JOINT RESOLUTION [S.J. Res. 55]

To print the monthly publication entitled "Economic Indicators"

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Joint Economic Committee be authorized to issue a monthly publication entitled "Economic Indicators," and that a sufficient quantity be printed to furnish one copy to each Member of Congress; the Secretary and the Sergeant at Arms of the Senate; the Clerk, Sergeant at Arms, and Doorkeeper of the House of Representatives; two copies to the libraries of the Senate and House, and the Congressional Library; seven hundred copies to the Joint Economic Committee; and the required numbers of copies to the Superintendent of Documents for distribution to depository libraries; and that the Superintendent of Documents be authorized to have copies printed for sale to the public.

Approved June 23, 1949.

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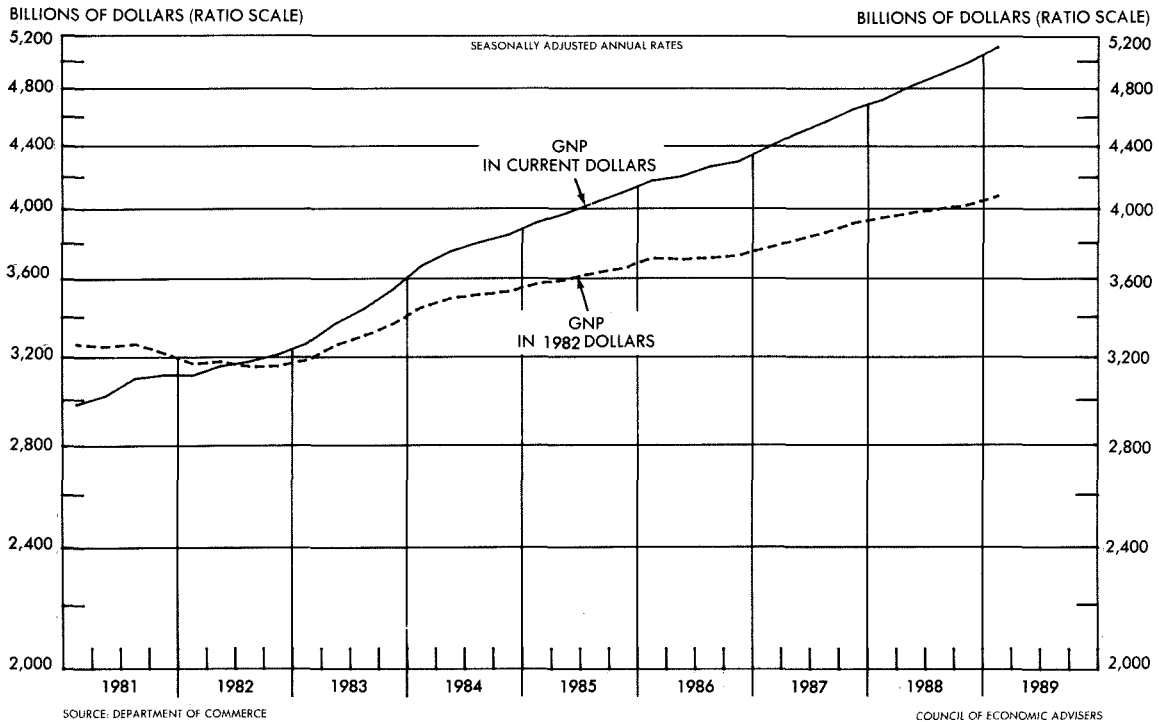
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TOTAL OUTPUT, INCOME, AND SPENDING

GROSS NATIONAL PRODUCT

In the first quarter of 1989, according to advance estimates, current-dollar gross national product (GNP) rose 9.7 percent (annual rate) or \$117.1 billion. Real GNP (GNP adjusted for price changes) rose 5.5 percent and the implicit price deflator rose 3.9 percent.

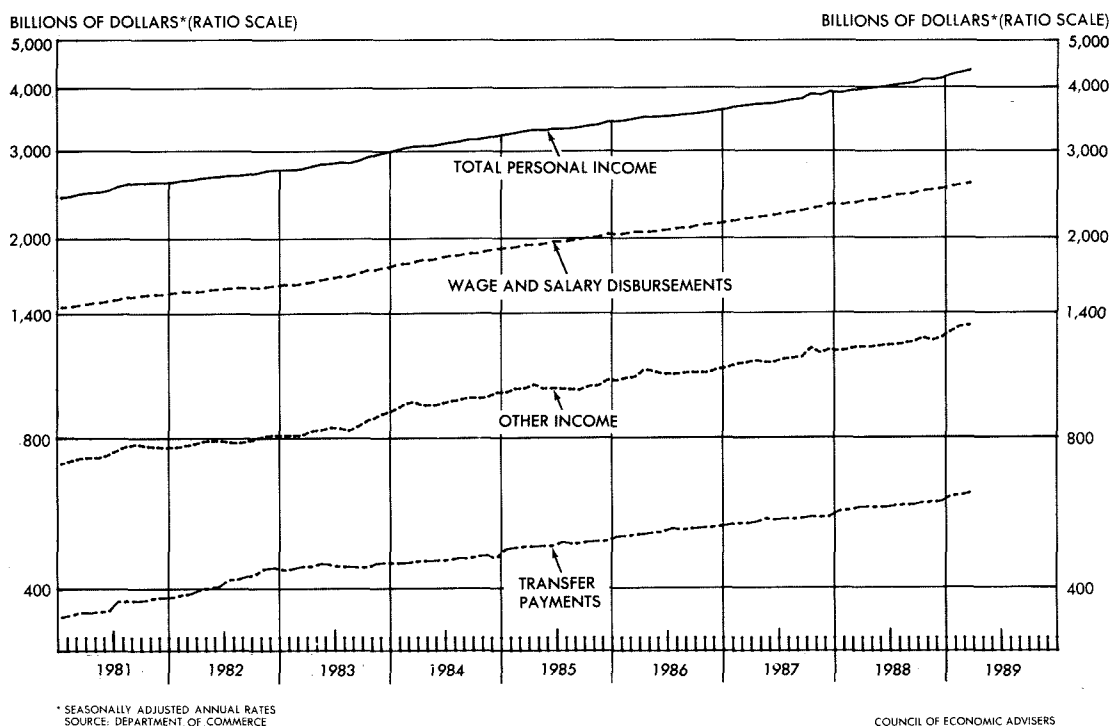

SOURCES OF PERSONAL INCOME

Personal income rose \$34.1 billion (annual rate) in March, following an increase of \$43.7 billion in February. The increases were affected by several special factors: Profit-sharing payments to employees in the motor vehicle industry and a large increase in retroactive social security benefits affected the March increase; subsidy payments to farm proprietors affected both the March and February increases. Excluding these special factors, personal income increased \$27.9 billion in March and \$31.4 billion in February.

