





Price Movements

October 1994

The Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) rose 0.1 percent before seasonal adjustment in October to a level of 149.5 (1982-84=100). For the 12-month period ended in October, the CPI-U increased 2.6 percent.

The Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) increased 0.1 percent in October, prior to seasonal adjustment. The October 1994 CPI-W level of 147.0 was 2.6 percent higher than the index in October 1993.

CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U)

On a seasonally adjusted basis, the CPI-U rose 0.1 percent in October. (See table A.) This compares with an increase of 0.2 percent in September and was the smallest monthly advance since a similar rise in April. The food index was unchanged in October after advancing 0.3 percent or more in each of the 5 preceding months. The energy index declined 0.7 percent in October, the same as in September. The CPI-U excluding food and energy increased 0.2 percent in October, the same as in September.

During the first 10 months of 1994, the CPI-U rose at a 2.6-percent seasonally adjusted annual rate (SAAR). (See table B.) This compares with an increase of 2.7 percent in all of 1993. Thus far in 1994, the food index has increased

at an annual rate of 2.0 percent and energy costs at a 2.2-percent rate. The year-to-date annual rate for the index for all items less food and energy in 1994 was 2.8 percent. This follows a 3.2-percent increase in all of 1993 and continues the moderating pattern evident in this component since 1990.

The food and beverages index rose 0.1 percent in October. Grocery store food prices, which rose at a 7.2-percent SAAR in the third quarter, declined 0.1 percent. Of the five major grocery store food groups, only the index for fruits and vegetables registered an increase in October, advancing 0.4 percent. Increases in the indexes for fresh vegetables and processed fruits and vegetables—up 2.1 and 0.5 percent, respectively—more than offset a 1.3-percent decline in the index for fresh fruits. The index for meats, poultry, fish, and eggs declined 0.3 percent to a level only 0.1 percent higher than a year ago. Meat prices rose 0.1 percent, but were more than offset by declines in prices for poultry, eggs, and fish and seafood. A 0.2-percent decline in the pork index was more than offset by increases in prices for beef and other meats—up 0.1 and 0.5 percent, respectively. Poultry prices fell 1.3 percent after increasing 1.1 percent in September. The index for cereal and bakery products declined 0.1 percent, while the index for dairy products was unchanged. The index for other food at home,

which had increased 5.3 percent in the third quarter, largely due to the increase in coffee prices, fell 0.3 percent in October. Coffee prices, which had risen 22.4 and 22.0 percent in July and August, respectively, before stabilizing in September, advanced 0.9 percent in October. This increase, however, was more than offset by decreases in prices for carbonated drinks and prepared foods. The other two components of the food and beverages index—restaurant meals and alcoholic beverages—rose 0.1 percent and 0.2 percent, respectively.

The housing component rose 0.1 percent in October, the same as in September. Shelter costs increased 0.2 percent, following a 0.3-percent rise in September. Within shelter, renters' costs and homeowners' costs rose 0.5 and 0.2 percent, respectively, while maintenance and repair costs fell 0.6 percent. The increase in renters' costs reflects a 1.5-percent rise in other renters' costs; residential rents advanced 0.1 percent. The index for fuel and other utilities—down 0.2 percent—declined for the second consecutive month, but by less than in September. The index for household fuels fell 0.4 percent, reflecting declines in the indexes for fuel oil and natural gas—down 2.3 and 1.2 percent, respectively. The index for electricity rose 0.3 percent. (Prior to seasonal adjustment, charges for electricity fell 4.1 percent, reflecting the shift to off-season rates.) The index for other utilities and public services rose 0.1 percent in October, as increases in the indexes for water and sewerage maintenance and for refuse collection were partially offset by small declines in the indexes for telephone services and for cable television. The index for household furnishings and operation was unchanged in October, following a decrease of 0.1 percent in September.

