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## INTRODUCTION

The Budget for the fiscal year 1947 was submitted to Congress on January 14, 1946. At that time it was impracticable to submit definite. detailed recommendations of appropriations and other authorizations for 1947 for the major war agencies and some of the war-related agencies because of the difficulties of adjusting their programs from a wartime to a peacetime basis so soon after fighting stopped. However, preliminary estimates were included in the 1947 Budget for the activities for which specific recommendations were postponed. During recent months, detailed recommendations superseding the preliminary estimates for these activities have been submitted to Congress by the President. This War Supplement now brings together these detailed recommendations of appropriations and other authorizations for the major agencies and some of the war-related agencies

## RECOMMENDATIONS SUBMITTED SINCE THE 1947 BUDGET WHICH ARE CONTAINED

[^0]Part I of this War Supplement contains supplemental tables which itemize by organization units and appropriation titles the recommendations for the fiscal year 1947 shown in summary form in the foregoing table. Supplement to table 5 itemizes the recommended appropriations for 1947 for general and special accounts, together with the actual appropriations for 1946 and 1945 and the actual expenditures for 1945 ; Supplement to table 11 does the same for trust accounts. The actual appropriations for 1946 and 1945, as shown in these tables, do not include supplemental or deficiency appropriations enacted since the submission of the 1947 Budget last January. Supplement to table 6 itemizes the actual reappropriations of unobligated balances for 1945 and the estimated reappropriations for 1946 and 1947. Supplement to table 7 itemizes the recommended new contract authorizations for 1947 and the actual authorizations for 1946 and 1945, together with the amounts included in the recommended 1947 and actual 1946 and 1945 general and special account appropriations for the liquidation of contract authorizations. Supplement to table 8 itemizes rescissions of appropriations and contract authorizations during fiscal years 1945 and 1946, together with amounts included in the rescinded appropriations to liquidate contract authorizations. The detailed rescissions replace or supersede the lump-sum amounts contained in the corresponding table in the January Budget and show additional lump-sum rescissions recommended. The total for 1946 represents all rescissions for that year, including those classified as "national defense" as well as "nondefense."

Part II of this War Supplement contains the appropriation language and schedules of obligations supporting the recommendations for fiscal year 1947. This section also contains explanatory statements describing the functions and programs of each of the war agencies.

## TOTAL RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 1947

The following table summarizes to date the total recommended appropriations and other authorizations submitted to Congress by the President for all purposes for the fiscal year 1947 under gencral and special accounts. The amounts included for indefinite appropriations, reappropriations, and contract authorizations represent the estimates included in the 1947 Budget as submitted last January and in this War Supplement.

The recommended direct appropriations for all purposes for the fiscal year 1947 amount to $\$ 33,903$ million, consisting of $\$ 16,075$ million submitted in the 1947 Budget, $\$ 983$ million submitted in the Corporation Supplement, $\$ 11,861$ million in this War Supplement, and $\$ 4,984$ million of supplemental
recommendations. In addition, reappropriations of unobligated balances of $\$ 121$ million and contract authorizations of $\$ 775$ million have been recommended. The total appropriations and other authorizations recommended for all purposes for the fiscal year 1947 are $\$ 34,182$ million, excluding $\$ 617$ million of appropriations to liquidate contract authorizations. This total for 1947 is $\$ 50,562$ million less than the comparable total enacted for the preceding fiscal year. However, during the fiscal year 1946 there were rescissions of 1946 and prior appropriations and other authorizations of $\$ 58,039$ million, excluding $\$ 3,758$ million of appropriations to liquidate contract authorizations.

## EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

## EXECUTIVE OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT

## Office for Emergency Management

## CIVILIAN PRODUCTION ADMINISTRATION

The Civilian Production Administration was established by Executive order on October 4, 1945. By this order the War Production Board was abolished and its powers, functions, and funds were transferred to the Civilian Production Administration which was given the responsibility of directing the swift and orderly transition from wartime production to maximum peacetime production.

Plans were developed early by the War Production Board for releasing controls on industry and paving the way for reconversion in industry. The policy for the reconversion period was to cancel all orders no longer needed, and to retain only those controls which were essential to assure an orderly transition to peacetime operation.

Following the defeat of Germany the Controlled Materials Plan was open-ended and went out of existence at the end of September. More than 200 orders and regulations in effect VE-day were lifted before VJ-day and following that, further revocations reduced the controls to a limited few.

Concurrent with the reduction of industry controls a plan for the demobilization of the War Production Board was launched and with the change in the character of the agency the War Production Board was abolished and the Civilian Production Administration established.

The responsibilities assigned to the Civilian Production Administration include expansion in production of materials in short supply; restrictions of the use of materials in short supply; control of inventories so as to avoid hoarding and unbalanced distribution; granting of priority assistance to break bottlenecks; and allocation of scarce materials and facilities necessary for the production of lowpriced items. These responsibilities were greatly augmented when the Housing Expediter assigned this agency the task of assuring material production and distribution adequate to meet the needs of the veterans' emergency housing program.

Exceptional progress has been made in the over-all effort for full civilian production-progress which, gaged by the total civilian goods and services produced, has reached the highest level ever attained in war or peace. Great as this production is, it must be viewed in terms of civilian need, both in total and for specific products. Demand far exceeds any previous requirements and cannot be satisfied by merely attaining prewar production goals. The speed with which materials are supplied to satisfy this demand and the extent to which specific requirements are met will be the responsibility of the Civilian Production Administration during fiscal year 1947. The budget for the coming year represents a decrease of approximately 40 percent below the funds available in the fiscal year 1946.

## COMMITTEE ON FAIR EMPLOYMENT PRACTICE

The Committee on Fair Employment Practice, originally established under Executive order, was reorganized under the terms of another Executive order on May 27, 1943. During fiscal year 1946, the Committee operated under this authority, as amended and modified by the terms of its appropriation language for the fiscal year. The Committee's program was to promote the elimination of practices in war industries, Federal agencies and labor organizations which involved discrimination in employment because of race, creed, color, or national origin.

Under the appropriation act for fiscal year 1946, the Committee was required to terminate its functions and duties on June 30, 1946, unless legislation for its program was enacted earlier by the Congress. No such legislation has been enacted. Owing to a lack of funds, the agency was forced to terminate its activities on May 3, 1946. A final report to the President was prepared by the Committee. The Department of the Treasury was directed by the President to complete the liquidation of the affairs of the Committee.

## FOREIGN ECONOMIC ADMINISTRATION

By Executive order dated September 27, 1945, the Foreign Economic Administration was terminated and disposition of its affairs made by transfer to other Gov-
ernment agencies. Activities to be terminated or continued were transferred to the following departments and agencies:

Department of State: lend-lease functions, administrative activities in connection with United States participation in the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration, expediting the supplying of requirements in liberated areas, economic and commercial reporting abroad, and plaming for control of occupied territories.

Reconstruction Finance Corporation: Rubber Development Corporation, Petroleum Reserves Corporation, U. S. Commercial Company.

Department of Commerce: export control, Technical Industrial Intelligence Committee, the Clearing Office for Foreign Transactions and Reports, and responsibility for firal liquidation of the Foreign Economic Administration.

Department of Agriculture: functions relating to food programs.

Estimates for those functions for which continuation into 1947 is anticipated have been presented to the Congress in the Eudget for 1947 ar.d amendments thereto.

## NATIONAL WAR LABOR BOARD

The National War Labor Board, established by Executive order on January 12, 1942, following the wartime no-strike-no-lockout agreement by labor and industry representatives, was given the responsibility to settle wartime labor disputes which could not be adjusted by other available peaceful methods. Under the War Labor Disputes Act of June 25, 1943, the Board was given statutory authority and additional powers, including that of subpena, to assist it in its disputes function.

On October 2, 1942, Congress enacted an amendment to the Emergency Price Control Act which authorized the President to issue a general order for the stabilization of wages and salaries at levels existing, as far as practicable, on September 15,1942 . Wage adjustment was authorized to the extent necessary to correct gross inequities or to aid in the effective prosecution of the war. The President, by Executive order, authorized the War Labor Board to carry out the mandate of Congress with respect to stabilization of all wages and of most salaries under $\$ 5,000$ per annum.
On September 19, 1945, by Executive order, the National War Labor Board, together with all its functions, officers, employees, records, property, and unexpended funds, was transferred to the Department of Labor, where it continued to operate as an organizational entity through December 31, 1945. At that time, by a further Executive order, the National War Labor Board was abolished, its disputes function was discontinued, and its stabilization function was turned over to the newly created National Wage Stabilization Board in the Department of Labor. Estimates of appropriation to cover operations of the latter Board during fiscal year 1947 have been included as amendments to the budget for the Department of Labor.

## OFFICE OF ALIEN PROPERTY CUSTODIAN

Under Executive orders of March 11, 1942, July 6, 1942, June 8, 1945, and May 16, 1946, the Office of the Alien Property Custodian controls, administers, or disposes of certain classes of property in which nationals of enemy or enemy-occupicd countries have, or have had interest. Property in which the office deals falls into the following main groups: (1) business enterprises; (2) patents, trademarks.and copyrights; (3) real and personal property;
(4) ships; (5) property in process of judicial administration; (6) cash and securities. An Executive order issued April 21, 1942, provided for the transfer from the Department of Justice to the Custodian of Alien Property of matters remaining from World War I.
The function of the Custodian is to search out and to obtain control of all enemy or enemy-dominated interests in property under United States jurisdiction to insure that such property is administered with maximum benefit for the economy of the United States. To accomplish this, the Custodian either "vests," taking outright title to the property from the foreign owner, or, particularly during hostilities, controls the use of property by means of a "supervisory order" without actual transfer of title, or issues gencral orders and regulations requiring or restraining the peformance of specified acts by persons with interests in such property.
The general policy of the Office is the early liquidation or sale of all vested business enterprises. Proceeds from the sale of vested property are deposited in the United States Treasury and held pending disposition by the Congress.
Inventions disclosed in vested patents are being made freely available to American industry. No patents are for sale, but enemy patents not already under exclusive license to Americans prior to seizure are being licensed for the remaining life of the patents on a nonexclusive, royalty-free basis to qualified American manufacturers.
Administrative costs of the Office of Alien Property Custodian are authorized by the Congress and are payable out of funds or property held by the Custodian. These costs are estimated at $\$ 3,870,120$ for fiscal year 1947.

## OFFICE OF DEFENSE TRANSPORTATION

The Office of Defense Transportation was created by Executive Order 8989 on December 18, 1941. The basic responsibility of this agency is to insure that all forms of domestic transportation are utilized to meet the transportation requirements of the Nation. The personnel of the agency was reduced rapidly in the fall of 1946. The Highway Trarsport Department was completely liquidated and the forces of other departments were materially reduced.
The 1947 estimate provides for a small force for approximately 10 months. The principal function of the agency will arise from the boxcar shortage resulting from inadequate maintenance and replacement, strikes, and shortages of materials. The transportation needs during reconversion and the grain-export program both make it important that the boxcars be used to the maximum. Much of the work in this connection will be performed by the Interstate Commerce Commission on a reimbursable basis. A second function is that of actirg as claimant agency before the Civilian Production Administration for steel, lumber, and other materials necessary for equipment construction and maintenance. A third function is to operate or to direct the operations of essential rail or water transport facilities that are tied up because of wage disputes or other causes. During the remainirg period of its existence the Office of Deferse Trarsportation will also complete as much as possible the financial settlements with companies it has operated.

OFFICE OF ECONOMIC STABILIZATION
The Office of Economic Stabilization was established by Executive Order 9250, dated October 3, 1942. The order provides for a Director and staff, and an Economic

Stabilization Board, composed of 11 Government officials and 6 members representing labor, management, and agriculture. The Director is chairman of the board. The function of the Office is to develop a comprehensive national economic policy relating to the control of civilian purchasing power, prices, rents, wages, salaries, profits, subsidies, and related matters for the purpose of stabilizing the cost of living. Differences between recommendations of Federal agencies upon specific matters relating to the stabilization program are resolved by the Director. The administration of activities relating to the national economic policy remains with the departments and agencies responsible for such activities, but the programs of all Federal departments and agencies concemed with stabilization are coordinated by and conform to the directives on policy issued by the Director. Since VJ-day the Director, in accordance with requirements of Executive Order 9599, has undertaken the task of formulating and developing comprehensive national economic policies which will effectuate the stabilization program whilo facilitating transition to a peacetime economy. The Director also implements the new wage price policy expressed in Executive Order 9697. The Budget estimate for 1947 of $\$ 260,000$ reflects the current rate of operations.

## OFFICE OF INTER-AMERICAN AFFAIRS

By Executive order of August 31, 1945, the information functions of the Office of Inter-American Affairs performed abroad were transferred to the Department of State. Estimates for these functions were presented to the Congress in the form of an amendment to the Budget for 1947. All remaining activities of the Office of InterAmerican Affairs, including the corporations, were transferred to the Department of State on May 20, 1946, by Executive order dated April 10, 1946. Estimates for the corporations were included in the Corporation Supplement to the 1947 Budget.

## OFFICE OF SCIENTIFLC RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

The Office of Scientific Research and Development was established by Executive order on June 28, 1941, as an emergency agency to coordinate and supplement the Government's scientific and medical research activities related to national defense. During the war the Office of Scientific Research and Development carried on, primarily through contracts with academic and industrial institutions, a program of scientific research in the development, of new and improved weapons at an average annual cost of about $\$ 100,000,000$, and a much smaller but extremely important program of research in medical fields of concern to the armed services.

Since the end of the war some of the Office of Scientific Research and Development projects of continuing military or medical significance have been transferred to the War and Navy Departments and the United States Public Health Service. All other activities of the agency are being liquidated, and the 1947 estimate of $\$ 597,000$ contemplates that the liquidation will be completed by the end of the fiscal year. It is planned that the records and experience of the Office of Scientific Research and Development would be utilized by the National Science Foundation which the President has proposed to Congress.

## OFFICE OF WAR INFORMATION

The Office of War Information was terminated by Executive order dated August 31, 1945. Its foreign information function was transferred to the Department of State. Estimates for this function were presented to the

Congress in the form of an amendment to the Budget for 1947.

The functions relating to review of Government publications and supplying information on Government activities were transferred to the Bureau of the Budget, and estimates for the continuation of those functions were transmitted to the Congress in the 1947 Budget.

## WAR ASSETS ADMINISTRATION

Executive Order 9689 provided for the establishment of the War Assets Administration. Under the terms of this order, the functions of the Surplus Property Administration were transferred to the War Assets Corporation, and the Surplus Property Administration was merged into and consolidated with the War Assets Corporation. As of March 25, 1946, the functions of the War Assets Corporation relative to surplus property were transferred to the War Assets Administration.

During the calendar years 1944 and 1945, the Surplus Property Administration had superseded the Surplus Property Board by Public Law 181. The Surplus Property Board, created by the Surplus Property Act of 1944, had superseded the Surplus War Property Administration, created by an Exccutive order of February 19, 1944.

Under the Surplus Property Act, the War Assets Administration has general supervision and direction over the care, handling, and disposition of surplus property within the continental limits of the United States. The War Assets Administration formulates regulations to be carried out by other agencies of the Government responsible for the disposal of surplus property. Ninety-six percent of domestic surplus property is disposed of directly by the War Assets Administration.

