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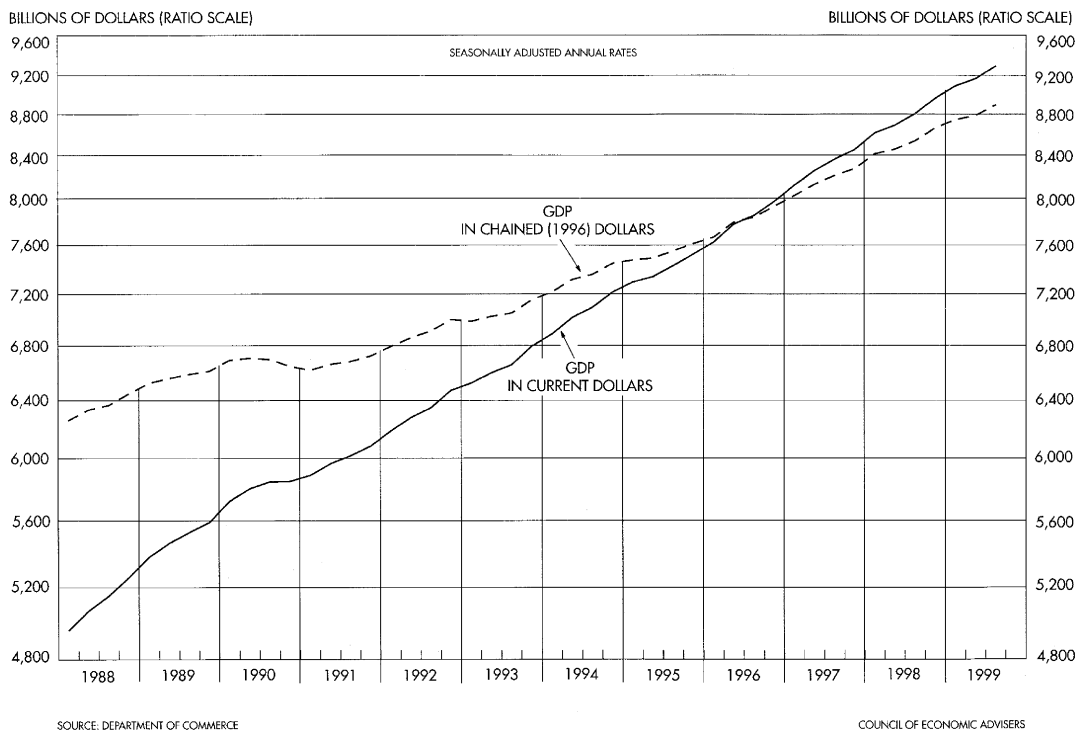

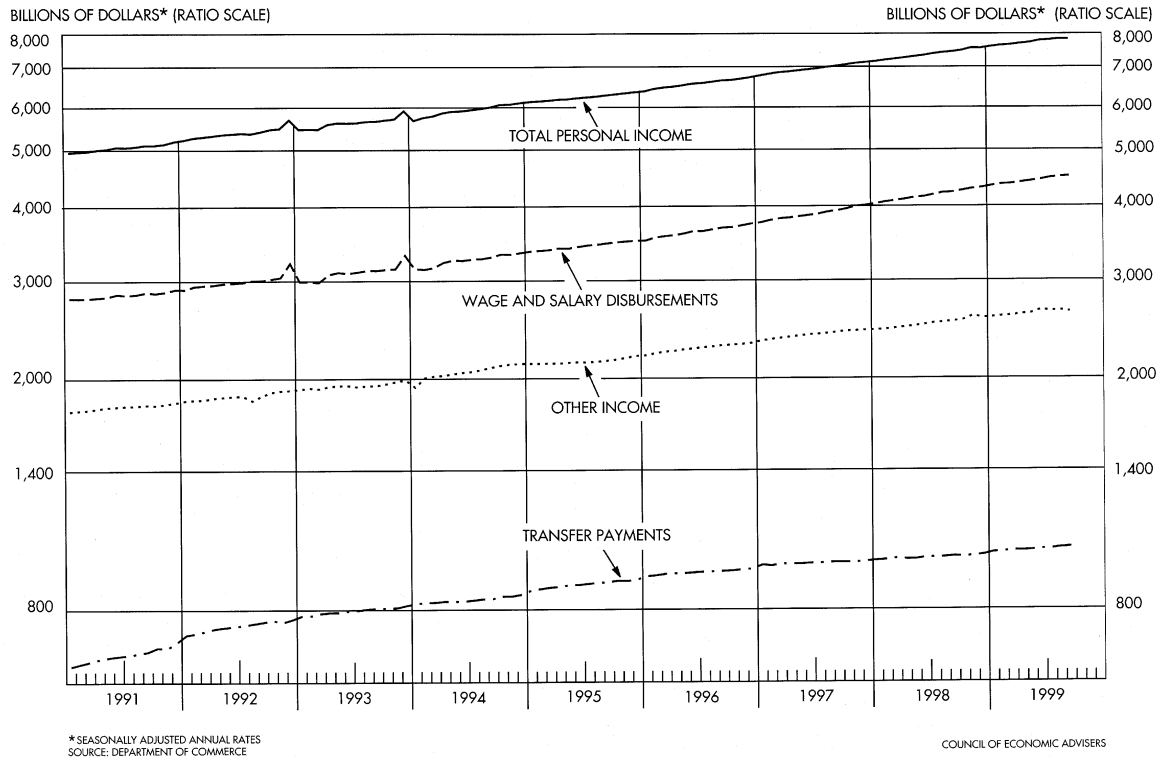

SOURCES OF PERSONAL INCOME

Personal income rose \$2.6 billion (annual rate) in September, following an increase of \$28.3 billion in August. Wages and salaries increased \$12.8 billion in September, following an increase of \$18.1 billion in August. The September change in personal income was reduced by effects of Hurricane Floyd. Excluding uninsured losses caused by the hurricane, personal income rose \$24.6 billion in September. (Data reflect benchmark revisions.)