The transportation index, which increased slightly in September, decreased 0.2 percent in October, reflecting larger declines than in September in the indexes for both

motor fuels and for public transportation costs. The index for gasoline declined 1.1 percent in October, following a 0.6-percent drop in September, and is now 14.8 percent lower than its peak level recorded in December 1990. The index for public transportation, which declined 0.7 percent in September, fell 2.1 percent in October, reflecting a 2.6-percent decrease in airline fares. Automobile purchase costs decelerated in October. The index for new vehicles, which rose 0.5 percent in September, was unchanged in October. (Prior to seasonal adjustment, prices for new vehicles rose 0.7 percent. As of October, the proportion of 1995 models in the index was about one-third of the new car sample. They will continue to be phased in over the next several months as new models replace the old at dealerships. For a report on quality changes for the 1995 cars, see *Producer Price Indexes November 1994*.) Automobile finance charges continued to increase, but by less than in September, advancing 1.0 percent in October and 16.8 percent thus far in 1994. The index for used cars rose 1.4 percent.

The index for apparel and upkeep declined for the fourth consecutive month, down 0.5 percent in October. (Prior to seasonal adjustment, clothing prices rose 0.8 percent.) Price increases associated with the introduction of fall-winter wear in 1994 have been smaller than in recent years.

Medical care costs rose 0.6 percent in October, following increases of 0.4 percent in each of the 5 preceding months, and are 4.7 percent higher than a year earlier. The index for medical care commodities—prescription drugs, nonprescription drugs, and medical supplies—rose 0.4 percent in October. The index for medical care services rose 0.6 percent. Charges for professional services and hospital and related services increased 0.6 and 0.3 percent, respectively.

The entertainment index increased 0.1 percent in Octo-

ber, the same as in September. A 1.7-percent increase in the October index for fees for participant sports, reflecting a return to regular prices after substantial discounting in the 2 preceding months, offset price declines in the indexes for reading materials and for admissions to movies, theaters, concerts, and sporting events.

The index for other goods and services rose 0.4 percent in October after advancing 0.1 percent in September. Increases in the indexes for tobacco and smoking products

and for personal expenses—up 0.8 and 0.7 percent, respectively—accounted for over three-fourths of the October rise in the other goods and services index.

CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W)

On a seasonally adjusted basis, the CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers rose 0.1 percent in October.

Improvements to CPI Procedures: Prescription Drugs

Effective with the calculation of the index for January 1995, the CPI will change its treatment of prescription drugs that lose patent protection. Under the new procedure, after a drug in the CPI sample loses patent protection, the CPI field representative responsible for that observation will select among all therapeutically-equivalent drugs (including the original) sold in the selected retail outlet to give generic versions of the drug a chance to be selected as substitutes for the original drug. The reselection will occur 6 months after the patent expires in order to give the emerging generic drugs time to gain market share, because the chance of selection is proportional to the sales of each version of the drug. When a substitute is selected, the CPI will treat the price difference between the original drug and its selected substitute as a price change and will reflect it in the index. The current CPI practice allows such a substitution only if the original drug was no longer sold at the selected

outlet, a relatively rare occurrence. Drugs that enter the sample after their patent has expired will not be affected by the new procedure, because during CPI sample rotation generic versions also would have had a chance of being selected.

The Bureau has decided to implement this new procedure with drugs whose patents have expired since the beginning of 1993, because after patent expiration the shift in the market toward generic equivalents occurs gradually over time. The reselection process for these quotes will be spread over the first 6 months of 1995.

This change in method should have the effect of slightly slowing the rate of growth in the CPI prescription drugs component.

Improvements in Estimating the Shelter Indexes in the CPI

Two changes in the shelter component of the CPI will become effective in January 1995. These changes will improve the validity and reliability of the residential rent and owners' equivalent rent (OER) indexes.

Modification to the OER Formula for Estimating Implicit Rents for Owner-Occupied Units

Because there is no direct rent for an owner-occupied unit, an initial estimate of the rental value of the unit is obtained by the CPI Housing field representative, based on rental values supplied by the homeowner, combined with the field representative's knowledge of the local market. The initial estimate is then updated by an estimate of rent change for the unit. Rent change for each owner-occupied unit is estimated using rent changes for rental units that are similar to the owner-occupied unit. The initial estimate and the subsequent estimates of rent for the owner-occupied unit are called implicit rents. The estimate of rent change for owner-occupied units is called the implicit rent change relative.