There are 20 objectives specified in the act. Among them are: (a) to assure the most effective use of such property, (b) to promote free, independent private enterprise, (c) to stimulate full employment, ( $d$ ) to prevent unusual profits and discourage speculation and monopoly, and ( $e$ ) to obtain fair value for the Government. In making disposals, the War Assets Administration is required to give priority to certain claimants, including the Federal Government, veterans, small business, State and local governments, and nonprofit institutions.

During the fiscal year 1947, the disposal program of the War Assets Administration contemplates proceeds of 2.9 billion dollars arising from sales of property with an acquisition cost of 15.4 billion dollars and leases of property valued at 2.6 billion dollars. Administrative expenses of the War Assets Administration will be paid out of proceeds from disposals, and the budget estimate reflects expenses amounting to 18.8 percent of estimated receipts.
The estimate provides for reimbursement by the War Assets Administration to the owning agencies for the costs of care and handling surplus property prior to its declaration or disposal. Contemplated reimbursements to the War Department approximate 106 million dollars and to the Navy Department 61 million dollars. Proposed allocations to designated disposal and service agencies amount to approximately 32 million dollars.

The budget estimate for the fiscal year 1947 in the aggregate sum of $\$ 545,100,000$ represents an increase of $\$ 317,995,434$ over the amount of $\$ 227,104,566$ available in 1946 to predecessor agencies.

## WAR MANPOWER COMMISSION

The War Manpower Commission was established by Executive Order No. 9139 on April 18, 1942, to assure the effective mobilization and utilization of the Nation's man-
power for prosecuting the war. The Commission operated throughout the remaining period of the war and was terminated by Executive Order 9617 dated September 19, 1945. All the functions of the Chairman of the Commission, exclusive of those relating to the Procurement and Assignment Service, were transferred to the Secretary of Labor. The Procurement and Assignment Service was transferrod to the Federal Security Agency, where it is now in process of liquidation which is expected to be completed as of June 30, 1946.
The following major programs were transferred to the Department of Labor, and appropriations have been requested as amendments to the Budget for the fiscal year 1947 for those programs that will be continued:

General administration.-Funds for this part of the program covered the headquarters, regional, State, and area organization which was responsible for supplying the policies, procedures, and supervision for the local office operations of the Commission. The same functions will be continued in 1947 for the United States Employment Service.
Employment office facilities and services (United States Employment Service).-This part of the program covers the operation of the State and local employment offices throughout the United States and the Territories. This program is likewise being continued for 1947 in the Department of Labor and includes the activities of the Veterans Employment Service which, through the local offices of the United States Employment Service, provides extensive placement and counseling service for veterans.
Apprentice Training Service.-This Service promotes the establishment and supervision of employee training programs within industrial plants. The Service assists management and labor in developing and maintaining apprenticeship programs for workers learning to become craftsmen in recognized skilled trades.

Training-Within-Industry Service.-The function of this Service was to assist war industries through technical advice and counsel and training supervisors how to lead and teach their workers. Industrial foremen were trained within the plants to make the maximum use of the abilities of every worker in war production. The Service was discontinued soon after the end of the war and was completely liquidated as of December 31, 1945.
Migration of workers.-The function of this program was the importation of foreign workers from countries on this continent and neighboring islands to meet urgent manpower needs that could not be supplied by the transfer of domestic workers. The bringing in of workers was stopped after the end of the war and the program is now in process of liquidation, with no additional funds being requested for 1947.

## war shipping administration

The War Shipping Administration was established by Executive order issued February 7, 1942. With the exception of actual construction, large vessel disposal, and various regulatory functions, its responsibilities extend to all phases of shipping, including the purchasing or requisitioning of vessels for its own use or that of the Army, Navy, or other Government agencies; the repairing, conversion, or reconversion of War Shipping Admin-istration-controlled vessels, and for other special purposes; the training of seamen; the manning, operating, loading, discharging, and general control of the movement of merchant vessels; and the administration of marine and war risk insurance laws and funds.
The War Shipping Administration is operating through its agents the largest merchant fleet in the world. During
the peak of the war activity, approximately 75 percent of the total cargo lift from this country was carried in WSA-controlled vessels, resulting, during the last year of the war, in an average delivery of 8,500 tons of cargo every hour of the day and night.

The 1947 budget contemplates the operation of an average of approximately one-fourth the number of ships in operation at the high point in the war activity.

As rapidly as conditions permit, privately owned ships under charter to War Shipping Administration are being returned to the owners. The ships still to be operated by War Shipping Administration will be for tho needs of the Army and Navy, and to augment the services in certain Government relief programs and other services deemed essential to the economy of this country and its possessions.

The reduction in estimated expenditures is related to the reduction in the size and type of ship operations.

Revolving fund.-In the 1947 estimates for the War Shipping Administration, the policy of providing free transportation for Army, Navy, and other Government cargoes is discontinued. Continued operation of ships at a very reduced rate is assumed for carrying cargo for the military, for various Government programs, and in various commercial services.

No additional funds are being appropriated as it is assumed that a balance of funds from 1946 (for previous carrying of revenue-producing cargo), plus estimated receipts accruing from revenue in fiscal year 1947, will provide sufficient funds for any losses incurred in the carrying out of various Government programs and for other expenditures such as reconversions and repairs of chartered ships, manning of ships, administrative expenses, and other miscellaneous items. In addition, transfers from this fund are provided for training activities and for assistance to State marine schools.

Training fund.-The responsibility of training personnel for the merchant marine was transferred, July 1942, by Executive order to the War Shipping Administration. This authority was originally granted to the Maritime Commission by the Merchant Marine Act of 1936 which in its declaration of policy states that the merchant marine is to be "manned with a trained and efficient civilian personnel." The training program is being carried on by means of stations, schools, ships, and correspondence courses.

Provision is also made in this appropriation for various health activities to be provided by United States Public Health Service.
The item of decrease is related to the reduction in number of ships to be operated and contemplates an approach to the postwar needs of the industry.

State marine schools.-In addition to the direct training activities carried on by War Shipping Administration, grants are made to established State marine schools.
The appropriation for State marine schools is to provide for matching grants and per capita payments for out-ofState students and for repairs to vessels being used by five State marine schools.

The increase in the 1947 estimate is related to the item of ship repairs.

Authority for the establishment of and payment of matching grants to State marine schools is contained in the act of March 4, 1911.

## Office of Censorship

The Office of Censorship, established by Executive order on December 19, 1941, censored communications by mail, cable, radio, and other means of transmission between
the United States and any foreign country. It also issued the voluntery censorship codes to fuide the domestic press and radio in volunterily withholding from publication military and other information which would be detrimental to the effective prosecution of the wer.

On Aucust 15, 1945, the President ordered the Director of Censorship to terminate censorship operations on that date. Executive Order 9631, September 28, 1945, provided for the termination of the Office on November 15, 1945. At the close of business on that date, remaining personnel and belences of appropriations then unexpended were trensferred to the Secretary of the Treasury to be utilized by the Secretary in winding up the affairs of the Office.

## Office of Price Administration

General statement.-The main statutory responsibilities of the Office of Price Administration under the provisions of the Emergency Price Control Act of 1942, as amended, are to stabilize prices and rents, to protect persons having fixed incomes against undue impairment of their standard of living, and to assist in securing adequate production of commodities and facilities. The Office, through delegation of authority by directives under the Second War Powers Act, has the further responsibility of rationing such commodities as may be designated by the supply agencies responsible for their control.
Through delegation of authority from the Office of Economic Stabilization, the Office receives notices of increases in common carrier and other public utility rates and in significant cases intervenes in proceedings before regulatory bodies to prevent rate increases.
The estimate for 1947 is based on the assumption that the first 6 months of the year will be the most critical period yet experienced in the anti-inflation program. Staff is therefore increased somewhat during that period. During the second half of the fiscal year, it is planned that, if production goals are attained, the staff of the agency will be tapered off. Exceptions to these reductions are the building and construction pricing programs, the meat slaughter control program, and the rent control program, all of which will be continued substantially at present levels.

Price program.--Living costs for moderate income families in large cities, according to the Consumer's Price Index of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, have increased only about 5 percent since May of 1943, when the hold-the-line order became effective. The main tasks for the fiscal year 1947 are to strengthen price controls over building and construction materials and food, to adjust ceiling prices where such adjustments are warranted, and to maintain current information on the supply-demand situation so that prompt action can be taken in accordance with the provisions of Office of Economic Stabilization directive No. 68.
Rent program.--The rent-control program has been successful despite the fact that pressures on rents have materially increased during the present fiscal year. The Bureau of Labor Statistics Rent Index has shown a total rise of only 3.8 percent since 1939, and a rise of only 6.3 percent since May of 1943, when the hold-the-line order became effective. On June 1, 1946, the Federal rent regulation was effective in 520 defense-rental areas covering more than 15 million registered rental dwelling units.

The acute housing shortage has increased the need for rent control. During the present fiscal year, rent centrol has been extended to 54 new areas, as of June 1, 1946; during the fiscal year 1947, it is probable that rent control will be extended to a total of 145 new areas.

Rationing program.-Sugar is the sole remaining commodity rationed by the Office of Price Administration. Rationing of all other commodities was discontinued during the period from August 15, 1945, to January 1, 1946.

The outlook for the civilien supply of sugar in the United States indicates the need for maintaining rationing controls during 1947. Administratively, responsibility for the rationing program has been transferred from the Rationing Department, abolished in January 1946, to the Price Department.

Enforcement program.-During the past calendar year, violations disclosed on investigation have risen from 58 to 73 percent. The bulk of these cases was handled successfully through administrative rather than court action. Sanctions instituted in the calender year 1945 were four times greater than the number instituted in the calendar year 1944. Emphasis placed on obtaining major sanctions resulted in a threefold increase in criminal and contempt cases. Where court proceedings were instituted, the Office was highly successful. Enforcement action successfully maintained the price, rent, and rationing regulations involved in 97.6 percent of civil proceedings inst tuted and in 95.5 percent of criminal proceedings instituted.

Price-control boards.-The 1,900 price-control boards loce ted in the principal retail trading areas throughout the country carry the Agency's responsibility for compliance with, and enforcement of, price control at the retail level. The boards are organized into a series of panels made up of representative citizens of the community who serve without compensation. These panels hold hearings with retailers on reported violations of ceiling prices. There are now about 100,000 citizens serving on these panels or doing work on other activities at the boards. The successful operation of the price-control boards is due in a large mersure to these volunteer workers.

A staff of paid clerks assists the panels in carrying out their function. They perform the necessary secretarial and clerical functions of the boards.

## Petroleum Administration for War.

The Petroleum Administration for War was established by Executive order on December 2, 1942, for the purpose of coordinating and centralizing the war policies and activities of the Government relating to petroleum in order to provide adequate supplies of petroleum for the prosecution of the war and other essential needs. During the war, the Administration met critical emergencies and supplied all military needs without seriously curtailing essential civilian activities, and by the coordination of all operations of the petroleum industry under its direction, the Administration succeeded in supplying tremendous quantities of petroleum products when and where they were needed.
After the surrender of Japan, the Administration began the liquidation of its activities and it was abolished by Executive Order 9718, dated May 3, 1946.

## Office of Strategic Services

The Office of Strategic Services was terminated by Executive order dated September 20, 1945, and there were transferred to the Department of State the functions of the Research and Analysis Branch and the Presentation Branch, except those functions performed in Germany and Austria. Estimates for the functions transferred to the Department of State were presented to the Congress in the form of an amendment to the Budget for 1947.

All other functions of the Office were transferred to the War Department.

## EMERGENCY FUNDS APPROPRIATED TO THE PRESIDENT

## Defense Aid-Lend-Lease

During fiscal year 1947 the lend-lease program will be in the final stages of liquidation. A small volume of final deliveries to certain foreign governments will be made under credit arrangements and the procurement activities carried out by several Federal agencies will largely be completed.

The original Lend-Lease Act, approved on March 11, 1941, was enacted "to promote the defense of the United States, and for other purposes." Under this act the President was authorized, when he deemed it to be in the interest of the national defense, to sell, transfer title to, exchange, lease, lend, or otherwise dispose of articles, information, or services to any country whose defense the President deemed vital to the defense of the United States. On April 18, 1945, the act was extended to June 30, 1949, for purposes of carrying out agreements with foreign governments entered into prior to June 30, 1946.

To enable the President to carry out the provisions of this act, there has been available direct appropriations to the President totaling approximately 30.7 billion dollars. Of this amount 385 million dollars has been transferred to United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration and 500 million dollars has been transferred to the Department of Agriculture for the postwar price support of agricultural commodities. In addition to these appropriations, the Congress authorized the President to transfer certain articles and services purchased directly by the War and Navy Departments, and to lease vessels procured out of appropriations made to the Navy Department and the United States Maritime Commission.

Following the surrender of Japan, the Foreign Economic Administration was dissolved and the President's authority for making lend-lease settlements transferred to the Secretary of State. The remaining operations under the act will continue to be carried on by such other principal Federal service agencies as the Treasury Department, the War Department, the Navy Department, the Department of Agriculture, the War Shipping Administration, and the United States Maritime Commission.

The 1947 obligations which are solely for liquidation of the lend-lease activities, are estimated at $\$ 7,100,000$, which amount is to be provided from unobligated funds from previous appropriations. No appropriation of additional funds is required for this purpose.

## United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration

The United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration was established by an agreement concluded on November 9, 1943, among the United Nations and associated nations and authorities. The United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration, representing 48 governments, is responsible for providing minimum essential supplies and services, including food, clothing, seed, shelter, tools, sanitation and repatriation, to peoples of areas liberated from the enemy. The cost' of such supplies and services are met from contributions by the several member governments. On March 28, 1944, the President approved a joint resolution of the Congress authorizing the appropriation of $\$ 1,350,000,000$ as this Government's contribution toward the new international
organization. On December 18, 1945, the Congress authorized the appropiation of an additional $\$ 1,350$,000,000 as a further United States contribution.
The appropriation of $\$ 1,300,000,000$ and of $\$ 385,000,000$ in authority to transfer funds originally made available for lend-lease purposes constitutes the United States contribution in the fiscal year 1946. The appropriation and fund transfers do not reflect an authorization to transfer supplies in the amount of $\$ 100,000,000$ from the War Department to United Nation's Relief and Rehabilitation Administration without reimbursement. Four hundred and sixty-five million dollars remain to be appropriated by the Congress to complete this Government's authorized contribution to the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration.