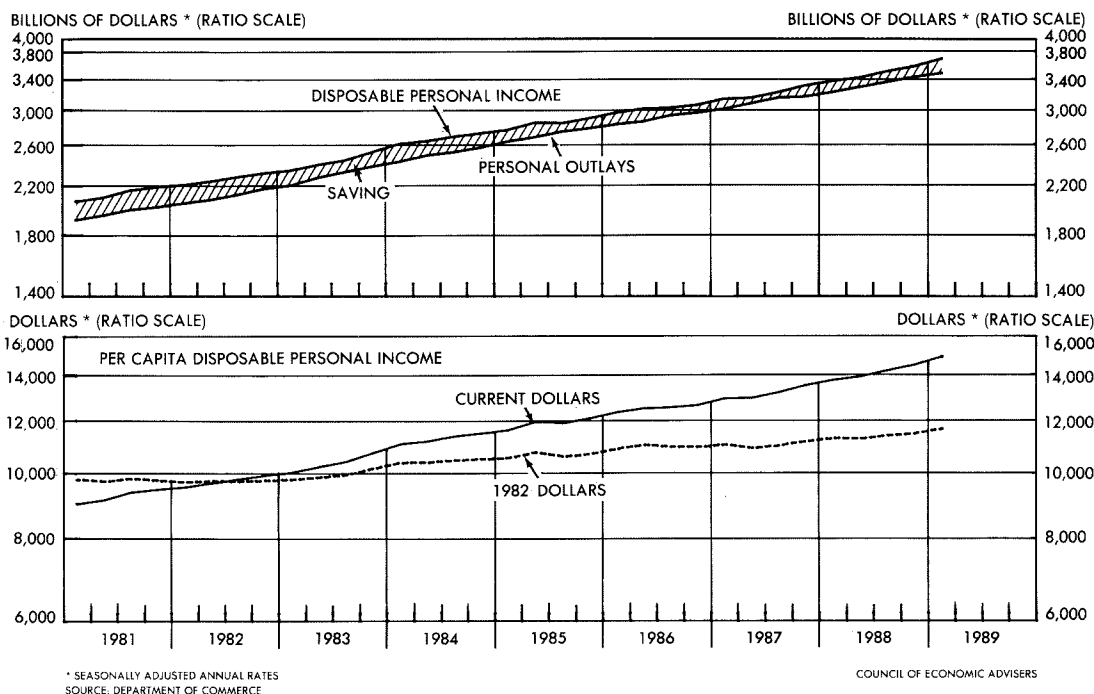

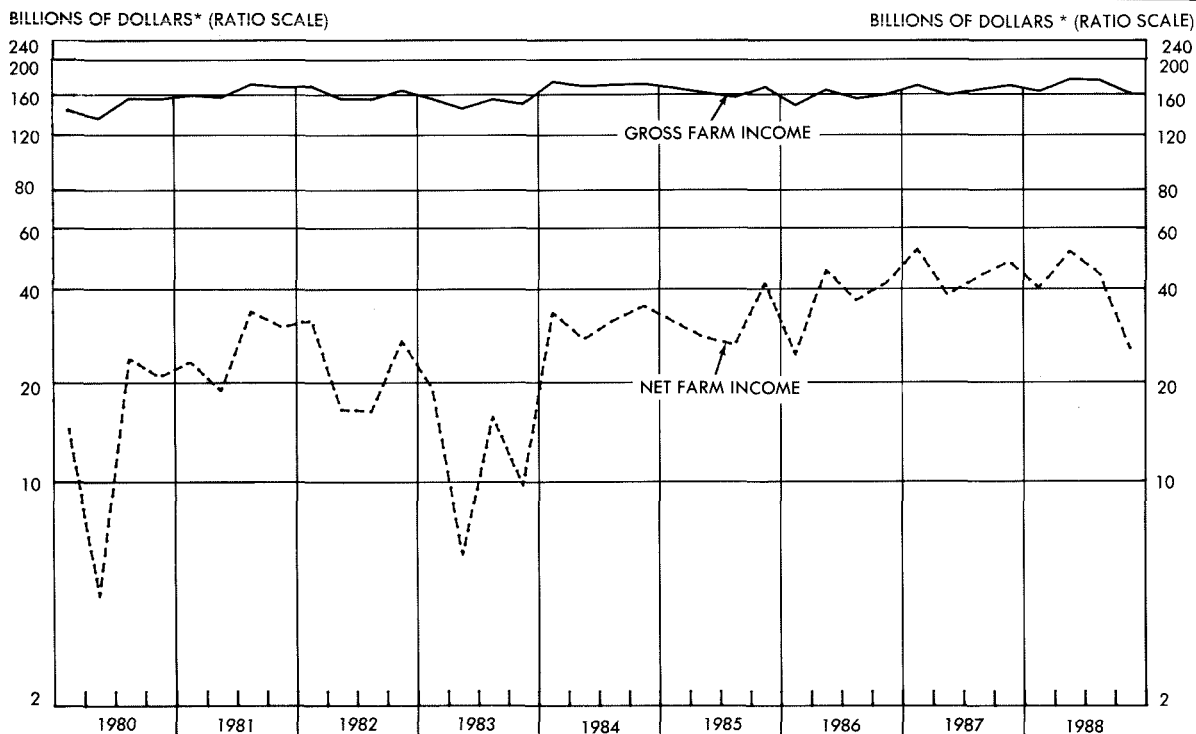

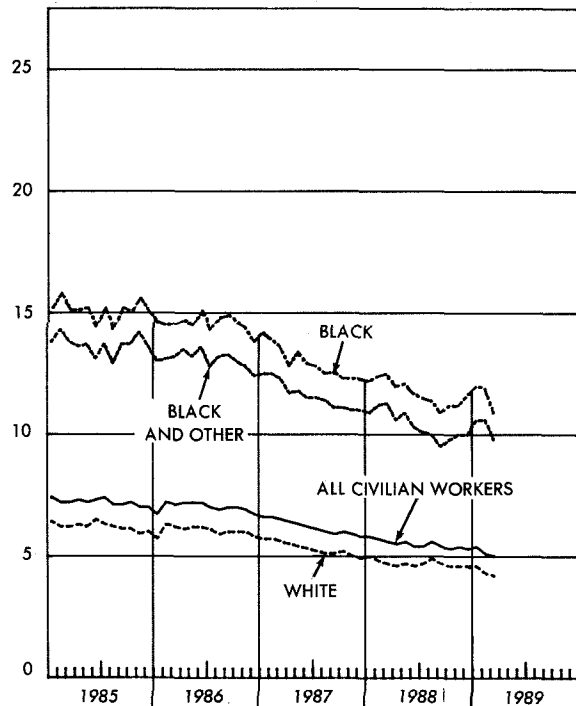

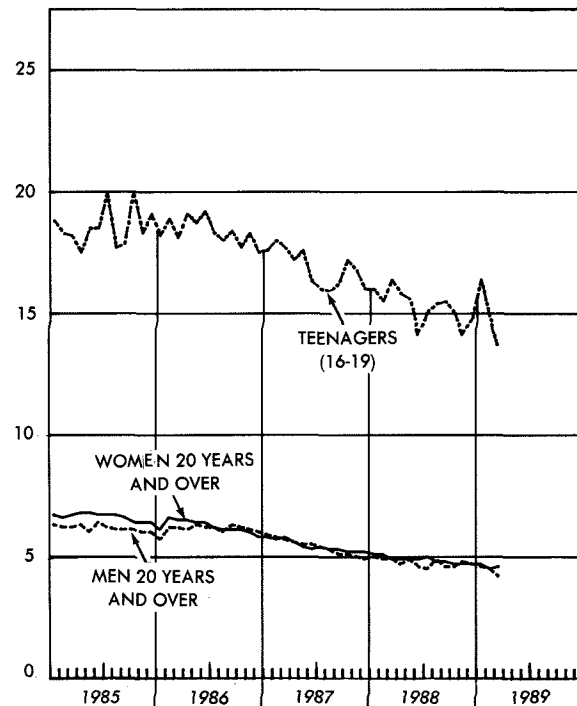
SELECTED UNEMPLOYMENT RATES

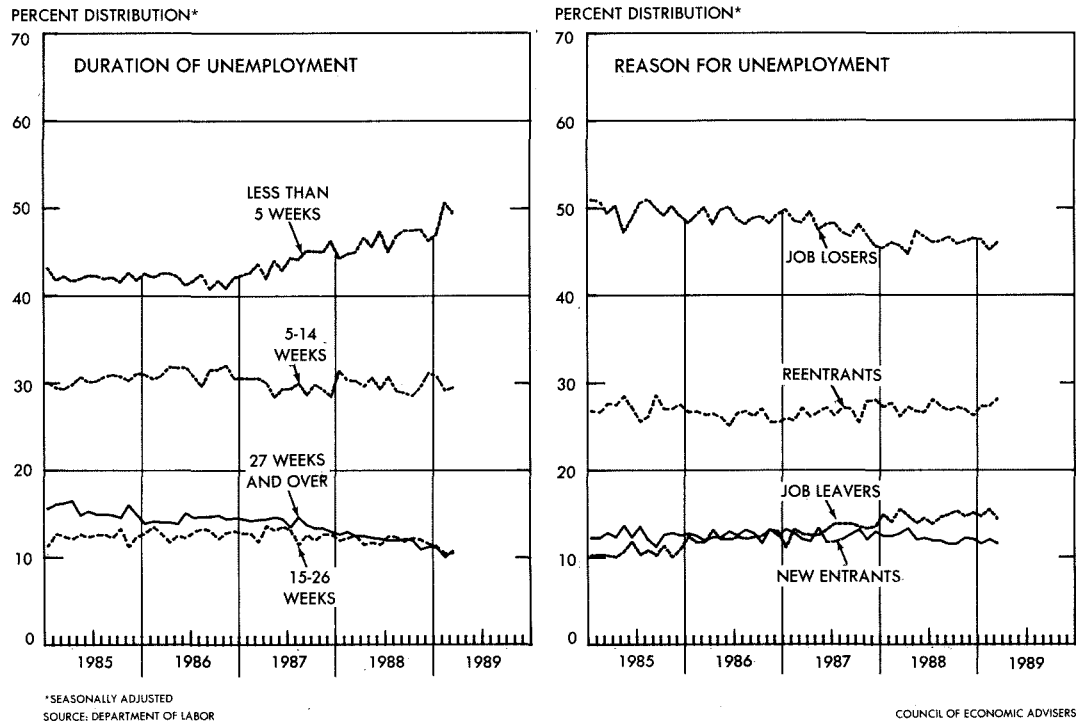

