






Price Movements

October 1995

The Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) rose 0.3 percent before seasonal adjustment in October to a level of 153.7 (1982-84=100). For the 12-month period ended in October, the CPI-U increased 2.8 percent.

The Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) rose 0.3 percent in October, prior to seasonal adjustment. The October 1995 CPI-W level of 151.0 was 2.7 percent higher than the index in October 1994.

CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U)

On a seasonally adjusted basis, the CPI-U rose 0.3 percent in October after increasing 0.1 percent in both August and September. The energy index, which had declined in each of the 3 preceding months rose 0.4 percent in October. Household fuel costs declined less than seasonally anticipated, while the index for motor fuels continued to fall, but by substantially less than in recent months. The food index, which rose 0.5 percent in September, advanced 0.3 percent in October as a downturn in the index for fresh fruits and vegetables more than offset larger increases in most other major grocery store food groups. Excluding food and energy, the CPI-U rose 0.3 percent, following increases of 0.2 percent in each

of the 5 preceding months. An upturn in the index for apparel and upkeep was primarily responsible for the larger advance in October.

During the first 10 months of 1995, the CPI-U rose at a 2.9-percent seasonally adjusted annual rate (SAAR). This compares with a 2.7-percent increase for all of 1994. The food index has risen at a 2.5-percent annual rate, while energy costs have decreased at a 1.9-percent rate. Excluding food and energy, the CPI-U advanced at a 3.3-percent annual rate in the first 10 months of 1995. This follows a 2.6-percent increase in all of 1994.

The food and beverage index rose 0.3 percent in October. Grocery store food prices, which rose 0.6 percent in September, increased 0.4 percent in October. The index for fruits and vegetables, which increased 2.4 percent in September, declined 0.2 percent in October. This deceleration more than offset larger increases in most other major grocery store food groups. In particular, the index for meats, poultry, fish, and eggs, which had risen 0.8 and 0.6 percent in the 2 preceding months, increased 1.0 percent in October, its largest monthly advance since a similar rise in April 1993. Meat prices increased 1.2 percent with beef prices up 0.6 percent; pork prices were up 1.4 percent; and prices for other meats rose, up 2.4 percent. Egg prices increased 4.1 percent in October, their third substantial increase in the past 4 months. The in-

dexes for cereal and bakery products and dairy products also accelerated in October, increasing 0.5 and 0.7 percent, respectively. The index for other food at home declined 0.1 percent, the same as in September. The other two components of the food and beverage index—restaurant meals and alcoholic beverages—increased 0.3 and 0.2 percent, respectively.

The housing component increased 0.4 percent in October, following a 0.1-percent rise in September. The index for fuel and utilities, which declined 0.6 percent in September, rose 0.6 percent in October. The index for household fuels rose 1.1 percent as declines in the indexes for fuel oil and natural gas—down 1.3 and 0.2 percent, respectively—were more than offset by a 1.9-percent increase in the index for electricity. (Prior to seasonal adjustment, charges for electricity fell 2.5 percent.) The index for other utilities and public services rose 0.2 percent, reflecting increases in the indexes for telephone services, cable television, and for water and sewer services. Shelter costs advanced 0.4 percent, the same as in September. Within shelter, renters' and homeowners' costs each increased 0.3 percent, and maintenance and repair costs rose 0.7 percent. The index for household furnishings and operation advanced 0.1 percent in October, following increases of 0.5 and 0.3 percent in August and September, respectively.

The transportation index rose 0.1 percent in October after registering declines in each of the 3 preceding months. An upturn in the index for airline fares coupled with a smaller decline in the index for motor fuels more than offset a drop in the index for new vehicles. The index for airline fares, which had fallen 5.9 percent in the last 3 months after increasing 20.4 percent in the first half of 1995, rose 2.3 percent in October. The gasoline index,

which fell 6.5 percent in the 3-month period ended in September, continued to decline, but by less than in recent months—down 0.5 percent in October. (Prior to seasonal adjustment, gasoline prices fell 1.7 percent.) The index for new vehicles, which rose 0.5 percent in September, declined 0.1 percent in October. (Prior to seasonal adjustment, prices for new vehicles rose 0.6 percent. As of October, almost one-fifth of the new car sample was represented by 1996 models. The 1996 models will continue to be phased in over the next several months as they replace old models at dealerships. For a report on quality changes for 1996 cars, see *Producer Price Indexes* October 1995.) Automobile finance charges declined 0.5 percent after seasonal adjustment. The index for used car prices was unchanged in October.

