

The CPI Detailed Report is a monthly report on consumer price movements, including statistical tables and technical notes. The report covers two indexes, the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) and the Consumer Price Index for Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W). The indexes reflect data for the U.S. city average and selected areas.

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Price Movements October 1984

The Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) increased 0.3 percent before seasonal adjustment in October, to a level of 315.3 (1967=100). For the 12-month period ended in October, the CPI-U increased 4.2 percent.

The Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) was virtually unchanged in October, prior to seasonal adjustment. The October level of 312.2 (1967=100) was 3.6 percent higher than the index in October 1983. The CPI-W is used for indexing Social Security and some other Federal payments. It is also commonly used as an escalator in collective bargaining agreements.

CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U)—seasonally adjusted changes

On a seasonally adjusted basis, the CPI for All Urban Consumers rose 0.4 percent in October, the same as in September. This change is in line with the average experience during 1984, in which the CPI-U has advanced at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 4.2 percent during the first 10 months. In October, the index for food and beverages increased, following a slight decline in September. The transportation and medical care components advanced somewhat more than in the preceding month. On the other hand, the housing index rose more slowly in October. Increases for the other three major groups—apparel and upkeep, entertainment, and other goods and services—were generally moderate and about the same as in September.

The food and beverage component registered a 0.4 percent increase in October. Grocery store food prices, which declined 0.3 percent in September, advanced 0.4 percent in October, largely due to a turnaround in the indexes for meats, poultry, fish, and eggs and for fruits and vegetables. While prices in the market for most of these items were lower, the decreases were smaller than usual this October. A 1.0 percent increase in beef prices, following seasonal adjustment, more than offset declines in prices for pork (down 0.8 percent) and poultry (down 1.5 percent). The index for fruits and vegetables advanced 1.4 percent in October, following seasonal adjustment. The index for dairy products rose 0.5 percent in October and has risen more in the past 2 months—up 1.3 percent—than in the first 8 months of this year. Other major grocery store food groups registered very moderate increases in October. The other two components of the food and beverage index—restaurant meals and alcoholic beverages rose 0.4 and 0.6 percent, respectively.

The transportation component advanced 0.7 percent in October. This compares with a 0.5 percent rise in September and a decline in the preceding 3-month period. The movement of gasoline prices has been primarily responsible for this changing behavior, increasing 1.1 percent in September and 1.8 percent in October after registering declines in each of the 3 preceding months. Despite the advances in the past 2 months, gasoline prices are 2.3 percent lower than at the end of 1983 and 13.0 percent below their peak level of March

1981. Larger increases in automobile insurance and automobile finance charges, up 1.7 and 1.2 percent, respectively, also contributed to the acceleration in the transportation component in October. On the other hand, automobile prices moderated. Used car prices declined 0.3 percent, following seasonal adjustment, the third decrease in the past 4 months. New car prices rose 0.2 percent, following increases of 0.5 percent in each of the 3 preceding months. (For a report on quality change for 1985 cars, see BLS news release USDL 84-468, Nov. 9 1984.) The index for public transportation, which declined in September, rose 0.4 percent in October, due to a turnaround in airline fares.

The October increase of 0.1 percent in the housing component followed a 0.4 percent rise in September and still larger increases in the 2 preceding months. A decline in the index for fuels and utilities was primarily responsible for the slowdown in October. Charges for gas and electricity, both of which had risen sharply in the third quarter, declined in October-down 1.3 and 1.7 percent, respectively. Conversely, fuel oil prices rose 0.8 percent, following declines in each of the 4 preceding months. The other two major housing groups also contributed to the moderation. Shelter costs rose 0.4 percent in October—somewhat less than in the 3 preceding months—with renters' costs advancing 0.5 percent, homeowners' costs 0.4 percent, and maintenance and repair costs declining 0.3 percent. The index for household furnishings and operations rose 0.1 percent in October, following increases of 0.6 percent in both August and September. Declines in prices for textile housefurnishings, appliances (including televisions), and other household equipment were primarily responsible for the slowdown.

The medical care component rose 0.5 percent in October, following increases of 0.3 percent in both August and September. The index for medical care commodities—prescription drugs, non-prescription drugs, and medical supplies—advanced 0.8 percent. The cost of medical care services rose 0.5 percent, with hospital

rooms and professional services up 0.7 and 0.6 percent, respectively.

The index for apparel and upkeep increased 0.5 percent in October, largely due to a 1.3 percent increase in prices for women's and girls' clothing. After declining slightly during the first 6 months of 1984, the index for apparel and upkeep has advanced during the past 4 months, bringing the seasonally adjusted annual rate of change to 2.8 percent for the first 10 months of the year.

The entertainment and other goods and services components both rose 0.4 percent in October, the same as in September.

CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W)—seasonally adjusted changes

On a seasonally adjusted basis, the CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers rose 0.2 percent in October. This compares with an increase of 0.4 percent in the CPI-U. In the CPI-U, the homeowners' cost index—which uses a rental equivalence approach—rose 0.4 percent in October. Homeownership in the CPI-W, which is based on house prices, mortgage interest rates, property taxes, property insurance, and maintenance and repair costs, declined 0.4 percent in October, primarily due to a 0.8 percent drop in mortgage interest rates

Changes in frequency of publication for local area CPI's to begin in 1987

The Bureau of Labor Statistics will improve the sample of urban areas in which it gathers prices for monthly preparation of the Consumer Price Index beginning in 1987. At the same time, the Bureau will publish a number of local area CPI's less frequently.

The changes in publication frequency arise from the requirement to allocate the sample to reflect population shifts in the 1980 Census so as to provide the most accurate national CPI possible with the funds available. As a result, some local areas will no longer have samples sufficient to permit more frequent publication.

In addition to the national index for all cities, the Bureau now publishes indexes for 28 urban areas. In 1987, it will continue to publish indexes for all but one of these areas—Northeast Pennsylvania (Scranton-Wilkes-Barre).

Of the remaining 27 published urban areas, 13 will have a reduction in frequency beginning in 1987. The index for Detroit, currently published monthly, will be published every other month. Twelve areas now published bimonthly will be compiled on a semiannual average basis. These areas are: Buffalo-Niagara Falls, NY; Cincinnati-Hamilton, OH-KY-IN; Kansas City, MO-Kansas City, KS; Milwaukee, WI; Minneapolis-St. Paul, MN-WI; Atlanta, GA; Anchorage, AK; Denver-Boul-

der, CO; Honolulu, HI; Portland-Vancouver, OR-WA; San Diego, CA; and Seattle-Tacoma, WA. Also, the Cleveland-Akron-Lorain, OH, indexes will be published in even-numbered rather then odd-numbered months.

Reconciling Two Measures of Consumer Price Change: Third Quarter 1984

This article continues the analysis presented in the July 1984 CPI Detailed Report of differences between two major price measures—The Consumer Price Index (CPI-U) published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and the Implicit Price Deflator for Personal Consumption Expenditures (PCE) published by the Bureau of Economic Analysis of the Department of Commerce. More information on the technique of reconciliation appears in the September 1981 Monthly Labor Review.

Cumulative differences

The reconciliation begins with a comparison of cumulative percent changes in the indexes from the 1972 reference base (1972 = 100) through the third quarter of 1984 (see table C). During this period, the CPI-U increased 149.2 percent to a level of 249.2 while the PCE rose 121.5 percent to a level of 221.5. The total cumulative difference between the two measures of 27.7 percentage points as of third quarter 1984 reflects a modest nar-

The narrowing of cumulative differences is reflected in both the weighting differences and all "other" effects. The impact of weighting differences is determined through the comparison of two different PCE indexes, one using current weights and another using fixed weights. This weighting impact decreased slightly from 10.8 percentage points in the second quarter to 10.7 percent in the third. The "other" effects, which consists primarily of different methods of seasonal adjustment and some different data sources in the PCE, totaled 2.9 percentage points after the third quarter, down from the 3.0 percentage point difference in the second quarter.

Period-to-period differences

Differences in the quarterly rates of the CPI and PCE (see table D), reflect period-to-period movements in the two inflation measures. The chain weight PCE, which is used in place of the current weight PCE,³ increased 3.9

an additional constant cumulative housing effect—15.3 percent for annual data, 14.1 percent for quarterly data.

rowing from the second quarter cumulated difference of 27.9 percent. Deleting the constant residual housing effect (14.1 percent for quarterly data), due to different treatment of homeowners' costs prior to January 1983, the remaining cumulative difference of 13.6 percent can be attributable to the effects of weighting and "other" differences.²


percent during the third quarter, 0.4 percent higher than the 3.5 percent increase in the CPI-U. The advance of 4.0 percent in the fixed weight PCE was 0.1 percent higher than the chain weight PCE. This 0.1 percent positive weighting effect, however, was more than offset by the 0.5 percent decline in the "other" effects, resulting in an overall negative difference of 0.4 percent.

These two components of the total quarterly change showed a turnaround from their respective second quarter movements. The weighting effect had decreased 0.2 percent in the second quarter before the 0.1 percent increase in the third. The "other" effects increase of 0.6 percent in the second quarter was followed by a 0.5 percent decrease in third quarter 1984. The relatively small period-to-period differences between the recent rates of inflation as measured by the CPI and the PCE—0.4 percent in the third quarter—and the decrease in the third quarter cumulative differences, both reflect a general narrowing of differences since the change in the treatment of homeowners' cost in the CPI-U in 1983.



Chart 1. CPI-U: All items, food and beverages, 1973-84




• Percent changes over 12—month spans are calculated from unadjusted data. Percent changes over 1—month spans are annual rates calculated from seasonally adjusted data.

Chart 2. CPI-U: Housing, apparel and upkeep, 1973-84




• Percent changes over 12-month spans are calculated from unadjusted data. Percent changes over 1-month spans are annual rates calculated from seasonally adjusted data.

NOTE: Local area CPI indexes are by-products of the national CPI program. Because each local index is a small subset of the national index, it has a smaller sample size and is, therefore, subject to substantially more sampling and other measurement error than the national index. As a result, local area indexes show greater volatility than the national index, although their long-term trends are quite similar.

