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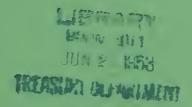

Treasury Financing Operations

June Certificate Offering

On May 16, 1953, the Secretary of the Treasury announced the offering on May 20, of a new issue of one-year 2-5/8 percent certificates of indebtedness. The certificates were offered to holders of the 11-month 1-7/8 percent certificates maturing on June 1 and to holders of the 2 percent partially tax-exempt Treasury bonds of June 15, 1953-55 (dated October 7, 1940) which previously had been called for redemption on June 15. The maturing certificates were outstanding in the amount of \$4,963 million and the called bonds in the amount of \$725 million. Subscriptions to the new certificates totaled \$4,858 million, which was 85 percent of the maturing and called securities.

The new certificates, Series B-1954, are dated June 1, 1953, and will bear interest from that date at the rate of 2-5/8 percent per annum payable with the principal at maturity on June 1, 1954. They were exchanged par for par for the maturing certificates on June 1, and for the called bonds par for par on June 15, with an interest adjustment on that date. Cash subscriptions were not received. The certificates were issued in bearer form only, in denominations of \$1,000, \$5,000, \$10,000, \$100,000, and \$1,000,000. Subscription books were closed at the close of business on May 22.

Reports to the Treasury on the ownership of Government securities indicated that on March 31,1953, about 52 percent of the maturing certificates and about 90 percent of the called bonds were owned by reporting commercial banks and Federal Reserve Banks. The ownership figures for March 31 are the latest published for commercial banks.

Maturing certificates were exchanged in the amount of \$4,410 million, leaving \$553 million to be paid in cash, and the called bonds were exchanged in the amount of \$448 million, leaving \$277 million to be paid in cash.

Treasury Savings Notes, Series B

The Secretary of the Treasury announced on May 11 that a new series of Treasury savings notes would be available for purchase beginning on May 15.

The announcement recalled that Treasury savings notes are issued primarily to provide a security in which corporations and other taxpayers can invest their tax reserves as they accumulate during the

The new notes, designated Series B, replaced Treasury savings notes Series A, which had been on sale since May 15, 1951. The new notes are similar in all respects except as to maturity and interest rate. Their maturity is two years instead of the three years of the discontinued series.

Interest on the new Series B notes accrues monthly on the fifteenth calendar day of each month after the issue date on a graduated scale as follows:

The table on the following page shows for the denomination of \$1,000 the monthly tax-payment or redemption values and approximate investment yields. The official circular, No. 922, dated May 11, 1953, contains a table showing these data for each denomination, and gives the terms of the offering in full.

Series B savings notes, if inscribed in the name of a Federal taxpayer, may be used in payment of Federal income, eatate, and gift taxes assessed against the owner of the notes or his estate at par and accrued interest, at any time after two months from the issue date. If not presented in payment of taxes, and except for notes in the names of banks that accept demand deposits, Series B notes will be redeemable for cash at par and accrued interest at any time after four months from the issue date. If inscribed in the name of a bank that accepts demand deposits, the notes will be accepted at par and accrued interest in payment of taxes, but will be redeemed for cash at or before maturity only at the purchase price.

Tax Anticipation Bills Offered

On May 26, the Secretary of the Treasury invited tenders for \$600 million, or thereabouts, of 107-day Treasury bills, Tax Anticipation Series. The bills are dated June 3, 1953, and will mature September 16, 1953. They will be accepted at face value in payment of income and profits taxes due on

September 15, 1953; and to the extent that they are not presented in payment of taxes due they will be paid in cash at maturity. Taxpayers desiring to apply these bills in payment of September 15, 1953, income and profits taxes have the privilege of surrendering them to any Federal Reserve Bank or branch not more than fifteen days before September 15, 1953, and receiving receipts therefor showing the face amount of the bills so surrendered.

The offering was for cash with payment on the date of issue, except that any qualified depositary could make payment for the bills by credit in its Treasury tax and loan account up to any amount for which it is qualified in excess of existing deposits.

Tenders were received on May 29, and were accepted in the amount of \$500 million at the average rate of discount of 2.383 percent.

Treasury 91-day Bills Increased

New issues of 91-day Treasury bills during May totaled \$6.0 billion. They refunded the \$5.4 billion of weekly bill maturities and in addition provided \$600 million cash. Each weekly offering was for \$1.5 billion; and each maturity amounted to \$1.3 billion except that for May 14, which amounted to \$1.5 billion. The average rates of discount on the new issues were 2.352 percent for May 7, 2.271 percent for May 14, 2.092 percent for May 21, and 2.084 percent for May 28.