There will be no change to the process that matches rental units to owner-occupied units based on similarities in location, structure type, and general unit characteristics. The process that calculates the current implicit rent (T) by multiplying the implicit rent from 6 months earlier (T-6) by the implicit rent change relative will remain unchanged. The current implicit rent is still calculated using the following formula:

$$\text{Implicit rent } T = \text{implicit rent } T-6 \times \text{implicit rent change relative}$$

The change will be in the formula that will be used to calculate the implicit rent change relative. Starting in January 1995, the unweighted sum of the matched current rents will be divided by the unweighted sum of the matched previous rents to estimate the implicit rent change relative. The new equation, simplified to exclude the depreciation adjustment, is:

$$\text{New implicit rent change relative} = \frac{\sum \text{pure rent in } T \text{ for all matched rental units}}{\sum \text{pure rent in } T-6 \text{ for all matched rental units}}$$

From January 1987 through December 1994 the formula for the implicit rent change relative was the unweighted average of rent ratios from the matched rental units. The equation for calculating the implicit rent change relative, simplified to exclude an adjustment for the effect of depreciation on the value of a unit, is currently:

$$\text{New implicit rent change relative} = \frac{\sum \left(\frac{\text{pure rent in } T \text{ for all matched rental units}}{\text{pure rent in } T-6 \text{ for all matched rental units}} \right)}{\text{the number of matched rental units}}$$

The new formula, unlike the old, for the implicit rent change relative produces rent change relatives which are both proportionate and reciprocal. A relative is proportionate if it accurately reflects the average rent change of the matched rental units; a relative is reciprocal if an increase and a subsequent equal decrease in rents for the matched rental units causes the implicit rent to return to its starting point. Comparisons between the old and new equations for proportionality and reciprocity are provided at the end of these notes.

Replacing the Housing Composite Estimator

The current composite estimation process of combining the 1- and 6-month rent change relatives to calculate the residential rent and OER indexes at the market basket level¹ will be replaced by a method that uses only the 6-month rent change relative. The market basket level is the most detailed level for which the CPI calculates indexes. The rent change relative for a market basket is the weighted average change in rents for units in an area. The rent change relative for residential rent is based on rents for rental units and the rent change relative for OER is calculated using implicit rents for owner-occupied units.

The composite estimator currently used by the residential rent and OER indexes is a weighted combination of the 6-month price relative and the 1-month price relative. Rents used to calculate the residential rent index and the new implicit rents for owners in the OER index, are obtained from respondents every 6 months. During the interview, field representatives ask for both the current rent and the rent paid in the previous month. On-going research has shown that too few 1-month differences are captured in these interviews, and that this causes a downward bias.

Both residential rent and OER indexes use a composite

estimation approach to calculate the market basket level index. The composite estimator places 65 percent of the importance on the 1-month relative. The current formula for calculating the index for the current period (T) is:

$$\text{index T} = [(0.65) \times (\text{index T-1}) \times (1\text{-month relative for index})] + [(0.35) \times (\text{index T-6}) \times (6\text{-month relative for index})]$$

Upward changes in rents predominate in the national rent sample. When rents are rising and 1-month rent increases are missed, the housing indexes do not reflect the full increase in inflation.

To remove the problem caused by the undercount of 1-month changes, the composite estimator will be replaced with a new equation that only uses 6-month changes. The replacement equation for each current month index at the market basket level will take the one-sixth root of the 6-month change and multiply it by last month's index. The new equation is:

$$\text{index T} = (\text{index T-1}) \times (6\text{-month rent relative})^{1/6}$$

CPI field representatives will continue to collect information on the previous month rent question to further study the accuracy of reporting 1-month changes.

