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Highlights

The derivation of the BLS spendable earnings series is discussed by Carol Utter in *The Spendable Earnings Series: A Technical Note on its Calculations* (pp. 6-13).

In accordance with regular practice at the beginning of each year, the seasonally adjusted labor force series have been slightly revised, due to the application of new seasonal factors which incorporate 1968 data. The revisions did not affect the total unemployment rates published in 1968 by more than 0.1 percentage point. A discussion of the seasonal adjustment methodology, the new factors, and the updated seasonally adjusted series appear on pages 20, 22, and 26-68, respectively.

Summary Employment and Unemployment Developments, January 1969

The employment situation continued to show strength in January. At 3.3 percent, the overall unemployment rate, seasonally adjusted, was unchanged, matching December's 15-year low. Unemployment rates for adult men and all full-time workers rose over the month, while the rate for teenagers declined. The number of employed persons fell less than normally for this time of year, and the number of unemployed rose about in line with seasonal expectations.

Industry Employment

Nonfarm payroll employment, which usually declines sharply between December and January, fell much less than expected this January. After seasonal adjustment, nonagricultural payroll employment, at 69.5 million, was up 250,000 over the month, the fourth consecutive month of substantial gains. The advance occurred despite a 90,000 net increase in the number of workers off payrolls because of strikes. Since September, nonfarm payroll employment has risen by 1.2 million (seasonally adjusted).

The January payroll increase was led by gains on a seasonally adjusted basis of 165,000 in trade and 50,000 each in services and government. These increases were partially offset by declines of 30,000 in contract construction and 10,000 in transportation and public utilities. The increase in trade employment partly reflected a recovery from the December decline caused by the flu outbreak. In transportation and public utilities, the employment cutback reflected the effects of the longshoremen's strike.

Manufacturing employment was generally strong in January; but the total job gain on a seasonally adjusted basis was held down by a strike in the petroleum industry. Although employment rose by 65,000 in durable goods, headed by machinery and fabricated metals, the strike produced a 50,000 decline in nondurables.

Hours and Earnings

The workweek for all rank and file workers on private nonfarm payrolls averaged 37.5 hours, down 0.3 hour from December. After seasonal adjustment, the workweek rose 0.2 hour over the month. Substantial declines in mining and contract construction were offset by increases in trade and finance.

In manufacturing, seasonally adjusted weekly hours remained unchanged after declining for 3 successive months. At 40.7 hours, the factory workweek was the same as the average for 1968. Factory overtime, at 3.7 hours, declined one-tenth of an hour but continued in the high range which has prevailed since May 1968.

Average hourly earnings for all rank and file workers rose 2 cents in January to \$2.95. The decline in the average workweek, however, edged average weekly earnings down 12 cents to \$110.63. Compared to a year ago, average weekly earnings were up \$7.68 (7.5 percent).

Average weekly earnings for production and nonsupervisory workers declined in January in mining, contract construction, and manufacturing but increased in trade and finance. Despite a 2-cent rise in hourly earnings for factory workers, their average weekly earnings fell \$1.05 to \$126.36 due to the usual January decline in the workweek (0.6 hour, not seasonally adjusted).

Unemployment

The number of unemployed persons rose in January to 2.9 million about in line with expectations. The number was down 200,000 from a year ago. At 3.3 percent, the overall unemployment rate was unchanged over the month and thus remained at its post-Korean low. Over the year, the unemployment rate was down by 0.3 of a percentage point.

The jobless rate for adult men rose from 1.8 to 2.0 percent in January, after falling in December to the lowest point since the series began in 1948. The January increase occurred primarily among 20-24 year-olds. The teenage jobless rate fell to 11.7 percent--a drop of one percentage point from December--its lowest mark since January 1968. Girls accounted for all of the decline in teenage unemployment. The rate for adult women (3.5 percent) was unchanged over the month.

The unemployment rate for married men held at 1.4 percent in January, its lowest point since the series began in 1955. The rate for full-time workers rose 0.2 percentage point to 2.9 percent, with persons over 25 years old accounting for most of the increase.

Jobless rates for both whites (3.0 percent) and nonwhites (6.0 percent) were unchanged in January, holding at the post-Korean lows established in the previous month.

State insured unemployment edged up slightly from the post-World War II low reached in De-

cember. At 2.1 percent, the rate continued in the range which had prevailed for most of 1968.

Total Employment and Labor Force

Total employment and the labor force normally decline sharply after the Christmas season, but January's reductions were substantially less than anticipated.

At 75.4 million in January, total employment declined 450,000 less than expected. After allowances for seasonal changes, agricultural employment dropped 100,000, its first seasonally adjusted decline in 3 months. Nonagricultural employment increased by 550,000, almost all of which occurred among adult women and teenagers. Over the year, total employment was up by 2.1 million, as 550,000 more men, 1.2 million more women, and 325,000 more teenagers held jobs.

The civilian labor force declined 500,000 less than expected in January. After seasonal adjustment, this was the third monthly increase in a row. Over the year, labor force growth amounted to 1.9 million.

The Spendable Earnings Series: A Technical Note on its Calculation *

Before the income tax was extended to a majority of wage earners in 1943, the amount of weekly pay earned measured the money available for spending. During the past 25 years, however, the rise in the average level of earnings has placed the worker in higher brackets of the graduated income tax schedule which, together with rising social security tax rates, has resulted in his take home pay becoming significantly smaller than his gross earnings.

To better measure current earnings available for spending, the Bureau of Labor Statistics has developed series of spendable weekly earnings--average money earnings after deductions for Federal income and social security taxes--for production or nonsupervisory workers on payrolls of all private nonagricultural establishments. Since changes in consumer prices directly affect the purchasing power of the worker, the Bureau also computes spendable earnings in constant (1957-59) dollars. Conversion of the earnings into 1957-59 dollars indicate the approximate value of the goods and services which could have been purchased with current earnings at average prices for the 3 years 1957-59. These series are calculated each month as a part of the Bureau's program on hours and earnings statistics.

Spendable earnings are derived from gross earnings, which measure only regularly recurring payments to workers and therefore exclude irregular bonuses, retroactive pay, and employers' contributions for welfare benefits. In addition, the spendable earnings series do not take into account all deductions from pay but only the most important personal taxes for which deductions are made at standard rates nationwide. ^{1/} Because of wide variations in tax laws, State and city income taxes and employee contributions for other State and local programs cannot be deducted from average earnings on a national basis. (Individual States, however, could develop their own formulas for statewide deductions.) Payments for union dues, like taxes, also reduce the amounts received in pay envelopes but are not subtracted from gross earnings because

deductions are not uniform. Group insurance premiums, and other pay deductions for welfare programs are generally classified as consumption expenditures or personal savings and would not be deducted even if the necessary data were available. The cost of these items is included in the Consumer Price Index which is used to deflate the spendable earnings series.

Since the amount of tax liability depends on the number of dependents supported by the worker and his marital status as well as on the level of his gross income, it would be somewhat unrealistic to speak of an average amount of income tax per wage earner. It has seemed preferable to compute the tax liability for two groups of income receivers, a single person with no dependents and a worker who is the sole support of a spouse and two children. Income from the earnings of other family members and from such sources as rent, dividends, and pensions are excluded.

Uses and Limitations

The spendable earnings series, although lacking numerous refinements which would be necessary to make it a precise tool, serves as a rough guide to the trend of "take home" pay and is therefore useful in union-management wage negotiations, in developing national wage policies, and in studying current economic trends. It measures changes in the money amounts available to workers from current earnings for spending on goods and services and for personal savings. It shows the effect on pay envelopes of revisions of tax rates and, when related to changes in consumer prices, indicate changes in the purchasing power of workers' earnings.

Some of the limitations implied in the derivation of the spendable earnings series should be remembered. These data measure the spendable earnings of workers who earn the average gross weekly earnings, have the specified number of dependents, and take the standard deduction. They may not represent the average spendable earnings of all workers with the specified number of dependents, which, because of individual variations in earnings, tax rates, and deductions, might be substantially different from the spendable earnings series. Moreover, since the tax rates depend on the total annual income, it must be assumed, in computing the deductions from average weekly earnings for a particular month, that the annual earnings are 52 times the weekly earnings.

If the spendable earnings series deflated by the CPI is used to measure changes in the general welfare of workers, certain technical and economic considerations should be borne in mind. First, the CPI represents only the purchases of wage-earners and clerical-worker families in urban areas, and therefore is not strictly appropriate for deflating the widely varying earnings of workers in all areas of the United States, rural as well as urban. Moreover, the CPI measures the price change from month to month for a standard list of goods and services; changes in buying habits, which take place slowly, are taken into account fully only on the occasion of comprehensive revisions of the index every 8 or 10 years. Neither the CPI nor the earnings figures, of course, reflects the changes in welfare resulting from the expansion of free

Government services, such as those for education, health, and other community services.

Two final cautions suggest that the spendable earnings series should be used in conjunction with other economic indicators for broad assessments of workers' economic well-being. The series refers only to the employed and naturally should not be used as a measure of the welfare of unemployed workers. It is also important to consider the effect on earnings of length of the work-week.

The effect of total Federal income and social security taxes on a weekly paycheck of \$100 (assuming a joint return with 3 dependents) was practically the same in 1947 as in 1968 (\$10.62 and \$10.69 respectively). In 1947, however, applicable Federal income taxes amounted to \$10.04 and social security taxes were only 58 cents, whereas in 1968, Federal income taxes were \$6.29 and social security taxes came to \$4.40. If actual gross earnings of the average production or nonsupervisory worker in the private economy since 1947 are compared it will be noted that gross average earnings have risen 136 percent while Federal income and social security taxes increased 12-fold because of the progressive income tax, and the value of the dollar declined by over 35 percent, as measured by the Consumer Price Index. Nevertheless, the purchasing power of the average pay check was enhanced about 37 percent in 20 years. The average gross earnings and spendable earnings in current and constant dollars of the average production or nonsupervisory worker with three dependents are shown in the tabulation below.

Method of Computation

The spendable earnings series are computed by direct application to gross weekly earnings (multiplied by 52 weeks) of the appropriate deductions, exemptions, and rates shown on the instructions accompanying Federal income tax and social security tax forms. For example, a worker with three dependents, being allowed a total exemption of \$2,400 (\$600 for himself and for each dependent) and a minimum standard deduction of \$600 (\$300 for himself and \$100 for each dependent), does not pay Federal income taxes until he has earned more than \$3,000 per year or the equivalent of \$57.69 per week. Therefore, to compute spendable weekly earnings for a worker with three dependents whose income is \$57.69 per week or less—one merely subtracts the 4.8 percent social security tax. Computing spendable earnings for gross incomes greater than \$57.69 becomes progressively more complicated because of the graduated income tax. The married worker with three dependents earning \$100 per week, or \$5,200 per year, pays income tax on \$2,200 at a rate of 14 percent on the first \$1,000, 15 percent on the second \$1,000 and 16 percent on the remaining \$200, plus a surcharge on the amount of tax levied at the 16 percent rate. In addition, he pays 4.8 percent social security taxes on all \$5,200.

Derivation of the Formulas

To prepare the spendable earnings series with a minimum of effort, a short-cut computation method was devised, whereby deductions for both Federal income tax and social security tax are made in a single operation. This method assumes that gross average weekly earnings are constant from week to week, that is, they may be multiplied by 52 to obtain the annual income figure upon which tax rates are based.

