NEW-YORK MARKET.

JUNE 23, 1923.

ASHES—The demand is limited, and sales of Pots have been made at a reduction of \$2.50 per ton.

Export, from 1st to 26th June—Pots..... 1194 bbls.

BEEFWAX—Remains without inquiry—we have no sales to report.

CANDLES—We reduce our quotations for Tallow Candles. Sperm. continue dull.

COAL—There is a fair supply of Newcastle and Scotch in market, and but very little Liverpool.

COFFEE—Sales have been made, since our last, of about 275 bags St. Domingo at 7 1/2 cents, short price, to 1 1/2 cents, long price, 4 mos.; 270 bags fair to good Porto Rico at 13 a 13 1/2 cents, 3 mos. mostly for exportation, debenture in part pay; 40 bags inferior Cuba at 11 1/2 cents, and some Laguaira on terms not transpired.

COTTON—The transactions in this article continue on a limited scale—holders are not disposed to give way, and shippers prefer to wait for further advices from Europe. The sales, since our last, comprise about 200 Uplands at 10 1/2 a 12 cents; 130 Alabamas at 11 1/2 a 14 cents, a few bales only at the latter price; and 200 Tennessee and New-Orleans at 10 1/2 a 13 1/2 cents—making the total sales of the week between 7 and 800 bales. DRUGS AND DYES—We have to notice sales of a few cases Orange Shellack at 22 cents per lb.; Gum Copal, scraped, at 20 cents; and, by auction, 5 cases Liquorice Paste at 15 cents per lb. cash. Essence of Lemon has been sold at \$3 per lb. Opium is held for an advance on our quotation.

DUCK—Heavy Duck continues in very limited request. Sales of Ravens, Bear mark, have been made at \$7 per piece, 6 mos.

DYE WOODS—We have no sales to report; the stock of Campeachy Logwood is all held by one house, and there is no St. Domingo in first hands.

FISH—Sales have been made of Pickled Salmon at \$15; Smoked at 20 cents, and Connecticut Mess Shad, No. 1, at \$7.75. Mackerel are scarce. No. 1 are held at \$6 per barrel.

FLOUR AND MEAL—The demand for Flour has been very fair, and the principal sales have been of Western Canal, chiefly at \$4.62 1/2 a \$4.75; some N. York at \$4.75; 4 a 500 barrels Baltimore Howard-street within our range, and several hundred Georgetown, Mountain Flour, at \$4.37 1/2 a \$5. The stock is moderate. No Petersburg in market. Export, from 1st to 26th inst. Wheat Flour 16,129 bbls.

FRUIT—Sales of good Smyrna Figs, in drums, continue to be made at 7 1/2 cents per lb. In other descriptions we have no transactions to notice.

GRAIN—Wheat continues to arrive sparingly—further sales of about 2000 bushels Western have been made at 99 and 100 cents. Rye and Corn are rather dull—fair Southern Corn is offered at 38 cents; a sale of Jersey White has been made at 50 cents. Beans and Peas are dull—we reduce our quotation for the former. Export, from 1st to 26th inst. Corn 16,737 bushels.

HEMP—A few tons of Clean Russia were sold yesterday at \$220 per ton. There is no demand, however, beyond the immediate wants of the dealers.

HIDES—Sales have been made of 1500 Montevideo at 16 1/2 cents, 6 mos., part of the same cargo as the lot reported in our last, erroneously, as Rio's; 700 light Rio Grande Ox Hides at 16 1/2 cents, 6 mos., and 150 Rio Cow Hides at 16 cents.

HORNS—A sale of 80,000 Rio Grande Ox Horns has been made at 17 1/2 cents each, equal to cash.

INDIGO—A few cases of Bengal, mid-dling, recently imported from Calcutta, have been sold at \$1.30 a \$2 per lb.

IRON—The market is almost bare of Russia and Swedes; but several cargoes of the latter are shortly expected.

LEAD—A sale of about 1000 pigs New-Orleans has been made at 5 1/2 cents per lb. 6 mos. There is a good supply of Sheet in market.

LUMBER—Pipe Staves are in demand, and the price has advanced.

MOLASSES—We have to notice sales of about 130 hds. Matanzas, sweet but thin, at 30 cents; 70 hds. fair at 31 1/2; about 100 hds. Antigua at 32 cents, cash, a 33 cents, 4 mos.; and some prime New-Orleans at 35 cents.

NAVAL STORES—Turpentine is dull at our quotation. Tar is also in limited demand.

OILS—A public sale was made, on the 25th, of 200 cases Olive Oil, (30 bottles each,) ribboned, at \$5.25 a \$5.75 per case, and 100 cases, not ribboned, at \$5 per case, 3 mos. At private sale, fresh Bordeaux, in baskets, goes off in lots at \$4.25 per basket. In other descriptions there is but little doing, and no variation in prices.

PROVISIONS—Pork is in good demand, and higher prices are required; but we make no change in our quotations. Beef is steady at our rates, and the stock much reduced. Lard continues dull. A sale of 200 kegs Philadelphia Butter, No. 1, has been made as low as 6 cents per lb. Export, from 1st to 26th inst. Beef 1606 bbls; Pork 1791 bbls; Lard 771 kegs.

RICE—The transactions continue limited—70 a 80 tierces have been sold, since our last, at 2 1/2 a 3 cents per lb. There is no Prime in market. No Import since our last. Total, since 1st inst. 612 tcs. 111 half tcs.

SALT—Liverpool Sack Salt has become rather scarce; there is none in importers' hands, and the retail price is advanced to \$2.75 per sack. A cargo of 10,000 bushels Lisbon, now afloat, is held at 46 cents per bushel.