## INDEPENDENT OFFICES

## Office of War Móbilization and Reconversion

The Office of War Mobilization and Reconversion was established by the War Mobilization and Reconversion Act of 1944, approved October 3, 1944. The Office replaced the Office of War Mobilization, created by Executive Order 9347, dated May 27, 1943. The act of October 3, 1944, placed within this Office the Retraining and Reemployment Administration, the Office of Contract Settlement, and the Surplus Property Board.
During fiscal year 1946, several changes were effected in the organization of the Office of War Mobilization and Reconversion. Under Executive Order 9617, dated September 19, 1945, the Retraining and Reemployment Administration was transferred to the Department of Labor. Under Executive Order 9689, dated January 31, 1946, the Surplus Property Board (changed to the Surplus Property Administration by Public Law 181, 79th Cong.) was merged with the War Assets Corporation, and its functions reassigned to the Department of State and to the Corporation. Effective March 25, 1946, the War Assets Administration was established and assumed all functions of the War Assets Corporation relative to surplus property.
In fiscal year 1946, the Office of War Mobilization and Reconversion and its constituent agencies had available for administrative expenses $\$ 3,955,400$. In addition, there was appropriated $\$ 40,000,000$ for expenses of surplus property disposal agencies, and to this sum was added $\$ 14,999,000$ transferred by appropriation act from the fund previously appropriated to the Treasury Department for surplus property disposal expenses. Moreover, the First Deficiency Appropriation Act, 1946, made available for surplus property disposal expenses $\$ 170,000,000$ to be taken out of proceeds from sales of property.
The budget estimate of $\$ 900,000$ for 1947 for administrative expenses represents a decrease of more than 75 percent from 1946 direct appropriations for these expenses. No estimate under this head is submitted for surplus property disposal expenses in 1947, inasmuch as such funds will be budgeted for the War Assets Administration.
The Office of War Mobilization and Reconversion is primarily a coordinating and policy-forming unit, assisted by an advisory board of 12 members. The emphasis of the Director's program now is geared to the problems of industrial reconversion and the economic readjustments necessitated by the transition from war to peace. To that end he supervises and coordinates the activities of the numerous exccutive agencies engaged in the reconversion program. Through the advisory board, a study is being concluded as to the feasibility of guaranteed annual wage plans as techniques for stabilizing employment.

The budget estimate is for $\$ 900,000$. The estimate contemplates merging the functions of the Office of Contract Settlement with OWMR. Available to the Office but not included in the estimate is an item amounting to $\$ 11,700$ required for completion of the study of guaranteed wage plans, funds for which will be available for expenditure from balances in the 1946 appropriation, as authorized by the Congress in the Second Deficiency Appropriation Act, 1946.

## Selective Service System

The 1947 budget of $\$ 37,000,000$ for the Selective Service System is a decrease of $\$ 15,000,000$ or 29 percent below the $\$ 52,000,000$ appropriated for fiscal year 1946. Substantial reductions have been made in every project. Principal items of decrease are in local board personal services, travel of selectees, and State headquarters administrative costs.

The Selective Service System was established by the Selective Training and Service Act of 1940 . To accomplish the objectives laid down by the Congress, the System performs the following basic functions:

1. Registers, classifies, selects, and delivers registrants for induction into the armed forces, or, in lieu of induction into the armed forces, for assignment to work of national importance of those registrants determined to be conscientiously opposed to participation in military service.
2. Supervises and controls the program of work of national importance to which are assigned those individuals found to be conscientious objectors.
3. Assists veterans desiring reinstatement in their old jobs, and, under the general coordinating supervision of the Retraining and Reemployment Administration, provides certain informational services to veterans.

The organization of the Selective Service System consists of approximately 6,600 separate units, including a National Headquarters in Washington, D. C.; a State Headquarters in each of the 48 States, New York City, District of Columbia, Alaska, Hawrii, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands; one or more appeal boards in each State; and 6,443 local boards, with at least one in each county or similar political subdivision.

The administration of Selective Service is widely decentralized and considerable latitude in administrative authority and responsibility is vested in the State directors and local board chairmen. The Governor of each State or Territory is the responsible head of Selective Service in his State; he administers his functions through a State director who is appointed by the President upon his recommendation. He also appoints or recommends for appointment by the President members of local boards, boards of appeal, medical advisory boards, advisory boards for
registrants, Government appeal agents, examining physicians and dentists, veterans reemployment committeemen, medical field agents, and others who serve in an advisory capacity. The System includes more than 180,000 citizens who receive no compensation from the Federal Government for their services; the compensated personnel number approximately 12,000.
Since the beginning of the Selective Service program in 1940 more than $46,000,000$ persons have been registered. The group now being registered consists almost entirely of men becoming 18 years of age. Approximately 100,000 males become 18 each month; of these approximately 30,000 enlist before reaching their eighteenth birthday and, therefore, are not required to register with the Selective Service System.
During fiscal year 1946, the age group liable for military service has been changed once and the age group acceptable for military service has been changed twice. The following table outlines these changes:

| Period | Age group liable | Age group acceptable |

On May 14, 1946, the Congress prohibited the induction of 18 - and 19-year-old registrants during the 6 weeks' period in which the Selective Training and Service Act was extended, i. e., May 15 to July 1, 1946. The President, therefore, in order to secure the maximum number of men possible for the armed forces, directed that the age group acceptable for service be expanded to include registrants 26 through 29 years of age. It is estimated that there are $11,664,000$ in this age group; of these $8,136,000$ have been or are now in the armed forces, $2,345,000$ have been found physically or mentally unfit for service, and $1,111,000$ have been deferred for occupational or other reasons.
The primary purpose of the Selective Service program has been accomplished. The greatest armed force in the Nation's history has been raised, largely through Selective Service The present primary purpose of Selective Service is to obtain replacements for men being released in order that the necessary strength of the armed forces may be maintained. In the process of raising an armed force and in obtaining necessary replacements, the reservoir of manpower has been nearly exhausted, except for those men becoming 18 years of age. To the extent that the requirements of the armed forces cannot be met from the pool of younger men becoming eligible, the task of the Selective Service System will become increasingly difficult.

C. 600 c ), of fees, mileage, and subsistence of witnesses appearing at hearings held by the National War Labor Board or its agents in connection with the performance of its functions, which payment of fees, mileage, and subsistence shall be subject to certification by the Chairman of the Board, or his designee, as to the necessity therefor; actual transportation and other necessary expenses, and not to exceed $\$ 25$ per diem in lieu of subsistence, whether or not in a travel status, of other members, alternate members, and associate members of the Board while serving as such without other compensation from the United States; $\$ 13,320,000$ : Provided, That those provisions of section 201 of the Independent Offices Appropriation Act, 1946, making appropriations available for travel and subsistence of persons employed or serving intermittently or without other compensation while away from their homes or regular places of business shall apply to public, labor, or industry members of the regional boards, committees, commissions, or panels, or public hearings officers of the National War Labor Board, whether employed intermittently or indefinitely, and the term "consultants" as used in section 201, National War Agencies Appropriation Act, 1945, and title I, under the head "Office for Emergency Management First Deficiency Appropriation Act, 1943," and paragraph (a), general provisions, National War Agencies Appropriation Act, 1944, shall be construed to include such persons: Provided further, That no part of the funds appropriated in this paragraph shall be used in connection with investigation, hearings, directives or orders concerning bargaining units composed in whole or in part of agricultural laborers, as that term is defined in the Social Security Act in section 409, title 42, United States Code. None of the persons receiving compensation on a per diem when-actually-employed basis and employed intermittently or indefinitely shall be entitled to any of the benefits of the Sick Leave Act of March 14, 1936 ( 49 Stat. 1162), or of the Annual Leave Act of March 14, 1936 ( 49 Stat. 1161), as amended, or of any other provisions of law pertaining to sick or annual leave. 1 (Executive Orders 9017, 9240 , 9250, 9328, 9381, 9535, 9599, and 9617; 91 U. S. C. 757760; 50 U. S. C. 1501-1511, App. 901-971; Act of July 17, 1945, Public Law 156.)

App.) : Provided, That not to exceed [ $\$ 2,500,000] \$ 3,870,120$ shall be available for the entire fiscal year [1946] 1947 for the general administrative expenses of the Office of Alien Property Custodian, including the salary of the Alien Property Custodian at $\$ 10,000$ per annum; printing and binding; not to exceed [ $\$ 4,400] \$ 8,500$ for deposit in the general fund of the Treasury for cost of penalty mail as required by section 2 of the Act of June 28, 1944 (Public Law 364) ; rent in the District of Columbia; not to exceed $\$ 70,000$ for the temporary employment of persons or organizations by contract or otherwise for special services without regard to the civil service and classification laws and section 3709, Revised Statutes; personal services in the District of Columbia and elsewhere; contract stenographic reporting services; lawbooks, books of reference, newspapers, and periodicals; maintenance, operation, and repair of passenger automobiles; acceptance and utilization of voluntary and uncompensated services; traveling expenses, including expenses of attendance at meetings of organizations concerned with the work of the agency; and all otber necessary general administrative expenses: Provided further, That on or before November 1, [1945] 1946, the Alien Property Custodian shall make a report to the Appropriations Committees of the Senate and the House of Representatives giving detailed information on all administrative and nonadministrative expenses incurred in connection with the activities of the Office of Alien Property Custodian [: Provided further, That nothing herein contained authorizing expenditures by the Alien Property Custodian during the fiscal year 1946 shall be construed as validating or invalidating expenditures by the Custodian during prior fiscal years].
[Administrative expenses: For an additional amount for the general administrative expenses of the Office of Alien Property Custodian for the fiscal year 1946, including not to exceed $\$ 8,900$ for deposit in the general fund of the Treasury for cost of penalty mail, $\$ 730,300$, payable out of any funds or other property or

[The appropriation herein made for the Office of War Information shall constitute the total amount to be available for obligation by such agency during the fiscal year 1946 and shall not be supplemented by funds from any source except by reverse lend-lease. ]
[This appropriation shall be available when authorized by the Director of the Office of War Information for furnishing of food, prepared or otherwise, and quarters to employees and others engaged in activities of the Office of War Information in the Far East, and for furnishing of quarters which may be required in other areas outside the continental limits of the United States, including the construction of quarters (when not otherwise available) outside the continental limits of the United States without regard to the provisions of section 355, Revised Statutes ( 40 U. S. C. 255), and other provisions of law affecting the purchase or rental of land and the construction of buildings thereon: Provided, That food and quarters furnished hereunder shall be on a basis of not less than cost, as determined by the Director, payment therefor to be by reduction of living and travel allowances, in accordance with standardized regulations prescribed by the President, or in the case of native employees as part compensation for service rendered, or cash. ## Salaries and Expenses, War Assets Administration, Special Fund-

Salaries and expenses: There is hereby appropriated from the special fund account in the Treasury as provided for in the First Deficiency Appropriation Act, 1946, not to exceed $\$ 545,100,000$ for the fiscal year $194^{7}$ for all necessary expenses of the War Assets Administration established by Executive Order 9689; for allocation or reimbursement by the War Assets Administrator to Government agen-
cies designated by the Administraior as disposal agencies by or pursuant to the Surplus Property Act of 1944; for payment to Government agencies designated by the Administrator for rendering special services in connection with the disposal of surplus property in such amounts as shall be approved by the Bureau of the Budget; and for allocation or reimbursement to owning agencies in such amounts and upon such basis as shail be approved by the Bureau of the Budget, for the care and handling (including pay and allowances and subsistence of military and naval personnel) of surplus property subsequent to the filing of a declaration of surplus covering such property with a disposal agency designated by the Administrator, or, if the Administrator prescribes procedures whereby declarations of surplus are made at approximately the time of disposal or removal, subsequent to notice by the owning agency to the disposal agency that property has been determined to be surplus and is subject to such procedures, such funds to be available for personal services in the District of Columbia; fees and mileage of witnesses at rates provided by law for witnesses attending in the United States Courts (28 U.S.C.600c); temporary (not in excess of one year) or intermittent services of experts or consultants or organizations thereof, including stenographic reporting services, by contract or otherwise, without regard to the civil service and classification laws; lawbooks, books of reference, newspapers, and periodicals; acceptance and utilization of voluntary and uncompensated services; printing and binding; travel expenses, including reimbursement, at not to exceed 4 cents per mile, to employees for expenses incurred by them in performance of official travel in privately owned aulomobiles within the limits of their official stations; expenses of attendance at meetings of organizations concerned with the work of the Administration; procurement of supplies, equipment, reports, and services in connection with the care, handling, and disposition of surplus property without regard to the provisions of section 3709 of the Revised Statutes (41 U. S. C. 5) upon determination by the Administrator or by any official designated by him for this purpose that such method of procurement is necessary; purchase and procuremen of reports of experts or consultants or organizations thereof; advertising, including radio time; purchase, maintenance, operation, and repair of passenger automobiles; maintenance, operation, and repair of aircraft in the Territories and possessions in connection with disposal activities and, in the continental limits of the United States in connection with the disposition of aircraft and airports; acquisition of buildings, lands, leaseholds, and other interests therein, and temporary use thereof for the care, handling, and disposition of surplus property; payments to States or political subdivisions thereof of sums in lieu of and equivalent to taxes accruing against real property declared surplus to the Administration by Government corporations; authority to advance money to Administration cashiers and collection officials upon furnishing bond, for the purpose of handling cash transactions and making change at surplus property sales: Provided, That the Administrator may delegate to any official in the War Assets Administration the authority to make appointments of personnel and he may also delegate to any subordinate official the authon ity to make other determinations necessary for the conduct of the administrative management within said Administration: Provided further, That any employee of the War Assets Administration is authorized, when designated for the purpose by the Administrator, to administer to or take from any person an oath, affirmation, or affidavit, when such instrument is required in connection with the performance of the functions or activities o t the War Assets Administration: Provided further, That the Administration may procure by contract or otherwise and furnish to Government employees and employees of Government contractors at the reasonable value thereof food, meals. subsistence, and medical supplies, emergency medical services, quarters, heat, light, household equipment, laundry service, and sanitation facilities; and erect temporary structures and make alterations in existing structures necessary for these purposes, when such employees are engaged in the disposal of surplus property, or in the preparation for such disposal, at locations where such supplies, services, equipment, or facilities are otherwise unavailable, the proceeds derived therefrom to be credited to this appropriation: Provided further, That the provisions of subparagraph (A) of paragraph (1) of section 14 (a) of the Federal Employees Pay Act of 1946 (Public Law 390) shall not apply with respect to officers and employees of the War Assets Administration.

Office for Emergency Management—General Provisions
(a) The head of any constituent agency may delegate to any official in such agency the authority to make appointments of personnel and he may also delegate to any official in the agency of which he is the head the authority to make other determinations necessary for the conduct of the administrative management within such agency.
(b) Any employee of any of the constituent agencies is authorized, when designated for the purpose by the head of such agency, to administer to or take from any person an oath, affirmation, or affidavit, when such instrument is required in connection with the performance of the functions or activities of such agency.
(c) The head of any of the constituent agencies is authorized, in connection with the operations of such agency, to consider, ascertain, adjust, determine, and certify claims against the United States in accordance with the Act of December 28, 1922 (31 U. S. C. 215), and to designate certifying officers in accordance with the Act of December 29, 1941, or to delegate authority to the head of any other agency to designate employees of such agency as certifying officers to certify vouchers payable against the funds of the constituent agency concerned.
[(d) The appropriations for the constituent agencies under the Office for Emergency Management for the fiscal year 1946 shall be available for the hire of motor-propelled passenger-carrying vehicles.] (Act of July 17, 1945, Public Law 156.)