The index for apparel and upkeep increased 0.3 percent in October, following a decline of 0.2 percent in September. (Prior to seasonal adjustment, clothing prices rose 1.5 percent, reflecting the continued introduction of higher-priced fall-winter wear.)

Medical care costs rose 0.3 percent in October and have risen 4.2 percent in the past 12 months. The index for medical care commodities—prescription drugs, nonprescription drugs, and medical supplies—increased 0.5 percent in October. The index for medical care services rose 0.3 percent. Charges for professional services and hospital and related services increased 0.1 and 0.2 percent, respectively.


Entertainment costs rose 0.1 percent in October. Large increases in the indexes for newspapers and club memberships—up 1.7 and 1.1 percent, respectively—were largely offset by declines in the indexes for sporting goods, for toys, hobbies, and music equipment, for admissions, and for fees for lessons and instructions.

The index for other goods and services increased 0.3 percent in October, the same as in September. The index for toilet goods and personal care appliances increased 1.0 percent.

CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W)

On a seasonally adjusted basis, the CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers rose 0.3 percent in October.

Guide to Available CPI Data Series

Each month the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) releases comprehensive data on changes in average retail prices paid by American consumers during the previous month. These data, the Consumer Price Index (CPI), receive widespread media attention and are closely analyzed by government and private economists to gauge the effectiveness of monetary and fiscal policies for the Nation as a whole. Often neglected in the attention to the overall national inflation rate, however, is that the CPI publishes more than 5,000 other price indexes each month. This article describes the available CPI data series and discusses some of the unique characteristics which should be noted when using or requesting CPI indexes.

Published areas

BLS releases the national (or U.S. city average) CPI data monthly, about 2 weeks after the reference month—the CPI for January is released in mid-February, for example. BLS also publishes indexes monthly for the 4 regions (Northeast, North Central, South, and West), 4 population size classes (A,B,C, and D), and 13 region-by-size groups (Northeast-Size Class A, South-Size Class C, etc.). The A population size class represents all metropolitan areas over 1.2 million; B represents mid-sized metropolitan areas; C small metropolitan areas; and D all nonmetropolitan urban areas. Due to insufficient sample sizes, region-by-size indexes are not published for Northeast Size Class D and West Size Classes B and D.

In addition, BLS publishes CPI information for 29 local metropolitan areas. Some of these metropolitan areas, as defined by the Bureau of the Census, include suburbs or counties that extend across State boundaries. The 29 local areas are available on the following schedule:

Population coverage

For each published CPI data series, two separate indexes are available: All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) and Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W). Both the CPI-U and the CPI-W reflect only the buying habits of *urban* consumers. The CPI-U is the most comprehensive of the two and represents the expenditures by all urban consumers, about 80 percent of the total U.S. population.

The CPI-U is most often referenced when discussing the overall inflation rate and typically is used by economic policy makers. The CPI-W represents a subset of the CPI-U population, that is, the expenditures by urban consumers where more than one-half of the household's income must come from clerical or hourly wage occupations. The CPI-W represents about 32 percent of the total U.S. population and is used in most blue-collar collective bargaining agreements and to index Social Security payments as well as pensions of military and Federal Civil Service retirees and survivors.

The difference in movement of the two indexes arises from slight differences in the weighting of the goods and services priced for the two population groups. Over extended periods of time, the two series show similar movements.

Reference base

The CPI is a tool that simplifies the measurement of changes in prices over time. By selecting an appropriate reference base and setting the average index level for that time period equal to 100, it is possible to compare this month's (or last year's) price index level with the reference base period or to any other time period. The current standard reference base period is 1982-84=100. That is, all price changes are measured from a reference base (100) that represents the

average index level of the 36-month period encompassing 1982, 1983, and 1984.

Prior to the release of the CPI for January 1988, the standard reference base was 1967=100. As a service to our customers with existing escalation provisions, BLS continues to publish CPI all items indexes for the U.S. city average and all regional and local areas using the old base. Note that, although comparisons cannot be made between indexes with different reference bases, the conversion to a new base period does not affect the measurement of percent changes in a given index series from one time period to another, except for rounding differences.

In addition, BLS publishes several index series with a reference base period more recent than January 1982. These indexes either could not be rebased because historical price data were not available for the entire 1982-84 reference period or they represent items (such as mid-grade gasoline) that only recently were introduced into the CPI.

