JOINT RESOLUTION [S.J. Res. 55]

To print the monthly publication entitled "Economic Indicators"

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Joint Economic Committee be authorized to issue a monthly publication entitled "Economic Indicators," and that a sufficient quantity be printed to furnish one copy to each Member of Congress; the Secretary and the Sergeant at Arms of the Senate; the Clerk, Sergeant at Arms, and Doorkeeper of the House of Representatives; two copies to the libraries of the Senate and House, and the Congressional Library; seven hundred copies to the Joint Economic Committee; and the required numbers of copies to the Superintendent of Documents for distribution to depository libraries; and that the Superintendent of Documents be authorized to have copies printed for sale to the public.

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
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TOTAL OUTPUT, INCOME, AND SPENDING

GROSS NATIONAL PRODUCT

According to very preliminary ("flash") estimates for the first quarter of 1984, gross national product is expected to increase \$98.7 billion or 12.0 percent, both at annual rates. Real output (GNP adjusted for price changes) is expected to rise 7.2 percent (annual rate) and the implicit price deflator, 4.4 percent (annual rate).



SELECTED UNEMPLOYMENT RATES

The seasonally adjusted overall unemployment rate, which includes resident Armed Forces in the labor force, fell to 7.7 percent in February from 7.9 percent in January. The unemployment rate for all civilian workers fell to 7.8 percent in February from 8.0 percent in January.







FEDERAL SECTOR, NATIONAL INCOME ACCOUNTS BASIS

In the fourth quarter of 1983, according to preliminary estimates, Federal receipts rose \$12.3 billion (annual rate) and expenditures rose \$14.8 billion, yielding a deficit of \$189.9 billion; in the third quarter, the deficit was \$187.3 billion.





In the capital accounts, claims on foreigners reported by U.S. banks increased \$12.2 billion in the fourth quarter of 1983 compared with a \$2.0 billion increase in the third quarter. Liabilities to private foreigners reported by U.S. banks increased \$26.3 billion compared with a \$16.1 billion increase in the third quarter.