The basic formula used to derive spendable earnings may be expressed as:

To determine the tax using the graduated income tax rate schedule and the various deduction rules for a single person or a person with any number of dependents, several variations of this basic formula are required. The following definitions and constraints of terms used are given:

- N = spendable earnings
- X = gross weekly earnings
- s = social security tax rate. (Instead of sX, maximum social security tax in dollars (\$7.20 in 1969) must be used if income exceeds \$7800 per year or \$150.00 per week.)
- E = total exemptions in dollars (\$600 for each exemption claimed).
- D = standard income tax deduction which applies as (1) the minimum standard deduction (\$300 for self plus \$100 for each dependent) with incomes for which the minimum standard deduction is larger than the 10 - percent deduction; (2) as a 10 - percent deduction with incomes for which the 10 - percent deduction is larger than the minimum deduction; and (3) as \$1000 with incomes of \$10,000 and over.
- t = maximum Federal income tax rate applicable to taxable income, that is, gross annual income (52 X) minus exemptions (E) and deductions (D)
- X₀ = income subject to Federal income tax at lower rates than t.
- C = cumulation of tax paid on X₀.

The passage of the Revenue and Expenditure Control Act of 1968 introduced a surtax on Federal income taxes paid in 1968 and 1969. The

effect of this surtax has not been taken into consideration in the above formula. Therefore an additional adjustment must be made. The surtax does not apply unless the taxpayer has taxable income above the first two tax brackets; that is, for a single person, if his tax exceeds \$145 or for a married person filing a joint return, if his tax exceeds \$290. Furthermore, single persons with tax liabilities between \$145 and \$290 or married persons with tax liabilities between \$290 and \$580 pay the surtax at a rate of less than the full 10 percent.^{3/} For these persons the surtax is applied at twice the surtax rate, but only to their tax liability above the exemption level. Thus, the surtax to be deducted from the formula given above may be expressed:

Example of Computations

The formulas presented above are the general formulas used as a model for all calculations. Specific weekly earnings, of course, will fall in specific tax brackets and the actual calculations can be greatly simplified. For example, the calculation of tax for a single person with gross average weekly earnings between \$98.29 and \$141.02 per week during January 1969 is as follows:

Publication and Revisions

A monthly press release on spendable weekly earnings is issued on the same day as the latest Consumer Price Index—about the 25th of each month—and shows a preliminary figure for spendable earnings for the previous month in both current and 1957-59 dollars. Revised figures for that month are later presented in the monthly publication Employment and Earnings and Monthly Report on the Labor Force and in the Monthly Labor Review. Historical data going back to 1939 are published annually in Employment and Earnings Statistics for the United States.

The final data are subject to possible revision at the time of the annual adjustment of the BLS

employment estimates to new benchmarks, since the employment estimates are used to weight the earnings data, and the introduction of new benchmark levels may cause some redistribution of weights. In general, revisions of earnings averages caused by benchmark adjustments of the employment data are slight and relatively infrequent.

The accompanying table shows the formulas used for the worker with no dependents and with three dependents for 1939 to 1969. Changes in both the income tax and social security laws since 1939, when the series begin, are reflected. The formulas are presented so that users may compute comparable figures for industrial groupings not published by the BLS.

(Seasonally adjusted)

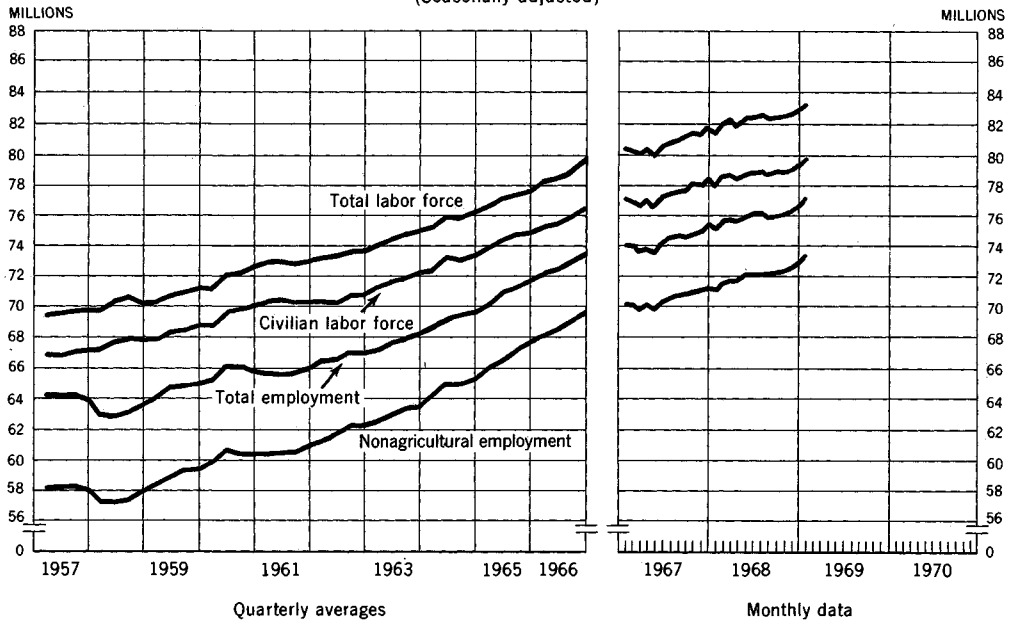
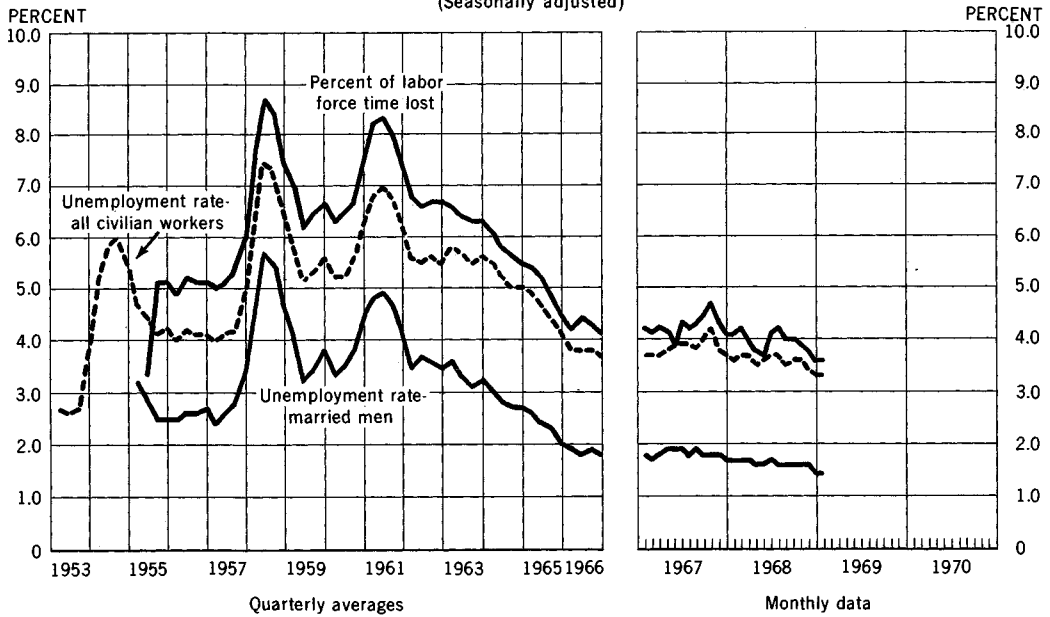

(Seasonally adjusted)

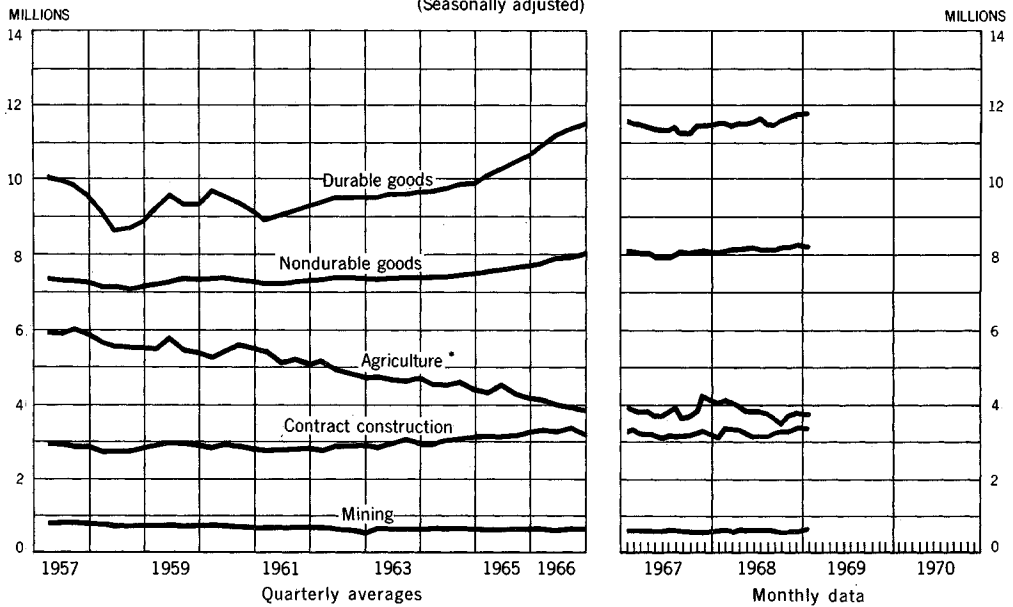

(Seasonally adjusted)

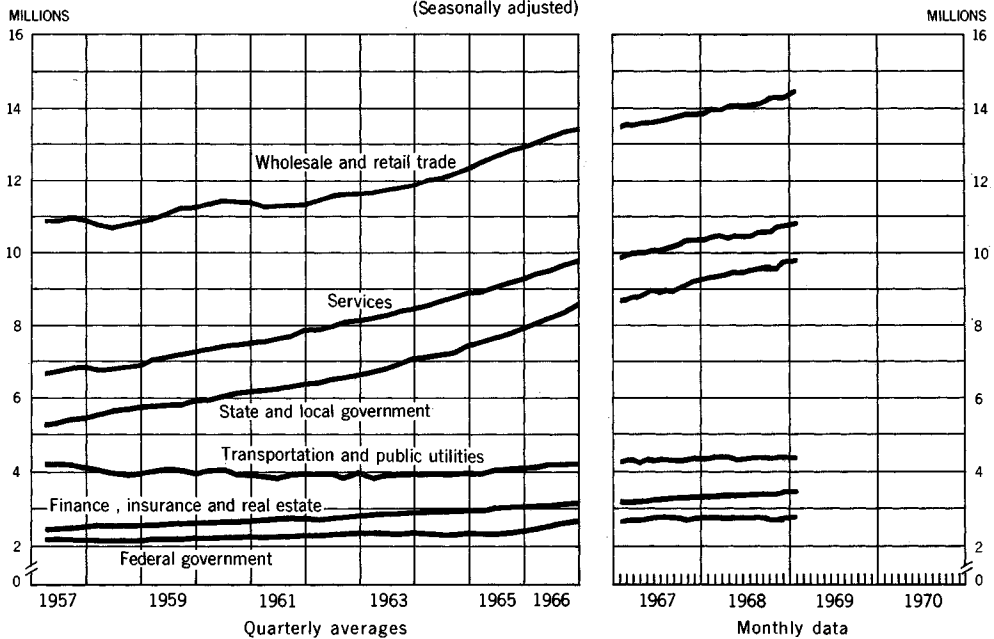

(Seasonally adjusted)