Expected Effect of Changes

Based on research and index recalculations the effect of the two changes on the OER index at the national level is estimated to be approximately -0.4 percent per year. Only one change affects the residential rent index. The impact at the national level on the change in the residential rent index is estimated to be approximately +0.2 percent per year. Because OER has 19 percent of the total relative importance for the national All Items CPI and residential rent has 6 percent, the overall yearly effect on the national All Items Index is anticipated to be roughly -0.07 percent.

Comparisons Between the Old and New Equations

The old equation has an upward bias because it relies on averaging the ratios of relatives of rent change. With this type of calculation, the changes in implicit rent were not proportionate and were not reciprocal. That is, equal but opposite dollar changes to two matched rental units do not cause a neutral impact. For example, consider the following five units:

Proportionality

Rental units A and B have equal but inverse dollar rent changes. If they are matched to an owner E with an original implicit rent of \$100, their impact is not proportional as their rent ratios do not average to 1.0. If apartment A's pure rent goes from \$100 to \$200, its relative is \$200/\$100 = 2.0. If apartment B's rent goes from \$200 down to \$100 at the same time, its relative is \$100/\$200 = 0.5. Averaging these two ratios together causes an upward bias problem: $(2.0 + 0.5) / 2 = 1.25$.

$$\text{The old implicit rent T+6} = \$100 \times 1.25 = \$125$$

Substituting the new equation for the old equation in the same example shows this result. When A's rent goes from \$100 to \$200 while B's rent goes from \$200 to \$100, we calculate:

$$\text{The new implicit rent T+6} = \$100 \times [(\$200 + \$100) / (\$100 + \$200)] = \$100$$

Equal dollar changes are proportionate and cancel each other out.

Reciprocity

Using the ratio of averages does not necessarily cause a reciprocal change. If an owner E is matched to apartment C and D and the rent for apartment C stays the same (\$100) over time but the rent for apartment D increases by \$100 and then decreases by \$100, the implicit rent does not return to its original level. In this example, the averaged relatives for the first time period are: $[(\$100/\$100) + (\$200/\$100)] / 2 = 1.5$. In the next time period, when the rent returns to its original level for apartment D, the averaged relatives become $[(\$100/\$100) + (\$100/\$200)] / 2 = 0.75$. Multiplying both averaged ratios by an implicit rent of \$100 causes the implicit rent at the end of the second period to be too high:

$$\text{The old implicit rent T+12} = \$100 \times 1.5 \times 0.75 = \$112.50$$

Substituting the new equation for the old equation in the same example shows this result. When C's rent stays at \$100 over time and D's rent goes up and then down by \$100, the implicit rent is reciprocal as it returns to its starting point:

$$\text{The new implicit rent T+12} = \$100 \times [(\$100 + \$200) / (\$100 + \$100)] \times [(\$100 + \$100) / (\$100 + \$200)] = \$100$$

Improving CPI Sample Rotation Procedures

Effective with the calculation of the index for January 1995, an improvement will be made in the method for calculating price change when new samples for most food items are introduced. This article will briefly summarize the current method of calculating price change as well as the new method to be introduced in January.

The universe of consumer goods and services in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) is divided into 207 component item strata and 44 geographic areas, stratifying the CPI into 9,108 basic item-area components (207 item components x 44 areas). Within each basic item-area component, price relatives are calculated using a weighted average of price change for sampled items. Those price relatives are then used to update estimates of expenditures across items and geographic areas.

Within basic item-area components, the CPI has used a point-of-purchase survey (POPS) since 1978 to provide the sampling frame of outlets for most goods and services in the CPI. Item and outlet samples are scientifically selected using probability proportionate to sales. To keep CPI samples representative of consumer purchases, the POPS survey is conducted annually in approximately 20 percent of the primary sampling units (or urban areas) in the CPI, where new outlets are selected to replace the old samples.

Sample rotation in the Consumer Price Index

Within most basic item-area components, expenditure estimates for each sampled item are derived from the POPS. Retail outlets are also drawn from the POPS, and are introduced into the index usually a year or two after the POPS survey is conducted.