Treasury Savings Notes of Series B -- Tax-Payment or Redemption Values and Investment Yields

The table below shows for each month from issue date to maturity date the amount of interest accrual; the principal amount with accrued interest added, for notes of the \$1,000 denomination; the approximate investment yield on the par value from issue date to the 15th of each month following the issue date; and the approximate investment yield on the current redemption value from the 15th of the month indicated to the maturity date.

The Social Security Act Amendments of 1950 (Public Law 734), approved August 28, 1950, changed in certain respects the basis of transferring the appropriated funds to the trust fund. Effective January 1, 1951, the old-age insurance taxes on employers and employees and the withheld income tax are paid into the Treasury in combined amounts without separation as to type of tax. The old-age insurance tax on self-employment income, imposed by Public Law 734, is levied and collected as part of the individual income tax, beginning with the taxable year 1951. Beginning January 1951, the amounts transferred currently as appropriations to the trust fund are based on estimates of old-age insurance tax receipts made by tho Secretary on estimates of old-age insurance tax receipts made by the Secretary

of the Treasury, and are adjusted in later transfers on the basis of wage and self-employment income records maintained in the Social Security Administration. For purposes of this table, the amounts credited to the trust fund beginning January 1951 are considered to represent estimated receipts of old-age insurance taxes for corresponding periods. Accordingly, these emounts are included under employment taxes and excluded from total income and profits taxes as shown. Throughout the calendar year 1951, the same amounts were deducted from the combined taxes paid in by employers, and the balance was shown as income tax withheld. Beginning January 1952, the tax on eelf-employment income is allowed for in the emounte credited to the trust fund, but no breakdown between the two types of old-age insurance taxee is evailable monthly. Estimates of the breakdown are made on a fiscal year basis beginning 1952.

United States savings bonds were first offered in March 1935 and began to mature in March 1945. Series A-D were sold between March 1935 and the end of April 1941, and Series E, F, and G were first offered in May 1941. When Series E began to mature on May 1, 1951, owners of the matured bonds were offered three optione: To redeem the bonds in cash in accordance with the original terme; to retain them with an extended maturity of 10 years at specified rates of interest accrual; or to exchange them for Series G bonds. A number of changes became effective May 1, 1952. The principal ones were: The rate of interest accrual on Series E was increased, especially for the near term, with corresponding changes in extended Series E; and Series F and G were replaced by two new issues, Series J

and K, also at higher interest rates. A new current-income bond, Series H, similar in interest return to Series E, was offered beginning Junel. For details of these changes see "Treasury Bulletin" for May 1952, page A-1.

In the tables which follow, Series A-F and J sales are shown at issue price and total redemptions and amounts outstanding at current redemption values. Series G, H, and K are shown at face value throughout. Matured bonds which have been redeemed are included in redemptions. Data by denominations and sales by States are published on a monthly basis but not in each issue of the "Treasury Bulletin".

Treasury tax and savings notes have been issued as follows: Tax Series A from August 1, 1941, through June 22, 1943; Tax Series B from August 1, 1941, through September 12, 1942; Savings Series C (originally designated Tax Series C) from September 14,1942, through August 31, 1948; Savings Series D from September 1,1948, through May 14, 1951; Savings Series A from May 15, 1951, through May 14, 1953; and Savings Series B beginning on May 15, 1953.

Details concerning terms and conditions for purchase and redemption and information on investment yields of Savings Series, B appear in the present issue of the "Treasury Bulletin", page A-1. Similar information with respect to the offering of the earlier series was published currently in the "Treasury Bulletin", and appears also in the "Annual Report of the Secretary of the Treasury" for appropriate years.

In the following tables sales and redemptions of Treasury savings notes are shown at par value. Matured notes redeemed (either for cash or for tax payment) are included in the figures on redemptions. Matured notes outstanding are reflected in the interest-bearing debt until all notes of the series have matured, when they are transferred to matured debt upon which interest has neased.

TREASURY SURVEY OF OWNERSHIP, MARCH 31, 1953 _

The Treasury Survey of Ownership covers eccurities issued by the United States Government and by Federal agencies. The banks and insurance companies included in the Survey account for approximately 95 percent of such securities held by all banks and insurance companies in the United States. Data were first published for March 31, 1941, in the May 1941 "Treasury Bulletin".