The CPI market basket

The CPI market basket represents all the goods and services purchased by urban households. Price data are collected for more than 200 categories which BLS has arranged into 7 major groups. These major groups, with examples of categories in each, are as follows:

- Food and beverages (bacon, eggs, fruit juice, coffee);
- Housing (residential rent, fuel oil, cable television);
- Apparel and upkeep (men's shirts, women's suits, jewelry);
- Transportation (airline fares, new cars, gasoline, tires);
- Medical care (prescription drugs, physicians' services, eye care, hospital rooms);
- Entertainment (newspapers, pet supplies and expenses, admissions); and,
- Other goods and services (college tuition, tobacco and smoking products, funeral expenses).

Indexes for all of the above categories are published at the U.S. city average level. Due to limitations in sample size, however, many of the smaller expenditure categories are not available at regional and local area levels. Instead, related categories are aggregated and published as part of a more comprehensive category. For example, physicians' services and eye care are combined with similar categories and published as professional medical services at the regional level. At the local area level, professional medical services is, in turn, combined further and published as medical care services.

Seasonal adjustment

Many of the goods and services included in the CPI market basket exhibit "seasonal" patterns of price movement. For example, gasoline regularly tends to rise in price after Memorial Day and decline in price after summer vacations are over in September. BLS analysts use sophisticated statistical techniques to factor out the seasonal trends from the underlying change in prices. The result is that, each month, BLS publishes a seasonally adjusted index for those goods and services that display consistent seasonal patterns of price change. The seasonally adjusted indexes primarily are used by the media, government, and private economic forecasters as a guide in identifying changes in the underlying rate of inflation or in determining the short-term effects on prices of unpredictable events such as natural disasters.

BLS publishes seasonally adjusted indexes only at the U.S. city average level (for both the CPI-U and CPI-W). They are not available for regional or local area levels. Seasonally adjusted indexes are not appropriate for use in escalation or cost-of-living-adjustments (COLA's) because what consumers actually pay for goods and services is represented by the unadjusted data.

NOTE: Local area CPI indexes are byproducts of the national CPI program. Each local index has a smaller sample size than the national index and is, therefore, subject to substantially more sampling and other measurement error. As a result, local area indexes show greater volatility than the national index, although their long-term trends are similar.

Therefore, the Bureau of Labor Statistics strongly urges users to consider adopting the national average CPI for use in their escalator clauses.

Technical Notes

Brief Explanation of the CPI

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of the average change in prices over time in a fixed market basket of goods and services. The Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes CPI's for two population groups: (1) a CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) which covers approximately 80 percent of the total population and (2), a CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) which covers 32 percent of the total population. The CPI-U includes, in addition to wage earners and clerical workers, groups such as professional, managerial, and technical workers, the self-employed, short-term workers, the unemployed, and retirees and others not in the labor force.

The CPI is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter, fuels, transportation fares, charges for doctors' and dentists' services, medicine, and the other goods that people buy for day-to-day living. Prices are collected in 85 urban areas across the country from about 57,000 housing units and approximately 19,000 retail establishments—department stores, supermarkets, hospitals, gasoline stations and other types of stores and services establishments. All taxes directly associated with the purchase and use of items are included in the index. Prices of food, fuel, and a few other items are obtained every month in all 85 locations. Prices of most other commodities and services are collected every month in the five largest geographic areas and every other month in other areas. Prices of most goods and services are obtained by either personal visits or telephone calls from the Bureau's trained representatives. Some data, such as used car prices, are obtained from secondary sources.

In calculating the index, price changes for the various items in each location are averaged together with weights which represent their importance in the spending of the appropriate population group. Local data are then combined to obtain a U.S. city average. Separate indexes are also published by size of city, by region of country, for cross-classifications of regions and population-size classes, and for 29 local areas. Area indexes do not measure differences in the level of prices among cities, they only measure the average change in prices for each area since the base period.

The indexes measure price change from a designated reference date, usually 1982-84, which equals 100.0. An increase of 7 percent, for example, is shown as 107.0. This change can also be expressed in dollars as follows: the price of a base period "market basket" of goods and services in the CPI has risen from \$100 in 1982-84 to \$107.

Calculating index Changes

Movements of the indexes from one month to another are usually expressed as percent changes rather than changes in index points, because index point changes are affected by the level of the index in relation to its base period while percent changes are not. The example in the accompanying box illustrates the computation of index point and percent changes.