App. 622), and Acts amending or suppicmenting such Acts, and all other powers, duties, and functions which may be lawfully delegated to the Office of Price Administration, including personal services in the District of Columbia and elsewhere; lawbooks, books of reference, newspapers, and periodicals; expenses of in-service training of employees, including salaries and traveling expenses of instructors; not to exceed $\$ 55,000$ for the employment of aliens; not to exceed $\$ 30,000$ for the temporary employment of persons or organizations, by contract or otherwise, without regard to section 3709, Revised Statutes, or the civil-service and classification laws; contract stenographic reporting services without regard to said section 3709; witness fees; printing and binding (not to exceed [ $\$ 1,470,000] \$ 790,290$, which limitation shall not apply to the printing of forms prescribed for use of trade or public, instructions, regulations, coupon books, price lists, and printing required for the conduct of litigation); not to exceed [ $\$ 100,000] \$ 800,000$ for test purchases [, without regard to section 3648, Revised Statutes, and the Act of December 29, 1941 (31 U. S. C. 529 and 82b), $]$ of commodities, services, or ration currency for enforcement purposes, authorization in each case to have approval prior to purchase of the Administrator, regional administrator, or the district director in the region or district in which the purchase is contemplated; traveling expenses (not to exceed [ $\$ 7,949,700] \$ 7,674,330$ ), including reimbursement, at not to exceed [3] 4 cents per mile, of employees for expenses incurred by them in official travel in privately owned automobiles within the limits of their official stations, [and] expenses of appointees from point of induction in continental United States to their first post of duty in the Territories and return and expenses of attendance at meetings of organizations concerned with the work of the Office of Price Administration; hire, purchase (not to exceed two), maintenance, operation, and repair of [motor-propelled] passenger [-carrying vehicles] automobilcs; not to exceed $[\$ 5,210,550] \$ 2,509,000$ for deposit in the general fund of the Treasury for cost of penalty mail as required by section 2 of the Act of June 28, 1944 (Public Law 364); fiscal year [1946, $\$ 174,500,000] 1947, \$ 142,200,000:$ Provided, That no part of this appropriation shall be used for the compensation of any officer, agent, clerk, or other employee of the United States who shall divulge or make known in any manner whatever to any person the operations, style of work, or apparatus of any manufacturer
or producer visited by him in the discharge of his official duties, or the amount or source of income, profits, losses, expenditures, or any particular thereof, set forth or disclosed in any questionnaire, report, return, or document, required or requested to be filed by order or regulation of the Administrator or to permit any questionnaire, report, return, or document or copy thereof or any book containing any abstract or particulars thereof to be seen or examined by any person except as provided by law; nor for any person who shall print or publish in any manner whatever, except as hereinafter provided, any questionnaire, report, return, or document or any part thereof or source of income, profits, losses, expenditures, or methods of doing business, appearing in any questionnaire, report, return, or document: Provided further, That the foregoing provisions shall not be construed to prevent or prohibit the publication or disclosure of studies, graphs, charts, or other documents of like general character wherein individual statistics or the source thereof is not disclosed or identified directly or indirectly nor to prevent the furnishing in confidence to the War Department, the Navy Department, or the United States Maritime Commission, such data and information as may be requested by them for use in the performance of their official duties: Provided further, That no part of this appropriation shall be available for making any subsidy payments: Provided further, That no part of this appropriation shall be used to enforce any maximum price or prices on any agricultural commodity or any commodity processed or manufactured in whole or substantial part from any agricultural commodity, including milk and its products and livestock, unless and until (1) the Secretary of Agriculture has determined and published for such agricultural commodity the prices specified in section 3 (a) of the Emergency Price Control Act of 1942, as amended by Public Law 729, approved October 2, 1942, as amended; (2) in case of a comparable price for such agricultural commodity, the Secretary of Agriculture bas held public hearings and determined and published such comparable price in the manner prescribed by section 3 (b) of said Act as amended; and (3) the Secretary of Agriculture has determined after investigation and proclaimed that the maximum price or prices so established on any such agricultural commodity, including milk and its product and livestock, will reflect to the producer of such agricultural commodity a price in conformity with section 3 (c) of said Act as amended: Provided further, That such maximum price or prices shall conform in all respects to the provisions of section 3 of Public Law 729 approved October 2, 1942, as amended: Provided further, That any employee of the Office of Price Administration is authorized and empowered, when designated for the purpose by the head of the agency, to administer to or take from any person an oath, affirmation, or affidavit when such instrument is required in connection with the performance of the functions or activities of said Office: [Provided further, That no part of this appropriation shall be directly or indirectly used for the payment of the salary or expenses of any person who directs the formulation of any price policy, maximum price, or price ceiling with respect to any article or commodity unless in the judgment of the Administrator, such person shall be qualified by experience in business, industry, or commerce; but this limitation shall not apply to the Administrator or Acting Administrator as the case may be, in considering, adopting, signing, and promulgating price policies, maximum prices, or price ceilings formulated and prepared in compliance herewith:] Provided further, That none of the funds appropriated in this Act shall be used to pay the salary or expenses of any person fixing maximum prices for different kinds, classes, or types of processed fruits and vegetables which are described in terms of specifications or standards, unless such specifications or standards were, prior to such order, in general use [: Provided further, That as to appropriations and contract authorizations granted for the national defense, war agencies, and the prosecution of the war contained in this Act and other appropriation Acts, in addition to compliance with the provisions of section 303 of the Second Deficiency Appropriation Act, 1944, there shall be submitted to the Congress on January 3, 1946, a list showing the condition of the balances of each of such appropriations and contract authorizations together with recommendations for the repeal of such of those funds or portions thereof as are deemed no longer required for the purposes for which they were granted]. (Act of July 5, 1945, Public Law 182.)

[(a) For the procurement, by manufacture or otherwise, of defense articles, information, and services, for the government of any country whose defense the President deems vital to the defense of the United States, and the disposition thereof, including all necessary expenses in connection therewith, as follows:]
[Vessels, ships, boats, and other watercraft, including the hire and temporary use thereof, and equipage, supplies, materials, spare parts, and accessories, $\$ 666,912,000$.]
[Agricultural, industrial, and other commodities and articles, ,805,228,000.]
[(b) For administrative expenses, not specified or included in the appropriation for "Salaries and expenses, Foreign Economic Administration, 1946", $\$ 2,860,000$.]
[(c) In all, $\$ 2,475,000,000$.]
[(d) Each of the foregoing appropriations shall be additional to, and consolidated with, the appropriations for the same purposes, contained in the same respective categories of appropriation in the Defense Aid Supplemental Appropriation Act, 1941, the Defense Aid Supplemental Appropriation Act, 1942, the Second Defense Aid Supplemental Appropriation Act, 1942, the Defense Aid Supplemental Appropriation Act, 1943, and the Defense Aid Appropriation Act, 1945 , and the appropriations contained in the foregoing Acts are hereby continued and shall be available until June 30, 1946, except that $\$ 500,000,000$ of the total amount thus made available shall be continued to be reserved for expenditure, as and when necessary, for the postwar price support of agriculture: Provided, That with the exception of the appropriation for "Administrative expenses", not to exceed 20 per centum of any of the foregoing appropriations may be transferred by the President to any other of such appropriations, but no such appropriation shall be increased more than 30 per centum thereby: Provided further, That notwithstanding the foregoing proviso (1) balances, unobligated as of June 30, 1945, and balances subsequently released from obligation, of appropriations contained in the foregoing Acts for "Ordnance and ordnance stores, supplies, spare parts, and materials, including armor and ammunition and components thereof", and for "Miscellaneous military equipment. supplies, and materials', may be transferred by the Presidert to and consolidated with the appropriation provided above for "Agricultural, industrial, and other commodities and articles'; and (2) balances, unobligated as of June 30, 1945, and balances subsequently released from obligation, of appropriations contained in the foregoing Acts for "Necessary services and expenses" may be transferred by the President to and consolidated with any of the appropriations provided, above, except the appropriation for "Administrative expenses".]
[SEc. 202. Any defense article, information, or service procured from funds appropriated by this title or prior Acts appropriating funds to the President for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of said Act of March 11, 1941, as amended, shall be retained by or transferred to and for the use of such department or agency of the United States as the President may determine, in lieu of being disposed of to a foreign government, whenever in the judgment of the President the defense of the United States will be best served thereby: Provided further, That none of the funds appropriated in this title shall be used for the payment of any subsidy on agricultural products produced in the continental United States nor for the purchase or distribution of any food products for use in Puerto Rico or the Virgin Islands.]

Liquidation: Not to exceed $\$ 7,100,000$ of the funds made available by title II of the Second Deficiency Appropriation Act, 1945, and other Acts mentioned in said title for carrying out the provisions of an Act to promote the defense of the United States, approved March 11, 1941, are hereby continued available during the fiscal year 1947 for the liquidation of the activities under said Act of March 11, 1941, said sums to be derived from the amounts appropriated for the several categories for which appropriations have been made as may be determined by the Secretary of State, or such official as he may designate. (Act of July 5, 1945, Public Law 132.)

## GENERAL PROYISIONS

[Sec. 102. The appropriations in this Act for salaries and expenses shall be available, in addition to the objects specified under each head, for personal services in the District of Columbia and elsewhere; contract stenographic reporting services; lawbooks, books of reference, newspapers and periodicals; maintenance, operation, and repair of motor-propelled passenger-carrying vehicles; acceptance and utilization of voluntary and uncompensated services; and traveling expenses, including expenses of attendance at meetings of organizations concerned with the work of the agency from whose appropriation such expenses are paid.]
[Sec. 103. Whenever sums are set apart from the appropriations in this Act for special projects (classified in the estimates submitted to Congress as or under "Other contractual services") expenditures may be made therefrom for traveling expenses, printing and binding, and purchase of motor-propelled passenger-carrying vehicles without regard to the limitations specified for such objects under the respective heads, but within such amounts as the Bureau of the Budget may approve therefor and such Bureau shall report to Congress each such limitation determined by it: Provided, That such limitations shall not apply where the special projects are performed by non-Government agencies.]
[Sec. 104. With the prior approval of the Bureau of the Budget and under authority of section 601 of the Act of June 30, 1932, as amended (31 U. S. C. 686), orders for work or services to be performed by other agencies of the Government may be placed by any of the agencies whose appropriations are contained in this Act, but no agency shall perform work or render services with or without reimbursement (including the detail or loan of personnel) for any of the agencies whose appropriations are contained in this Act except in pursuance of orders approved or authorized in accordance with regulations prescribed by said Bureau or under specifie authority of other law. This provision shall not apply to the Office of Strategic Services.]
[SEc. 105. The foregoing sections 102, 103, and 104 shall have no application to appropriations for the War Shipping Administration. $]$
[Sec. 106. No part of any appropriation contained in this Act shall be used to pay the salary or wages of any person who advocates, or who is a member of an organization that advocates, the overthrow of the Government of the United States by force or violence: Provided, That for the purposes hereof an affidavit shall be considered prima facie evidence that the person making the affidavit does not advocate, and is not a member of an organization that advocates, the overthrow of the Government of the United Sta, es by force or violence: Provided further, That any person who advocates, or who is a member of an organization that advocates, the overthrow of the Government of the United States by force or violence and accepts employment the salary or wages for which are paid from any appropriation contained in this Act shall be guilty of a felony and, upon conviction, shall be fined not more than $\$ 1,000$ or imprisoned for not more than one year, or both: Provided further, That the above penalty clause shall be in addition to, and not in substitution for, any other provisions of existing law.] (Act of July 17, 1945, Public Law 156.)

## EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

## SOLID FUELS ADMINISTRATION FOR WAR

The Solid Fuels Administration for War was established in the Department of the Interior by Executive order on April 19, 1943.
The Administration coordinates Government policies and activities pertaining to solid fuels and is the channel of liaison and communication between the solid fuels industries and Federal agencies on fuel questions under its jurisdiction. The Administrator establishes basic policies after consultations with unpaid advisory boards and committees composed of representatives of the coal industry, coal consumers, and the public at large, and formulates programs to assure an orderly and equitable distribution of solid fuels to all consumers. The Administration has enlisted the aid of State and municipal authorities in important phases of its work with considerable success.

Continued interruptions in the production of coal combined with low consumer stocks in the face of continued high requirements make it necessary to continue the Administration through the next fiscal year.
The estimate for the fiscal year 1947 provides for the continuation of the Administration's activities at the level provided by the 1946 appropriation until April 1, 1947, and for liquidation thereafter.

## WAR RELOCATION AUTHORITY

The War Relocation Authority was established by Executive order on March 18, 1942, and was transferred to
the Department of the Interior on February 16, 1944, by Executive Order 9423 . The immediate occasion of the establishment of the Authority was the evacuation of all persons of Japanese ancestry from designated areas of California, Oregon, Washington, and Arizona-an evacuation carried out by the western defense command of the Army in accordance with a public proclamation issued by the commanding general on March 2, 1942.
In order to provide subsistence for the evacuees pending relocation, and to maintain some degree of control over the relocation process in the public interest, the Authority established and administered a number of barracks cities known as relocation centers. By memorandum from the President, dated June 8, 1944, the Authority was assigned the responsibility for administering a shelter for European war refugees.
Following the revocation of the general exclusion orders by the War Department on December 17, 1944, the Authority accelerated its relocation program and closed its last center on May 4, 1946. On February 6, 1946, the last person left the European refugee shelter, which was returned to the War Department on March 1, 1946. Liquidation of the program is thus virtually complete.
Certain clean-up work, which remains to be done after the close of the fiscal year 1946, will be financed by an appropriation for "War agency liquidation" in the Office of the Secretary of the Interior.

## EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

## GENERAL STATEMENT

The fundamental naval policy of the United States is to maintain the Navy in strength and readiness to uphold national policies and interests, and to guard the United States and its continental and overseas possessions. The administration of this policy is carried out by the Navy Department.

The Navy Department comprises the Offices of the Secretary and Chief of Naval Operations, the Bureaus of Naval Personnel, Yards and Docks, Ordnance, Ships, Supplies and Accounts, Medicine and Surgery, Aeronautics, and the Headquarters, Marine Corps.

## NAVY BUDGET PROGRAM, FISCAL YEAR 1947

The Navy budget for the fiscal year 1947 contemplates appropriations of $\$ 3,724,752,000$ and new contract authorizations of $\$ 275,000,000$. In addition, provision is made for the transfer of $\$ 500,000,000$ from the "Naval stock fund" to the appropriation "Pay and subsistence of naval personnel." Three hundred million dollars of the proposed appropriation is for the liquidation of prior contract authorizations. Approximately 80 percent of the funds to be appropriated are for recurring maintenance and operation items.

The largest item, $\$ 1,615,297,000$, is for the pay, subsistence, and travel of naval personnel, which, together with funds for training and medical care of personnel, amounting to $\$ 137,766,000$, comprises 42 percent of the budget.

Maintenance and operation of the fleet, including repairs, equipage, supplies, and fuel for vessels, ordnance, and ordnance stores, freight charges, and upkeep of shore establishments supporting the fleet, account for $\$ 1,129,-$ 189,000 , or 27 percent of the budget.

There is provided for aviation $\$ 595,000,000$, representing 14 percent of the budget. In addition, contract authority in the amount of $\$ 275,000,000$ is proposed. The aviation program in the budget calls for the procurement of 1,359 improved aircraft for replacement purposes.

The Marine Corps estimates total $\$ 353,241,000$, or 8 percent of the total budget.

