To Open Fed Processing Center This Fall

A Regional Check Processing Center (RCPC) will be established at Des Moines, Iowa, this fall by the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago, according to Robert P. Mayo, president of the Chicago bank. The proposal has been studied intensively for more than a year by the Federal Reserve in cooperation with Iowa banks.

Representatives of each Iowa bank have been invited to attend one of a series of meetings in Des Moines, June 12-15, at which the check facility will be described in detail by Federal Reserve officials.

The major purpose of the Regional Check Processing Center, according to the Chicago Fed, is to accelerate the clearing of checks deposited with Iowa banks and thereby improve the payments mechanism.

The Des Moines facility will be headed by Mr. Rudolph W. Dybeck, presently an assistant vice president of the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago. When fully operational, the new center will employ approximately 200 people, most of whom will be recruited from the Des Moines area. The exact location of the new center is expected to be announced shortly.

The decision of the Federal Reserve to open the new center reflects its dedication to an accelerated check clearance system as part of a broader plan for the development of a more efficient payments mechanism over the years ahead. Iowa banks are now served through the head office of the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago. Shifting their check processing 330 miles westward will add significantly to the timeliness and efficiency of check collection throughout the state, Mayo said. Other Federal Reserve services will continue to be provided from the Chicago office.

The Des Moines facility will provide check collection services for all banks in 86 of the 99 counties in Iowa, covering approximately 88 percent of the state's area and 82 percent of its population. After extensive study as to optimum efficiency of check operations, bank officials concluded that six counties in southwestern Iowa will be served most efficiently for check clearing purposes from the Omaha branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City, and seven counties in southeastern Iowa will continue to be served, at least temporarily, from the Fed's Chicago office. Officials of the Kansas City Fed plan to provide overnight check collection service to banks in the six southwestern Iowa counties concurrent with the initiation of such service from Des Moines.


All banks located in the 86-county area, including nonmember banks, will be eligible to deposit with the new center checks amount encoded in magnetic ink drawn on all other banks within the area, plus U. S. Treasury checks, Postal Money Orders and U. S. Department of Agriculture food coupons. Member banks of the



Federal Reserve System can also deposit checks drawn on banks outside the area. The close-off hour for deposit of items drawn on Iowa banks receiving overnight service has been set at 12:05 a.m., Monday through Friday. Credit to banks depositing items with the Federal Reserve facility will be given on the day the items are presented for payment to the banks on which they are drawn.

The geographical area encompassed by the Des Moines office will be a zone of "immediate payment" and "overnight credit," President Mayo said, explaining that all 572 banks located in the 86county area can use the facility to accomplish overnight collection of all checks deposited with them that are drawn on other banks in the area.

DES MOINES: John R. Fitzgibbon, president of the Iowa-Des Moines National Bank, has announced the construction of a multi-million dollar financial Center in downtown Des Moines.

Located at Seventh and Walnut, this half block complex will be 25 stories, over a two-level underground parking garage providing space for 260 cars.

David H. Murdock of Los Angeles, California, the owner-developer, stated that the building will be fire proof steel structural frame with exterior walls of dark bronze Spandrelite panels. Windows will be bronze thermopane with bronze aluminum framing and will be set between formed vertical metal fins. The sidewalk will be decorative terrazzo with an embedded ice melting system.

Mr. Murdock anticipates completion of the new Financial Center Building by late 1973.

The west two-story wing and the first seven floors of the tower will be the new location of the Iowa-Des Moines National Bank. The two-story east wing will be occupied by Des Moines Savings & Loan Association.


The new center will not displace the Des Moines Clearing House, according to Fed officials. The clearing house will continue to be a vital link in the development of a more efficient check clearance system, and the new Regional Check Processing Center will become associated with the clearing house.

Signifying the conversion to a zone of "immediate payment" and "overnight credit," the Federal Reserve bank will assign banks in the area a new check routing symbol to expedite processing, collection, and crediting of checks. Existing stocks of check forms need not be discarded when this change occurs, the bank said, but orders placed for new check forms should provide for the new routing symbol. All banks will be advised as to the routing symbols to be used.