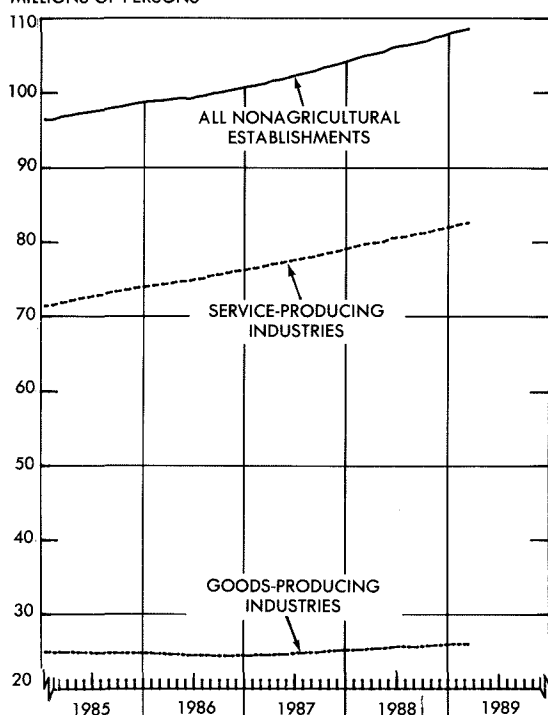

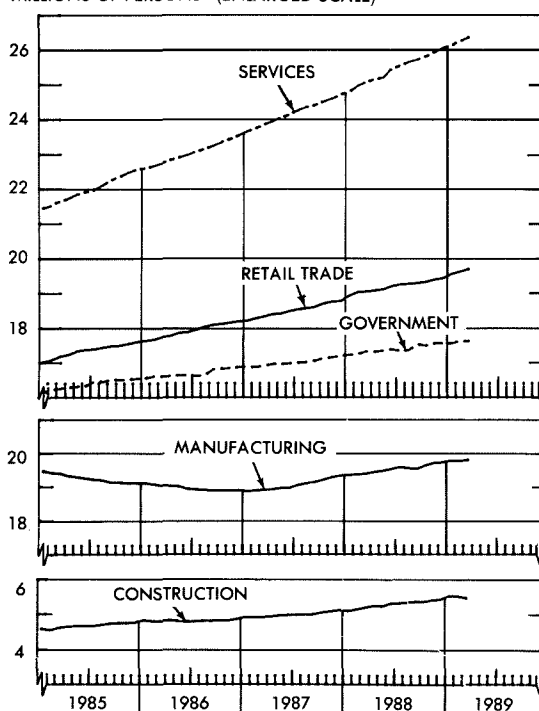

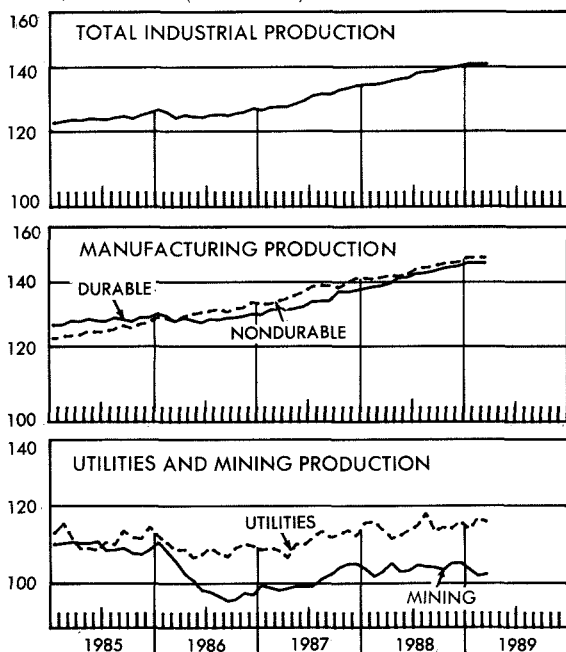

INDUSTRIAL PRODUCTION AND CAPACITY UTILIZATION

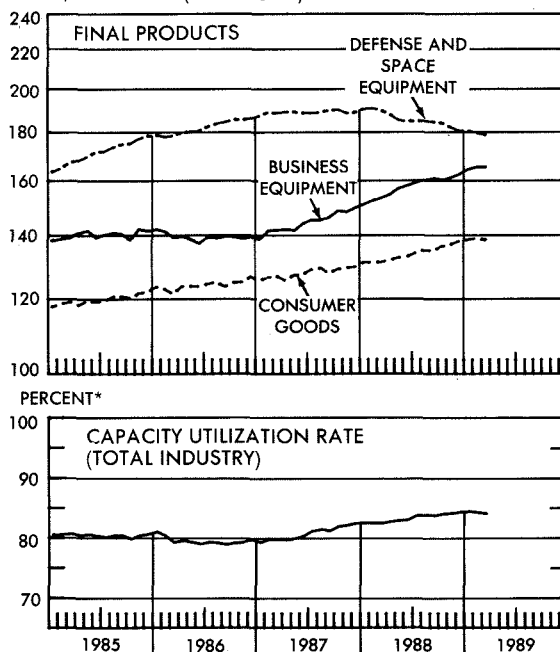
Industrial production was unchanged in March, for the second