The price index for each item-area component is updated each month by a price relative, as in:

$$\text{Index}_t = \text{Index}_{t-1} \times R_{t,t-1}$$

Ideally, $R_{t,t-1}$ is a Laspeyres-based estimate using the ratio of the current cost of purchasing the base period quantities in period t to the cost in the previous period $t-1$,

$$R_{t,t-1} = \frac{\sum P_t Q_b}{\sum P_{t-1} Q_b}$$

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where P is the price of an item and Q_b its base period quantity.

In practice, POPS base period quantities (Q_b) are not available; only estimates of expenditures (EX_b) are collected during the POPS reference period. Because expenditures are products of quantities and prices, a proxy for base period quantities can be estimated using the relation $Q_b = (EX_b / P_b)$, and the Laspeyres-based formula can be rewritten as:

$$R_{t,t-1} = \frac{\sum P_t (EX_b / P_b)}{\sum P_{t-1} (EX_b / P_b)}$$

Because the sample is drawn after the base period, the base-period prices (P_b) are also unknown, and a proxy base price (\hat{P}_b) for each selected item is calculated by dividing the link-month price of the item by the price change of the component item-area relative from the POPS reference period to the link month, as in

$$P_b = \frac{I_b}{I_{link}} P_{link}$$

where I_b is the component index value in the POPS base period and I_{link} is the index value at link month.

In the first month after the new sample is introduced, then, the price relative is:

$$R_{link+1, link} = \frac{\sum P_{link+1} (EX_b / P_b)}{\sum P_{link} (EX_b / P_b)}$$

or

$$R_{link+1, link} = \frac{\sum P_{link+1} [EX_b / (X * P_{link})]}{\sum P_{link} [EX_b / (X * P_{link})]}$$

where $X = I_b / I_{link}$.

In the formula above, there is a negative correlation between the starting price for the new sample (P_{link}) and the weight $[EX_b / (X * P_{link})]$. Thus, the lower the starting

(link month) price, the higher the weight of the quote. Because newly sampled items that are on sale or have unusually low link-month prices tend to increase in price in the next period, the formula has the effect of giving higher weights to items that are increasing in price.

For example, assume a set of banana prices where the average price in an area is always \$1.00, but prices between outlets can vary between \$0.50 to \$1.50. If a new sample of two equally weighted bananas in that area is introduced into the CPI where

	link month	link month + 1
Banana #1	\$1.50	\$1.00
Banana #2	\$0.50	\$1.00

then the price relative in link month +1 would be:

$$R_{\text{link}+1, \text{link}} = \frac{\sum P_{\text{link}+1} (EX_b / P_b)}{\sum P_{\text{link}} (EX_b / P_b)}$$

or, since the expenditures are equal in this example,

$$R_{\text{link}+1, \text{link}} = \frac{\sum (P_{\text{link}+1} / P_b)}{\sum (P_{\text{link}} / P_b)}$$

Therefore, the price relative would be

$$\frac{(1.00 / 1.50) + (1.00 / 0.50)}{(1.50 / 1.50) + (0.50 / 0.50)} = \frac{0.67 + 2.0}{2} = 1.33$$

or a 33-percent increase.

Change in CPI methods for introducing new samples

Breaking the correlation between the weight and the starting (link month) price would alleviate this bias. One

way to reduce the correlation would be to price the new sample (estimating the base period price for each item in the new sample) months before actually using the prices in index calculation. During this time frame, the old sample would continue to be used in index calculations. Although it is costly to collect prices for both the new and old sample at the same time, this approach would be of particular benefit for those items where prices are highly volatile from month to month, such as for most apparel and food items. Indeed, this method is already in place in the CPI for apparel commodities.