Percent changes for 3-month and 6-month periods are expressed as annual rates and are computed according to the standard formula for compound growth rates. These data indicate what the percent change would be if the current rate were maintained for a 12-month period.

Energy Prices


Prices are usually available for the U.S. city average, 15 large metropolitan areas, the four census regions, four size classifications, and 13 areas reflecting the four Census regions cross-classified by the four population sizes. However, not all energy commodities and services are used in every area of the country. Fuel oil, for example, is not a common heating fuel in some urban areas, particularly in the South and West. Where no average prices are available, the designation NA appears. This designation also appears if the data sufficiency criteria have not been met in any given month. For example, if there are fewer than five usable fuel oil prices for a published city or region size class, no fuel oil prices for the area will be published.

All prices are collected monthly by BLS representatives in the urban areas priced for the CPI. Prices for natural gas and electricity include fuel and purchased gas adjustments and all applicable taxes. Fuel oil and gasoline prices include applicable Federal, State, and local taxes.

Natural gas and electricity. Natural gas prices are reported in therms, which are a measure of heating value. Electricity prices are given in kilowatt hours (kwh). For both utility services, the consumption ranges specified in table P2 are the upper and lower limits of the bill sizes priced for the Consumer Price Index. The average prices per therm and per kilowatt hour are calculated from bills priced within these ranges. It should be noted that bills priced for the CPI are not only for different consumption amounts, but may also be calculated from different types of residential rate schedules. *The average price per therm and per kilowatt hour are not, therefore, generally suitable for use in place-to-place price comparisons.*

The average prices for 40 and 100 therms of natural gas for 500 kilowatt hours of electricity (table P1) are calculated from a special price collection program. They are not used in the calculation of the CPI. Since heating and air-conditioning requirements vary by geographic location, climate, and weather conditions, it cannot be inferred that these consumption amounts represent those used by a typical residen-

tial consumer. These bills are used merely to track price changes over time for constant amounts of consumption, and to provide continuity with prices of natural gas and electricity formerly published in conjunction with the unrevised Consumer Price Index.

Fuel oil. Only #2 fuel oil (home heating oil) is priced. Prices are collected, in most cases, for quantities greater than one gallon. These prices are converted to a gallon price for this program. Fuel oil prices reflect discounts for quantity and/or quick payment.

Gasoline. Gasoline prices are collected at the pump from a sample of full service, mini-service, and self-serve gas stations.

Approximate British Thermal Unit (BTU) values for some energy items are as follows, according to the source indicated:

1 therm = 100,000 BTU's (U.S. Department of Energy).

1 kwh = 3,412 BTU'S (Edison Electric Institute).

1 gallon #2 fuel oil = 140,000 BTU'S (U.S. Department of Energy).

Food Prices

In the revised CPI, actual weighted average prices are calculated each month at the national level and for the four Census geographic regions. As a result of changes in price collection methodology and sample sizes, average prices for individual cities cannot in general be produced. It is hoped however, that regional average prices will help satisfy the need for local area data. It should be noted that the average prices for food in this report reflect variations in brand, quality, and size among geographic areas. Users of average food prices should be aware that these differences exist.

Because a number of food commodities are not available in all areas on a year-round basis, prices will not appear in some months for some regions or for the U.S. city average. In other instances, sufficient prices may not be available due to temporary disruptions in supplies. Where no average prices are available, the designation NA appears. When a price is not available from an individual store in any month, an estimated price will be calculated for the missing item and used in computing the average price. In cases where the proportion of estimated prices used to calculate the average is considered too high, the average price is not published and NA appears for that item in the table.

Because of space limitations in the table, the description for each item is abbreviated. More detailed specifications are available from the BLS regional offices or from the Washington office upon request.

Adjustment of Shelter Indexes for Aging Effects

Beginning with January 1988 CPI, the Bureau of Labor Statistics adjusts the monthly CPI shelter indexes for the

change in quality resulting from the effect of aging on rental housing. In January 1987, the Bureau announced its intention to begin making such adjustments, assuming that further research substantiated the need to do so. The decision to implement the adjustment was based on extensive BLS research, in which alternative adjustment methods were explored and tested. Evaluation of the research indicates that an aging effect exists, and that the chosen method is operationally feasible.¹ The adjustment affect CPI shelter indexes, which would have been raised by 0.2 percent for the year 1987 had an aging adjustment been applied.