month in a row. The index for March was 4.6 percent above its year-earlier level.

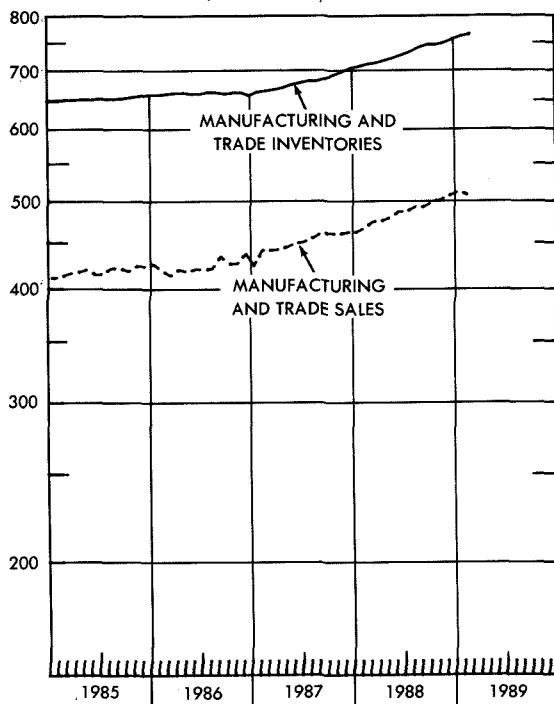

BUSINESS SALES AND INVENTORIES—Manufacturing and Trade

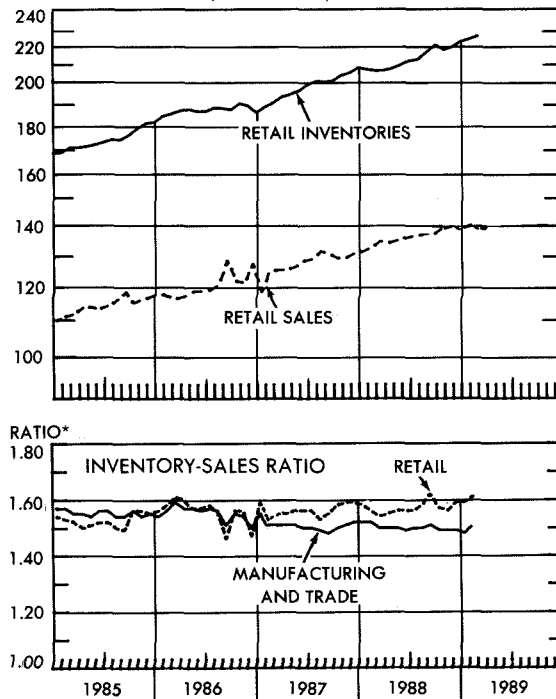

BILLIONS OF DOLLARS* (RATIO SCALE)

