

The CPI Detailed Report is a monthly report on consumer price movements, including statistical tables and technical notes. The indexes reflect data for the U.S. city average and selected areas.

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Price Movements September 1983

The Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) increased 0.5 percent before seasonal adjustment in September. The September level of 301.8 (1967=100) was 2.9 percent higher than the index in September 1982.

The Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) rose 0.4 percent in September, prior to seasonal adjustment, to a level of 300.8 (1967=100). For the 12-month period ended in September, the CPI-W has increased 2.7 percent. The CPI-W is used for indexing Social Security and some other Federal payments. It is also commonly used as an escalator in collective bargaining agreements.

CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U)—seasonally adjusted changes

On a seasonally adjusted basis, the CPI for All Urban Consumers rose 0.5 percent, following increases of 0.4 percent in both July and August. The transportation index registered a substantial increase again in September, primarily due to price increases for both new and used motor vehicles. Both the housing and food and beverage components advanced moderately, but by more than in August. Medical care and entertainment costs rose moderately in September. On the other hand, the index for apparel and upkeep was unchanged, while the other goods and services component declined slightly.

For the first 9 months of 1983, the CPI-U rose at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 3.7 percent. The third-quarter advance of 5.3 percent at an annual rate follows increases of 5.4 percent in the second quarter and 0.4 percent in the first quarter. The similarity in price behavior between the second and third quarters is evident at the major group level, as well as for the overall CPI. The transportation component rose sharply in both the second and third quarters and accounted for about 40 percent of the overall increase in the CPI. Housing costs, which rose at an annual rate of between 4 and 5 percent in each quarter, contributed about 30 percent in each quarter. Food and beverage prices rose slightly less than 2 percent in each quarter and and accounted for about 7 percent of the increase. Each of the other 4 major categories registered generally moderate increases in both quarters.

The transportation component advanced 0.8 percent in September, following a 1.0 percent increase in August. New and used car prices rose 1.0 and 2.1 percent, respectively, and accounted for over two-thirds of the transportation increase. The increase in new car prices primarily reflects the discontinuance of the latest domestic rebate programs and low inventory of both domestic and imported 1983 models. Used car prices have risen sharply in each of the last 5 months, increasing at an annual rate of almost 20 percent from April to September. Gasoline prices advanced 0.4 percent, after sea-

sonal adjustment. As of September, gasoline prices were 8 percent below their peak level in March 1982. Automobile finance charges, which advanced in August for the first time in 13 months, increased 0.6 percent in September. The index for public transportation rose 0.4 percent.

The housing component rose 0.5 percent in September, following a 0.2 percent increase in August. All three major housing groups—shelter, fuel and other utilities, and household furnishings and operations—contributed to the larger increase. Shelter costs increased 0.5 percent on average, with renters' costs up 0.7 percent, homeowners' costs up 0.5 percent, and maintenance and repairs down 0.4 percent. The 0.7 percent rise in the index for fuel and other utilities reflects large increases in fuel oil and electricity prices and small increases in prices for telephone services, natural gas, and water and sewerage. The index for household furnishings and operations increased 0.2 percent in September, following a small decline in August.

The 0.4 percent advance in the food and beverage component followed a 0.2 percent increase in August and declines in each of the preceding 2 months. Grocery store food prices rose 0.2 percent in September, as increases in the indexes for fruits and vegetables and other foods at home were partially offset by declines in the indexes for meats, poultry, fish and eggs, and cereal and bakery products. Prices for dairy products were unchanged. The impact of the prolonged summer drought was reflected in higher prices for fresh vegetables (up 5.3 percent), fats and oils (up 2.6 percent), and poultry (up 1.9 percent). On the other hand, the decline in meat prices is also drought related, as higher feed costs led to expanded slaughter rates and plentiful supplies. The other two components of the food and beverage index-restaurant meals and alcoholic beverages-increased 0.5 and 0.8 percent, respectively.

The medical care index rose 0.4 percent in Septem-

ber, continuing the moderating trend evident since March. The index for medical care commodities, which includes prescription and non-prescription drugs and medical supplies, increased 0.5 percent. Within medical care services, charges for professional services and hospital rooms rose 0.5 and 1.2 percent, respectively.

The index for apparel and upkeep was unchanged in September, following a 0.4 percent increase in August. Increases in prices for the new fall and winter lines of merchandise followed the normal seasonal pattern.

Increases in tuition and other school fees were substantial prior to seasonal adjustment (up 6.2 percent), but less than in recent years. Therefore, after seasonal adjustment, the other goods and services index declined 0.1 percent.


The index for entertainment increased 0.4 percent, about the same as in recent months.

CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W)—seasonally adjusted changes

On a seasonally adjusted basis, the CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers rose 0.4 percent in September, following an increase of 0.5 percent in August. The acceleration in the food and beverage component was more than offset by a decline in the other goods and services component and smaller increases in the other five major categories of consumer spending.


The 0.4 percent rise in the CPI-W compares with an increase of 0.5 percent in the CPI-U. In the CPI-U, the homeowners' cost index—which uses a rental equivalence approach—rose 0.5 percent in September. Homeownership in the CPI-W, which is based on house prices, mortgage interest rates, property taxes, property insurance, and maintenance and repair costs, rose 0.2 percent in September. Increases in mortgage interest rates, property insurance, and property taxes were partially offset by declines in house prices and maintenance and repair costs.

* Percent changes over 12—month spans are calculated from unadjusted data. Percent changes over 1—month spans are annual rates calculated from seasonally adjusted data.