The estimates for shipbuilding in the amount of $\$ 300$,000,000 are for the liquidation of prior contract authorizations. They represent 7 percent of the total budget.

The remainder of the budget, totaling $\$ 94,259,000$ or 2 percent, consists of miscellaneous expenses, departmental salaries, and other small appropriations.

## OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY

The Navy Department is directed by the Secretary of the Navy, who has as his principal advisers the Under Secretary of the Navy; the Assistant Secretary of the Navy; the Assistant Secretary for Air; the Chief of Naval Operations; the chiefs of the seven bureaus; the Judge Advocate General; the Chairman of the General Board; the budget officer; and the Commandant, Marine Corps.

The Secretary of the Navy is responsible to the President for the general supervision and direction of all naval affairs and activities.

The Under Secretary of the Navy is responsible for setting the over-all policy of business administration. This responsibility includes general supervision of matters of organization, staffing, administrative procedures, the
utilization of personnel, materials and facilities, and the budgeting and expenditure of funds.

The Assistant Secretary of the Navy is responsible for that part of the administration of the Naval Establishment which relates to the promulgation of policies and general procedures governing the procurement and production of matériel and facilities; the determination of stock levels and replenishment requirements in collaboration with the Chief of Naval Operations; the administration of inventory control systems; and the correlation and programming of matériel research, experimental, test, and development activities.

The Assistant Secretary of the Navy for Air is responsible for the administration of all aeronautical matters for the Secretary, including the coordination of naval aeronautics with other governmental agencies. He is also responsible for all civilian personnel matters throughout the Naval Establishment setting the policy for industrial relations and determining the methods to be followed in the attaining of adequate personnel to discharge the functions assigned to the Navy Department and the Shore Establishment.

The Executive Office of the Secretary consists of a group of boards, offices and divisions reporting to the Secretary, Under Secretary, Assistant Secretary, and Assistant Secretary for Air. The principal organizations in this group are the Administrative Office, Office of Industrial Relations, the General Board, the Office of Budget and Reports, the Office of Research and Inventions, the Office of the Fiscal Director, the Office of General Counsel, the Office of Judge Advocate General, the Office of Public Information, and the Material Division.

## CHIEF OF NAVAL OPERATIONS

The Chief of Naval Operations is, by virtue of Executive Order 9635, the principal naval adviser to the President and to the Secretary of the Navy on the conduct of war, and principal naval adviser and military executive to the Secretary of the Navy on the conduct of the activities of the Naval Establishment. This officer has command of the operating forces and is responsible to the Secretary of the Navy for their use in war and for plans and preparations for their readiness for war. Under the direction of the Secretary of the Navy, he is charged with the preparation, readiness, and logistic support of the operating forces, and with the coordination and direction of effort to this end of the bureaus and offices of the Navy Department.

VICE CHIEF AND DEPUTY CHIEFS OF NAVAL OPERATIONS
In carrying out the responsibilities of the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations, there are a Vice Chief and six Deputy Chiefs of Naval Operations assigned specific phases of responsibility in the performance of the over-all task. The Vice Chief of Naval Operations is the assistant and principal adviser to the Chief of Naval Operations and succeeds to command in the absence of the Chief of Naval Operations.

## bureau of naval personnel

The Bureau of Naval Personnel is responsible for the procurement, education, training, welfare, discipline, promotion, and distribution of officers and enlisted personnel
of the Navy, including the Naval Reserve. It is charged with the upkeep, operation, and repair of the Naval Academy, postgraduate school, Naval War College, schools for the training of enlisted personnel, training stations, naval home, and naval prisons, and with the direction of receiving ships and stations.

## BUREAU OF YARDS AND DOCKS

The Bureau of Yards and Docks is charged with and responsible for the design, construction, alteration, and inspection of the public works and public utilities of the entire Naval Shore Establishment; and for the maintenance, repair, upkeep, and operation of the shore facilities assigned to its cognizance, both in the continental United States and in the advanced areas. It is charged with the acquisition of all real estate acquired or leased for naval purposes.

## BUREAU OF ORDNANCE

The function of the Bureau of Ordnance is to arm the Navy both offensively and defensively. It is charged with the design and procurement of arms, armament, and ammunition, including armor, torpedoes, mines, depth charges, rockets, and other weapons of war. Naval ordnance establishments ashore, such as torpedo stations, mine depots, and powder factories, are operated under its cognizance.

## BUREAU OF SHIPS

The Bureau of Ships has cognizance of the design; construction, or acquisition, maintenance, repair, and alteration of all naval ships and craft (except airships and aircraft) together with all their machinery, supplies and equipment except ordnance and aeronautical materials. This Bureau also has cognizance of the maintenance and operation of all naval shipyards, naval shore radio stations and certain laboratories for research, development, and test of material under its cognizance.

## BUREAU OF SUPPLIES AND ACCOUNTS

The Bureau of Supplies and Accounts is responsible for the procurement, custody, shipment, warehousing, and issue of all supplies, fuel, and other material used by the Navy, with the exception of medical, ordnance, and Marine Corps material. It maintains and operates naval supply depots; fuel plants; commissary activities; coffee roasting plants; the naval clothing factory; supply, accounting, and disbursing departments of other naval activities; and numerous specialized offices. This Bureau performs the disbursing function of the Navy; accounts for
its funds and property; and administers the funds required for the operation of its shore activities, the freight and fuel used by the Navy, and the clothing and subsistence of naval personnel.

## BUREAU OF MEDICINE AND SURGERY

This Bureau administers a medical department which provides medical care for the Navy and Marine Corps. The specific responsibility of this Bureau is the maintenance of the health of the Navy and the care of its sick and injured. It provides by careful physical examination for the selection of men of excellent health and physique for service in the Navy and Marine Corps and for the elimination of those unfitted by disease or injury for further active service. The mission of the Medical Department is to promote the efficiency of the Navy and Marine Corps through the maintenance of physical fitness.

## BUREAU OF AERONAUTICS

The mission of this Bureau is to equip the Navy and Marine Corps with aircraft of the maximum military performance, reliability and endurance. To accomplish this, the Bureau of Aeronautics has cognizance over the design, testing, procurement, production, maintenance, overhaul, and repair of both Navy and Marine Corps aircraft and related aeronautical material and equipment. All aeronautical shore establishments in the Navy and Marine Corps are under its technical control. All photographic supplies and equipment of the Navy and Marine Corps, with the exception of certain specialized items, are the responsibility of this Bureau, together with the financial support of all photographic activities. In cooperation with other agencies having to do with scientific research and development, experimental aeronautical work is carried on to insure continuing improvements in the naval air arm.

## headquarters, MARINE CORPS

The Marine Corps is an integral part of the Navy. While a component of the naval service existing primarily to "support the fleet," Marines have in times of naval emergency been detached for special service. It has four distinct tasks: (1) to maintain a mobile force in immediate readiness for use in operations involving shore objectives; (2) to maintain marine detachments as a part of the ship's crew on battleships, aircraft carriers, and cruisers; (3) to provide forces for the protection of American lives and property abroad; and (4) to provide garrisons for the safeguarding of Navy yards and naval stations in the United States and in outlying possessions.

## Miscellaneous Expenses, Navy-

For traveling expenses of civilian employees, including travel of dependents of employees to and from navy yards or stations outside the continental limits of the United States; expenses of attendance, at home and abroad, upon meetings of technical, professional, scientific, and other similar organizations when, in the judgment of the Secretary of the Navy (hereafter in this Act referred to as the Secretary), such attendance would be of benefit in the conduct of the work of the Navy Department; physical examinations by civilian physicians and in other than naval hospitals of civilian employees engaged in hazardous occupations; expenses of courts and boards; purchase of law and reference books; expenses of prisoners and prisons; clerical assistance; witnesses' fees and traveling expenses; promoting accident prevention and safety in shore establishments of the Navy, to be expended in the discretion of the Secretary; newspapers and periodicals for the naval service; all advertising of the Navy Department and its bureaus (except advertising for recruits for the Bureau of Naval Personnel); costs of suits; maintenance of attachés and others abroad, including office rental and pay of employees, and not to exceed $\$ 900$ for any one person for allowances for living quarters, including heat, fuel, and light, as authorized by the Act approved June 26, 1930 ( 5 U. S. C. 118a), and cost of living allowances in accordance with the Act approved February 23, 1931, as amended (22 U.S.C.12), and regulations prescribed thereunder, for all civilian officers and employees of the Navy Department who are citizens of the United States permanently stationed in foreign countries; expenses for special compensation and for travel and subsistence of officers and students of Latin American countries, and other expenses deemed necessary by the Secretary for Latin American cooperation; contingencies for the [Director] Chief of Naval Intelligence, to be expended in his discretion, not to exceed $\$ 2,000$; collection and classification of information pertaining to Naval Intelligence; telephone, telegraph, and teletype rentals and tolls (including not to exceed $\$ 300$ for extension telephones between the telephone switchboards at the official stations of naval officials and the living quarters of such officials), telegrams, radiograms, and cablegrams for the Navy Department and the naval service; postage, foreign and domestic and post-office box rentals; microphotographic services; necessary expenses for interned persons and prisoners of war under the jurisdiction of the Navy Department, including funeral expenses for such interned persons or prisoners of war as may die while under such jurisdiction; payment of claims for damages as provided in the Act approved July 11, 1919 (34 U. S. C. 600), and the Act approved July 3, 1944 ( $46 \mathrm{U} . \mathrm{S} . \mathrm{C} .797$ ), and for the payment of claims of civilian employees of the Naval Establishment as provided in the Act approved October 27, 1943 ( 34 U. S. C. 984 ), which have not been or may be eligible for payment under the provisions of the Act approved March 27, 1942 (15 U. S. ## pay and subsistence of naval personnel

Pay and Subsistence of Naval Personnel-
For pay and allowances and subsistence prescribed by law for naval personnel, including reserves on active duty-

Pay and allowances: Officers, active duty, no part of which shall be available for increased pay for making aerial flights, by more than [ninety-one】 one hundred and eighteen officers above the rank of captain nor by nonflying officers or observers at rates in excess of those prescribed by law for the Army, which shall be the legal maximum rates as to such nonflying officers or observers; midshipmen; officers, retired, inactive; enlisted personnel, active, including cash prizes for men for excellence in gunnery, target practice, communication, engineering competition and additional pay for duty as messmen; enlisted men, retired, inactive; men of the Fleet Reserve, inactive; nurses, female, active; nurses, female, retired, inactive; six months' death gratuity, officers, nurses, and enlisted personnel; cash allowances for uniforms for officers; clothing furnished annually to enlisted personnel and issued in kind to members of the Navy Nurse Corps, or cash in lieu thereof; civilian clothing, including an overcoat when necessary, the cost of all not to exceed $\$ 30$ per person to enlisted personnel given discharges for bad conduct, undesirability, unsuitability, or inaptitude; reimbursement in kind or in cash as authorized by law to persons in the naval service, for personal property lost, destroyed, or damaged; including reimbursement, under rules prescribed by the Secretary, of naval personnel who furnish from their personal stock subsistence and clothing to shipwrecked and destitute persons; purchase of medals, crosses, bars, emblems, and other insignia; miscellaneous items, including hire of quarters for officers serving with troops where sufficient quarters are not possessed by the United States to accommodate them; rent of quarters for members of the Nurse Corps; and hire of quarters for naval personnel, comparable to quarters assignable on a capital ship, as authorized by the Secretary to meet emergency conditions, including officers and men on sea duty at such times as they may be deprived of their quarters on board ship due to repairs or other conditions which may render them uninhabitable: Provided, That under this authorization no funds may be expended for the hire of quarters for occupancy by the dependents of officers or enlisted personnel; interest on deposits by enlisted personnel; losses
in the accounts of Navy[,] and Marine Corps[, and Coast Guard] officers certified under the Act of July 11, 1919 (31 U.S. C. 105), and the Act of June 10, 1921 (31 U. S. C. 104), and payments in settlement of claims under the Act of January 2, 1942 (31 U. S. C. 224d); total pay and allowances, [ $\$ 6,061,770,000] \$ 931,481,000$ : Provided, That, except for the public quarters occupied by the Chief of Naval Operations, the Superintendent of the Naval Academy, and the Commandant of the Marine Corps. and messes temporarily set up on shore for officers attached to seagoing vessels, aviation unitsbased on seagoing vessels (including officer's messes at naval air stations), submarine bases, overseas bases (including Alaska), mobile hospitals, landing forces and expeditions, and such bachelor officers' quarters and messes as may be specifically designated by the Secretary and, in addition, not to exceed three hundred in number at such other places as shall be designated by the Secretary, no appropriation contained in this Act shall be available for the pay, allowances, or other expenses of any enlistedman or civil employee performing service in the residence or quarters of an officer or officers on shore as a cook, waiter, or other work of a character performed by a household servant, but nothing herein shall be construed as preventing the voluntary employment in any such capacity of a retired enlisted man or a transferred member of the Fleet Reserve without additional expense to the Government, nor the sale of meals to officers by general messes on shore as regulated by detailed instructions from the Navy Department;

Subsistence: For provisions for messes, subsistence in messes, commuted rations, including commuted rations for enlisted personnel on leave at 65 cents per diem, and other subsistence in kind; midshipmen's rations at 85 cents per diem; subsistence in kind in hospital messes of female nurses, hospital corpsmen, and other enlisted personnel on duty in hospitals, active duty enlisted personnel, active and inactive retired enlisted personnel and members of the Fleet Reserve when sick and in hospitals, credited, when applicable, to the appropriation "Medical Department, Navy", at the rate of 80 cents per ration; subsistence of supernumeraries on naval vessels because of war conditions, including expenses heretofore incurred for such purpose; subsistence of Navy and Marine Corps general courts-martial prisoners undergoing imprisonment; money allowances for subsistence and quarters of enlisted personnel when not furnished quarters or subsistence in kind, and for enlisted personnel absent from messes on temporary duty not involving travel (during which time all other subsistence shall be stopped); total subsistence, [ $\$ 674,457,000]$ \$102,406,000;

In all, for pay and subsistence of naval personnel, [ $\$ 6,736,227,000] \$ 1,038,887,000$, and the money herein specifically appropriated for "Pay and subsistence, Navy", shall be disbursed and accounted for in accordance with existing law and shall constitute one fund: Provided, That [hereafter additional commissioned, warranted, appointed, enlisted, and civilian personnel of the Medical Department of the Navy, required for the care of patients of the United States Veterans Administration in naval hospitals, may be employed in addition to the numbers annually appropriated for: Provided further, That during the present emergency 1 until September 1, 1946, qualified enlisted men of the Navy, Naval Reserve, and Marine Corps may be appointed to the Naval Academy after nine months of service.

The Secretary of the Navy is hereby directed to transfer to this appropriation, at such time during the fiscal year 1947 as he may deem advisable, $\$ 500,000,000$ from the "Naval stock fund." (Act of May 29, 1945, Public Law 62.)