Starting in January 1995, BLS will begin the pricing of overlap samples for food-at-home categories for 3 months. This means that the CPI would continue to price and use in the index calculation the old samples for food-at-home observations for 3 months after the introduction of new food-at-home samples that would be priced but not used in index calculations. By doing this, base-period prices can be calculated that are much less likely to be correlated with price change after the new sample is linked into the index. Research indicates that the pricing of double samples for food at home for 3 months will result in the food at home index increasing about 0.3-0.4 percent less per year under the new method.

Mathematically, the calculation of the basic item-area price relatives for food at home will then be:

$$R_{\text{link}+1, \text{link}} = \frac{\sum P_{\text{link}+1} [EX_b / (X * P_{\text{link}-3})]}{\sum P_{\text{link}} [EX_b / (X * P_{\text{link}-3})]}$$

where $X = I_b / I_{\text{link}-3}$.

CPI-U 12-month changes, 1985 to present



Technical Notes

Brief Explanation of the CPI

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of the average change in prices over time in a fixed market basket of goods and services. The Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes CPI's for two population groups: (1) a CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) which covers approximately 80 percent of the total population and (2), a CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) which covers 32 percent of the total population. The CPI-U includes, in addition to wage earners and clerical workers, groups such as professional, managerial, and technical workers, the self-employed, short-term workers, the unemployed, and retirees and others not in the labor force.

The CPI is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter, fuels, transportation fares, charges for doctors' and dentists' services, medicine, and the other goods that people buy for day-to-day living. Prices are collected in 85 urban areas across the country from about 57,000 housing units and approximately 19,000 retail establishments—department stores, supermarkets, hospitals, gasoline stations and other types of stores and services establishments. All taxes directly associated with the purchase and use of items are included in the index. Prices of food, fuel, and a few other items are obtained every month in all 85 locations. Prices of most other commodities and services are collected every month in the five largest geographic areas and every other month in other areas. Prices of most goods and services are obtained by either personal visits or telephone calls from the Bureau's trained representatives. Some data, such as used car prices, are obtained from secondary sources.

In calculating the index, price changes for the various items in each location are averaged together with weights which represent their importance in the spending of the appropriate population group. Local data are then combined to obtain a U.S. city average. Separate indexes are also published by size of city, by region of country, for cross-classifications of regions and population-size classes, and for 29 local areas. Area indexes do not measure differences in the level of prices among cities, they only measure the average change in prices for each area since the base period.

The indexes measure price change from a designated reference date, usually 1982-84, which equals 100.0. An increase of 7 percent, for example, is shown as 107.0. This change can also be expressed in dollars as follows: the price of a base period "market basket" of goods and services in the CPI has risen from \$100 in 1982-84 to \$107.

Calculating Index Changes

Movements of the indexes from one month to another are usually expressed as percent changes rather than changes in index points, because index point changes are affected by the level of the index in relation to its base period while percent changes are not. The example in the accompanying box illustrates the computation of index point and percent changes.

Percent changes for 3-month and 6-month periods are expressed as annual rates and are computed according to the standard formula for compound growth rates. These data indicate what the percent change would be if the current rate were maintained for a 12-month period.

Energy Prices


Prices are usually available for the U.S. city average, 15 large metropolitan areas, the four census regions, four size classifications, and 13 areas reflecting the four Census regions cross-classified by the four population sizes. However, not all energy commodities and services are used in every area of the country. Fuel oil, for example, is not a common heating fuel in some urban areas, particularly in the South and West. Where no average prices are available, the designation NA appears. This designation also appears if the data sufficiency criteria have not been met in any given month. For example, if there are fewer than five usable fuel oil prices for a published city or region size class, no fuel oil prices for the area will be published.

All prices are collected monthly by BLS representatives in the urban areas priced for the CPI. Prices for natural gas and electricity include fuel and purchased gas adjustments and all applicable taxes. Fuel oil and gasoline prices include applicable Federal, State, and local taxes.