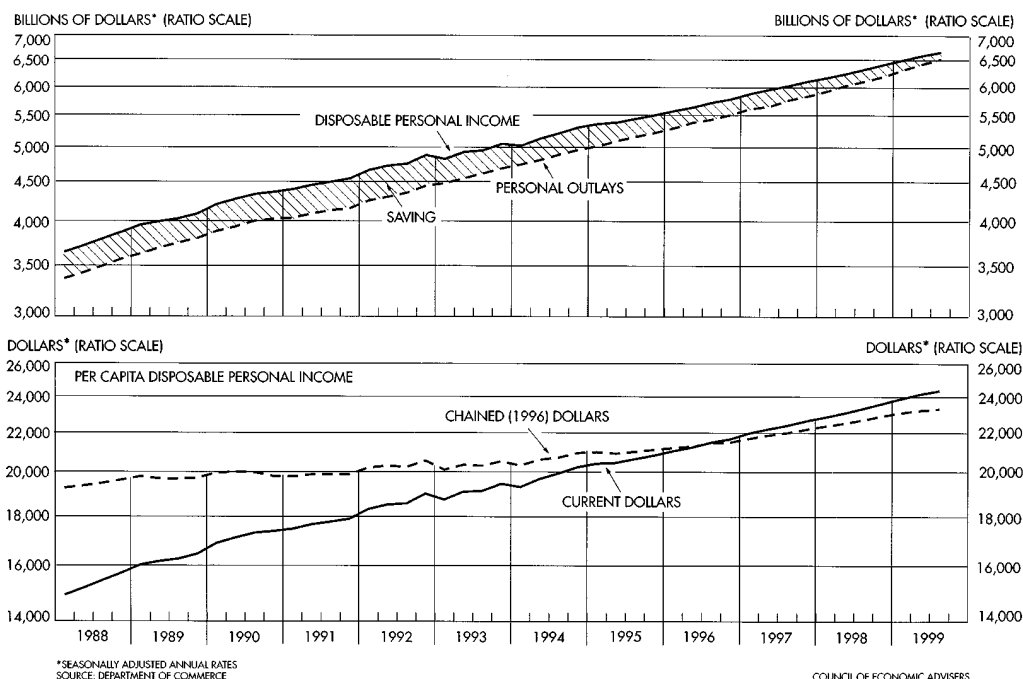

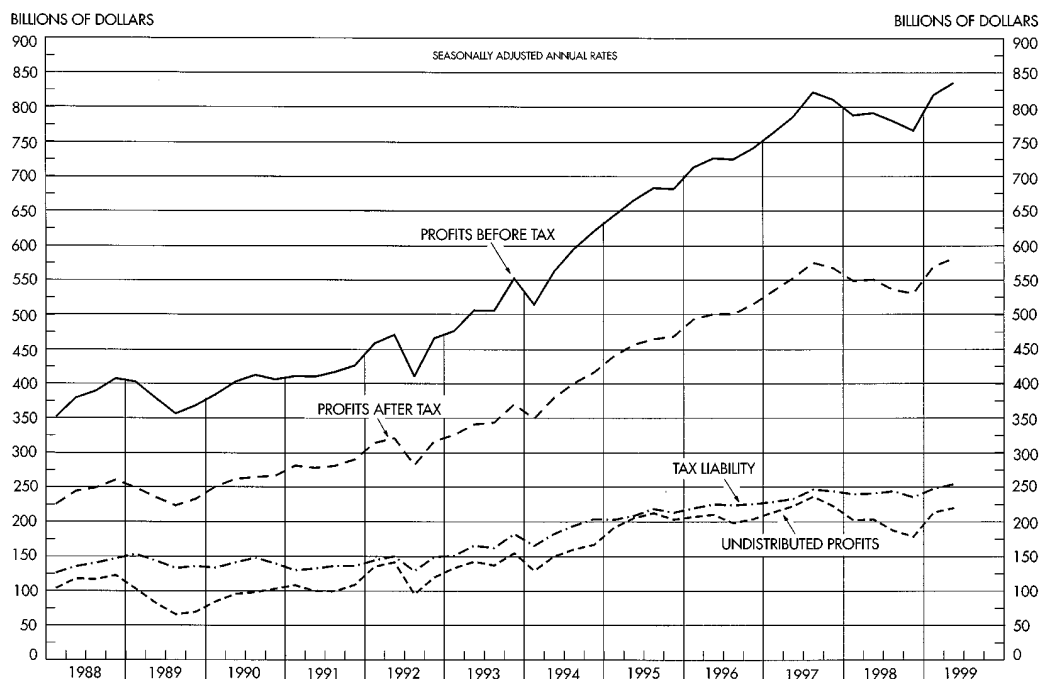

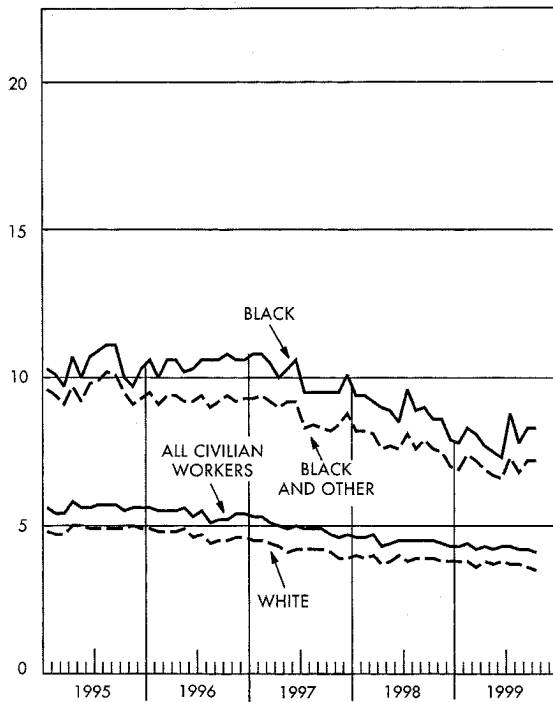