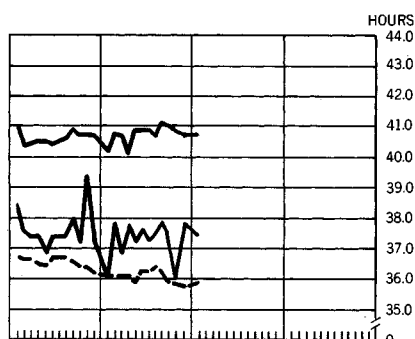
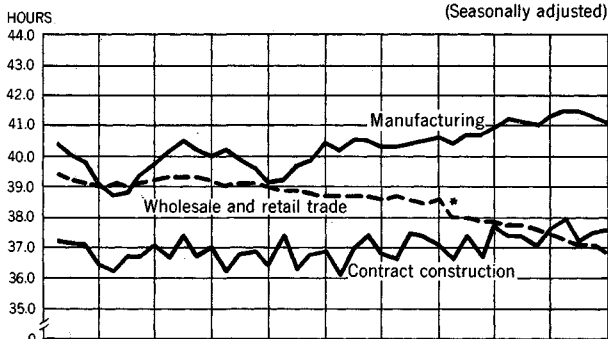

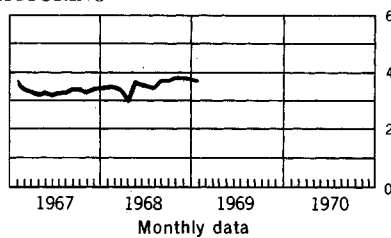
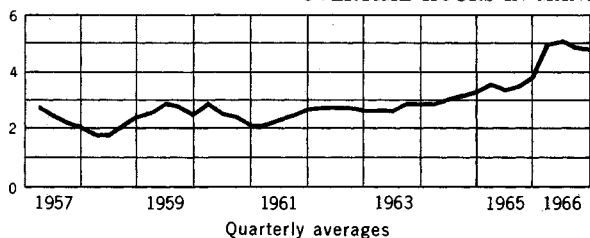

OVERTIME HOURS IN MANUFACTURING

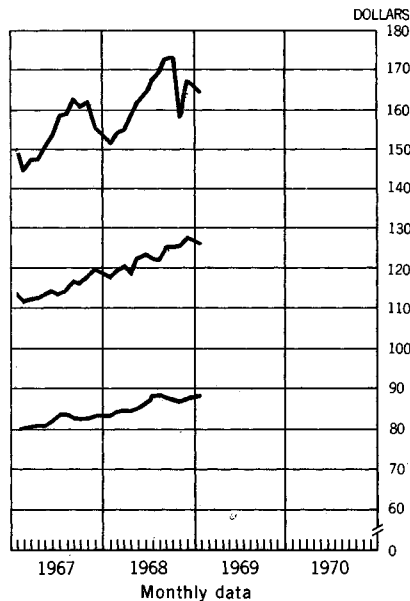
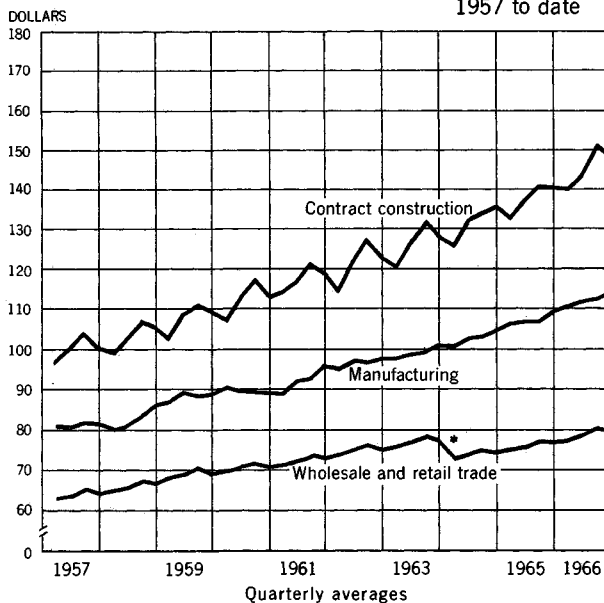

AVERAGE WEEKLY EARNINGS IN MANUFACTURING, CONTRACT CONSTRUCTION, AND TRADE

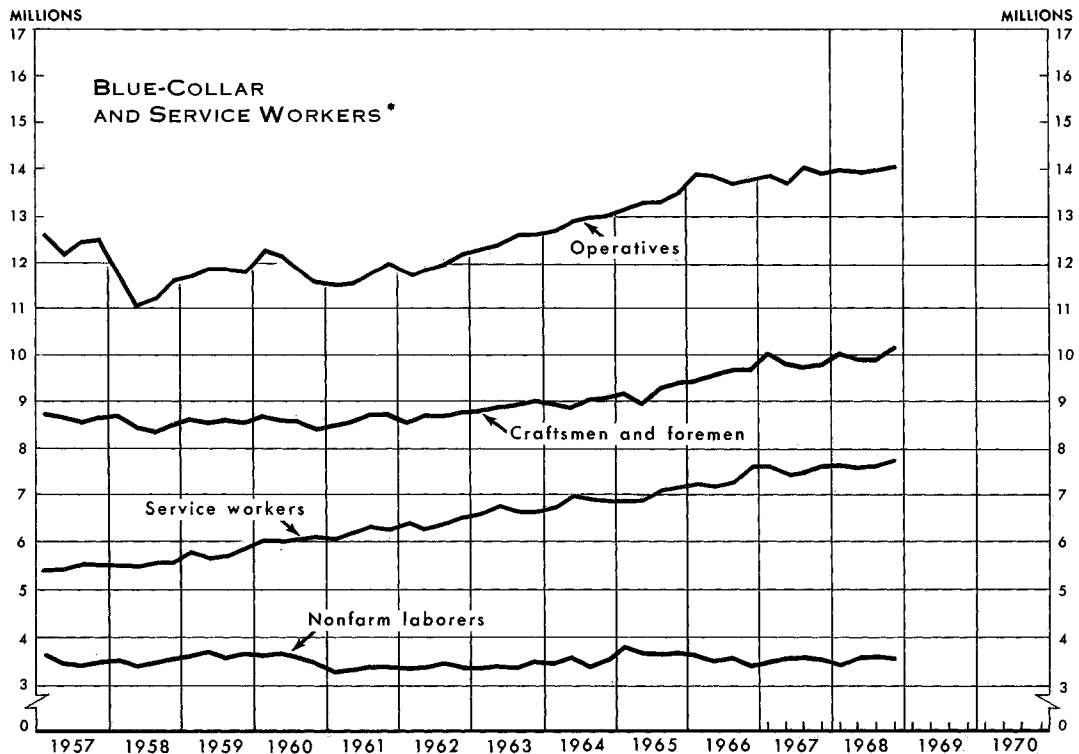
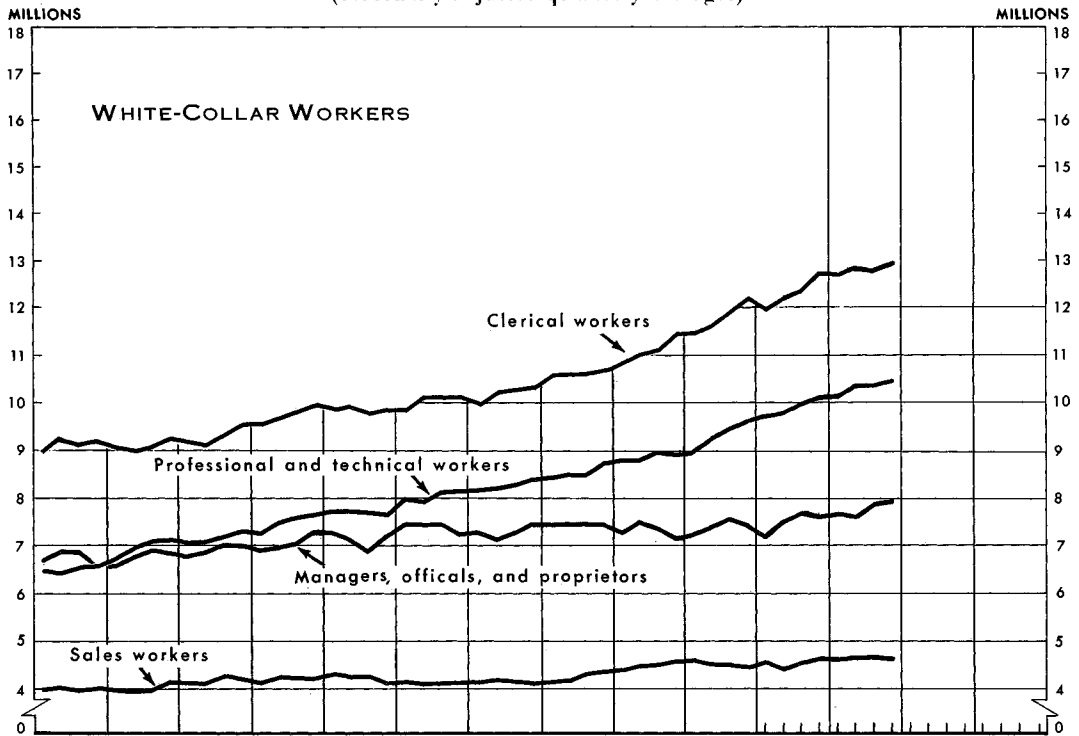

(Seasonally adjusted quarterly averages)