## Pay of the Navy, Deposit Fund-

That any enlisted man or appointed petty officer of the Navy may deposit his savings, in sums not less than $\$ 5$, with the paymaster upon whose books his account is borne; and he shall be furnished with a deposit book, in which the said paymaster shall note, over his signature, the amount, date, and place of such deposit. The money so deposited shall be accounted for in the same manner as other public funds, and shall pass to the credit of the appropriation for "Pay of the Navy", and shall not be subject to forfeiture by sentence of court-martial, but shall be forfeited by desertion, and shall not be permitted to be paid until final payment on discharge, or to the heirs or representatives of a deceased sailor, and that such deposit be exempt from liability for such sailor's debts: Provided, That the Government shall be liable for the amount deposited to the person so depositing the same.

[The Secretary of the Navy is authorized, in accordance with the provisions of the Act approved March 1, 1945 (Public Law 13), to enter into contracts for public-works equipment, materials, and construction, including collateral public-works items and the acquisition of land, in the amount of not to exceed $\$ 974,008,413$ and without regard to the provisions of section 3709, Revised Statutes: Provided, That $\$ 986,000,000$ of the foregoing appropriation and contractual authorization shall apply exclusively to advance base construction, material, and equipment authorized in such Act approved March 1, 1945 (Public Law 13), and $\$ 1,500,000$ for field house at United States Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland, including acquisition of land and accessories, as authorized by law. 1

## GENERAL PROVISIONS

Sec. 102. The appropriations made in this Act for the purchase or manufacture of equipment or material or of a particular class of equipment or material shall be available for the purchase of letters patent, applications for letters patent, and licenses under letters patent and applications for letters patent that pertain to such equipment or material for which the appropriations are made.

Sec. 103. No part of any appropriation made for the Navy shall be expended for any of the purposes herein provided for on account of the Navy Department at the seat of government, including personal services of civilians, except as expressly authorized by law.
[SEc. 104. Such number of enlisted personnel as may be approved by the Secretary may be detailed to duty in the Navy Department at the seat of government and Marime Corps and Coast Guard headquarters, excepting from such number, as far as practicable, enlisted personnel qualified for combat service. 7

Sec. [105] 104. No part of the appropriations made in this Act shall be available for the salary or pay of any officer, manager, superintendent, foreman, or other person or persons having charge of the work of any employee of the United States Government while making or causing to be made with a stop watch or other timemeasuring device a time study of any job of any such employee between the starting and completion thereof, or of the movements of any such employee while engaged upon such work; nor shall any part of the appropriations made in this Act be available to pay any premiums or bonus or cash reward to any employee in addition to his regular wages, except for suggestions resulting in improvements or economy in the operation of any Government plant; and no moneys herein appropriated for the Naval Establishment or made available therefor shall be used or expended under contracts hereafter made for the repair, purchase, or acquirement, by or from any private contractor, of any naval vessel, machinery, article, or articles that at the time of the proposed repair, purchase, or acquirement can be repaired, manufactured, or produced in each or any of the Government navy yards or arsenals of the United States, when time and facilities permit, and when, in the judgment of the Secretary, such repair, purchase, acquirement, or production would not involve an appreciable increase in cost to the Government, except when the repair, purchase, or acquirement, by or from any private contractor, would, in the opinion of the Secretary, be advantageous to the national defense.

SEC. [106] 105. No funds herein appropriated shall be available to pay a contractor upon any contract for a naval vessel entered into under authority of this Act unless, at the time of fling his bid, he shall also file the estimates upon which such bid was based.

Sec. [107] 106. The appropriations available to the Navy Department and the naval service shall be available for the pay and other expenses of men inducted into the Navy[,] and Marine Corps [, and Coast Guard in accordance with law.
[SEC. 108. No part of any appropriation contained in this Act shall be used directly or indirectly, except for temporary employment $m$ case of emergency, for the payment of any civilian for services rendered by him on the Canal Zone while occupying a skilled, technical, clerical, administrative, executive, or supervisory position unless such person is a citizen of theUnited States of America or of the Republic of Panama: Provided, however, (1) That, notwithstanding the provision in the Act approved August 11, 1939 (53 Stat. 1409), limiting employment in the above-mentioned positions to citizens of the United States from and after the date of the approval of said Act, citizens of Panama may be employed in such positions; (2) that at no time shall the number of Panamanian citizens employed in the above-mentioned positions exceed the number of citizens of the United States so employed, if United States citizens are available in continental United States or on the Canal Zone; (3) that nothing in this Act shall prohibit the continued employment of any person who shall have rendered fifteen or more years of faithful and honorable service on the Canal Zone; (4) that in the selection of personnel for skilled, technical, administrative, clerical, supervisory, or executive positions, the controlling factors in filling these positions shall be efficiency, experience, training, and education; (5) that all citizens of Panama and the United States rendering skilled, technical, clerical, administrative, executive, or supervisory service on the Canal Zone under the terms of this Act (a) shall normally be employed not more than forty hours per week; (b) may receive as compensation equal rates of pay based upon
rates paid for similar employment in continental United States plus 25 per centum; (6) this entire section shall apply only to persons employed in skilled, technical, clerical, administrative, executive, or supervisory positions on the Canal Zone directly or indirectly by any branch of the United States Government or by any corporation or company whose stock is owned wholly or in part by the United States Government: Provided further, That the President may suspend, from time to time in whole or in part, compliance with this section in time of war or national emergency if he should deem such course to be in the public interest. 1

SEc. [109] 107. The Secretary is authorized where necessary to exceed the statutory limit on repairs and alterations to vessels during the fiscal year [1946] 1947.

LSEc. 110. During the fiscal year 1946 all retired officers and enlisted men of the Navy and Marine Corps shall, when on active duty, receive full pay and allowances. 1

SEC. [111] 108. No part of any appropriation contained in this Act shail be used to pay the salary or wages of any person who advocates, or who is a member of an organization that advocates, the overthrow of the Government of the United States by force or violence: Provided, That for the purposes hereof an affidavit shall be considered prima facie evidence that the person making the affidavit does not advocate, and is not a member of an organization that advocates, the overthrow of the Government of the United States by force or violence: Provided further, That any person who advocates, or who is a member of an organization that advocates, the overthrow of the Government of the United States by force or violence and accepts employment the salary or wages for which are paid from any appropriation in this Act shall be guilty of a felony and, upon conviction, shall be fined not more than $\$ 1,000$ or imprisoned for not more than one year, or both: Provided further, That the above penalty clause shall be in addition to, and not in substitution for, any other provisions of existing law.

Sec. [112] 109. No part of any money appropriated herein or included under any contract authority herein granted shall be expended for the payment of any commission on any land purchase contract in excess of 2 per centum of the purchase price.
[SEC. 113. The Secretary is authorized to employ additional civil personnel in the Navy Department at the seat of government, and to provide out of any appropriations available for the Naval Establishment for their salaries: Provided, That the average number of all civil personnel in the Navy Department at the seat of government, excluding the Marine Corps and the Coast Guard, shall not exceed seventeen thousand. 1

Sec. [114] 110. The appropriations for the Naval Estabish ment for the fiscal year [1946] 1947 shall be available for providing transportation of naval and civilian personnel between their domiciles and places of employment as authorized by law; carrying out the provisions of Executive Order Numbered 9112 of March 26, 1942, Public Law 395, approved July 1, 1944, Public Law 119, approved July 2, 1945, Public Law 277, approved December 28, 1945, and Public Law 457, approved October 3, 1944; services of employees assigned to group IV (b) and those performing similar services carried under native and alien schedules in the Schedule of Wages for Civil Employees in the field service of the Navy Department; [payment of employment at the seat of government or elsewhere for a period not to exceed the duration of the war of such specizlists as may be contracted for by the Secretary, at a rate of pay not exceeding $\$ 25$ per diem for any person so employed (no appropriation for the Navy Department or the Naval Establishment shall be available during the fiscal year 1946, except funds transferred or made available to other executive agencies for use for naval purposes, for the employment of persons for the performance of service in other than the Navy Department or elsewhere than under the Navy Department, except (1) employees who had been employed by and performing service under the Navy Department for three months or more immediately prior to their detail for service elsewhere and (2) employees now or hereafter detailed and assigned pursuant to the lawful authority of the Secretary of the Navy to any committee of the Congress operating under resolution duly authorizing such assignment); I accident prevention programs and for safety engineering and occupational health measures; [payment, upon approval of the Secretary, of claims, not in excess of $\$ 1,000$ in any one case, for causes other than personal injury or death, resulting from the administration or operation of the naval service during the existing national emergency and not cognizable under other law; pay of commissioned medical officers who are graduates of reputable schools of osteopathy;1 actual and necessary expenses or per diem in lieu thereof, as may be determined and approved by the Secretary, of civilian personnel in and under the Naval Establishment on special duty in foreign countries; expenses authorized in Public Law 99, approved June 29, 1943; expenses including those heretofore incurred in connection with the administration by the Navy of occupied areas; expenses including those heretofore incurred incident to the
operation by the Navy of private plants taken over at the direction of the President, and the Secretary may designate any naval appropriation to be charged with such expenses, proper adjustments to be made on the basis of final costs between applicable appropriations; and payment of rewards to civilian officers or employees and other persons in civil life for suggestions resulting in improvement or economy in manufacturing process or plant or naval material as authorized by the Act of July 1, 1918 ( 5 U. S. C. 416), and for suggestions resulting in efficiency or economy in the operation or administration of the Navy Department and the Naval Establishment.
[SEc. 115. Appropriations in this Act for pay of personnel shall be available, in lieu of the appropriation "Foreign Service Pay Adjustment", contained in the Independent Offices Appropriation Act, for payments to authorized naval and civilian personnel in and under the Naval Establishment due to the appreciation of foreign currencies, as provided by the Act of March 26, 1934, as amended ( $5 \mathrm{U} . \mathrm{S}$. C. 118c), and for every object and purpose specified therein. $]$

Sec. [116] 111. Appropriations available [for the fiscal year $1946]$ for travel expenses of civilian [inspectors] employees of the Navy Department shall be available for reimbursement, at not to exceed [3] 5 cents per mile, for travel performed by such employees in privately owned automobiles within the limits of their official stations and for their reimbursement for ferry, bridge, road, and tunnel tolls paid.

Sec. [117] 112. Funds available for heat and light for public quarters occupied by personnel of the Navy[,] and Marine Corps[. and Coast Guard] for the fiscal year [1946]'1947 shall be available for furnishing water and for operating mechanical refrigerators in such quarters.

Sec. [118] 113. Appropriations in this Act shall be available for the pay of missing or captured civilian or naval personnel under the provisions of Public Law 490, approved March 7, 1942, as amended, and for that which accrued during fiscal year [1945] 1946 or prior years and was not paid, including accruals of pay authorized by law for retired and Reserve officers, nurses, enlisted personnel, and family allowances.
[SEC. 119. The authority contained in section 103 of the Second Supplemental National Defense Appropriation Act, 1943, is hereby extended to and made applicable to the appropriations for the naval service made subsequent to such Act and contained in this Act without any increase in the amount limitation fixed in such section: Provided, That "information and services" authorized to be rendered by the Act of March 11, 1941 (Public 11), need not be connected with the procurement or disposition of any defense article. $]$
[Sec. 120. For the fiscal year 1946 occupancy of emergency housing facilities under the jurisdiction of the Navy Department or the National Housing Agency, on a rental basis, by personnel of the services mentioned in the title of the Pay Readjustment Act of 1942, or by their dependents, shall not deprive such personnel of money allowances for rental of quarters. 1
[The appropriations of the Naval Establishment for the fiscal year 1946 shall be available for traveling expenses (including subsistence while awaiting transportation at west coast ports) in connection with the recruitment and placement of civilian personnel for naval facilities at Pearl Harbor and in the States of Washington, Oregon, California, Nevada, Utah, Nebraska, and Oklahoma.]

SEC. 114. Whenever, during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1947, the Secretary should deem it to be advantageous to the national defense, and if in his opinion the existing facilities of the Navy Department are inadequate, he is hereby authorized to employ, by contract or otherwise, without reference to section 3709, Revised Statutes, civil service or classification laws, or section 5 of the Act of April 6, 1914 ( 38 Stat. 335), and at such rates of compensation (not to exceed $\$ 40$ per day, and travel expenses, including actual transportation and per diem in lieu of subsistence while traveling from their homes or places of business to official duty station and return as may be authorized in travel orders or letters of appointment for individuals) as he may determine, the services of architects, engineers, and other technical and professional personnel, or firms or corporations thereof, as may be necessary.

SEC. 115. The Secretary is authorized to delegate to subordinate officials the power to employ persons in the departmental service of the Navy Department, wherever located.

SEC. 116. The Secretary may delegate to such officials as he shall designate the function of authorizing payment of the expenses of the transfer of household goods of employees, and of the cost of trarspor tation of their immediate families, on change from one official duty station to another

SEc. 117. Provisions of law prohibiting the payment of compensation to any person not a citizen of the United States shall not apply to personnel under the Naval Establishment during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1947.

SEC. 118. The appropriations for the Navy Department and the naval service for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1947, shall be available for expenses in connection with the transfer to the United States of foreign vessels, including pay, subsistence, transportation, and repatriation of alien crews, and such expenses incident to tests of the atomic bomb as the Secretary may deem necessary.

SEC. 119. The Secretary, with the approval of the Director of the Bureau of the Budget, may transfer not to exceed 10 per centum of any of the foregoing appropriations to any other of such appropriation or appropriations, but no appropriation shall be increased more than 10 per centum as a result of such transfers.

## EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

## COAST GUARD

The Coast Guard constitutes a branch of the land and naval forces of the United States, and in time of war or national emergency, when directed by the President, operates as part of the Navy. Executive Order 9666, dated December 28, 1945, returned the Coast Guard from the Navy to the Treasury Department as of January 1, 1946, with the provision that for such period as may be mutually agreeable to the Secretaries of the Treasury and the Navy, such Coast Guard facilities and personnel as may be agreed upon shall continue to operate under the control of the

Navy. The principal functions now remaining under the operational control of the Navy are air-sea rescue, midocean weather stations, and air-sea navigational aids. It is expected that the Coast Guard will regain control of all its facilities and personnel by June 30, 1946. In addition to the air-sea rescue function and the maintenance of midocean weather stations and air-sea navigational aids, the peacetime activities of the Coast Guard embrace maritime law enforcement, safeguarding navigation on the high seas and navigable waters of the United States, saving and protecting life and property, inspection of merchant vessels, and disciplinary control of merchant-marine personnel.

## EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

## General Statement

The War Department is charged with the responsibility of organizing, equipping, training, and maintaining the Army, and certain nonmilitary activities, under conditions prescribed by Congress. The Army of the United States consists of the following elements: the Regular Army, the National Guard of the United States, the National Guard while in the service of the United States, the Officers' Reserve Corps, the Organized Reserves, and the Enlisted Reserve Corps. These components in time of peace constitute the framework on which to build the military organization required in time of war. The following text gives a brief review of the fiscal year 1946 financial program, a statement of the military budget program for the fiscal year 1947, and concludes with a brief discussion of the organization of the War Department.