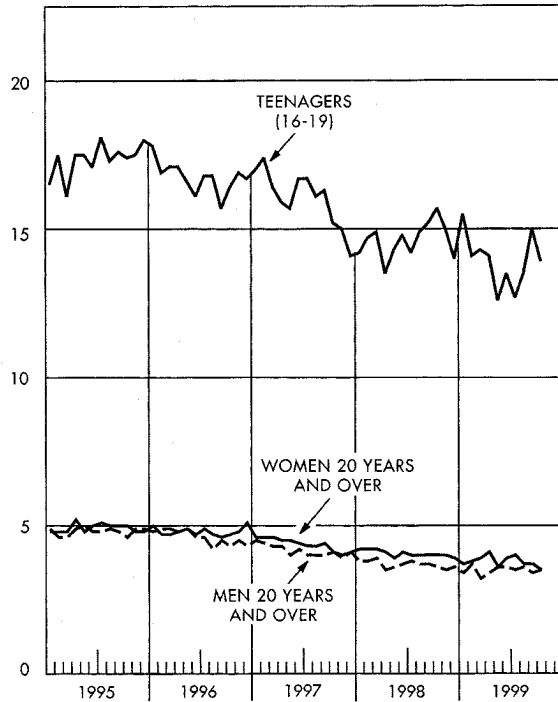

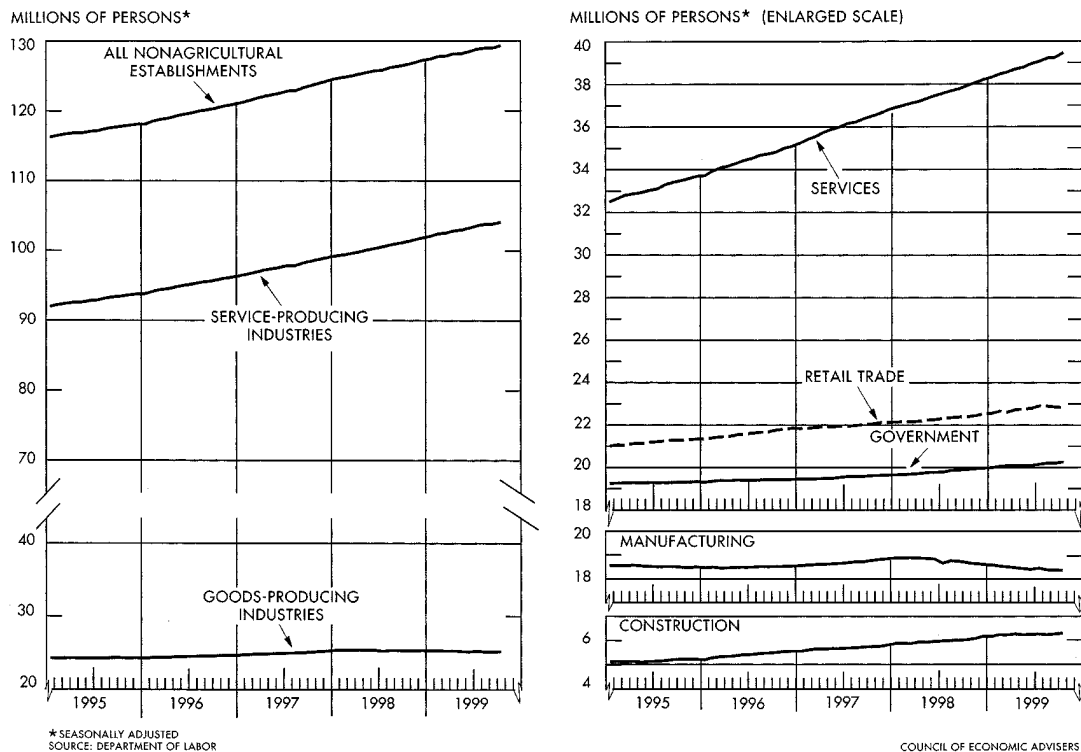

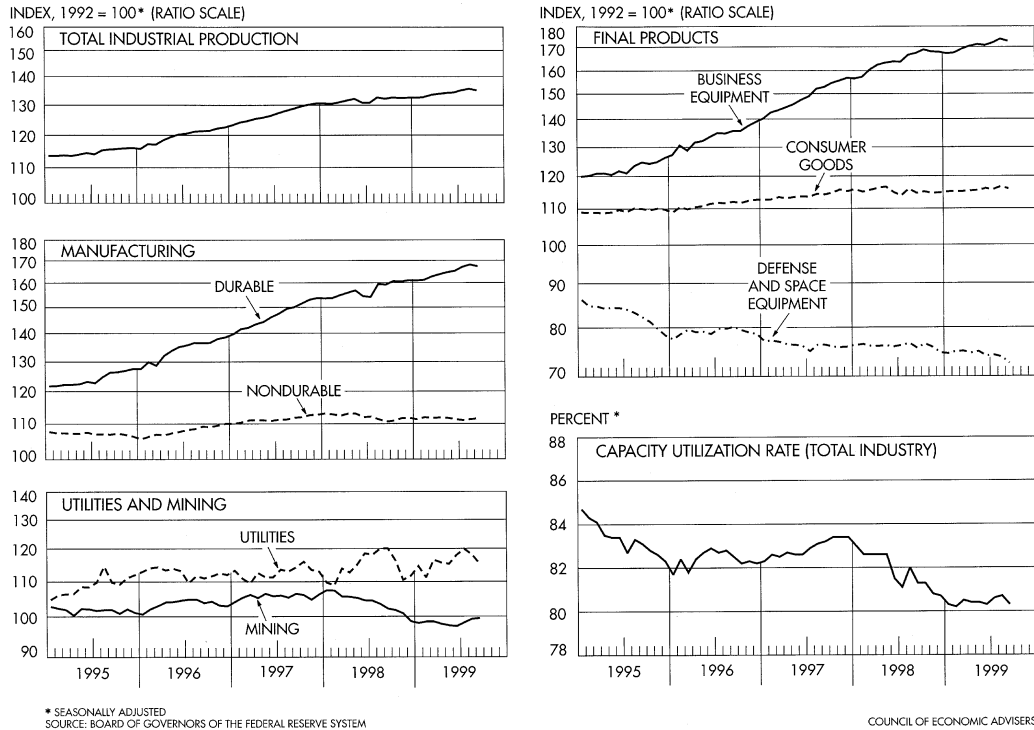

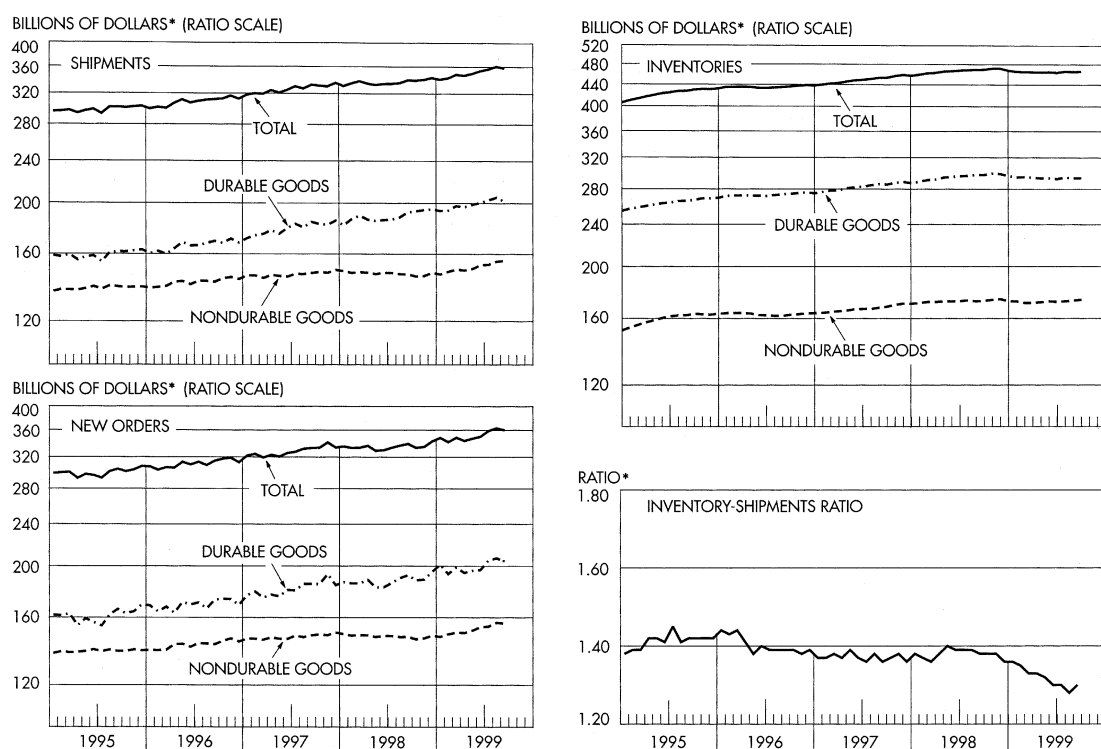