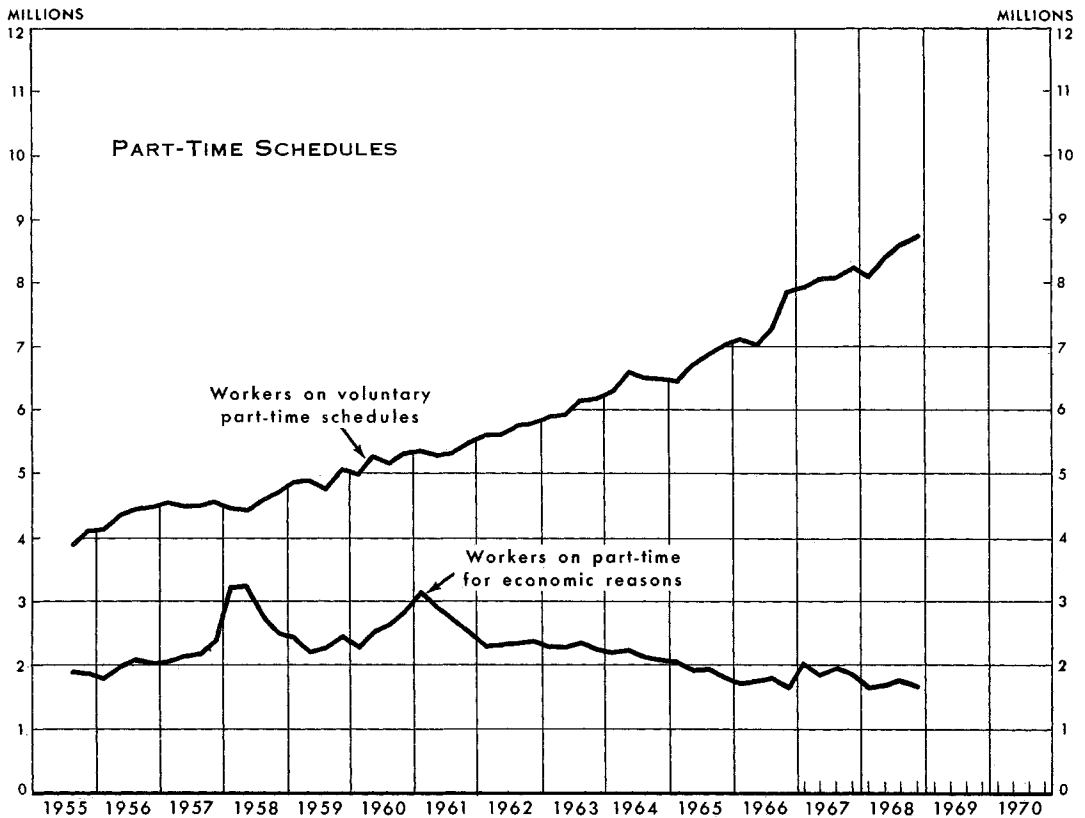
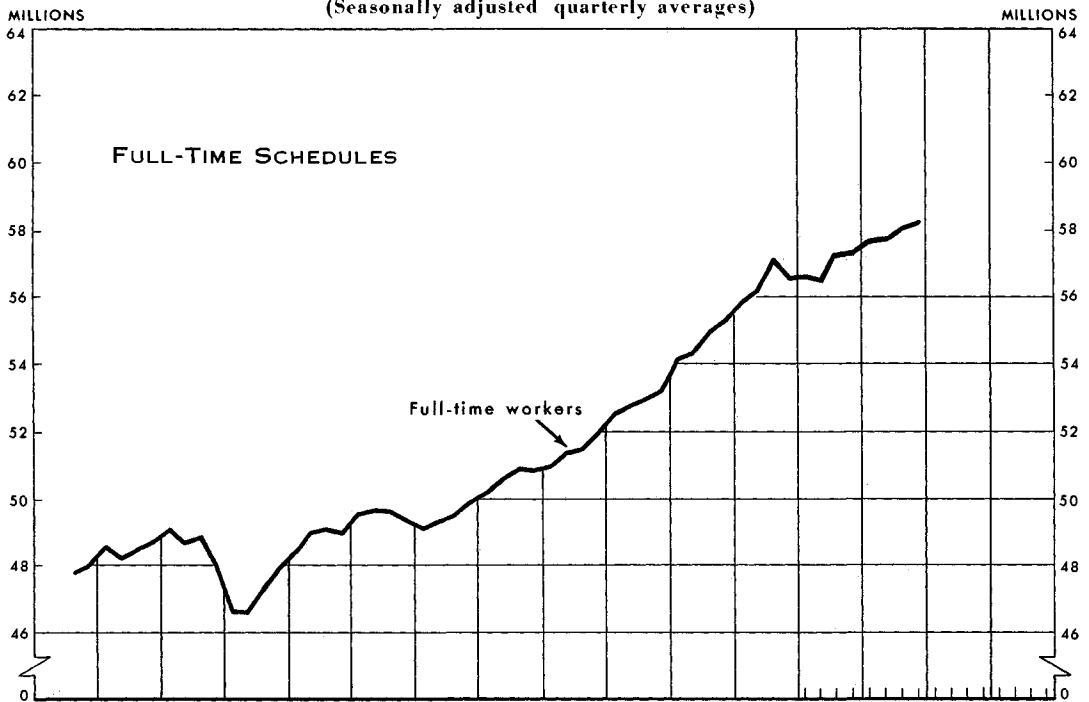

UNEMPLOYMENT RATES AMONG WHITE-COLLAR AND BLUE-COLLAR WORKERS 1957 to date

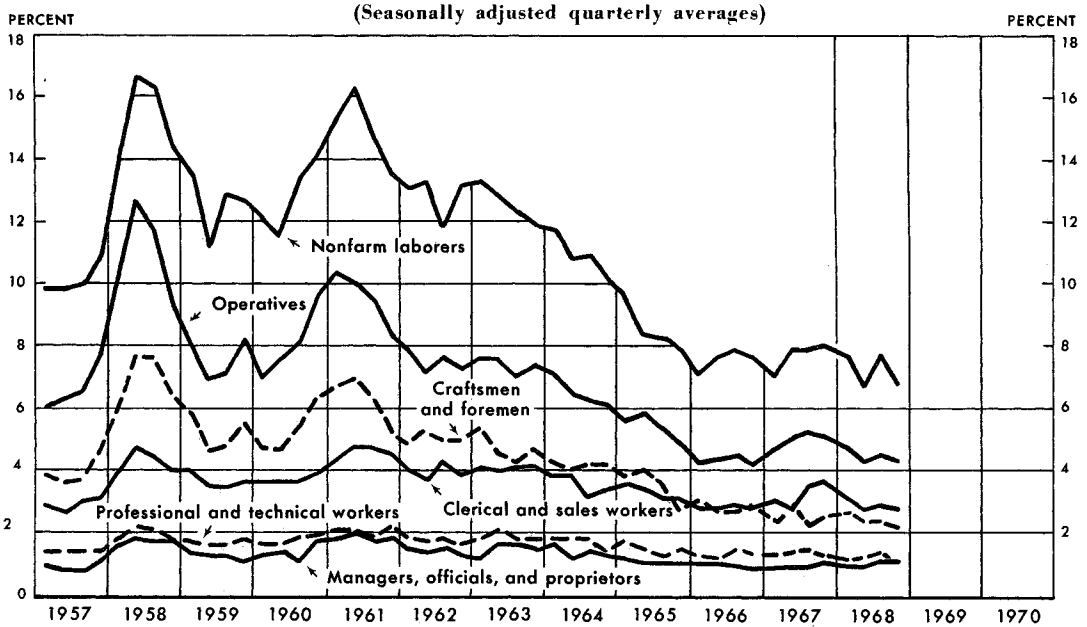
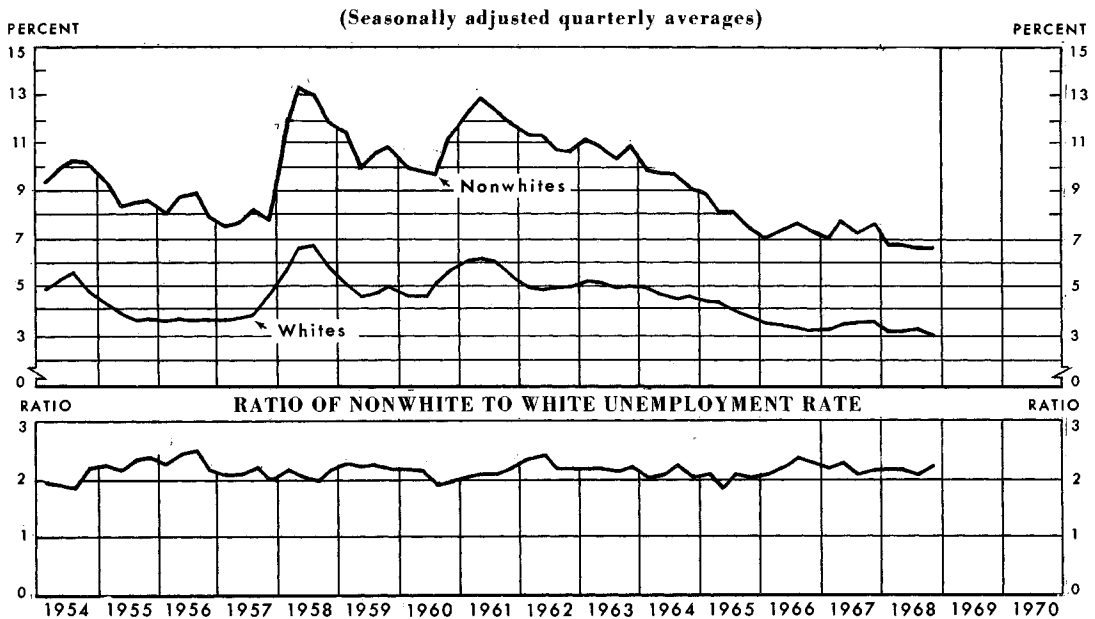

The Method of Seasonal Adjustment for Labor Force Series

In accordance with its regular practice at the beginning of each year, the Bureau of Labor Statistics has recomputed and revised the seasonal adjustment factors for unemployment and other labor force series. The revisions incorporate data through December 1968. The revised seasonal adjustment factors shown on page 22 and the seasonally adjusted series on pages 26-68 replace those published in the February and March 1968 issues of Employment and Earnings and Monthly Report on the Labor Force, which were based on data through December 1967. The incorporation of 1968 data and the recomputation of the seasonally adjusted data do not alter the unemployment rates of all civilian workers from those published last year by more than 0.1 percentage point for any month in the entire series.

Conceptual Changes

In January 1967, the definitions used in the measurement of employment and unemployment were modified and improved in line with the recommendations of the President's Committee to Appraise Employment and Unemployment Statistics. These improvements clarified and sharpened concepts and increased the accuracy of the statistics. In terms of comparability of 1967-68 with earlier data, however, they have tended to: (1) increase the number of persons working 1 to 34 hours and lower the number working 35 hours or more; (2) alter the distribution of unemployment by sex; (3) increase the number of workers on economic part time; (4) reduce the number of workers unemployed 15 weeks or longer; and (5) alter the seasonal pattern of teenage unemployment.^{1/}

The change in the seasonal pattern for teenagers result from the addition of the "current availability" test for jobseekers because, during the spring, persons in school looking for summer jobs are no longer counted as unemployed. For 1967 and subsequent years, a special procedure has been used to develop appropriate seasonal factors for unemployed young persons by sex and color.

An evaluation and computation of data based on the new definitions with historical data has not clearly indicated any appreciable changes in the seasonal pattern for other series. Nonetheless, review and evaluation will continue in the coming year. If this research reveals a need for further special seasonal adjustment procedures, revised factors and data will be developed and published later this year.

Historical Comparability

Beginning in January 1967, all data reflect the definitional changes adopted at that time and are seasonally adjusted using the factors published in this issue. However, as indicated earlier, data for some labor force series in 1967-68 are not exactly comparable with those prior to 1967.

Beginning in 1960, the data include Alaska and Hawaii; this fact should be taken into account in making comparisons with previous years. The inclusion of Alaska and Hawaii resulted in an increase of about 300,000 in the labor force, four-fifths of this in nonagricultural employment. The levels of other labor force categories were not appreciably changed.

Beginning in 1953, population data from the 1950 Census were introduced into the estimating procedure, affecting the comparability of the labor force figures with previous years. Labor force, total employment, and agricultural employment levels were raised by about 350,000, primarily affecting the figures for total and

males. Other categories were relatively unaffected. Similarly, population data from the 1960 Census were introduced in April 1962; this change primarily affected the labor force and employment totals, which were reduced by about 200,000. The unemployment totals were virtually unchanged.

Method of Adjustment 2/

The seasonal adjustment method used for these series continues to be an adaptation of the traditional ratio-to-moving-average method, with allowance for changing seasonal patterns.

The original data are regarded as a product of a trend-cycle component times a seasonal component times an irregular component. The trend-cycle represents the "real" movement of the series, including cyclical movements. The seasonal component is the annual repetitive pattern which makes certain months consistently higher or lower than others. The irregular component is a residual, including sampling errors and short-term fluctuations which do not follow any consistent pattern. After a satisfactory decomposition is achieved, the seasonally adjusted series is computed by dividing each original value by the corresponding seasonal factor.