## Fiscal Year 1946

The War Department budget estimates for fiscal year 1946 were submitted to the Congress just after VE-day. While it was then known that unless some wholly unforeseen condition or event should occur, the defeat of Japan was assured, it was not known how long it would take to finally achieve ultimate victory. That year saw the final defeat of Japan, the undertaking of grave duties of military occupation, and the substantial demobilization of the greatest fighting force ever assembled by the United States. From a peak wartime strength of more than 8 million efficiently trained soldiers, the Army will be reduced to $1,550,000$ on July 1, 1946, and will further decrease to $1,070,000$ by June 30, 1947. The personnel which will compose our Army during fiscal year 1947 will be largely inexperienced and this inexperience will require the Army to emphasize training of personnel in order to carry out the Army's remaining highly important missions.

The events of this last year have had a significant effect upon the original financial program of the War Department for fiscal year 1946. Based upon world conditions of a year ago, the Congress authorized the War Department to incur new obligations totaling $\$ 38,560,904,581$ during fiscal year 1946. At that time there were outstanding contracts and orders for equipment, supplies, and services amounting to $\$ 25,195,490,795$. This amount when added to the new authorization of $\$ 38,560,904,581$, gave the War Department a total unexpended balance on July 1, 1945, of $\$ 63,756,395,376$. The new authorization for fiscal year 1946, however, carried an appropriation of only $\$ 21,496,902,030$ of new funds, the balance being approximately equally provided by the reappropriation of unobligated balances existing on July 1, 1945, and the anticipated recovery of funds through the cancellation of previously incurred obligations.

The budget estimates for fiscal year 1947 indicate that new obligations for the fiscal year 1946 will total $\$ 19,913$,271,921 as compared with the original authorization of $\$ 38,560,904,581$. Additional reimbursements to the War Department and a more firm estimate of additional recoveries of funds obligated before the cessation of hostilities will provide further savings of approximately $\$ 1.5$ billion by June 30, 1946. Of the unexpended balance of $\$ 63.8$ billion on July 1, 1945, a total of approximately $\$ 33$ billion has been returned to the Treasury under the provisions of the surplus appropriation rescission acts or will be recommended for return to the Treasury by June 30, 1946.

It is presently estimated that obligations outstanding will have been reduced from $\$ 25.2$ billion on June 30, 1945, to approximately $\$ 3$ billion by June 30, 1946.

## Military Budget Program, Fiscal Year 1947

The War Department estimates for the fiscal year 1947 contemplate the appropriation of $\$ 7,246,335,200$. This amount is to be compared with the original authorization of $\$ 38.6$ billion for fiscal year 1946, $\$ 48.2$ billion for 1945 , $\$ 74.2$ billion for 1944 , and $\$ 75.2$ billion for 1943 .

The War Department budget estimates for fiscal year 1947 have been designed to provide for:
(a) operation of the military activities of the War Department;
(b) operation, training, and maintenance of the military forces in the United States and overseas;
(c) maintenance of required command installations and Army facilities on a scale commensurate with present and projected usage;
(d) procurement to the extent necessary to maintain the required flow of essential equipment and supplies;
(e) maintenance in stand-by of those Government-owned industrial facilities approved for retention as reserve capacity; and
( $f$ ) construction at posts, camps, and stations to supplement existing structures and facilities, which is necessary in the interests of health, safety, training, research, or to relieve housing shortages.

For personnel planning purposes and operating and maintenance costs, the budget estimates provide for a man-year strength of the Army of 1,279,000 during fiscal year 1947. A terminal strength of $1,070,000$ on June 30 , 1947, is planned. Of the total man-year strength it is estimated that 683,000 will be overseas during fiscal year 1947 and 596,000 will be in the United States. Personnel assigned to the Army Air Forces will total 400,000 on July 1, 1946, and will remain at that strength through the fiscal year. The average strength of the Army of 1,279,000 man-years is considered to be the minimum necessary to perform the Army's mission during the fiscal year.

The War Department budget estimates for fiscal year 1947 may be divided along functional lines approximately as follows:

It is estimated that the minimum essential items to enable the maintenance of an Army of $1,279,000$ man-years will require the obligation of $\$ 5,091,987,154$. Included in this minimum essential category are pay, food, clothing, medical care, and minimum operating and maintenance expenses. It would not provide for research, construction, new equipment, the activation of civilian components, the atomic energy project, or for government and relief in occupied areas.

In addition, funds are requested for construction of overseas bases, research and development, maintenance of certain Government-owned industrial plants in stand-by reserve capacity, reclamation and storage of munitions, procurement of markedly superior type items in limited quantities, the activation of the National Guard, Organized Reserves, and Reserve Officers' Training Corps, conversion of post facilities to public quarters, care and handling of surplus property in the United States, and new construction projects to provide minimum essential school and other training facilities, reserve storage facilities, lengthening of runways to accommodate new and heavier types of aircraft, removal of flying hazards, essential high priority research and development facilities, and certain
health and safety projects. Several of these categories of expenses are further explained below.

Funds are included in the estimate for the continuation of the program of construction at permanent overseas bases. General locations of these bases will be in Alaska, the Marianas, the Philippines, Hawaii, and on Okinawa. The program contemplates the construction of housing and permanent facilities at various stations where military personnel will be garrisoned. The funds which are requested for fiscal year 1947 represent but a part of the total project to construct these bases. This program will be initiated during the fiscal year 1946.

To implement the policy of maintaining the high standard and superiority of weapons and equipment, and to guarantee the availability of proven types superior to those of other nations, funds in the total amount of $\$ 281,500,000$ are requested for research and development during fiscal year 1947. Research by the Air Forces represents $\$ 185,500,000$ of this total.

Approximately $\$ 43$ million is requested to enable the placing and maintenance in reserve capacity of certain Government-owned industrial plants to provide the means for immediate production of military equipment and munitions of war in the event of an emergency. The plants which will be maintained in this stand-by reserve capacity are of the type required to produce ammunition, artillery, small arms, tanks, chemical agents, impregnation matériel, quartermaster equipage, and air-frame and engine parts.

To adequately preserve and properly store equipment and munitions of war which are now on hand it is estimated that a total of approximately $\$ 110$ million will be required during fiscal year 1947. The original cost of the items to be preserved and stored runs into several billions of dollars. Large quantities of ammunition are involved which will require very careful preparation for storage.

In addition to the procurement of the basic supplies essential to the operation and maintenance of the Army it is considered highly important that obsolete items of equipment be replaced to a limited extent by newly developed items which are markedly superior to those now in use. The minimum requirement to achieve this objective totals $\$ 410,776,000$. The procurement of approximately 1,046 of the most modern aircraft of all types from very heavy bombers and jet fighters to liaison planes and metal gliders, spare engines and parts, and airport communications equipment will require approximately $\$ 388$ million of this total.

Assuming that the activation of the National Guard of the several States, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, and the District of Columbia, will occur during fiscal year 1947, it is estimated that $\$ 110$ million will be required for National Guard activities during the fiscal year. This estimate contemplates that the strength of the National Guard on June 30,1947 , will be 240,000 , which is slightly less than 40 percent of the total troop basis of 622,510 , in 6,256 units, including the Air National Guard of 47,646 in 363 units.

It is estimated that $\$ 72,782,000$ will be required during fiscal year 1947 for the formation and administration of the Organized Reserve and the Reserve Officers' Training Corps. The Organized Reserve objective is 331,903 officers and 721,800 enlisted men. The expected enrollment in the Reserve Officers' Training Corps is 157,100 students at institutions, 45,000 at camps, and 15,000 at schools and colleges operating under section 55 c of the National Defense Act.

One of the most apparent and pressing requirements for the peacetime Army establishment is the provision of
family quarters at Army posts. It is estimated that a total of 82,080 units are required to meet the military housing requirements of the postwar Army. By conversion of post facilities (barracks) to family quarters, it is estimated that approximately 10,000 family units can be provided. Another 2,400 units will be provided by new construction, all of which will be in keeping with the announced policy of the Federal Government to provide the greatest number of low cost housing units as soon as possible to meet the present critical housing condition in our Nation. It is estimated that approximately $\$ 113,-$ 000,000 will be used for all construction projects in the United States, including housing, during fiscal year 1947.

Only a minimum amount is being provided for the rehabilitation of structures to bring them to peacetime standards of maintenance. Throughout the war, maintenance was drastically curtailed and standards reduced. Due to this fact, there has accumulated a large backlog of necessary maintenance on both permanent and mobilization type structures and utilities on posts, camps, and stations to be retained in the postwar period. The items to be covered this next fiscal year are only those which are necessary for health and safety or which will represent a saving due to the fact that they will pay for themselves in 1 year or less.

Following cessation of hostilities, the United States assumed certain military occupation responsibilities in Germany, Austria, Japan, Korea, and, to a lesser extent, in the northeast corner of Italy. In the zones assigned to it in Germany, Austria, and Korea, and in all of Japan and its outlying islands, the United States Army will be responsible for occupational duties which include most governmental functions. The War Department has been charged by the President with the initial financing of the procurement for the supplies needed to bring feeding, medical care, and transportation up to certain minimum standards which will prevent disease and general unrest, thereby avoiding unnecessary friction between local populations and occupying forces. Accordingly, for fiscal year 1947, fund requirements of $\$ 500$ million for "Government and relief in occupied areas" is presented as a separate appropriation to accomplish these occupation mis sions. The principal item in this estimate is $\$ 300$ million for foodstuffs.

A separate appropriation of $\$ 200$ million is requested to meet the cost of the atomic energy project.

## Organization

Executive Order 9722, May 13, 1946, which amends Executive Order 9082, dated February 28, 1942, authorizes a reorganization of the War Department and the Army effective June 11, 1946. The following is a summary description of the new organization:

## OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY OF WAR

Secretary of War.-The Secretary of War is head of the Department and performs such duties as are required of him by law or which are assigned to him by the President. He is charged specifically with the supervision of all estimates of appropriations for the expenses of the Department, including the Military Establishment; with the application of national scientific resources to the solution of military problems; with the procurement of all military supplies and related matters, including adequate provision for the mobilization of matériel and industrial facilities essential to wartime needs; with all expenditures for the support, tranportation, and maintenance of the Army; and with such expenditures of a civil nature as may be
placed under his direction by Congress. The Secretary is responsible for the proper execution of the provisions of the National Defense Act of 1920, as amended; for the protection of seacoast harbors and cities; for the development of improved weapons and matériel; for proper instruction of all military personnel; and for the discipline and morale of the Military Establishment. He directs the civil functions of the Corps of Engineers, which include development of navigable waterways, flood control, power, and irrigation. Among his other responsibilities are the defense, maintenance, and operation of the Panama Canal, and supervision of the United States Military Academy at West Point, N. Y.

Under Secretary of War.-The Under Secretary of War performs such duties and responsibilities as may be delegated to him by the Secretary of War. Such assignments now include the duties and responsibilities placed upon the Secretary of War by section 5a of the National Defense Act, as amended, pertaining to the mobilization of matériel and industrial organizations essential to wartime needs; coordination and direction over procurement and related matters of the Army Air Forces and the Chiefs of Technical Services, and coordination of these War Department functions with other agencies involved in the allocation of matériel or industrial facilities to various uses. Assistant Secretary of War.-The Assistant Secretary of War assists the Secretary of War and performs general administrative duties.

Assistant Secretary of War for Air.-The Assistant Secretary of War for Air is charged with the supervision of matters pertaining to the Army Air Forces and performs such other duties as are assigned to him by the Secretary of War.

Administrative Assistant.-The Administrative Assistant is chief executive officer of the Department, advises the Secretary on matters of administrative policy, and acts for him on official administrative matters not requiring his personal attention.

## THE CHIEF OF STAFF

The Chief of Staff is the principal military adviser to the President and to the Secretary of War on the conduct of war and the principal military adviser and executive to the Secretary of War on the activities of the Military Establishment. The Chief of Staff has command of all components of the Army of the United States and of the operating forces comprising the Army Ground Forces, the Army Air Forces, the army areas, overseas departments, task forces, base commands, defense commands, commands in theaters of operations, and all other commands, and the related supply and service establishments of the Army, and is responsible to the Secretary of War for their use in war and plans and preparations for their readiness for war. The Chief of Staff, under the direction of the Secretary of War, is responsible for the coordination and direction of the War Department General and Special Staffs and the administrative and technical services.

## DEPUTY CHIEF OF STAFF

The Deputy Chief of Staff assists the Chief of Staff by the supervision of general and special staff activities, and acts for the Chief of Staff in the latter's absence. He is charged with the establishment of policies and the supervision and approval of budgetary and legislative matters, and determines questions of programs and administrative procedure for the War Department and the Army. The Deputy Chief of Staff supervises the 6 General Staff

Divisions, each of which is under the immediate control of a Director. He also supervises the 10 divisions comprising the War Department Special Staff discussed below.
Chief of Public Information.-The Chief of Public Information advises the Secretary of War and the Chief of Staff on matters of policy relating to public relations and information, and coordinates the operations of the Public Relations Division, the Legislative and Liaison Division, and the Information and Education Division, War Department Special Staff.

## WAR DEPARTMENT GENERAL STAFF

The War Department General Staff, under the direction of the Chief of Staff, is responsible for the development of the Army and insures the existence of a well-balanced and efficient military team. It is specifically charged with the duty of providing such broad basic policies and plans as will enable the Commanding Generals of the Army Ground Forces, the Army Air Forces, task forces, theaters of operations, overseas commands, and such other commands as may be established, and the heads of the administrative and technical services, to prepare and execute detailed programs. In addition, the General Staff assists the Chief of Staff by issuing in the name of the Secretary of War and the Chief of Staff, necessary directives to implement such plans and policies and supervises the execution of these directives. In performing its duties, the General Staff follows the principle of decentralization to the fullest degree.
The Divisions of the War Department General Staff are as follows:

Personnel and Administrative Division.-This division is charged with duties which relate to the personnel of the Army as individuals.
Military Intelligence Division.-The duties of this division relate in general to the collection, evaluation, and dissemination of military information.
Organization and Training Division.-This division is charged with duties which relate to the mobilization, training, and organization of the military forces.
Service, Supply, and Procurement Division.-This division is charged with duties which relate to supply of the Army.
Plans and Operations Division.-The Plans and Operations Division is charged in general with duties relating to the formulation of operational plans and the strategic direction of the military forces in the theaters of war.
Research and Development Division.-The Research and Development Division is charged in general with duties relating to the application of national scientific resources to the solution of military problems; the initiation, allocation, coordination, and progress of research and development programs; and the expeditious demonstration of new or improved weapons, military equipment, and techniques of their employment to the using services.

## WAR DEPARTMENT SPECIAL STAFF

Budget Division.-This division prepares plans, develops foreign and domestic financial policies, and, by authorization of the Secretary of War and under the direction of the Chief of Staff, exercises general supervision and control over the budget of the War Department. It determines the language of proposed appropriation acts, supervises the expenditure of appropriated funds, and maintains budgetary and fiscal relationships with the Bureau of the Budget, the Congress, and other Govern-
ment agencies. The Chief of the Budget Division is also the Budget Officer for the War Department and chairman of the Budget Advisory Committee.

Civil Affairs Division.-This division advises the Secretary of War on civil affairs in areas occupied as a result of military operations and also maintains liaison with civilian agencies exercising functions in any military theater of operation.

The Inspector General.-The Inspector General keeps the Secretary of War and the Chief of Staff informed as to the state of the Army, and makes such inspections, investigations, and reports as may be prescribed by law or directed by the Secretary of War or Chief of Staff, or requested by the commanding generals of the Army Air Forces or Army Ground Forces.