SALT PETRE—Sales of good quality E. I. Crude have been made, in moderate quantities, at 8 cents per lb.

SKINS—A sale of about 6000 lbs. Deer Skins, in hair, (Summer) has been made at 19 cents per lb.

SPICES—Sales of heavy Sumatra Pepper have been made at 15 1/2 cents per lb. 6 mos.

LAWS OF THE U. STATES. MACKEREL FISHERY.

AN ACT to authorize the licensing of vessels to be employed in the Mackerel Fishery. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That, from and after the passage of this act, it shall be the duty of the Collector of the District to which any vessel may belong, on an application for that purpose by the master or owner thereof, to issue a license for carrying on the mackerel fishery, to such vessel, in the form prescribed by the act entitled, "An act for enrolling and licensing ships or vessels to be employed in the coasting trade and fisheries, and for regulating the same," passed the eighteenth day of February, one thousand seven hundred and ninety three: Provided, That all the provisions of said act, respecting the licensing of ships or vessels for the coasting trade and fisheries, shall be deemed and taken to be applicable to licenses and to vessels licensed for carrying on the mackerel fishery. Approved—24th May, 1923.

CUBA.

Matanzas, June 8.—Sugars are very scarce and rising, owing to the number of vessels wishing to complete their cargoes for Europe, and several more daily expected from Havana. It is estimated that three fourths of the crop has already been shipped from Matanzas, including the cargoes of the above mentioned vessels, which have been contracted for, and are now waiting the arrival of these sugars from the plantations. Should the rainy season commence, (which is daily expected,) it is very uncertain when many of the vessels will be able to complete their cargoes, as there is no sugar to be had in Matanzas.—The reason of the scarcity of sugar at this period is chiefly owing to a combination of 25 rich planters at the Havana, who have agreed to withdraw their sugar from the market for the present, confidently believing (that as the crop is generally ascertained to fall short about 3%) that the prices in the latter part of the season will be much higher. Sugar at Matanzas, 11 to 15, prime and scarce; fair 10 to 14; Coffee, prime, \$7 1/2 to \$8; Molasses, 4 1/2 to 5 per keg; Honey, 3 to 3 1/2 per gallon.

BRAZIL.

IMPERIAL DECREE. His Majesty, considering the very depreciated state to which Brazil Wood has been reduced in the European markets; its greatly diminished consumption, and the recent substitution of other dye-woods; and, that this deterioration and loss are solely attributable to irregularity and carelessness on the part of the shippers of this valuable commodity; which, although of excellent quality, most generally reaches Europe in split and imperfect sticks, and seriously damaged by the bilge water of vessels: his Majesty has deemed it advisable to issue the following decree:—

- 1. All Brazil Wood which the Government has allowed to be exported to Great Britain, in conformity with the provision of the 24th December of last year, and which remains still in its full force, shall be of the first quality, and consist of large, ample sized, unsplit sticks.
2. Scrupulous attention shall be paid to the marking of each stick, as this formality tends greatly to the credit of this article abroad.
3. No stick of young and slender trees shall be exported, nor those of such trees as have not arrived at a wholesome degree of maturity.
4. Brazil Wood shall be shipped carefully and in good condition; wherefore, the shippers of this article shall henceforth resume the old practice of piling the sticks upon the deck, carefully enveloped in sound cotton bagging; nor shall they, in any case, be allowed to stow this wood in the hold of a vessel, where it is liable to come in contact with the sea water.
5. From this day forth, all shipments of Brazil Wood, made from any of the Imperial ports, shall be duly consigned to the Envoy Extraordinary of H. I. M. near the Court of St. James, or to his order; and all former regulations of consignments to Agents of the Bank of Brazil, are hereby abolished and repealed.

QUANTITY OF GOODS TO COMPOSE A TON. Extract from the By-Laws of the New-York Chamber of Commerce.

Resolved, That when vessels are freight-ed by the ton, and no special agreement is made between the owner of the vessel and freighter of the goods, respecting the proportion of tonnage which each particular article shall be computed at, the following regulation shall be the standard of computation: That the articles, the bulk of which shall compose a ton, to equal a ton of heavy materials, shall be in weight as follows: 1568 lbs. of coffee in casks, 1830 do. in bags, 1120 lbs. of cocoa in casks, 1307 do. in bags. 952 lbs. of pimenta in casks, 1110 do. in bags. Eight barrels of flour, of 196 lbs. each. Six bbls. of beef, pork, tallow, pickled fish, pitch, tar, and turpentine. Twenty hundred weight of pig and bar iron, pot ashes, sugar, logwood, fustic, Nicaragua wood, and all heavy dye woods, rice, honey, copper ore, and all other heavy goods. Sixteen hundred weight of coffee, cocoa, and dried codfish, in bulk, and twelve hundred weight of dried codfish in casks of any size. Six hundred weight of ship bread in casks, seven hundred in bags, and eight hundred in bulk. Two hundred gallons (wine measure) reckoning the full contents of the casks, of oil, wine, brandy, or any kind of liquors. Twenty-two bushels of grain, peas or beans, in casks. Thirty-six bushels of European salt. Thirty-one bushels of salt from the West Indies. Twenty-nine bushels of sea coal. Forty feet (cubic measure) of mahogany, square timber, oak plank, pine and other boards, beaver, furs, peltry, beeswax, cotton, wool, and bale goods of all kinds. One hoghead of tobacco, and ten hundred weight of dry hides. Eight hundred weight of China raw silk, ten hundred weight net bohea tea, and eight hundred green teas.