A centered 12-month moving average of the original data is used as the first estimate of the trend-cycle. This estimate is divided into the original value to provide seasonal-irregulars. A 7-term weighted moving average of these seasonal-irregulars for the same month of successive years provides estimates of the seasonal factors. The quotient of each seasonal-irregular divided by the corresponding seasonal is an estimate of the irregular component, which at this stage includes some residual trend-cycle because of the insufficient flexibility of the 12-month moving average in representing the trend-cycle. These irregulars then are smoothed to provide a trend improvement factor which is multiplied by the 12-month moving average to yield a better trend-cycle. A new decomposition based on the revised trend-cycle is computed in the same way as before.

The use of the 12-month weighted moving average to compute a trend-cycle would end the process were it not for the problem of extreme values. Most series contain some values which do not quite fit the general pattern. The method uses a graduated approach in which every data value is assigned a credence factor between zero and one. Each credence factor is based on the size of the irregular deviation for that value; small deviations imply full credence, large deviations zero credence, and intermediate deviations intermediate credence.

The credence factors are used in two ways. They serve as auxiliary weights in the various moving averages so that the impact of each aberrant data value is reduced in accordance with its credence factor. They are used also in computing modified original values, where the amount of modification varies inversely with the credence factor.

The process is repeated twice in order to refine the credence factors and the resulting decomposition. The effect of all these refinements is to keep most of the aberrations out of the trend-cycle and seasonal components and make them part of the irregular instead.

Many of the labor force series are seasonally adjusted by aggregation rather than directly. That is, parts of the labor force are adjusted directly and their seasonally adjusted values are then combined to provide seasonally adjusted values for the aggregates. Most of the unemployment rates are a quotient of one such aggregate divided by another. The twelve basic component series, which are used in computing the overall unemployment rate, are the four age-sex groups (male and female, under and over 20 years of age) of unemployment, nonagricultural employment, and agricultural employment.

The seasonally adjusted series which follow cover 154 major series on the labor force 16 years of age and over. They include employment status by sex, color, and selected age groups; employment status by occupation; employment data by full- and part-time status; and unemployment by marital status. The March issue of Employment and Earnings and Monthly Report on the Labor Force will contain additional seasonally adjusted series, including unemployment by duration, unemployment rates by industry, and class-of-worker statistics.

The majority of the seasonally adjusted labor force series presented here are computed by a method of aggregation. The process begins with the computation of seasonal factors and seasonally adjusted data for approximately 100 basic labor force series. These basic series are then aggregated according to a set of specifications to yield other seasonally adjusted estimates. All civilian labor force and unemployment rate statistics, as well as the major employment and unemployment estimates, are computed by this method of aggregation. Totals of one aggregation pattern (e.g. civilian labor force by age and sex) will not necessarily equal those of other patterns (civilian labor force by color or occupation). Since the annual averages are also a product of the aggregation procedures, they may differ in some instances from those published elsewhere. A list of the basic series which are independently seasonally adjusted are available from the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Additional information concerning the preparation of the labor force, employment, hours and earnings, and labor turnover series--concepts and scope, survey methods, and limitations--is contained in technical notes for each of these series, available from the Bureau of Labor Statistics free of charge.

INTRODUCTION

The statistics in this periodical are compiled from three major sources: (1) household interviews, (2) payroll reports from employers, and (3) administrative statistics of unemployment insurance systems.

Data based on household interviews are obtained from a sample survey of the population 16 years of age and over. The survey is conducted each month by the Bureau of the Census for the Bureau of Labor Statistics and provides comprehensive data on the labor force, the employed and the unemployed, including such characteristics as age, sex, color, marital status, occupations, hours of work, and duration of unemployment. The survey also provides data on the characteristics and past work experience of those not in the labor force. The information is collected by trained interviewers from a sample of about 50,000 households, representing 449 areas in 863 counties and independent cities, with coverage in 50 States and the District of Columbia. The data collected are based on the activity or status reported for the calendar week including the 12th of the month.

Data based on establishment payroll records are compiled each month from mail questionnaires by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, in cooperation with State agencies. The payroll survey provides detailed industry information on nonagricultural wage and salary employment, average weekly hours, average hourly and weekly earnings, and labor turnover for the Nation, States, and metropolitan areas. The figures are based on payroll reports from a sample of establishments employing about 25 million nonagriculture wage and salary workers. The data relate to all workers, full- or part-time, who received pay during the payroll period which includes the 12th of the month.

Data based on administrative records of unemployment insurance systems furnish a complete count of insured unemployment among the two-thirds of the Nation's labor force covered by unemployment insurance programs. Weekly reports, by State, are issued on the number of initial claims, the volume and rate of insured unemployment under State unemployment insurance programs, and the volume under programs of unemployment compensation for Federal employees, ex-servicemen, and railroad workers. These statistics are published by the Bureau of Employment Security, U.S. Department of Labor, in "Unemployment Insurance Claims."

Relation between the household and payroll series

The household and payroll data supplement one another, each providing significant types of information that the other cannot suitably supply. Population characteristics, for example, are readily obtained only from the household survey whereas detailed industrial classifications can be reliably derived only from establishment reports.

Data from these two sources differ from each other because of differences in definition and coverage, sources of information, methods of collection, and estimating procedures. Sampling variability and response errors are additional reasons for discrepancies. The major factors which have a differential effect on levels and trends of the two series are as follows:

Employment

Coverage. The household survey definition of employment comprises wage and salary workers (including domestics and other private household workers), self-employed persons, and unpaid workers who worked 15 hours or more during the survey week in family-operated enterprises. Employment in both agricultural and non-agricultural industries is included. The payroll survey covers only wage and salary employees on the payrolls of nonagricultural establishments.

Multiple jobholding. The household approach provides information on the work status of the population without duplication since each person is classified as employed, unemployed, or not in the labor force. Employed persons holding more than one job are counted only once and are classified according to the job at which they worked the greatest number of hours during the survey week. In the figures based on establishment records, persons who worked in more than one establishment during the reporting period are counted each time their names appear on payrolls.

Unpaid absences from jobs. The household survey includes among the employed all persons who had jobs but were not at work during the survey week--that is, were not working but had jobs from which they were temporarily absent because of illness, bad weather, vacation, labor-management dispute, or because they were taking time off for various other reasons, even if they were not paid by their employers for the time off. In

the figures based on payroll reports, persons on leave paid for by the company are included, but not those on leave without pay for the entire payroll period.

Hours of Work

The household survey measures hours actually worked whereas the payroll survey measures hours paid for by employers. In the household survey data, all persons with a job but not at work are excluded from the hours distributions and the computations of average hours. In the payroll survey, employees on paid vacation, paid holiday, or paid sick leave are included and assigned the number of hours for which they were paid during the reporting period.

Comparability of the household interview data with other series

Unemployment insurance data. The unemployed total from the household survey includes all persons who did not have a job at all during the survey week and were looking for work or were waiting to be called back to a job from which they had been laid off, regardless of whether or not they were eligible for unemployment insurance. Figures on unemployment insurance claims, prepared by the Bureau of Employment Security of the Department of Labor, exclude persons who have exhausted their benefit rights, new workers who have not earned rights to unemployment insurance, and persons losing jobs not covered by unemployment insurance systems (agriculture, State and local government, domestic service, self employment, unpaid family work, nonprofit organizations, and firms below a minimum size).

In addition, the qualifications for drawing unemployment compensation differ from the definition of unemployment used in the household survey. For example, persons with a job but not at work and persons working only a few hours during the week are sometimes eligible for unemployment compensation but are classified as employed rather than unemployed in the household survey.

Agricultural employment estimates of the Department of Agriculture. The principal differences in coverage

are the inclusion of persons under 16 in the Statistical Research Service (SRS) series and the treatment of dual jobholders who are counted more than once if they worked on more than one farm during the reporting period. There are also wide differences in sampling techniques and collecting and estimating methods, which cannot be readily measured in terms of impact on differences in level and trend of the two series.

Comparability of the payroll employment data with other series

Statistics on manufactures and business, Bureau of the Census. BLS establishment statistics on employment differ from employment counts derived by the Bureau of the Census from its censuses or annual sample surveys of manufacturing establishments and the censuses of business establishments. The major reasons for some noncomparability are different treatment of business units considered parts of an establishment, such as central administrative offices and auxiliary units, the industrial classification of establishments, and different reporting patterns by multiunit companies. There are also differences in the scope of the industries covered, e.g., the Census of Business excludes contract construction, professional services, public utilities, and financial establishments, whereas these are included in BLS statistics.

County Business Patterns. Data in County Business Patterns, published jointly by the U.S. Departments of Commerce and Health, Education, and Welfare, differ from BLS establishment statistics in the treatment of central administrative offices and auxiliary units. Differences may also arise because of industrial classification and reporting practices. In addition, CBP excludes interstate railroads and government, and coverage is incomplete for some of the nonprofit activities.

Employment covered by State unemployment insurance programs. Not all nonagricultural wage and salary workers are covered by the unemployment insurance programs. All workers in certain activities, such as interstate railroads, are excluded. In addition, small firms in covered industries are also excluded in 31 States. In general, these are establishments with less than four employees.

Labor Force Data

COLLECTION AND COVERAGE

Statistics on the employment status of the population, the personal, occupational, and other characteristics of the employed, the unemployed, and persons not in the labor force, and related data are compiled for the BLS by the Bureau of the Census in its Current Population Survey (CPS). A detailed description of this survey appears in "*Concepts and Methods Used in Manpower Statistics from the Current Population Survey*" (BLS Re-

port 313). This report is available from BLS on request.

These monthly surveys of the population are conducted with a scientifically selected sample designed to represent the civilian noninstitutional population 16 years and over. Respondents are interviewed to obtain information about the employment status of each member of the household 16 years of age and over. The inquiry relates to activity or status during the calendar week,

Sunday through Saturday, which includes the 12th of the month. This is known as the survey week. Actual field interviewing is conducted in the following week.

Inmates of institutions and persons under 16 years of age are not covered in the regular monthly enumerations and are excluded from the population and labor force statistics shown in this report. Data on members of the Armed Forces, who are included as part of the categories "total noninstitutional population" and "total labor force," are obtained from the Department of Defense.

Each month, 50,000 occupied units are designated for interview. About 2,250 of these households are visited but interviews are not obtained because the occupants are not found at home after repeated calls or are unavailable for other reasons. This represents a noninterview rate for the survey of about 4.5 percent. In addition to the 50,000 occupied units, there are 8,500 sample units in an average month which are visited but found to be vacant or otherwise not to be enumerated. Part of the sample is changed each month. The rotation plan provides for three-fourths of the sample to be common from one month to the next, and one-half to be common with the same month a year ago.

CONCEPTS

Employed persons comprise (a) all those who during the survey week did any work at all as paid employees, in their own business, profession, or farm, or who worked 15 hours or more as unpaid workers in an enterprise operated by a member of the family, and (b) all those who were not working but who had jobs or businesses from which they were temporarily absent because of illness, bad weather, vacation, labor-management dispute, or personal reasons, whether or not they were paid by their employers for the time off, and whether or not they were seeking other jobs.

Each employed person is counted only once. Those who held more than one job are counted in the job at which they worked the greatest number of hours during the survey week.

Included in the total are employed citizens of foreign countries, temporarily in the United States, who are not living on the premises of an Embassy.