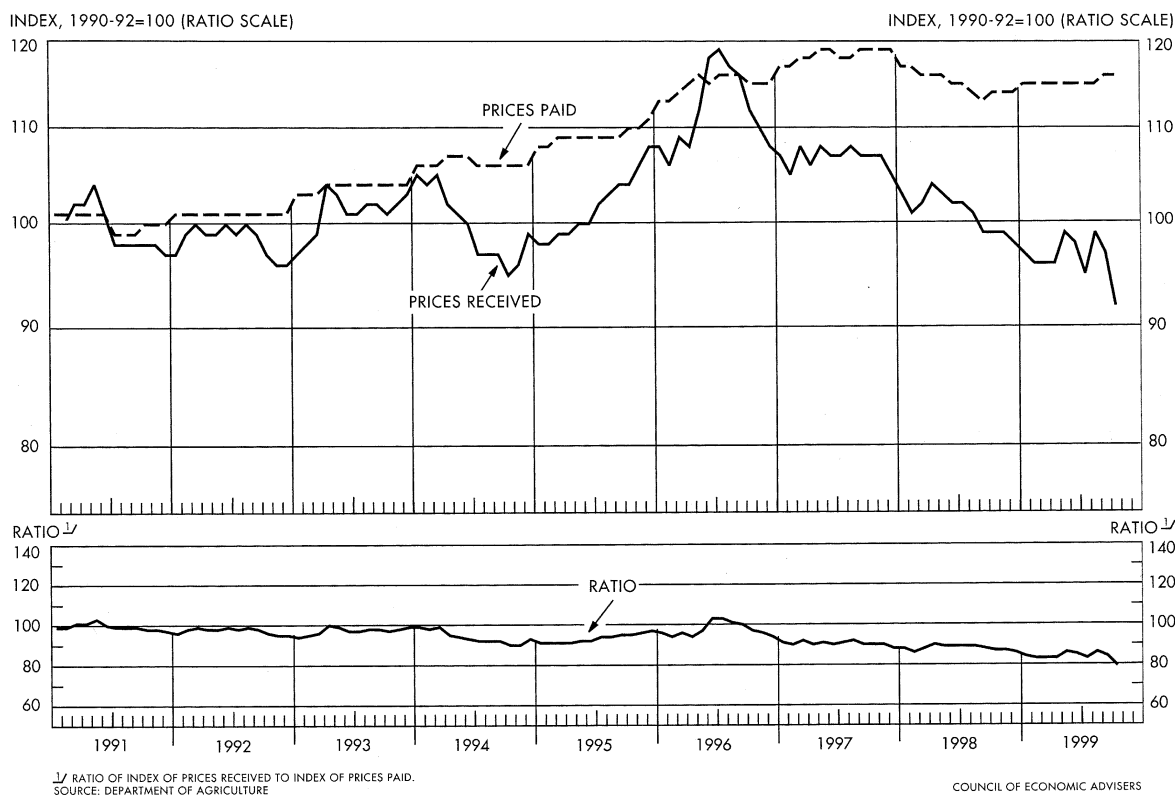

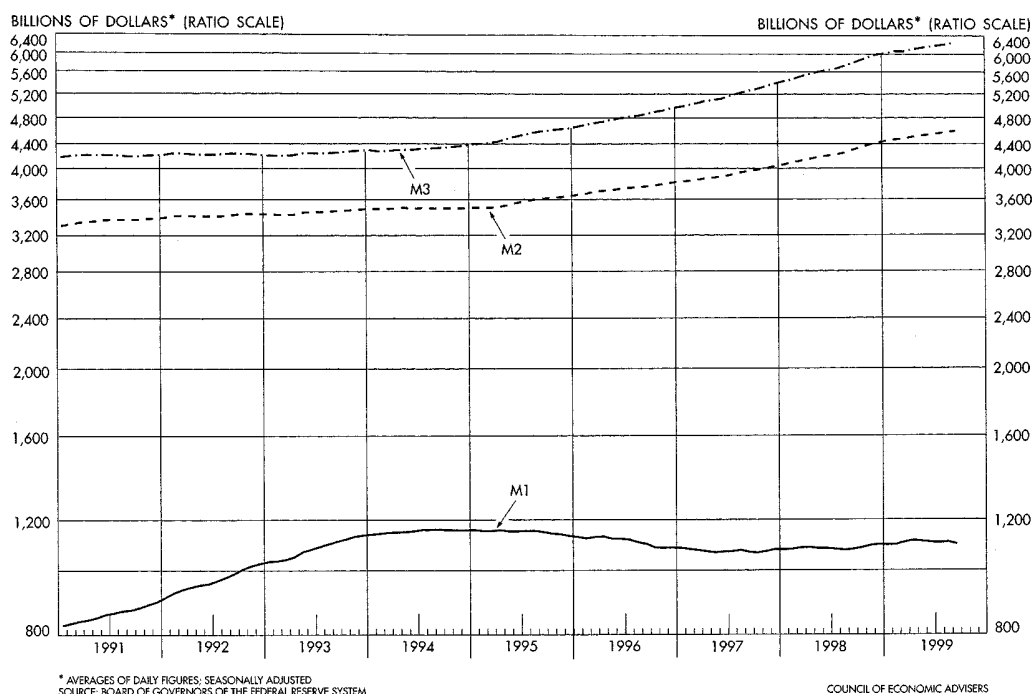

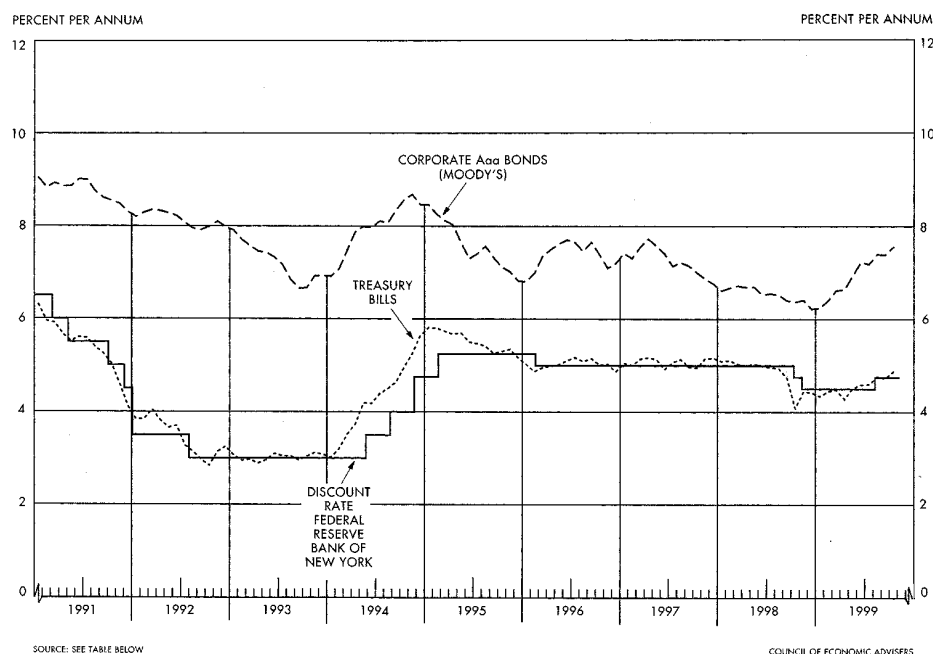