Information on the distribution of ownership by types of banks and insurance companies is published each month. Additional information showing the holdings of commercial banks distributed according to Federal Reserve member - bank classes and nonmember banks is published for June 30 and December 31.

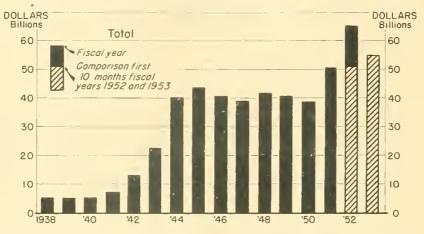

INTERNAL REVENUÈ COLLECTIONS BY PRINCIPAL SOURCES



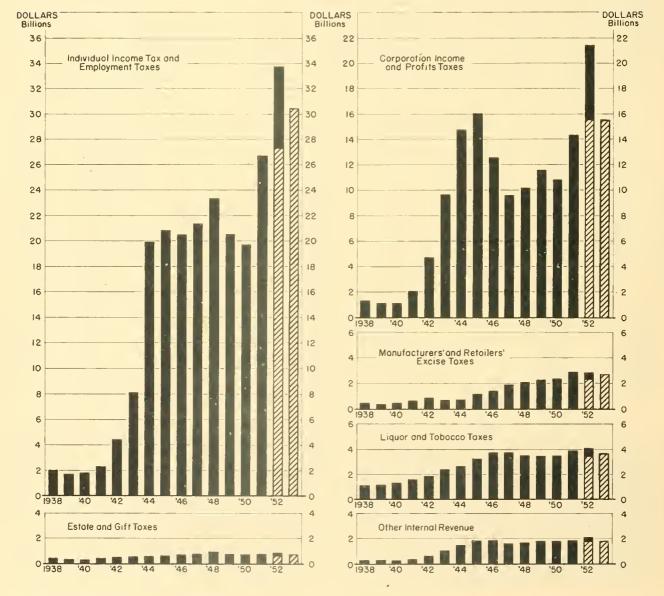

Data relating to claims on foreigners and liabilities to foreigners, and capital movements between the United States and foreign countries, have been collected since 1935, pursuant to Executive Order 6560 of January 15, 1934, and Treasury regulations thereunder. Information covering the principal types of data and the principal countries is reported each month by banks and bankers and securities brokers and dealers in the United States. This information is published regularly in the "Treasury Bulletin". Supplementary information is published at less frequent intervals. All reports are made initially to the Federal Reserve Banks, which forward consolidated figures to the Treasury.

The term "foreigners" as used in these reports covers all institutions and individuals (including United States citizens) domiciled outside the United States, as well as international organizations, wherever domiciled, created by treaty or convention between sovereign states. "Short-term" refers to original maturities of one year or less, and "long-term" refers to all other maturities. A detailed discussion of the reporting coverage, basis of reporting, and derivation of capital movements figures appeared in the April 1950 issue of the "Treasury Bulletin", pages 50-52. Revised report forms and regulations became effective with

the data for January 1950. Attention is called to the fact that although the grand total figures on the revised reporting basis are reasonably comparable with those for preceding months, data for individual countries in some instances are not comparable because of certain changes in coverage and geographical classification.

The supplementary information, contained in Section IV, is presented in three tables appearing at different times. Table 1 gives data by countries on short-term claims on and liabilities to foreigners as reported quarterly by exporters, importers, and industrial and commercial concerns in the United States. This information was published for the first time in the October 1949 issue of the "Treasury Bulletin" and begins with data for September 30, 1946. Table 2 supplies information by countries on long-term claims on and liabilities to foreigners as reported by banks and bankers in the United States. This table appeared for the first time in the December 1949 issue. Data are for the end of the calendar year beginning with 1942. Table 3 gives information on short-term liabilities to countries not regularly reported separately by banks and bankers. This table appeared for the first time in the April 1950 issue. The data have been requested at irregular intervals, the earliest date being October 1943.

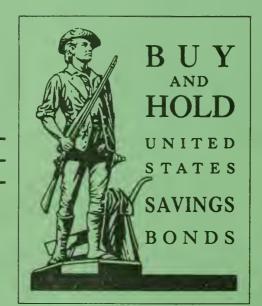