Excluded are persons whose only activity consisted of work around the house (such as own home housework, and painting or repairing own home) or volunteer work for religious, charitable, and similar organizations.

Unemployed persons comprise all persons who did not work during the survey week, who made specific efforts to find a job within the past 4 weeks, and who were available for work during the survey week (except for temporary illness). Also included as unemployed are those who did not work at all, were available for work, and (a) were waiting to be called back to a job from which they had been laid off; or (b) were waiting to report to a new wage or salary job within 30 days.

Duration of unemployment represents the length of time (through the current survey week) during which persons classified as unemployed had been continuously looking for work. For persons on layoff, duration of unemployment represents the number of full weeks since the termination of their most recent employment. A period of 2 weeks or more during which a person was employed or ceased looking for work is considered to break the continuity of the present period of seeking work. Average duration is an arithmetic mean computed from a distribution by single weeks of unemployment.

Unemployed persons by reasons for unemployment are divided into four major groups. (1) Job losers are persons whose employment ended involuntarily who immediately began looking for work and persons on layoff. (2) Job leavers are persons who quit or otherwise terminated their employment voluntarily and immediately began looking for work. (3) Reentrants are persons who previously worked at a full-time job lasting 2 weeks or longer but who were out of the labor force prior to beginning to look for work. (4) New entrants are persons who never worked at a full-time job lasting 2 weeks or longer.

The civilian labor force comprises the total of all civilians classified as employed or unemployed in accordance with the criteria described above. The "total labor force" also includes members of the Armed Forces stationed either in the United States or abroad.

The unemployment rate represents the number unemployed as a percent of the civilian labor force. This measure can also be computed for groups within the labor force classified by sex, age, marital status, color, etc. The job-loser, job-leaver, reentrant, and new entrant rates are each calculated as a percent of the civilian labor force; the sum of the rates for the four groups thus equals the total unemployment rate.

Not in labor force includes all civilians 16 years and over who are not classified as employed or unemployed. These persons are further classified as "engaged in own home housework," "in school," "unable to work" because of long-term physical or mental illness, and "other." The "other" group includes for the most part retired persons, those reported as too old to work, the voluntarily idle, and seasonal workers for whom the survey week fell in an "off" season and who were not reported as unemployed. Persons doing only incidental unpaid family work (less than 15 hours) are also classified as not in the labor force.

For persons not in the labor force, data on previous work experience, intentions to seek work again, desire for a job at the time of interview, and reasons for not looking for work are compiled on a quarterly basis. The detailed questions for persons not in the labor force are asked only in those households that are new entrants to the sample and in those that are reentering the sample after 8 months' absence.

Occupation, industry, and class of worker for the employed apply to the job held in the survey week. Per-

sons with two or more jobs are classified in the job at which they worked the greatest number of hours during the survey week. The unemployed are classified according to their latest full-time civilian job lasting 2 weeks or more. The occupation and industry groups used in data derived from the CPS household interviews are defined as in the 1960 Census of Population. Information on the detailed categories included in these groups is available upon request.

The class-of-worker breakdown specifies "wage and salary workers," subdivided into private and government workers, "self-employed workers," and "unpaid family workers." Wage and salary workers receive wages, salary, commission, tips, or pay in kind from a private employer or from a governmental unit. Self-employed persons are those who work for profit or fees in their own business, profession, or trade, or operate a farm. Unpaid family workers are persons working without pay for 15 hours a week or more on a farm or in a business operated by a member of the household to whom they are related by blood or marriage.

Hours of work statistics relate to the actual number of hours worked during the survey week. For example, a person who normally works 40 hours a week but who was off on the Veterans Day holiday would be reported as working 32 hours even though he was paid for the holiday.

For persons working in more than one job, the figures relate to the number of hours worked in all jobs during the week. However, all the hours are credited to the major job.

Persons who worked 35 hours or more in the survey week are designated as working "full time"; persons who worked between 1 and 34 hours are designated as working "part time." Part-time workers are classified by their usual status at their present job (either full time or part time) and by their reason for working part time during the survey week (economic or other reasons). "Economic reasons" include: Slack work, material shortages, repairs to plant or equipment, start or termination of job during the week, and inability to find full-time work. "Other reasons" include: Labor dispute, bad weather, own illness, vacation, demands of home housework, school, no desire for full-time work, and full-time worker only during peak season. Persons on full-time schedules include, in addition to those working 35 hours or more, those who worked from 1-34 hours for non-economic reasons but usually work full time.

Full- and part-time labor force. The *full-time labor force* consists of persons working on full-time schedules, persons involuntarily working part time (because full-time work is not available), and unemployed persons seeking full-time jobs. The *part-time labor force* consists of persons working part time voluntarily and unemployed persons seeking part-time work. Persons with a job but not at work during the survey week are classified ac-

ording to whether they usually work full or part time.

Labor force time lost is a measure of man-hours lost to the economy through unemployment and involuntary part-time employment and is expressed as a percent of potentially available man-hours. It is computed by assuming: (1) that unemployed persons looking for full-time work lost an average of 37.5 hours, (2) that those looking for part-time work lost the average number of hours actually worked by voluntary part-time workers during the survey week, and (3) that persons on part time for economic reasons lost the difference between 37.5 hours and the actual number of hours they worked.

ESTIMATING METHODS

Under the estimation methods used in the CPS, all of the results for a given month become available simultaneously and are based on returns from the entire panel of respondents. There are no subsequent adjustments to independent benchmark data on labor force, employment, or unemployment. Therefore, revisions of the historical data are not an inherent feature of this statistical program.

1. *Noninterview adjustment.* The weights for all interviewed households are adjusted to the extent needed to account for occupied sample households for which no information was obtained because of absence, impassable roads, refusals, or unavailability for other reasons. This adjustment is made separately by groups of sample areas and, within these, for six groups--color (white and non-white) within the three residence categories (urban, rural nonfarm, and rural farm). The proportion of sample households not interviewed varies from 4 to 6 percent depending on weather, vacations, etc.

2. *Ratio estimates.* The distribution of the population selected for the sample may differ somewhat, by chance, from that of the Nation as a whole, in such characteristics as age, color, sex, and residence. Since these population characteristics are closely correlated with labor force participation and other principal measurements made from the sample, the latter estimates can be substantially improved when weighted appropriately by the known distribution of these population characteristics. This is accomplished through two stages of ratio estimates as follows:

a. *First-stage ratio estimate.* This is a procedure in which the sample proportions are weighted by the known 1960 Census data on the color-residence distribution of the population. This step takes into account the differences existing at the time of the 1960 Census between the color-residence distribution for the Nation and for the sample areas.

b. *Second-stage ratio estimate.* In this step, the sample proportions are weighted by independent current estimates of the population by age, sex, and color. These estimates are prepared by carrying forward the most recent census data (1960) to take account of subsequent aging of the population, mortality, and migra-

tion between the United States and other countries.

3. *Composite estimate procedure.* In deriving statistics for a given month, a composite estimating procedure is used which takes account of net changes from the previous month for continuing parts of the sample (75 percent) as well as the sample results for the current month. This procedure reduces the sampling variability of month-to-month changes especially and of the levels for most items also.

Rounding of Estimates

The sums of individual items may not always equal the totals shown in the same tables because of independent rounding of totals and components to the nearest thousand. Differences, however, are insignificant.

Reliability of the Estimates

Since the estimates are based on a sample, they may differ from the figures that would have been obtained if it were possible to take a complete census using the same schedules and procedures.

The standard error is a measure of sampling variability, that is, the variations that might occur by chance because only a sample of the population is surveyed. The chances are about 2 out of 3 that an estimate from the sample would differ from a complete census by less than the standard error. The chances are about 19 out of 20 that the difference would be less than twice the standard error.

Table A shows the average standard error for the major employment status categories, by sex, computed from data for past months. Estimates of change derived from the survey are also subject to sampling variability. The standard error of change for consecutive months is also shown in table A. The standard errors of level shown in table A are acceptable approximations of the standard errors of year-to-year change.

The figures presented in table B are to be used for other characteristics and are approximations of the standard errors of all such characteristics. They should be interpreted as providing an indication of the order of magnitude of the standard errors rather than as the precise standard error for any specific item.

The standard error of the change in an item from one month to the next month is more closely related to the standard error of the monthly level for that item than to the size of the specific month-to-month change itself. Thus, in order to use the approximations to the standard errors of month-to-month changes as presented in table C, it is first necessary to obtain the standard error of the monthly level of the item in table B, and then find the standard error of the month-to-month change in table C corresponding to this standard error of level. It should

be noted that table C applies to estimates of change between 2 consecutive months. For changes between the current month and the same month last year, the standard errors of level shown in table B are acceptable approximations.

Illustration: Assume that the tables showed the total number of persons working a specific number of hours as 15,000,000, an increase of 500,000 over the previous month. Linear interpolation in the first column of table B shows that the standard error of 15,000,000 is about 133,000. Consequently, the chances are about 68 out of 100 that the sample estimate differs by less than 133,000 from the figure which would have been obtained from a complete count of the number of persons working the given number of hours. Using the 133,000 as the standard error of the monthly level in table C, it may be seen that the standard error of the 500,000 increase is about 126,000.

The reliability of an estimated percentage, computed by using sample data for both numerator and denominator, depends upon both the size of the percentage and the size of the total upon which the percentage is based. Where the numerator is a subclass of the denominator, estimated percentages are relatively more reliable than the corresponding absolute estimates of the numerator of the percentage, particularly if the percentage is large (50 percent or greater). Table D shows the standard errors for percentages derived from the survey. Linear interpolation may be used for percentages and base figures not shown in table D.

Establishment Data

COLLECTION

Payroll reports provide current information on wage and salary employment, hours, earnings, and labor turnover in nonagricultural establishments, by industry and geographic location.

Federal-State Cooperation

Under cooperative arrangements with State agencies, the respondent fills out a single employment or labor turnover reporting form, which is then used for national, State, and area estimates. This eliminates duplicate reporting on the part of respondents and, together with the use of identical techniques at the national and State levels, insures maximum comparability of estimates.

State agencies mail the forms to the establishments and examine the returns for consistency, accuracy, and completeness. The States use the information to prepare

State and area series and then send the establishment data to the BLS for use in preparing the national series.

Shuttle Schedules

Two types of data collection schedules are used: Form BLS 790--Monthly Report on Employment, Payroll, and Hours; and Form DL 1219--Monthly Report on Labor Turnover. These schedules are of the "shuttle" type, with space for each month of the calendar year. The collecting agency returns the schedule to the respondent each month so that the next month's data can be entered. This procedure assures maximum comparability and accuracy of reporting, since the respondent can see the figures he has reported for previous months.

Form BLS 790 provides for entry of data on the number of full- and part-time workers on the payrolls of non-

agricultural establishments and, for most industries, payroll and man-hours of production and related workers or nonsupervisory workers for the pay period which includes the 12th of the month. The labor turnover schedule provides for the collection of information on the total number of accessions and separations, by type, during the calendar month.

CONCEPTS

Industrial Classification

Establishments reporting on Form BLS 790 and Form DL 1219 are classified into industries on the basis of their principal product or activity determined from information on annual sales volume. This information is collected each year on a supplement to the monthly 790 or 1219 report. For an establishment making more than one product or engaging in more than one activity, the entire employment of the establishment is included under the industry indicated by the most important product or activity.