Therefore, the Bureau of Labor Statistics strongly urges users to consider adopting the national average CPI for use in escalator clauses.

Technical Notes

Brief Explanation of the CPI

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of the average change in prices over time in a fixed market basket of goods and services. Effective with the January 1978 index, the Bureau of Labor Statistics began publishing CPI's for two population groups: (1) a new CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) which covers approximately 80 percent of the total noninstitutional civilian population; and (2) a revised CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) which represents about half the population covered by the CPI-U. The CPI-U includes, in addition to wage earners and clerical workers, groups which historically have been excluded from CPI coverage, such as professional, managerial, and technical workers, the self-employed, short-term workers, the unemployed, and retirees and others not in the labor force.

The CPI is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter, and fuels, transportation fares, charges for doctors' and dentists' services, drugs, and the other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. Prices are collected in 85 urban areas across the country from about 18,000 tenants, 18,000 housing units for property taxes, and about 24,000 establishments—grocery and department stores, hospitals, filling stations, and other types of stores and service establishments. All taxes directly associated with the purchase and use of items are included in the index. Prices of food, fuels, and a few other items are obtained every month in all 85 locations. Prices of most other commodities and services are collected every month in the five largest geographic areas and every other month in other areas. Prices of most goods and services are obtained by personal visits of the Bureau's trained representatives. Mail questionnaires are used to obtain public utility rates, some fuel prices, and certain other items.

In calculating the index, price changes for the various items in each location are averaged together with weights which represent their importance in the spending of the appropriate population group. Local data are then combined to obtain a U.S. city average. Separate indexes are also published by size of city, by region of the country, for cross-classifications of regions and population-size classes, and for 28 local areas. Area indexes do not measure differences in the level of prices among cities, they only measure the

average change in prices for each area since the base period.

The index measures price changes from a designated reference date—1967—which equals 100.0. An increase of 122 percent, for example, is shown as 222.0. This change can also be expressed in dollars as follows: The price of a base period "market basket" of goods and services in the CPI has risen from \$10 in 1967 to \$22.20.

Calculating Index Changes

Movements of the indexes from one month to another are usually expressed as percent changes rather than changes in index points, because index point changes are affected by the level of the index in relation to its base period while percent changes are not. The example in the accompanying box illustrates the computation of index point and percent changes.

Percent changes for 3-month and 6-month periods are expressed as annual rates and are computed according to the standard formula for compound growth rates. These data indicate what the percent change would be if the current rate were maintained for a 12-month period.

Homeownership Changes

Effective with data for January 1985, the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) will be changed to incorporate a rental equivalence measure of homeownership costs. The Bureau of Labor Statistics announced plans to change the treatment of homeownership costs on October 27, 1981. Effective with release of the index for January 1983, the BLS changed the way homeowner costs are measured in the CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) to rental equivalence.

rental equivalence approach calculates homeowner costs of the shelter based on the implicit rent owners would have to pay to rent the homes they own. The old method calculated homeowner costs as home purchase, mortgage interest costs, property taxes, property insurance and maintenance and repair. As with the CPI-U, the new homeownership component will be introduced in the CPI-W in such a manner that the indexes using the old and new methodologies will be equal in the so-called link month—December 1984 for the CPI-W. This technical procedure has also been used in previous revisions of the CPI. In accordance with historical practice, BLS will make available to users, for a 6-month overlap period after the change in the official indexes, calculations based on the current treatment of homeownership. In the case of the CPI-W, the overlap period will run from January to June 1985.

Seasonally Adjusted and Unadjusted Data


Because price data are used for different purposes by different groups, the Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes seasonally adjusted as well as unadjusted changes each month.

For analyzing general price trends in the economy, seasonally adjusted changes are usually preferred since they eliminate the effect of changes that normally occur at the same time and in about the same magnitude every year - such as price movements resulting from changing climatic conditions, production cycles, model changeovers, holidays, and sales.

The unadjusted data are of primary interest to consumers concerned about the prices they actually pay. Unadjusted data also are used extensively for escalation purposes. Many collective bargaining contract agreements and pension plans, for example, tie compensation changes to the Consumer Price Index unadjusted for seasonal variation.

Seasonal factors used in computing the seasonally adjusted indexes are derived by the X-11-ARIMA Seasonal Adjustment Method. The updated seasonal data at the end of 1977 replaced data from 1967 through 1977. Subsequent annual updates have replaced 5 years of seasonal data, e.g., data from 1979 through 1983 were replaced at the end of 1983. The seasonal movement of all items and 44 other aggregations is derived by combining the seasonal movement of 51 selected components. Each year the seasonal status of every series is reevaluated based upon certain statistical criteria. If any of the 51 components change their seasonal adjustment status from seasonally adjusted to not seasonally adjusted, not seasonally adjusted data will be used for the last five years, but the seasonally adjusted indexes will be used before that period. If any of the 51 components change their status from not seasonally adjusted to seasonally adjusted, seasonally adjusted data will be used for the last five years, but not seasonally adjusted indexes will be used before that period.

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