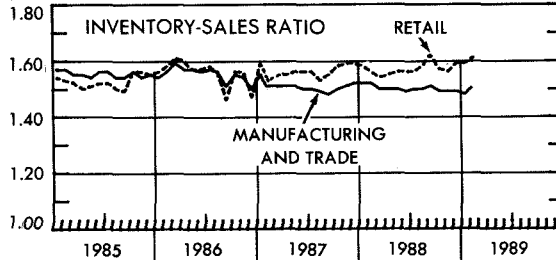

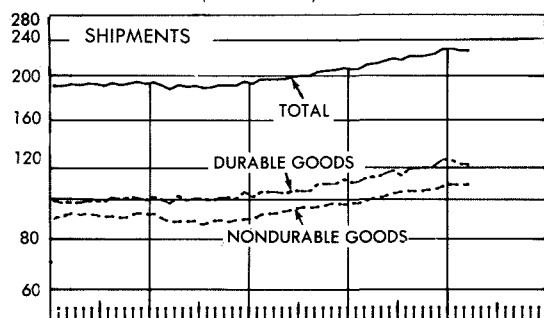

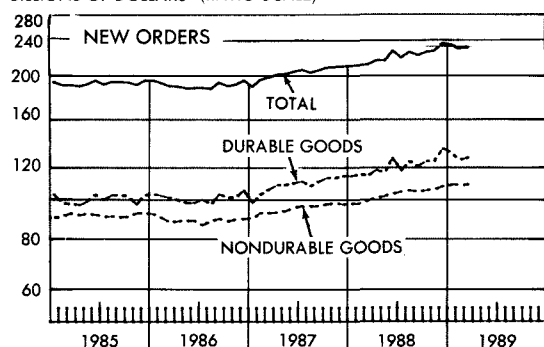

BILLIONS OF DOLLARS* (RATIO SCALE)

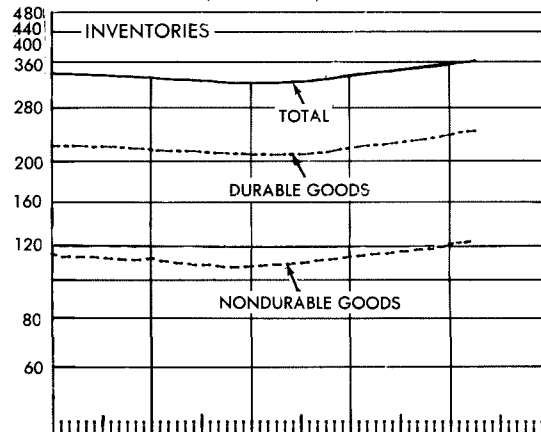


BILLIONS OF DOLLARS* (RATIO SCALE)