All national, State, and area employment, hours, earnings, and labor turnover series are classified in accordance with the *Standard Industrial Classification Manual*, Bureau of the Budget, 1957, as amended by the *1963 Supplement*.

Industry Employment

Employment data, except those for the Federal Government, refer to persons on establishment payrolls who received pay for any part of the pay period which includes the 12th of the month. For Federal Government establishments, employment figures represent the number of persons who occupied positions on the last day of the calendar month. Intermittent workers are counted if they performed any service during the month.

The data exclude proprietors, the self-employed, unpaid volunteer, or family workers, farm workers, and domestic workers in households. Salaried officers of corporations are included. Government employment covers only civilian employees; military personnel are excluded.

Persons on establishment payrolls who are on paid sick leave (when pay is received directly from the firm), on paid holiday or paid vacation, or who work during a part of the pay period and are unemployed or on strike during the rest of the period, are counted as employed. Not counted as employed are persons who are laid off, on leave without pay, or on strike for the entire period, or who are hired but have not reported to work during the period.

Industry Hours and Earnings

Hours and earnings data are derived from reports of payrolls and man-hours for production and related workers in manufacturing and mining, construction workers in contract construction, and nonsupervisory employees in the remaining nonagriculture components. For Federal

Government, hours and earnings relate to all employees, both supervisory and nonsupervisory. Terms are defined below. When the pay period reported is longer than 1 week, figures are reduced to a weekly basis.

Production and related workers include working foremen and all nonsupervisory workers (including leadmen and trainees) engaged in fabricating, processing, assembling, inspection, receiving, storage, handling, packing, warehousing, shipping, maintenance, repair, janitorial and watchman services, product development, auxiliary production for plant's own use (e.g., power plant), and recordkeeping and other services closely associated with the above production operations.

Construction workers include the following employees in the contract construction division: working foremen, journeymen, mechanics, apprentices, laborers, etc., whether working at the site of construction or in shops or yards, at jobs (such as precutting and preassembling) ordinarily performed by members of the construction trades.

Nonsupervisory employees include employees (not above the working supervisory level) such as office and clerical workers, repairmen, salespersons, operators, drivers, physicians, lawyers, accountants, nurses, social workers, research aids, teachers, draftsmen, photographers, beauticians, musicians, restaurant workers, custodial workers, attendants, linemen, laborers, janitors, watchmen, and similar occupational levels, and other employees whose services are closely associated with those of the employees listed.

Payroll covers the payroll for full- and part-time production, construction, or nonsupervisory workers who received pay for any part of the pay period which includes the 12th of the month. The payroll is reported before deductions of any kind, e.g., for old-age and unemployment insurance, group insurance, withholding tax, bonds, or union dues; also included is pay for overtime, holidays, vacations, and sick leave paid directly by the firm. Bonuses (unless earned and paid regularly each pay period), other pay not earned in pay period reported (e.g., retroactive pay), tips, and the value of free rent, fuel, meals, or other payment in kind are excluded. "Fringe benefits" (such as health and other types of insurance, contributions to retirement, etc. paid by the employer) are also excluded.

Man-hours cover man-hours paid for, during the pay period which includes the 12th of the month, for production, construction, or nonsupervisory workers. The man-hours include hours paid for holidays and vacations, and for sick leave when pay is received directly from the firm.

Overtime hours cover hours worked by production or related workers for which overtime premiums were paid because the hours were in excess of the number of hours of either the straight-time workday or the workweek during the pay period which includes the 12th of the month. Weekend and holiday hours are included only if overtime

premiums were paid. Hours for which only shift differential, hazard, incentive, or other similar types of premiums were paid are excluded.

Gross Average Hourly and Weekly Earnings

Average hourly earnings are on a "gross" basis, reflecting not only changes in basic hourly and incentive wage rates but also such variable factors as premium pay for overtime and late-shift work and changes in output of workers paid on an incentive plan. Shifts in the volume of employment between relatively high-paid and low-paid work and changes in workers' earnings in individual establishments also affect the general earnings averages. Averages for groups and divisions further reflect changes in average hourly earnings for individual industries.

Averages of hourly earnings differ from wage rates. Earnings are the actual return to the worker for a stated period of time; rates are the amounts stipulated for a given unit of work or time. The earnings series does not measure the level of total labor costs on the part of the employer since the following are excluded: Irregular bonuses, retroactive items, payments of various welfare benefits, payroll taxes paid by employers, and earnings for those employees not covered under the production-worker, construction worker, or nonsupervisory-employee definitions.

Gross average weekly earnings are derived by multiplying average weekly hours by average hourly earnings. Therefore, weekly earnings are affected not only by changes in gross average hourly earnings but also by changes in the length of the workweek, part-time work, stoppages for varying causes, labor turnover, and absenteeism.

Average Weekly Hours

The workweek information relates to the average hours for which pay was received and is different from standard or scheduled hours. Such factors as absenteeism, labor turnover, part-time work, and stoppages cause average weekly hours to be lower than scheduled hours of work for an establishment. Group averages further reflect changes in the workweek of component industries.

Average Overtime Hours

The overtime hours represent that portion of the gross average weekly hours which were in excess of regular hours and for which overtime premiums were paid. If an employee worked on a paid holiday at regular rates, receiving as total compensation his holiday pay plus straight-time pay for hours worked that day, no overtime hours would be reported.

Since overtime hours are premium hours by definition, gross weekly hours and overtime hours do not necessarily move in the same direction from month-to-month; for example, overtime premiums may be paid for hours in excess of the straight-time workday although less than a full week is worked. Diverse trends at the industry-group level also may be caused by a marked change

in gross hours for a component industry where little or no overtime was worked in both the previous and current months. In addition, such factors as stoppages, absenteeism, and labor turnover may not have the same influence on overtime hours as on gross hours.

Hours and Earnings For Total Private Nonagricultural Industries

This series covers all nonagricultural industry divisions except government. The principal source of payroll data is Form BLS 790. Secondary source material such as *Employment and Wages* (Bureau of Employment Security), *County Business Patterns* (Bureau of the Census), and additional supporting information such as *The Hospital Guide*, Part II, of the American Hospital Association and special studies by the National Council of Churches supplement data for certain industry groups within the service division.

For a technical description of this series, see the article, "Hours and Earnings for Workers in Private Nonagricultural Industries," published in the May 1967 issue of *Employment and Earnings and Monthly Report on the Labor Force*.

Railroad Hours and Earnings

The figures for class I railroads (excluding switching and terminal companies) are based on monthly data summarized in the M-300 report of the Interstate Commerce Commission and relate to all employees except executives, officials, and staff assistants (ICC group I) who received pay during the month. Gross average hourly earnings are computed by dividing total compensation by total hours paid for. Average weekly hours are obtained by dividing the total number of hours paid for, reduced to a weekly basis, by the number of employees, as defined above. Gross average weekly earnings are derived by multiplying average weekly hours by average hourly earnings.

Spendable Average Weekly Earnings

Spendable average weekly earnings in current dollars are obtained by deducting estimated Federal social security and income taxes from gross weekly earnings. The amount of income tax liability depends on the number of dependents supported by the worker and his marital status, as well as on the level of his gross income. To reflect these variables, spendable earnings are computed for a worker with no dependents and a married worker with three dependents. The computations are based on gross average weekly earnings for all production or non-supervisory workers in the industry division excluding other income and income earned by other family members.

"Real" earnings are computed by dividing the current Consumer Price Index into the earnings averages for the current month. The level of earnings is thus adjusted for changes in purchasing power since the base period (1957-59).

Average Hourly Earnings Excluding Overtime

Average hourly earnings excluding overtime premium pay are computed by dividing the total production-worker payroll for the industry group by the sum of total production-worker man-hours and one-half of total overtime man-hours. Prior to January 1956, these data were based on the application of adjustment factors to gross average hourly earnings (as described in the *Monthly Labor Review*, May 1950, pp. 537-540). Both methods eliminate only the earnings due to overtime paid for at $1\frac{1}{2}$ times the straight-time rates. No adjustment is made for other premium payment provisions, such as holiday work, late-shift work, and overtime rates other than time and one-half.

Indexes of Aggregate Weekly Payrolls and Man-Hours

The indexes of aggregate weekly payrolls and man-hours are prepared by dividing the current month's aggregate by the monthly average for the 1957-59 period. The man-hour aggregates are the product of average weekly hours and production-worker employment, and the payroll aggregates are the product of gross average weekly earnings and production-worker employment.

Labor Turnover

Labor turnover is the gross movement of wage and salary workers into and out of employed status with respect to individual establishments. This movement, which relates to a calendar month, is divided into two broad types: *Accessions* (new hires and rehires) and *separations* (terminations of employment initiated by either employer or employee). Each type of action is cumulated for a calendar month and expressed as a rate per 100 employees. The data relate to all employees, whether full- or part-time, permanent or temporary, including executive, office, sales, other salaried personnel, and production workers. Transfers to another establishment of the company are included, beginning with January 1959.

Accessions are the total number of permanent and temporary additions to the employment roll, including both new and rehired employees.

New hires are temporary or permanent additions to the employment roll of persons who have never before been employed in the establishment (except employees transferring from another establishment of the same company) or of former employees not recalled by the employer.

Other accessions, which are not published separately but are included in total accessions, are all additions to the employment roll which are not classified as new hires, including transfers from another establishment of the company.

Separations are terminations of employment during the calendar month and are classified according to cause: Quits, layoffs, and other separations, are defined as follows:

Quits are terminations of employment initiated by employees, failure to report after being hired, and unauthorized absences, if on the last day of the month the person has been absent more than 7 consecutive calendar days.

Layoffs are suspensions without pay lasting or expected to last more than 7 consecutive calendar days, initiated by the employer without prejudice to the worker.

Other separations, which are not published separately but are included in total separations, are terminations of employment because of discharge, permanent disability, death, retirement, transfers to another establishment of the company, and entrance into the Armed Forces for a period expected to last more than 30 consecutive calendar days.

Relationship to Employment Series

Month-to-month changes in total employment in manufacturing industries reflected by labor turnover rates are not comparable with the changes shown in the Bureau's employment series for the following reasons: (1) Accessions and separations are computed for the entire calendar month; the employment reports refer to the pay period which includes the 12th of the month; and (2) employees on strike are not counted as turnover actions although such employees are excluded from the employment estimates if the work stoppage extends through the report period.

ESTIMATING METHODS

The principal features of the procedure used to estimate employment for the industry statistics are (1) the use of the "link relative" technique, which is a form of ratio estimation, (2) periodic adjustment of employment levels to new benchmarks, and (3) the use of size and regional stratification.

The "Link Relative" Technique

From a sample composed of establishments reporting for both the previous and current months, the ratio of current month employment to that of the previous month is computed. This is called a link relative. The estimates of employment (all employees, including production and nonproduction workers together) for the current month are obtained by multiplying the estimates for the previous month by these "link relatives. In addition, small bias correction factors are applied to selected employment estimates each month. The size of the bias correction factors is determined from past experience. Other features of the general procedures are described later in the table, Summary of Methods for Computing Industry Statistics on Employment, Hours, Earnings, and Labor Turnover. Further details are given in the technical notes on *Measurement of Employment, Hours, and Earnings in Non-agricultural Industries* and on *Measurement of Labor Turnover*, which are available upon request.