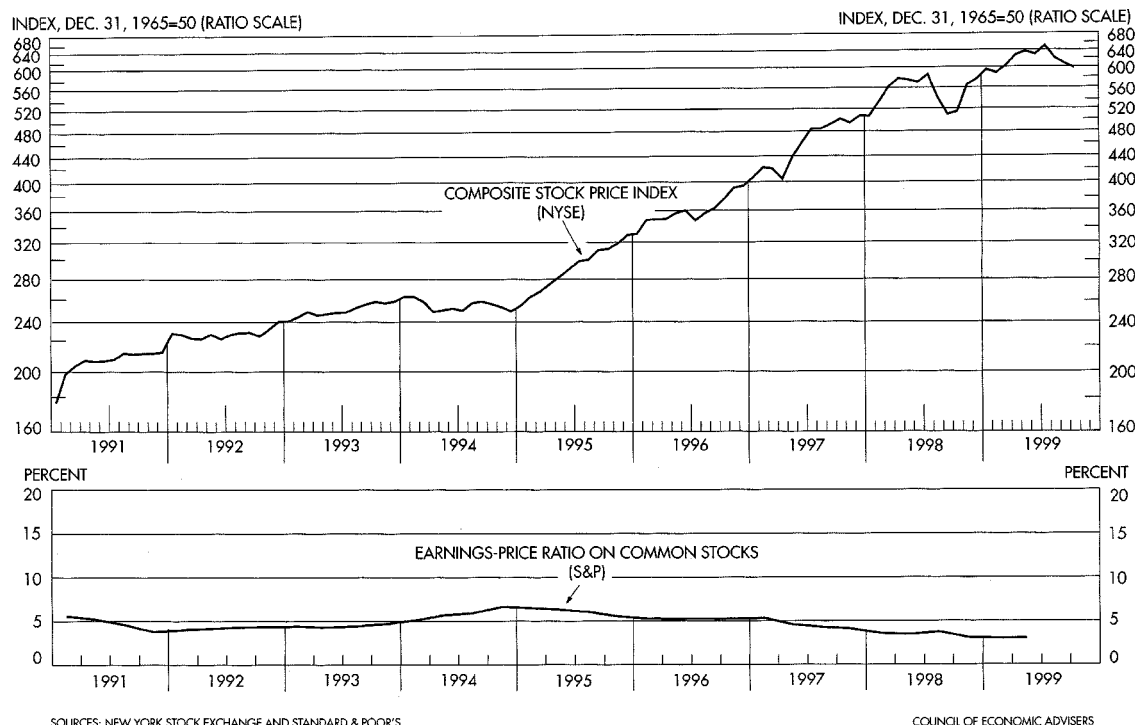

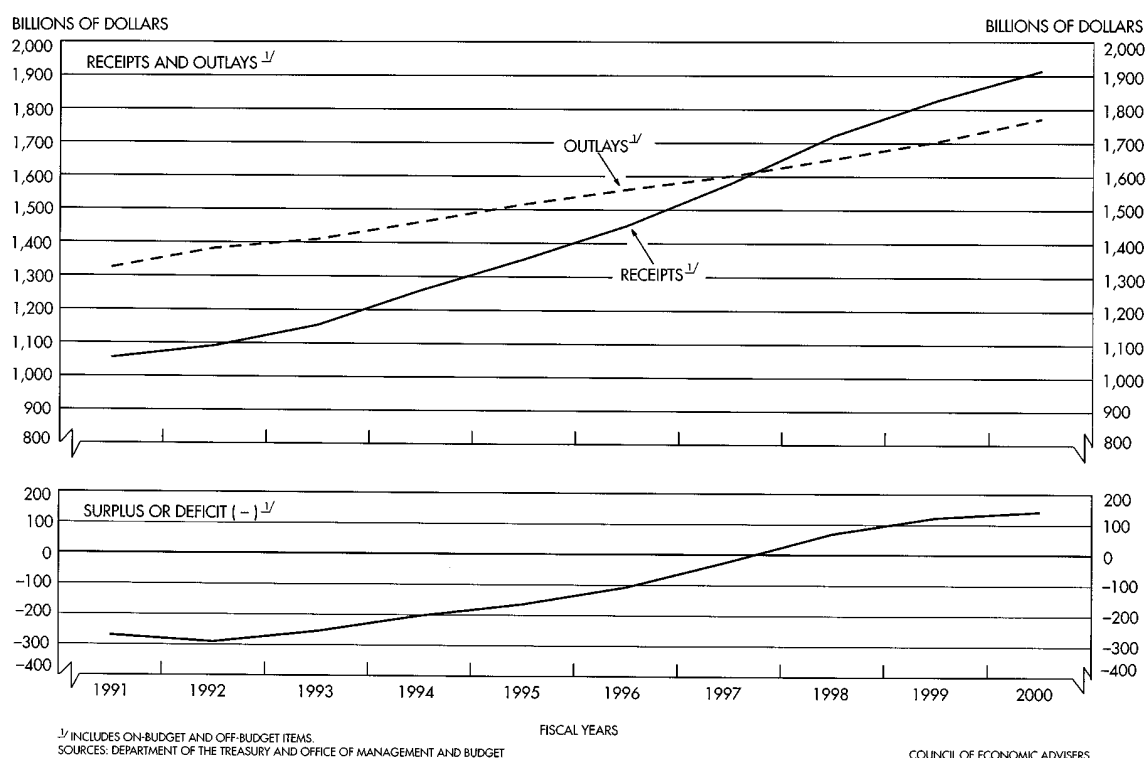

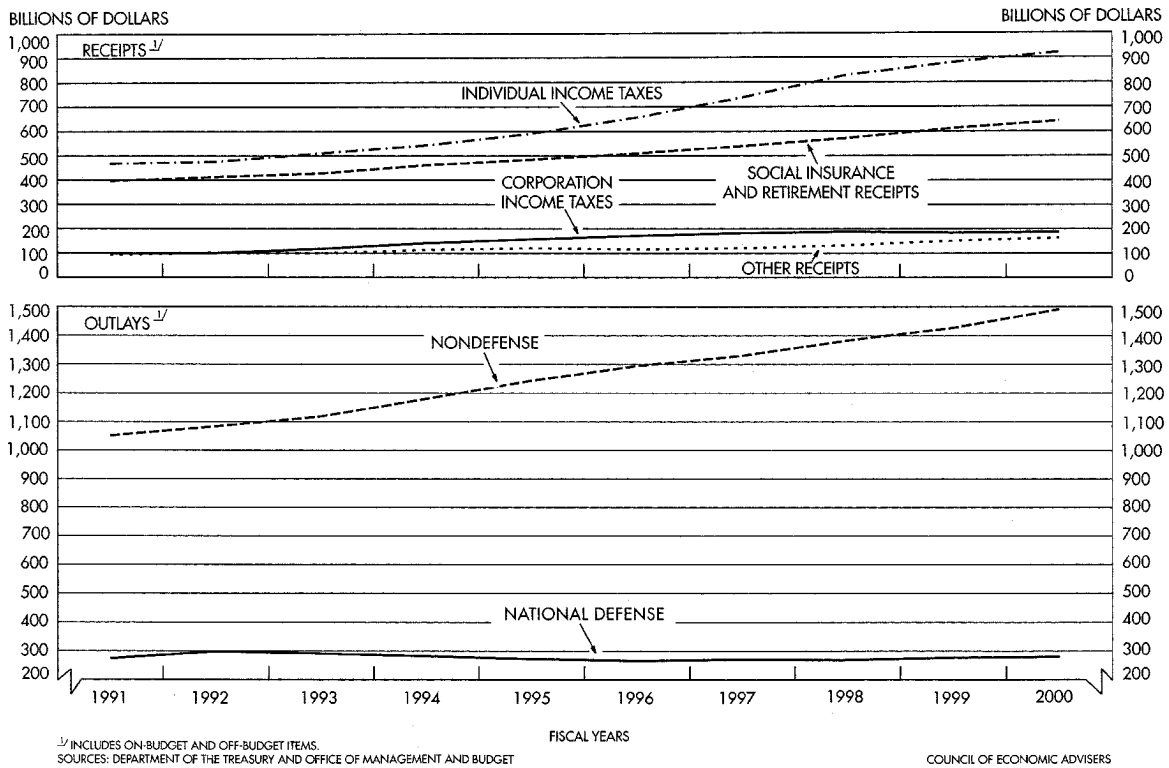

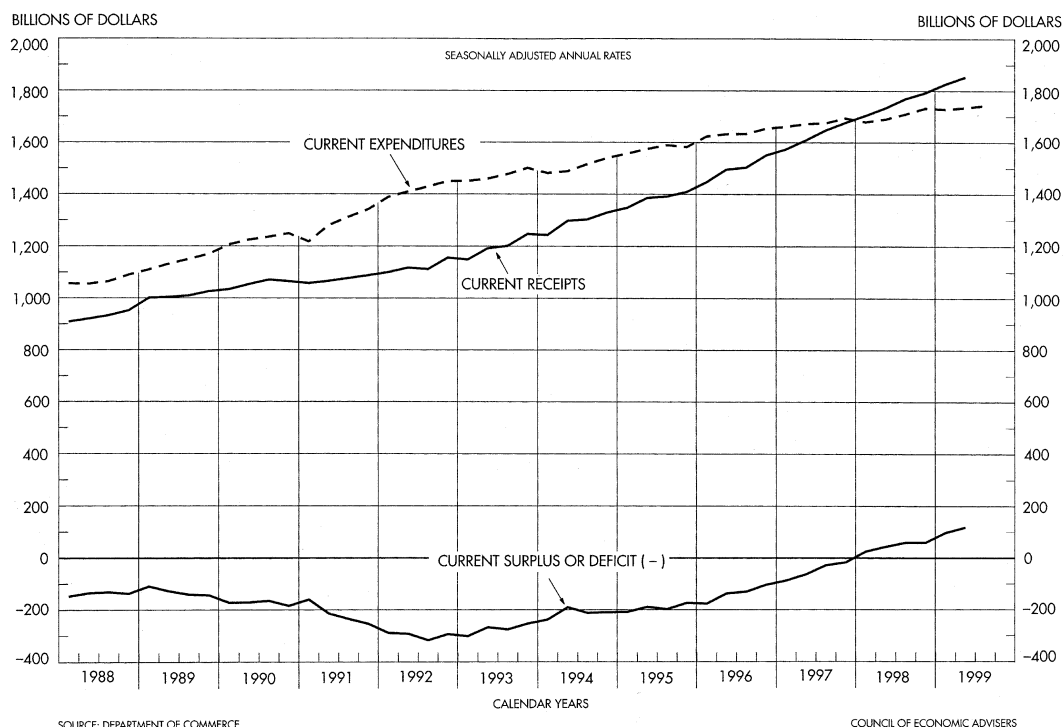