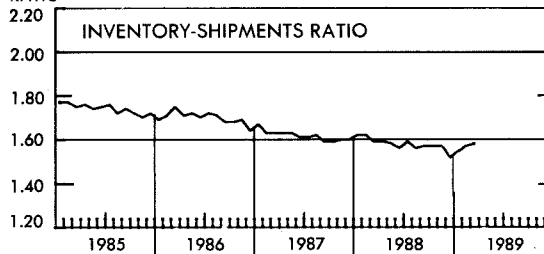

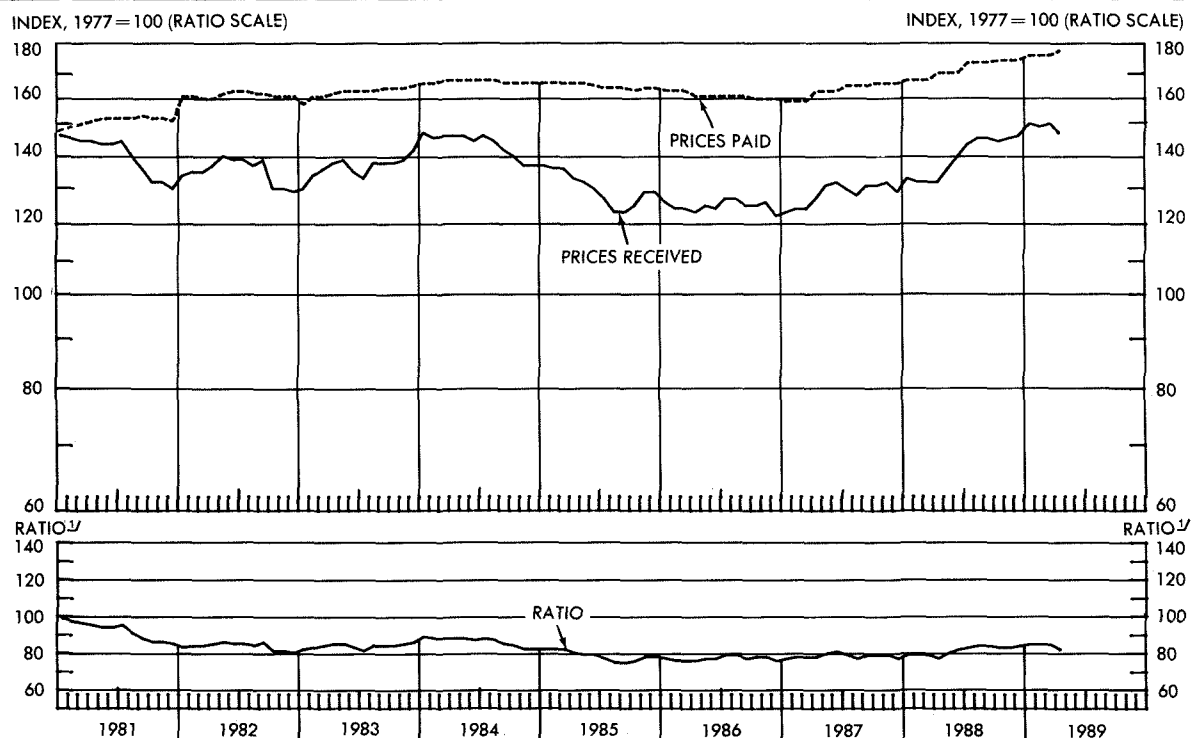

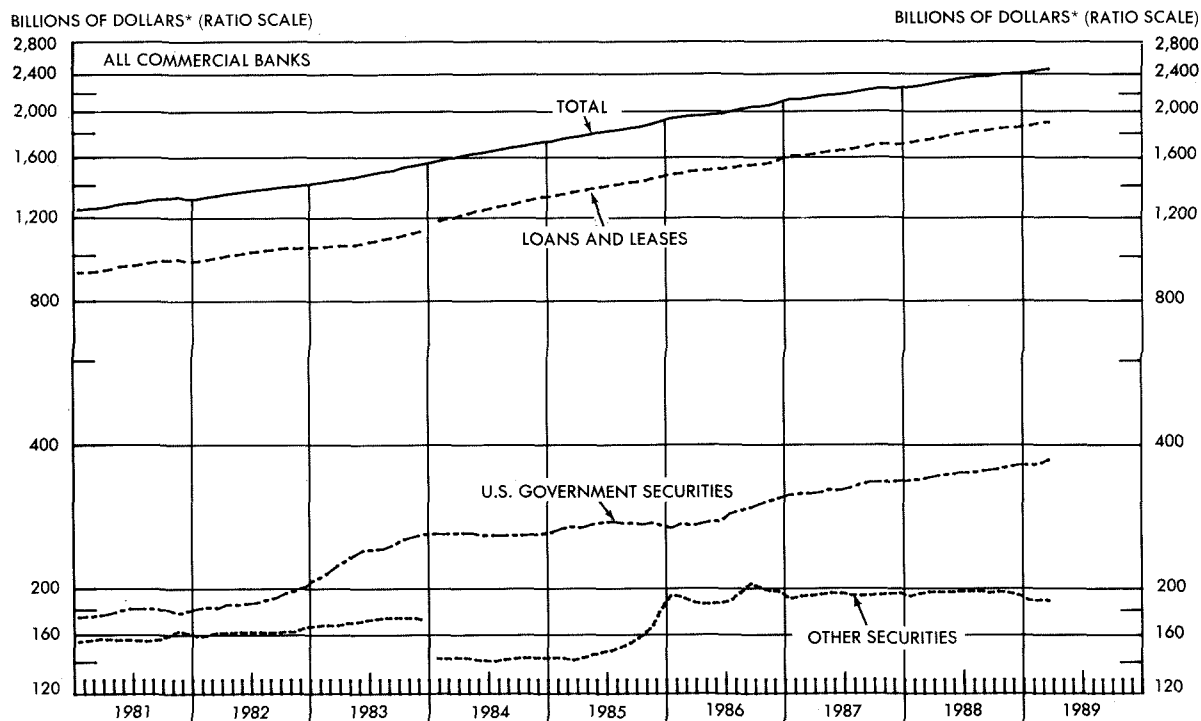

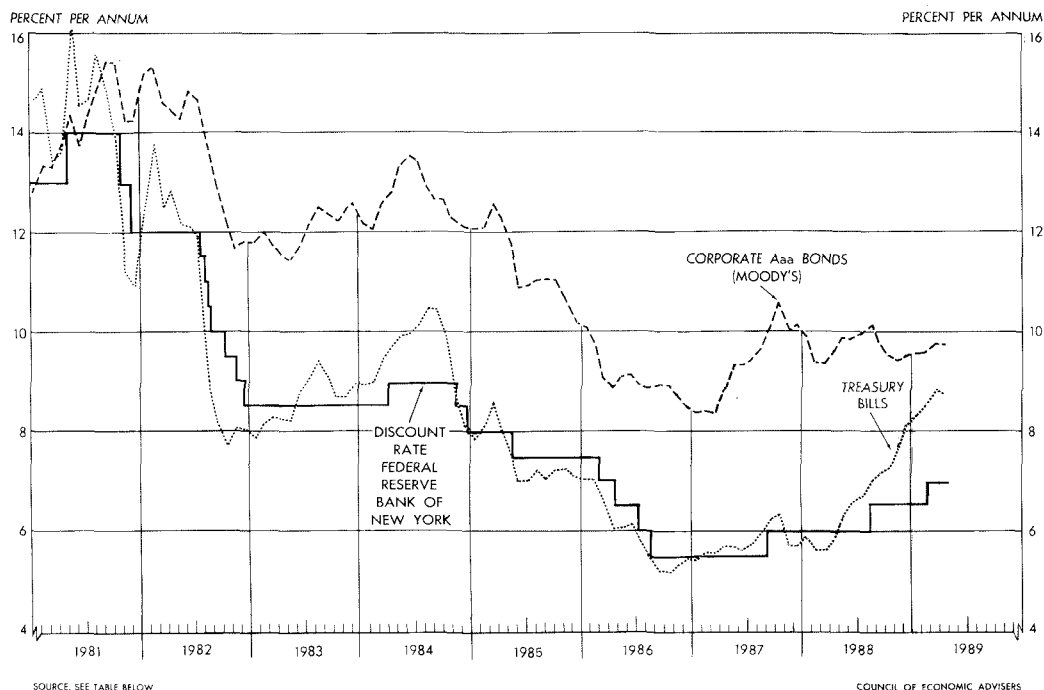

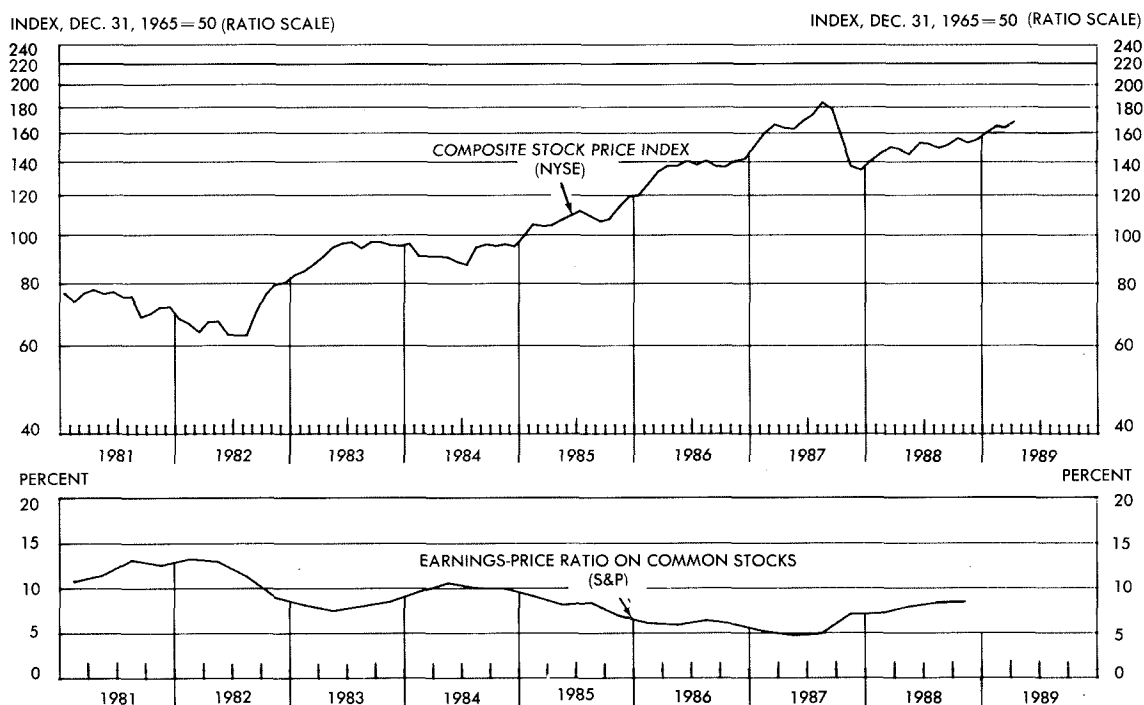

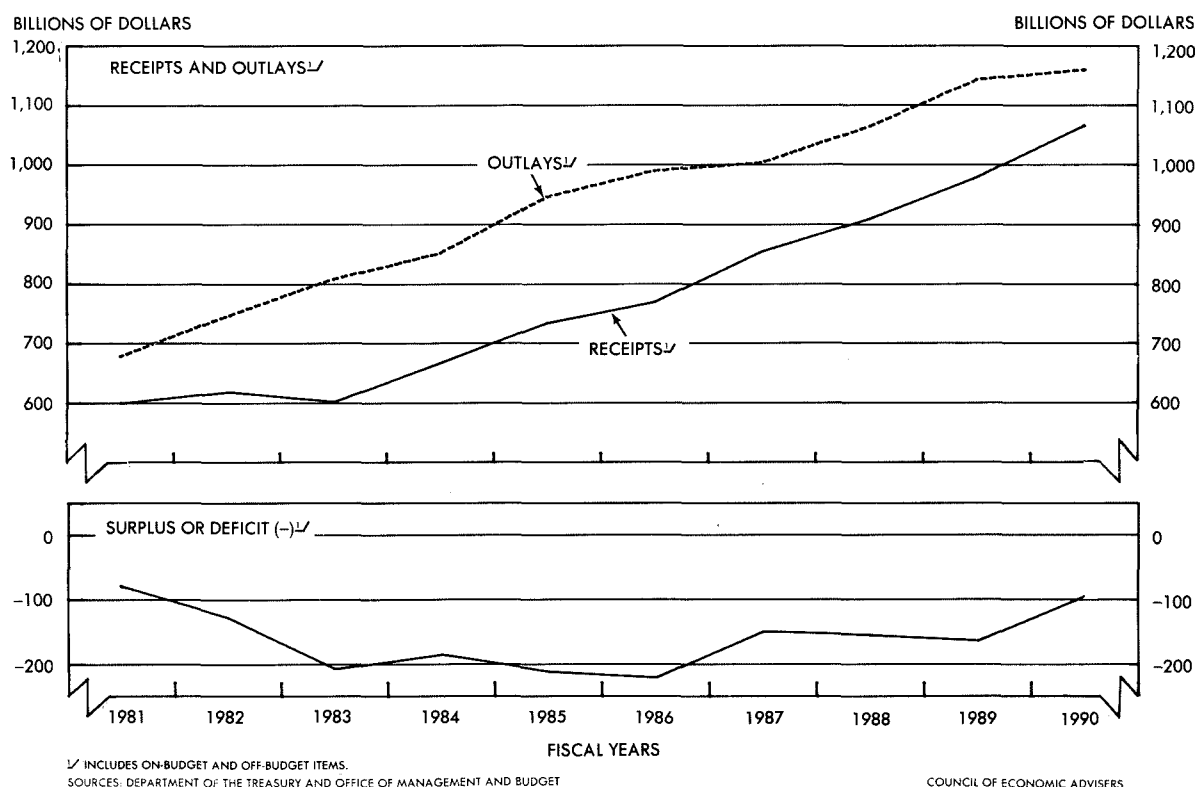