Chart 2: CPI-U: Housing, apparel and upkeep, 1972-83



Technical Notes

Brief Explanation of the CPI

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of the average change in prices over time in a fixed market basket of goods and services. Effective with the January 1978 index, the Bureau of Labor Statistics began publishing CPI's for two population groups: (1) a new CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) which covers approximately 80 percent of the total noninstitutional civilian population; and (2) a revised CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) which represents about half the population covered by the CPI-U. The CPI-U includes, in addition to wage earners and clerical workers, groups which historically have been excluded from CPI coverage, such as professional, managerial, and technical workers, the self-employed, short-term workers, the unemployed, and retirees and others not in the labor force.

The CPI is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter, and fuels, transportation fares, charges for doctors' and dentists' services, drugs, and the other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. Prices are collected in 85 urban areas across the country from about 18,000 tenants, 18,000 housing units for property taxes, and about 24,000 establishments—grocery and department stores, hospitals, filling stations, and other types of stores and service establishments. All taxes directly associated with the purchase and use of items are included in the index. Prices of food, fuels, and few other items are obtained every month in all 85 locations. Prices of most other commodities and services are collected every month in the five largest geographic areas and every other month in other areas. Prices of most goods and services are obtained by personal visits of the Bureau's trained representatives. Mail questionnaires are used to obtain public utility rates, some fuel prices, and certain other items.

In calculating the index, price changes for the various items in each location are averaged together with weights which represent their importance in the spending of the appropriate population group. Local data are then combined to obtain a U.S. city average. Separate indexes are also published by size of city, by region of the country, for cross-classifications of regions and population-size classes, and for 28 local areas. Area indexes do not measure differences in the level of prices among cities; they only measure the average change in prices for each area since the base period.

The index measures price changes from a designated reference date—1967—which equals 100.0. An increase of 122 percent, for example, is shown as 222.0. This change can also be expressed in dollars as follows: The price of a base period "market basket" of goods and services in the CPI has risen from \$10 in 1967 to \$22.20.

A Note About Calculating Index Changes

Movements of the indexes from one month to another are usually expressed as percent changes rather than changes in index points because index point changes are affected by the level of the index in relation to its base period while percent changes are not. The example in the accompanying box illustrates the computation of index point and percent changes.

Percent changes for 3-months and 6-month periods are expressed as annual rates and are computed according to the standard formula for compound growth rates. These data indicate what the percent change would be if the current rate were maintained for a 12-month period.

Seasonally Adjusted and Unadjusted Data

Because price data are used for different purposes by different groups, the Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes seasonally adjusted as well as unadjusted changes each month.

For analyzing general price trends in the economy, seasonally adjusted changes are usually preferred since they eliminate the effect of changes that normally occur at the same time and in about the same magnitude every year—such as price movements resulting from changing climatic conditions, production cycles, model changeovers, holidays, and sales.

The unadjusted data are also used extensively for escalation purposes. Many collective bargaining contract agreements and pension plans, for example, tie compensation changes to the Consumer Price Index unadjusted for seasonal variation.

Seasonal factors used to compute the seasonally adjusted indexes are derived by the X-11 Variant of the Census Method II Seasonal Adjustment Program. Annual updates replace 5 years of seasonal data, e.g., data from 1977 through 1981 were replaced at the end of 1981. The seasonal movement of all items and 35 other aggregations is derived by combining the seasonal movement of 45 selected components. Each year the seasonal status of every series is reevaluated based upon certain statistical criteria. If any of the 45 selected components changes its seasonal status, seasonal data from 1967 forward for the all-items and for any of the 35 other aggregations that have that series as a component are replaced.

Homeownership Changes

Effective with release of the index for January 1983, the Bureau of Labor Statistics changed the way homeowner costs are measured in the CPI-U to rental equivalence. The rental equivalence approach calculates homeowner costs of the shelter based on the implicit rent owners would have to pay to rent the homes they own. The old method calculated homeowner costs as home purchase, mortgage interest costs, property taxes, property insurance and, maintenance and repair.

As previously announced, the CPI-W will be changed to rental equivalence effective with data for January 1985. The CPI experimental measures, known as the CPI-U, X-1 through CPI-U, X-5 are no longer being published.

The new homeowners' cost component was introduced into the CPI-U in such a manner that the indexes using the old and new methodologies were equal in the so-called link month—December 1982. A similar technique will be employed for the CPI-W in December 1984. This technical procedure has been used in previous revisions of the CPI. In accordance with historical practice, the BLS made available calculations for the CPI-U from January to June 1983 based on the old method of homeownership. A 6-month overlap period for the CPI-W will also be made available to users; it will run from January to June 1985.

The new homeowners' cost component is similar to the one used in the CPI-U, X-1, with 4 important refinements. First, BLS has calculated a set of owner weights for the individual units in the CPI rent sample. These new weights make the rent sample represent owner occupied housing and permit the calculation of a rent change estimate for homeowners.


Second, the Bureau has augmented the rent sample in order to enhance the rental equivalence measure. This new sampling is concentrated in areas where the housing is predominantly owner-occupied in order to increase the proportion of rental units that have characteristics similar to owner-occupied units.

Third, the expenditure weight for rental equivalence, which for the experimental index, X-1, was calculated by means of a short-cut method, has been recalculated using the complex statistical estimating procedure used for weights in the official CPI. In addition, the weights associated with other homeowner expenditures for such things as insurance, appliances, and maintenance and repairs have been modified to be consistent with the rental equivalence concept. This enhancement has improved the quality of the national CPI's rental equivalence weight and provides weights for computation of local area CPI-U's using the rental equivalence approach.

Finally, the computer system which produces the CPI each month has been expanded to accommodate the calculation, with complete item and geographic detail, and with proper geographic weighting for the rental equivalence approach. BLS will continue to work on other refinements in the statistical estimating techniques used in the rental equivalence measure.