Natural gas and electricity. Natural gas prices are reported in therms, which are a measure of heating value. Electricity prices are given in kilowatt hours (kwh). For both utility services, the consumption ranges specified in table P2 are the upper and lower limits of the bill sizes priced for the Consumer Price Index. The average prices per therm and per kilowatt hour are calculated from bills priced within these ranges. It should be noted that bills priced for the CPI are not only for different consumption amounts, but may also be calculated from different types of residential rate schedules. *The average price per therm and per kilowatt hour are not, therefore, generally suitable for use in place-to-place price comparisons.*

The average prices for 40 and 100 therms of natural gas for 500 kilowatt hours of electricity (table P1) are calculated from a special price collection program. They are not used in the calculation of the CPI. Since heating and air-conditioning requirements vary by geographic location, climate, and weather conditions, it cannot be inferred that these consumption amounts represent those used by a typical residen-

tial consumer. These bills are used merely to track price changes over time for constant amounts of consumption, and to provide continuity with prices of natural gas and electricity formerly published in conjunction with the unrevised Consumer Price Index.

Fuel oil. Only #2 fuel oil (home heating oil) is priced. Prices are collected, in most cases, for quantities greater than one gallon. These prices are converted to a gallon price for this program. Fuel oil prices reflect discounts for quantity and/or quick payment.

Gasoline. Gasoline prices are collected at the pump from a sample of full service, mini-service, and self-serve gas stations.

Approximate British Termal Unit (BTU) values for some energy items are as follows, according to the source indicated:

1 therm = 100,000 BTU's (U.S. Department of Energy).

1 kwh = 3,412 BTU'S (Edison Electric Institute).

1 gallon #2 fuel oil = 140,000 BTU'S (U.S. Department of Energy).

Food Prices

In the revised CPI, actual weighted average prices are calculated each month at the national level and for the four Census geographic regions. As a result of changes in price collection methodology and sample sizes, average prices for individual cities cannot in general be produced. It is hoped however, that regional average prices will help satisfy the need for local area data. It should be noted that the average prices for food in this report reflect variations in brand, quality, and size among geographic areas. Users of average food prices should be aware that these differences exist.

Because a number of food commodities are not available in all areas on a year-round basis, prices will not appear in some months for some regions or for the U.S. city average. In other instances, sufficient prices may not be available due to temporary disruptions in supplies. Where no average prices are available, the designation NA appears. When a price is not available from an individual store in any month, as estimated price will be calculated for the missing item and used in computing the average price. In cases where the proportion of estimated prices used to calculate the average is considered too high, the average price is not published and NA appears for that item in the table.

Because of space limitations in the table, the description for each item is abbreviated. More detailed specifications are available from the BLS regional offices or from the Washington office upon request.

Adjustment of Shelter Indexes for Aging Effects

Beginning with January 1988 CPI, the Bureau of Labor Statistics adjusts the monthly CPI shelter indexes for the

change in quality resulting from the effect of aging on rental housing. In January 1987, the Bureau announced its intention to begin making such adjustments, assuming that further research substantiated the need to do so. The decision to implement the adjustment was based on extensive BLS research, in which alternative adjustment methods were explored and tested. Evaluation of the research indicates that an aging effect exists, and that the chosen method is operationally feasible.¹ The adjustment affect CPI shelter indexes, which would have been raised by 0.2 percent for the year 1987 had an aging adjustment been applied.

The quality of housing unit decreases as the unit ages. Existing BLS methods are used to correct for relatively easily measured quality changes such as the addition of an extra bedroom, but such methods are inadequate to correct for deterioration in the condition of housing unit.²

The aging adjustment method was specifically designed to correct for quality changes associated with this deterioration. The BLS used hedonic regression methods to estimate the aging effect.

The estimates were then used to correct the CPI rent and rental equivalence indexes. Hedonic regressions are statistical functions that relate the price of a good to its attributes or characteristics. For example, a hedonic regression relates a housing unit's rent to its size, age, location, etc. By using BLS housing survey data from 1987 and Census data from 1980, hedonic regression methods provided estimates of the relationship between a housing unit's rent and age while other housing unit characteristics were held constant. The estimated relationship was then used to construct the aging adjustment. Estimates will be recomputed annually by using the previous year's BLS housing survey data and the most recently available Census data.