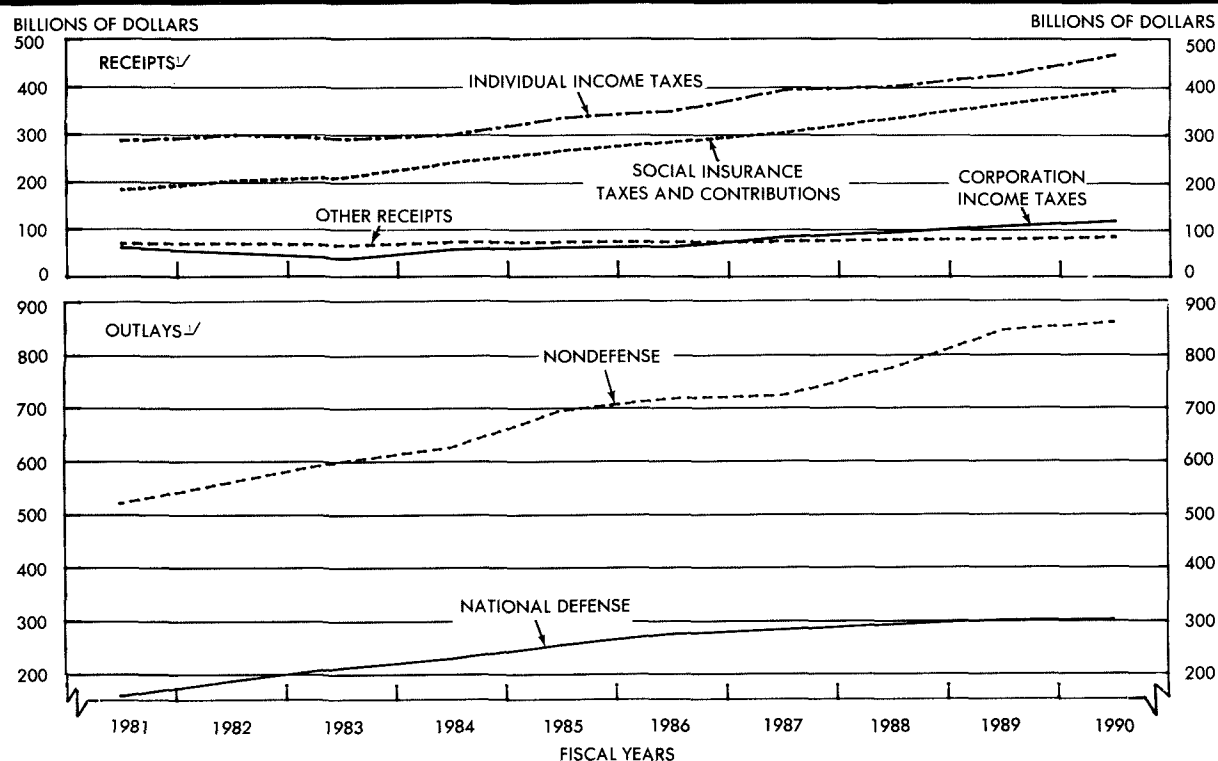

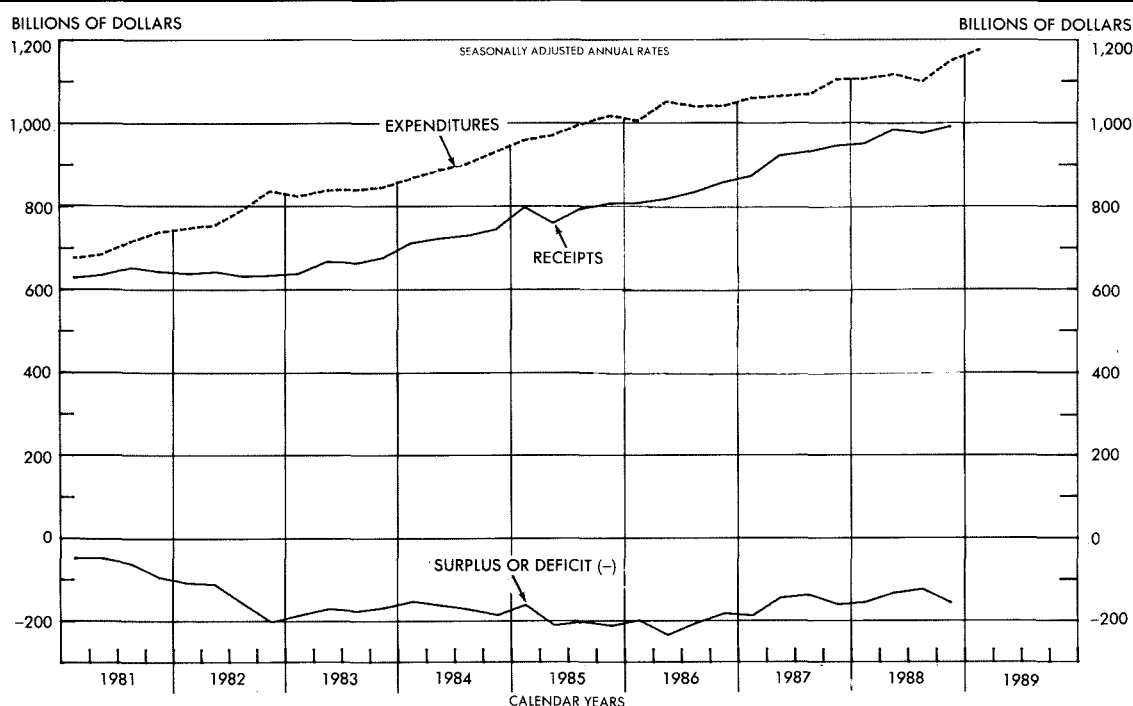

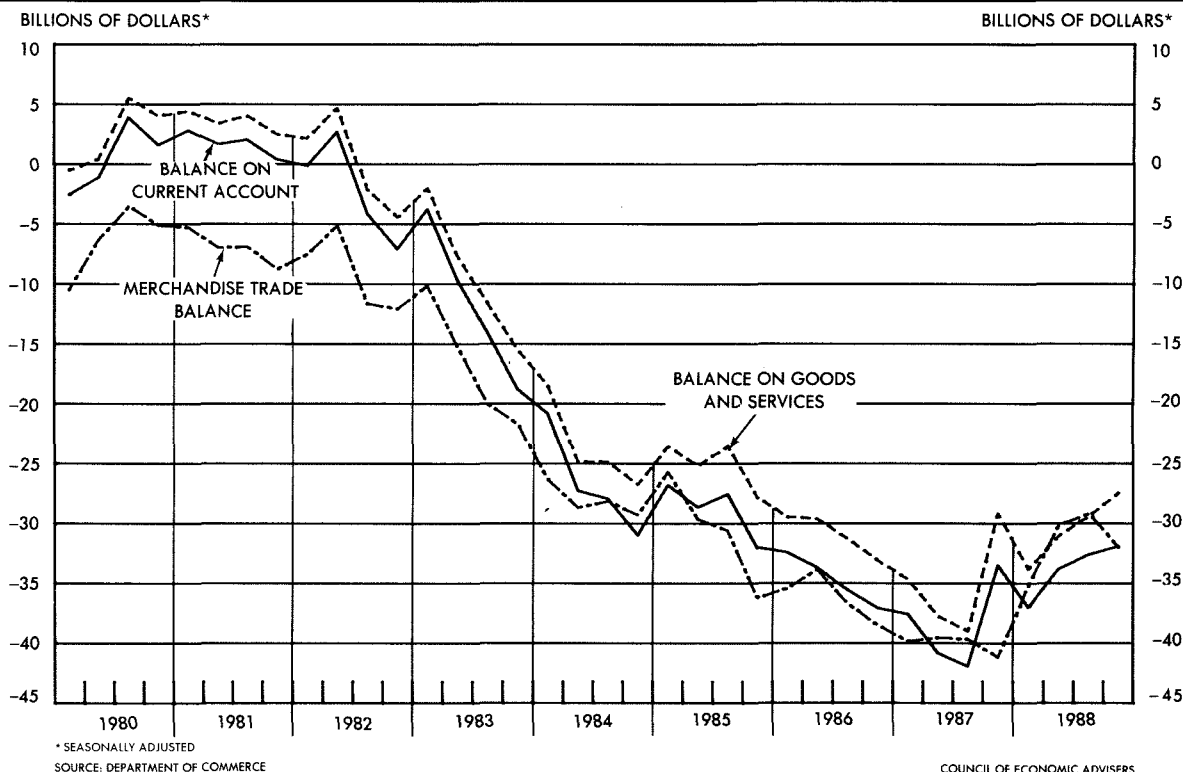

In the capital accounts, claims on foreigners reported by U.S. banks increased \$33.5 billion in the fourth quarter of 1988, compared with an increase of \$27.8 billion in the third quarter. Liabilities to private foreigners reported by U.S. banks, excluding Treasury securities, increased \$35.8 billion in the fourth quarter, compared with an increase of \$29.2 billion in the third quarter.