Size and Regional Stratification

A number of industries are stratified by size of establishment and/or by region, and the stratified produc-

tion- or nonsupervisory-worker data are used to weight the hours and earnings into broader industry groupings. Accordingly, the basic estimating cell for an employment, hours, or earnings series, as the term is used in the summary of computational methods, may be a whole industry or a size stratum, a region stratum, or a size stratum of a region within an industry.

Benchmark Adjustments

Employment estimates are compared periodically with comprehensive counts of employment which provide "benchmarks" for the various nonagricultural industries, and appropriate adjustments are made as indicated. The industry estimates are currently projected from March 1967 levels. Normally, benchmark adjustments are made annually.

The primary sources of benchmark information are employment data, by industry, compiled quarterly by State agencies from reports of establishments covered under State unemployment insurance laws. These tabulations, covering three-fourths of the total nonagricultural employment in the United States, are prepared under the direction of the Bureau of Employment Security. Benchmark data for the residual are obtained from the records of the Social Security Administration, the Interstate Commerce Commission, and a number of other agencies in private industry or government.

The estimates relating to the benchmark month are compared with new benchmark levels, industry by industry. If revisions are necessary, the monthly series of estimates are adjusted between the new benchmark and the preceding one, and the new benchmark for each industry is then carried forward progressively to the current month by use of the sample trends. Thus, under this procedure, the benchmark is used to establish the level of employment; the sample is used to measure the month-to-month changes in the level. A comparison of the actual amounts of revisions made in the last 3 benchmark years follows:

Data for all months since the last benchmark to which the series has been adjusted are subject to revision. To provide users of the data with a convenient reference source for the revised data, the BLS publishes as soon as possible after each benchmark revision a summary volume of employment, hours, earnings, and labor turnover statistics.

THE SAMPLE

Design

The sampling plan used in the current employment statistics program is known as "sampling proportionate to average size of establishment." This design is an optimum allocation design among strata since the sampling variance is proportional to the average size of establishments. The universe of establishments is stratified first by industry and then within each industry by size of establishment in terms of employment. For each industry, the number of sample units is distributed among the size class cells on the basis of average employment per establishment in each cell. In practice, this is equivalent to distributing the predetermined total number of establishments required in the sample among the cells on the basis of the ratio of employment in each cell to total employment in the industry. Within each non-certainty stratum the sample members are selected at random.

Under this type of design, large establishments fall into the sample with certainty. The size of the samples for the various industries is determined empirically on the basis of experience and of cost considerations. In a manufacturing industry in which a high proportion of total employment is concentrated in relatively few establishments, a large percentage of total employment is included in the sample. Consequently, the sample design for such industries provides for a complete census of the larger establishments with only a few chosen from among the smaller establishments or none at all if the concentration of employment is great enough. On the other hand, in an industry in which a large proportion of total employment is in small establishments, the sample design calls for inclusion of all large establishments and also for a substantial number of the smaller ones. Many industries in the trade and service divisions fall into this category. To keep the sample to a size which can be handled by available resources, it is necessary to accept samples in these divisions with a smaller proportion of universe employment than is the case for most manufacturing industries. Since individual establishments in these nonmanufacturing divisions generally show less fluctuation from regular cyclical or seasonal patterns than establishments in manufacturing industries, these smaller samples (in terms of employment) generally produce reliable estimates.

In the context of the BLS employment and labor turnover statistics programs, with their emphasis on pro-

ducing timely data at minimum cost, a sample must be obtained which will provide coverage of a sufficiently large segment of the universe to provide reasonably reliable estimates that can be published promptly and regularly. The present sample meets these specifications for most industries. With its use, the BLS is able to produce preliminary estimates each month for many industries and for many geographic levels within a few weeks after reports are mailed by respondents, and at a somewhat later date, statistics in considerably greater industrial detail.

Coverage

The BLS sample of establishment employment and payrolls is the largest monthly sampling operation in the field of social statistics. The table that follows shows the approximate proportion of total employment in each industry division covered by the group of establishments furnishing monthly employment data. The coverage for individual industries within the division may vary from the proportions shown.

Reliability of the Employment Estimates

The estimates derived from the establishment survey may differ from the figures that would have been obtained if it were possible to take a complete census using the same schedules and procedures. The relatively large size of the BLS establishment sample assures a high degree of accuracy. However, since the link relative technique requires the use of the previous month's estimate as the base in computing the current month's estimate, small sampling and response errors may cumulate over several months. To remove this accumulated error, the estimates are adjusted annually to new benchmarks. In addition to the sampling and response errors, the benchmark revision adjusts the estimates for changes in the industrial classification of individual establishments (resulting from changes in their product which are not reflected in the levels of estimates until the data are adjusted to new benchmarks). In fact, at the more detailed industry levels, particularly within manufacturing, changes in classification are the major cause of benchmark adjustments. Another cause of differences, generally minor, arises from improvements in the quality of the benchmark data. (A detailed description of the March 1967 benchmark is available from the Bureau upon request.)

One measure of the reliability of ratio estimates is the root mean square error (RMSE). This measure is the standard deviation adjusted for the bias in ratio estimates ($RMSE = \sqrt{(\text{Standard Deviation})^2 + (\text{Bias})^2}$). If the bias is small, the chances are about 2 out of 3 that an estimate from the sample would differ from its benchmark by less than the root mean square error. The chances are about 19 out of 20 that the difference would be less than twice the root mean square error.

Approximations of the root mean square errors (based on the experience of the last several years) of differences between final estimates and benchmarks are presented in the following table.

revision that may be expected between the preliminary and final levels of employment and preliminary and final month-to-month changes. Revisions of preliminary hours and earnings estimates are normally not greater than .1 of an hour for weekly hours or 1 cent for hourly earnings.

STATISTICS FOR STATES AND AREAS

State and area employment, hours, earnings, and labor turnover data are collected and prepared by State agencies in cooperation with BLS. The area statistics relate to metropolitan areas. Definitions for all areas are published each year in the issue of *Employment and Earnings and Monthly Report on the Labor Force* that contains State and area annual averages (usually the May issue). Changes in definitions are noted as they occur. Additional industry detail may be obtained from the State agencies listed on the inside back cover of each issue. These statistics are based on the same establishment reports used by BLS for preparing national estimates. For employment, the sum of the State figures may differ slightly from the equivalent official U.S. totals on a national basis, because some States have more recent benchmarks than others and because of the effects of differing industrial and geographic stratification.

For the States and the areas shown in the B and C sections of this periodical, all the annual average data for the detailed industry statistics currently published by each cooperating State agency are presented (from the earliest date of availability of each series) in a summary volume published annually by the BLS.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE DATA

Insured unemployment represents the number of persons reporting a week of unemployment under an unemployment insurance program. It includes some persons who are working part time who would be counted as employed in the payroll and household surveys. Excluded are persons who have exhausted their benefit rights, new workers who have not earned rights to unemployment insurance, and persons losing jobs not covered by unemployment insurance systems (agriculture, State and local government, domestic service, self-employment, unpaid family work, nonprofit organizations, and firms below a minimum size). The rate of insured unemployment is the number of insured unemployed expressed as a percent of average covered employment in a 12-month period ending 6 to 8 months prior to the week of reference. Initial

claims are notices filed by those losing jobs covered by an unemployment insurance program that they are starting a period of unemployment. A claimant who continues to be unemployed a full week is then counted in the insured unemployment figure.

Because of differences in State laws and procedures under which unemployment insurance programs are operated, State unemployment rates generally indicate, but do not precisely measure, differences among the individual States. Persons wishing to receive a detailed description of the nature, sources, inclusions and exclusions, and limitations of unemployment insurance data should address their inquiries to Bureau of Employment Security, Washington, D.C.

SEASONAL ADJUSTMENT

Many economic statistics reflect a regularly recurring seasonal movement which can be estimated on the basis of past experience. By eliminating that part of the change which can be ascribed to usual seasonal variation, it is possible to observe the cyclical and other nonseasonal movements in the series. However, in evaluating deviations from the seasonal pattern--that is, changes in a seasonally adjusted series--it is important to note that seasonal adjustment is merely an approximation based on past experience. Seasonally adjusted estimates have a broader margin of possible error than the original data on which they are based, since they are subject not only to sampling and other errors but, in addition, are affected by the uncertainties of the seasonal adjustment process itself. Seasonally adjusted series for selected labor force and establishment data are published regularly in *Employment and Earnings and Monthly Report on the Labor Force*.

The seasonal adjustment method used for these series is an adaptation of the standard ratio-to-moving average method, with a provision for "moving" adjustment factors to take account of changing seasonal patterns. A detailed description of the method is given in the booklet, *The BLS Seasonal Factor Method* (1966), which may be obtained from the Bureau on request.

For establishment data, the seasonally adjusted series on weekly hours and labor turnover rates for industry groupings are computed by applying factors directly to the corresponding unadjusted series. However, seasonally adjusted employment totals for all employees and production workers by industry division are obtained by summing seasonally adjusted data for the component industries. Indexes of aggregate weekly man-hours, seasonally adjusted, for mining, contract construction, and the major industries in manufacturing are obtained by multiplying average weekly hours, seasonally adjusted, by production workers, seasonally adjusted, and dividing by the 1957-59 base. For total, manufacturing, and durable and nondurable goods, the indexes of aggregate weekly man-hours, seasonally adjusted, are obtained by summing the aggregate weekly man-hours, seasonally adjusted, for the appropriate component industries and dividing by the 1957-59 base.

The seasonally adjusted establishment data for Federal Government are based on a series which excludes the Christmas temporary help employed by the Post Office Department in December. The employment of these workers constitutes the only significant seasonal change in Federal Government employment during the winter months. Furthermore, the volume of such employment may change substantially from year to year because of administrative decisions by the Post Office Department. Hence, it was considered desirable to exclude this group from the data upon which the seasonally adjusted series is based. Factors currently in use for the establishment data are shown in the June 1968 *Employment and Earnings and Monthly Report on the Labor Force*, and revisions will be made coincidental with the adjustment of series to new benchmark levels.

For each of the three major labor force components--agricultural and nonagricultural employment and unemployment--data for four age-sex groups (male and female workers under age 20 and age 20 and over) are separately adjusted for seasonal variation and are then added to give seasonally adjusted total figures. In order to produce seasonally adjusted total employment and civilian labor force data, the appropriate series are aggregated. The seasonally adjusted rate of unemployment is derived by dividing the seasonally adjusted figure for total unemployment (the sum of four seasonally adjusted age-sex components) by the figure for the seasonally adjusted civilian labor force (the sum of twelve seasonally adjusted age-sex components).

The seasonal adjustment factors applying to current data are based on a pattern shown by past experience. These factors are revised in the light of the pattern revealed by subsequent data. Revised seasonally adjusted series for major components of the labor force based on data through December 1968 are published in the February 1969 *Employment and Earnings and Monthly Report on the Labor Force*. Revisions will be made annually as each additional year's data become available.

ATTENTION

As discussed in the Technical Note, the Bureau periodically adjusts the industry employment series to a recent benchmark to improve their accuracy. These adjustments may also affect the hours and earnings series because employment levels are used as weights. Industry data for all national series shown in this report have been adjusted to March 1967 benchmarks. Data from April 1967 forward are subject to revision at the time of the next benchmark.

Beginning with the June 1968 and subsequent issues of Employment and Earnings and Monthly Report on the Labor Force, the national data in sections B, C, and D supersede those published in previous issues, as well as those appearing in the Handbook of Labor Statistics, 1968. Comparable data are published in Employment and Earnings Statistics for the United States, 1909-68, BLS Bulletin 1312-6.