Seasonally Adjusted and Unadjusted Data

Because price data are used for different purposes by different groups, the Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes seasonally adjusted as well as unadjusted changes each month. For analyzing general price trends in the economy, seasonally adjusted changes are usually preferred since they eliminate the effect of changes that normally occur at the same time and in about the same magnitude every year—such as price movements resulting from changing climatic conditions, production cycles, model changeovers, holidays, and sales.

The unadjusted data are of primary interest to consumers concerned about the prices they actually pay. Unadjusted data also are used extensively for escalation purposes. Many collective bargaining contract agreements and pension plans, for example, tie compensation changes to the Consumer Price Index unadjusted for seasonal variation.

In most cases, seasonal factors used in computing the seasonally adjusted indexes are derived by the X-11- ARIMA Seasonal Adjustment Method. The updated seasonal data at the end of 1977 replaced data from 1967 through 1977. Subsequent annual updates have replaced 5 years of seasonal data, for example, data from 1987 through 1991 were replaced at the end of 1991. The seasonal movement of all items and 47 other aggregations is derived by combining the seasonal movement of 60 selected components. Each year the seasonal status of every series is reevaluated based upon certain statistical criteria. Occasionally, a component changes its seasonal adjustment status from seasonally adjusted to not seasonally adjusted. When this occurs, not seasonally adjusted data are used for the last 5 years, but before that period the seasonally adjusted indexes remain in calculations of higher-level seasonally adjusted indexes.

Effective with the calculation of the seasonal factors for 1990, the Bureau of Labor Statistics has used an enhanced seasonal adjustment procedure called intervention analysis in conjunction with X-11-ARIMA for some CPI series. Intervention analysis allows for better estimates of seasonally adjusted data. Extreme values and/or sharp movements which might distort the seasonal pattern are removed from the data prior to calculation of seasonal factors in X-11-ARIMA.

For the fuel oil and the motor fuels indexes, this procedure was used to offset the effects that extreme price volatility would otherwise have had on the estimates of seasonally adjusted data for those series. For some women's apparel indexes and the girls' apparel index, the procedure was used to offset the effects of changes in pricing methodology; and for new cars, new trucks, and new vehicles, this procedure was used to offset the effects of changes in marketing strategies and the introduction of new models. For the tobacco and smoking products index, this procedure was used to offset the effects of increases in excise taxes and wholesale tobacco prices. For some alcoholic beverage series, intervention was used to offset the effects of excise tax increases.

An alternative to the intervention-adjusted X-11-ARIMA procedure is the state space model-based seasonal adjustment method. This method adjusts simultaneously for interventions and seasonal effects, rather than sequentially as in the X-11-ARIMA methodology, using structural statistical models with explanatory variables. The state space structural model-based method of seasonal adjustment was introduced in 1992 for the adjustment of January 1991-December 1991 indexes for three women's apparel series: Dresses, separates and sportswear, and suits.

CPI on Electronic Bulletin Board

A limited amount of CPI information is currently available via the Department of Labor's electronic bulletin board system (BBS). The data are accessible for downloading free of charge at virtually anytime to any person who has a personal computer with a modem and communications software. Included on the *Labor News* BBS are all items indexes for the CPI-U and CPI-W for both the U.S. city average and the Washington, D.C. area from 1980 to the present. Also included on the BBS are average prices for the U.S. from 1990 to the present for natural gas, electricity, fuel oil, and gasoline (all types, unleaded regular, and unleaded premium). More indexes or average prices may be added in the future.

Labor News is a menu-driven BBS. Users can select among choices presented on the screen to access the information desired. Typing a "?" will bring up a "Help" screen for on-line assistance. It is also possible to download a users manual for the BBS.

Please note that the BBS shuts down for maintenance every day from 3:00 A.M. to 3:15 A.M. (Eastern time), and Mondays from 7:30 A.M. to 8:00 A.M.