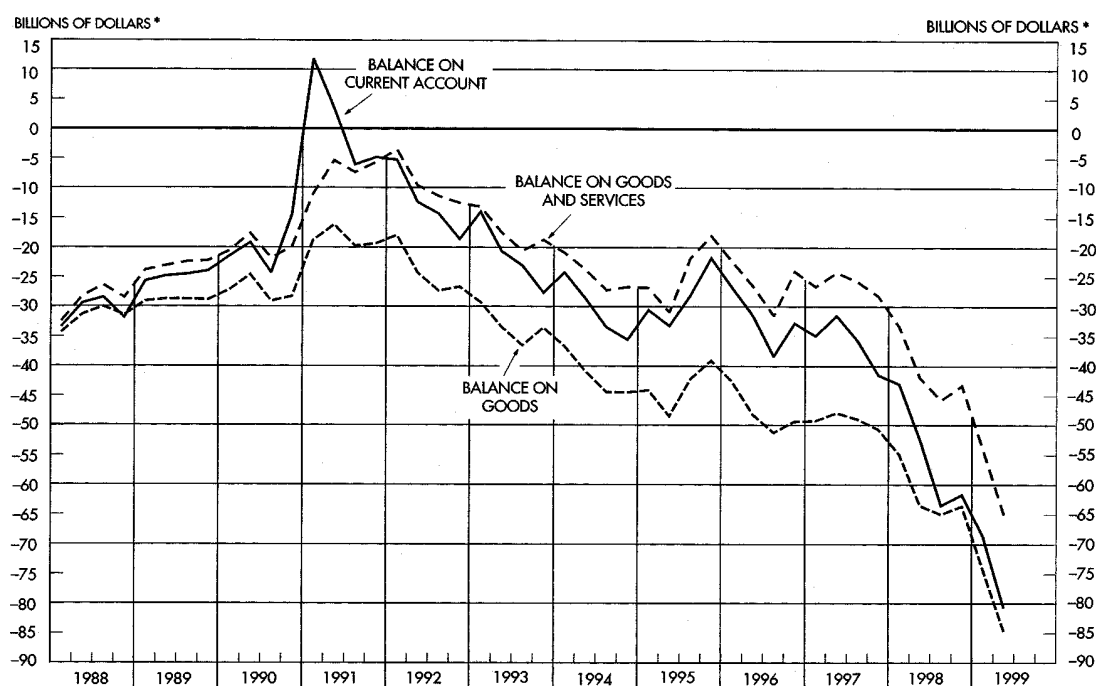

In the capital accounts, U.S. claims on foreigners reported by U.S. banks increased \$37.1 billion in the second quarter of 1999, following a decrease of \$27.8 billion in the first quarter. U.S. liabilities to private foreigners reported by U.S. banks, excluding Treasury securities, increased \$49.4 billion in the second quarter, following a decrease of \$14.2 billion in the first quarter.