The quality of housing unit decreases as the unit ages. Existing BLS methods are used to correct for relatively easily measured quality changes such as the addition of an extra bedroom, but such methods are inadequate to correct for deterioration in the condition of housing unit.²

The aging adjustment method was specifically designed to correct for quality changes associated with this deterioration. The BLS used hedonic regression methods to estimate the aging effect.

The estimates were then used to correct the CPI rent and rental equivalence indexes. Hedonic regressions are statistical functions that relate the price of a good to its attributes or characteristics. For example, a hedonic regression relates a housing unit's rent to its size, age, location, etc. By using BLS housing survey data from 1987 and Census data from 1980, hedonic regression methods provided estimates of the relationship between a housing unit's rent and age while other housing unit characteristics were held constant. The estimated relationship was then used to construct the aging adjustment. Estimates will be recomputed annually by using the previous year's BLS housing survey data and the most recently available Census data.

Seasonally Adjusted and Unadjusted Data

Because price data are used for different purposes by different groups, the Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes seasonally adjusted as well as unadjusted changes each month. For analyzing general price trends in the economy, seasonally adjusted changes are usually preferred since they eliminate the effect of changes that normally occur at the same time and in about the same magnitude every year—such as price movements resulting from changing climatic conditions, production cycles, model changeovers, holidays, and sales.

The unadjusted data are of primary interest to consumers concerned about the prices they actually pay. Unadjusted data also are used extensively for escalation purposes. Many collective bargaining contract agreements and pension plans, for example, tie compensation changes to the Consumer Price Index unadjusted for seasonal variation.

In most cases, seasonal factors used in computing the seasonally adjusted indexes are derived by the X-11- ARIMA Seasonal Adjustment Method. The updated seasonal data at the end of 1977 replaced data from 1967 through 1977. Subsequent annual updates have replaced 5 years of seasonal data, for example, data from 1987 through 1991 were replaced at the end of 1991. The seasonal movement of all items and 47 other aggregations is derived by combining the seasonal movement of 60 selected components. Each year the seasonal status of every series is reevaluated based upon certain statistical criteria. Occasionally, a component changes its seasonal adjustment status from seasonally adjusted to not seasonally adjusted. When this occurs, not seasonally adjusted data are used for the last 5 years, but before that period the seasonally adjusted indexes remain in calculations of higher-level seasonally adjusted indexes.

Effective with the calculation of the seasonal factors for 1990, the Bureau of Labor Statistics has used an enhanced seasonal adjustment procedure called intervention analysis in conjunction with X-11-ARIMA for some CPI series. Intervention analysis allows for better estimates of seasonally adjusted data. Extreme values and/or sharp movements which might distort the seasonal pattern are removed from the data prior to calculation of seasonal factors in X-11-ARIMA.

For the fuel oil and the motor fuels indexes, this procedure was used to offset the effects that extreme price volatility would otherwise have had on the estimates of seasonally adjusted data for those series. For some women's apparel indexes and the girls' apparel index, the procedure was used to offset the effects of changes in pricing methodology; and for new cars, new trucks, and new vehicles, this procedure was used to offset the effects of changes in marketing strategies and the introduction of new models. For the tobacco and smoking products index, this procedure was used to offset the effects of increases in excise taxes and wholesale tobacco prices. For some alcoholic beverage series, intervention was used to offset the effects of excise tax increases.

An alternative to the intervention-adjusted X-11-ARIMA procedure is the state space model-based seasonal adjustment method. This method adjusts simultaneously for interventions and seasonal effects, rather than sequentially as in the X-11-ARIMA methodology, using structural statistical models with explanatory variables. The state space structural model-based method of seasonal adjustment was introduced in 1992 for the adjustment of January 1991-December 1991 indexes for three women's apparel series: Dresses, separates and sportswear, and suits.

CPI on Electronic Bulletin Board

Included on the *Labor News* BBS are all items indexes for the CPI-U and CPI-W for both the U.S. city average and the Washington, D.C. area from 1980 to the present. Also included on the BBS are average prices for the U.S. from 1990 to the present for natural gas, electricity, fuel oil, and gasoline (all types, unleaded regular, and unleaded premium). More indexes or average prices may be added in the future.

Labor News is a menu-driven BBS. Users can select among choices presented on the screen to access the information desired. Typing a "?" will bring up a "Help" screen for on-line assistance. It is also possible to download a users manual for the BBS.

Please note that the BBS shuts down for maintenance every day from 3:00 A.M. to 3:15 A.M. (Eastern time), and Mondays from 7:30 A.M. to 8:00 A.M.