Legislative and Liaison Division.-The responsibilities and functions of this division fall into three general categories: (1) supervision of the preparation and processing of legislation pertaining to the War Department; (2) congressional liaison; (3) liaison between the War Department and various Federal agencies.

War Department Manpower Board.-The function of this board is to make a continuous survey of the use of manpower, both military and civilian, under the jurisdiction of the War Department and within the continental United States, and such overseas theaters as may be specifically designated from time to time by the Chief of Staff, and to recommend measures to the Chief of Staff for the most effective and economical utilization of all personnel.

National Guard Bureau.-This Bureau initiates and coordinates plans, procedures, regulations, and laws; administers funds and maintains records affecting the National Guard and the State Guard.

Executive for Reserve and ROTC Affairs.-The Executive for Reserve and ROTC Affairs advises the Secretary of War on all matters affecting the Reserve components and the ROTC, and reviews or initiates action on all matters affecting these organizations or their members.

Historical Division.--The Chief, Historical Division, War Department Special Staff, is responsible for preparing plans and policies for, and exercising supervision and direction over, War Department and Army historical activities other than current reports.

Public Relations Division.-The Chief, Public Relations Division, War Department Special Staff, coordinates, processes, and releases all War Department announcements of public interest, including photographs and motion pictures, to news-gathering agencies, radio stations and networks, film producers, and other public and private organizations in the field of public information; supervises War Department contacts with these agencies; and assists outside writers by gathering material and arranging interviews with officials within and outside the War Department.

Information and Education Division.--The Chief, Information and Education Division, War Department Special Staff, is charged with developing basic plans and policies for and supervision of information and education activities for military personnel.

## ARMY AIR FORCES

The Commanding General, Army Air Forces, is charged with the functions, responsibilities, and authorities of command over individuals and units assigned to the Army Air Forces. The mission of the Army Air Forces is to procure and maintain equipment peculiar to the Army Air Forces and to provide Air Forces units properly organ-
ized, trained, and equipped for combat operations. The Army Air Forces operates replacement training centers and schools, including officer candidate schools, for the training of personnel in pilot functions and specialized nonpilot functions of combat and ground crews, and in all duties involving the supply and maintenance of aeronautical matériel.

The Commanding General, Army Air Forces, is also charged with the organization and training of Air Forces tactical and service units and task forces; with developing tactics and training methods, and tables of organization; and with reviewing military characteristics of aircraft, weapons, and equipment, and operational changes needed in aircraft weapons, and equipment.

The Army Air Forces also has responsibility for supplying personnel and equipment peculiar to the Army Air Forces to the Army Ground Forces, theaters of operations, and overseas forces in accordance with policies announced by the Chief of Staff. The Army Air Forces submits recommendations to the War Department General Staff with respect to construction, training aids, supply, equipment not peculiar to the Army Air Forces alone, and similar matters.

The Commanding General, Army Air Forces, commands and controls Army Air Forces operations, stations, and bases not assigned to the theater commanders, including a world-wide air transport service and related facilities.

## ARMY GROUND FORCES

The Commanding General, Army Ground Forces, commands the six armies within the continental United States and is charged with the functions, responsibilities, and authorities of command authorized by law, Army Regulations, and custom over individuals and units assigned to the Army Ground Forces.

The Commanding General, Army Ground Forces, is responsible for the operations of Replacement Training Centers and Army Ground Forces schools; and the training and organization of such armies, task forces, or units as are assigned by the Chief of Staff. He reviews military characteristics of weapons and equipment, recommends operational changes needed for the Infantry, Cavalry, Coast Artillery, Field Artillery, and other specialized combat units; is responsible for supplying Infantry, Field Artillery, Coast Artillery, and Cavalry personnel to theaters of operations, and overseas forces; and submits recommendations on construction, training aids, supply, equipment, and similar matters to the War Department General Staff.

Army Areas.-The Commanding General of each of the armies within the continental United States and of the Military District of Washington commands all units, posts, camps, stations, and installations within the Army areas or the Military District of Washington, except exempted installations and stations, and except units, posts, camps, stations, or installations commanded by the Army Air Forces. The Commanding General of each of the armies is responsible for the operations, training, administration, services, and supply of all units, posts, camps, stations, and installations of his command.

## TECHNICAL STAFFS AND SERVICES

Medical Department.-The Surgeon General has administrative control of the Medical Department, which advises on all medical and sanitary affairs of the Army, and includes the Medical Corps, the Dental Corps, the Veterinary Corps, the Medical Administrative Corps, and the Army Nurse Corps.

Corps of Engineers.-The Chief of Engineers is responsible for all Army construction; the reproduction and distribution of military maps; the development, procurement, and storage of certain types of military equipment; and with the supervision of investigation and improvements for navigation, flood control, and power development on rivers and harbors.

Signal Corps.-The Chief Signal Officer is charged with the development, procurement, storage, and repair of signal equipment and supplies; coordination of communications operations of the Army; maintenance of all communications; and administration of the training film program under the Army's training directives.

Quartermaster Corps.-The Quartermaster General is charged with providing food and clothing for the Army and is responsible for the procurement, storage, and issue of all supplies common to two or more branches, not otherwise assigned.

Ordnance Department.--The Chief of Ordnance is responsible for the design, procurement, storage, supply, and maintenance of munitions and combat vehicles for the Army.

Chemical Warfare Service.-The Chief of the Chemical Warfare Service is responsible for investigation, development, manufacture, procurement, and supply to the Army of all smoke and incendiary materials, toxic gases, and gas defense appliances, together with the training of the Army in offensive and defensive chemical warfare.

Transportation Corps.-The Chief of Transportation is charged with the responsibility for all War Department surface traffic, inland and overseas; with all shipping overseas; and with all inland movements and supplies moving by commercial means in the continental United States.
Finance Department.-The Chief of Finance is responsible for matters pertaining to the accounting, auditing, and disbursement of War Department funds.

## ADMINISTRATIVE STAFFS AND SERVICES

Judge Advocate General's Department.-The Judge Advocate General advises on legal phases of military administration, including disciplinary action, the rights of personnel of the Army, and the legal aspects of financial, contractual, and other business affairs of the War Department.

Office of the Adjutant General.-The Adjutant General has responsibility for War Department records of, and communications to, Army troops and individuals; the issuance of all orders, instructions, and regulations; and the supervision of Army recruiting.

Office of the Provost Marshal General.--The Provost Marshal General is responsible for the establishment and training of the Corps of Military Police; supervising the detention, care, feeding, and housing of prisoners of war; and directing the internal security program of the War Department.

Special Services Division.-The Chief of the Special Services Division formulates policies and procedures for efficient operation and administration of the Army Exchange Service, Army Motion Picture Service, and athletic and recreational activities.

Office of the Chief of Chaplains.-The Chief of Cbaplains directs matters pertaining to moral and religious welfare of military personnel and supervises the Chaplain school.

## United states military academy

The United States Military Academy is located at West Point, N. Y. Besides a general education, the cadets receive theoretical and practical training as junior officers, and those who complete the course satisfactorily graduate with the rank of second lieutenant in the Regular Army.

No payment shall be made from money appropristed in this Act to any officer on the retired list of the Army who, for himself or for others, is engaged in the selling of, contracting for the sale of, or negotiating for the sale of, to the Army or the War Department, any war materials or supplies;

No appropriation for the pay of the Army shall be available for the pay of any officer or enlisted man on the active list of the Army who is engaged in any manner with any publication which is or may be issued by or for any branch or organization of the Army or military association in which officers or enlisted men have membership and which carries paid advertising of firms doing business with the War Department: Provided, however, That nothing herein contained shall be construed to prohibit officers from writing or disseminating articles in accordance with regulations issued by the Secretary of War; (Act of July 3, 1945, Public Law 126.)

Travel of the Army: For travel allowances and travel in kind, as authorized by law, for persons traveling in connection with the military activities of the War Department, including mileage, transportation, reimbursement of actual expenses, or per diem allowances, to officers, contract surgeons, and others whose rank, pay and allowances are assimilated to officers; the cost of a compartment or such other accommodations as may be authorized by the Secretary of War for security purposes when secret documents are transported by officer messenger, or when valuable War Departinent property is transported as hand baggage by personnel of the Military Establishment; transportation of troops; transportation, or reimbursement therefor, of cadets, enrolled members of the Medical Department, enlisted men, recruits, recruiting parties, applicants for enlistment between places of acceptance for enlistment and reoruiting stations, rejected applicants for enlistment, general prisoners, cadets and accepted cadets from their homes to the Military Academy, discharged cadets, civilian employees, civilan witnesses before courts martial, and dependents of civilian and military personnel; all necessary expenses of travel, under such regulations and restrictions as the Secretary of War may prescribe, of military personnel who have served outside the continental limits of the United States or in Alaska, to places in the United States, its Territories and possessions, whether ou leave or duty status, for purposes connected with redeployment or reassignment, or for the purpose of recuperation, rehabilitation and recovery; travel pay to discharged military personnel; transportation of discharged prisoners and persons discharged from Saint Elizabeths Hospital after transfer thereto from the military service, to their homes, or elsewhere as they may elect, the cost in each case not to be greater than to the place of last enlistment; transportation of persons discharged for fraudulent enlistment; monetary allowances for liquid coffee for troops traveling when supplied with cooked or travel rations; commutation of quarters and rations to enlisted men traveling on detached duty when it is impracticable to carry rations, and to applicants for enlistment and general prisoners traveling under orders; per diem allowanices or actual cost of subsistence while in a travel status, to civilian employees and civilian witnesses before courts martial; for rental of camp sites and the local procurement of communication service, fuel, light, water service, and other necessary supplies and services incident to individual or troop movements, including transportation of organizational equipment and impedimenta; and for transportation of authorized baggage of military and civilian personnel, including packing and unpacking; [ $\$ 720,000,000] \$ 185,680,000$ : Provided, That other appropriations for the Military Establishment shall be charged with such amounts as may be required for travel in connection with development, procurement, production, maintenance, or construetion activities; and, with such exception, no other appropriation in this Act shall be available for any expense for or incident to travel of personnel of the Regular Army or civilian employees under the War Department, except the [appropriation $\boldsymbol{1}$ appropriations "Government and relief in occupied areas", "Atomic Service", and "Contingencies of the Army" and the appropriations for Engineer Service, Army, the National Guard, the Organized Reserves, the Reserve Officers' Training Corps, and the National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice, and except as may be provided for in the appropriations "Special Field Exercises", "Inter-American Relations, War Department", and "Air Corps, Army": Provided further, That, in addition to the authority contained in section 67, National Defense Act of June 3, 1916, as amended, a total of not to exceed $\$ 15,000$ of the appropriations available to the War Department chargeable with expenses of travel shall be available for expenses incident to attendance at mectings of technical, professional, scientific, and other similar organizations, when, in the judgment of the Secretary of War, such attendance would be of benefit in the conduct of the work of the War Departinent: Provided further, That appropriations available for travel of personnel of the Military Establishment or employees under the War Department which are current at the date of relief from duty station of such personnel traveling under orders shall be charged with all expenses properly chargeable to such appropriations in connection with the travel enjoined, including travel of dependents and transportation of authorized baggage and household effects of such personnel, regardless of the dates of arrival at destination of the persons so traveling; (5 U.S. C. 78, 73a; 10 U.S. C. 747; 37 U.S. C. 103, 112-112a, 117, $117 a, b ; 50$ App. U. ## National Guard-

[For the National Guard, $\$ 100$, which amount shall be available for any of the objects, as may be determined by the War Department, specified in the appropriations for the National Guard in the Military Appropriation Act, 1942.]

For all expenses necessary for equipping, maintaining, operating and training the National Guard, including expenses of camps, airfields, and storage facilities either on Government-owned or State-owned land, construction and maintenance of buildings, structures, and facilities, the hire (at a rate not exceeding $\$ 1$ per diem), repair, maintenance and operation of passenger automobiles, and the modification, repair, maintenance and operation of airplanes; transportation of things; personal services at the seat of government or elsewhers (including services of personnel of the National Guard employed as civilians, without regard to their military rank) necessary for the care, maintenance, modification and repair of materials and equipment, for Federal property and custodial accounting work, and for administrative and such other duties as may be required; medical and hospital treatment of members of the National Guard who suffer injury or contract disease in line of duty and other expenses connected therewith as authorized by the Act of June 15, 1936 ( 10 U. S. C. 455); pay at a rate not less than $\$ 2,400$ per annum and travel of property and disbursing officers for the United States; attendance of National Guard personnel at military service schools and expenses of enlisted men of the Regular Army on duty with the National Guard, including allowances for quarters and subsistence; drill pay of the National Guard; travel of personnel of the

Regular Army detailed to or on duty with the National Guard, including transportation of dependents, and transportation, packing, crating and unpacking of household goods and effects; procurement and issue to the National Guard of the several States, Territories and the District of Columbia of military equipment and supplies, as provided by law, including motor-propelled vehicles and airplanes, and repair and modification of such equipment and supplies; $\$ 110,000,000$ : Provided, That the Secretary of War is hereby authorized to issue to the National Guard without charge against this appropriation except for actual expenses incident to such issue, supplies and equipment from surplus or excess supplies or equipment purchased for the Army: Provided further, That the number of caretakers authorized to be employed for any one unit, pool, or heavier-than-air squadron under the provisions of section 90 of the National Defense Act of June 3, 1916, as amended, may be such as is deemed necessary by the Secretary of War: Provided further, That not to exceed $\$ 25,500$ of this appropriation shall be available for the settlement of claims (not exceeding $\$ 500$ in any one case) for damages to or loss of private property incident to the operation of camps of instruction, either during the stay of National Guard units in such camps or while en route thereto or therefrom. (Act of July 3, 1945, Public Law 126.)

No part of the appropriations made in this Act shall be available for pay, allowances, or traveling or other expenses of any officer or enlisted man of the National Guard who may be drawing a pension, disability allowance, disability compensation, or retired pay (where retirement has been made on account of physical disability or age) from the Government of the United States: Provided, That nothing herein shall be construed as barring the continuance of adjutants general in a federally recognized status without pay under this Act. (Act of July 3, 1945, Public Law 126.)

## ORGANIZED RESERVES

## Organized Reserves-

For pay and allowances, not otherwise provided for, of members of the Officers' Reserve Corps (including nurses) and reserve warrant officers on active duty in accordance with law; mileage, reimbursement of actual traveling expenses, or per diem allowances in lieu thereof, as authorized by law; travel in kind, or reimbursement in lieu thereof, as now authorized by law for officers of the Regular Army, of dependents of Reserve officers and Reserve warrant officers who have been ordered to active duty for periods in excess of fifteen days; personal services; pay, transportation, subsistence, clothing, and medical and hospital treatment of members of the Enlisted Reserve Corps; conducting correspondence or extension courses for instruction of members of the Reserve Corps, including necessary supplies, procurement of maps and textbooks; transportation and traveling expenses of employees; purchase of training manuals, including Government publications and blank forms, subscriptions to magazines and periodicals of a professional or technical nature;
[For] establishment, maintenance, and operation of Organized Reserve headquarters, aviation facilities and camps for training of the Organized Reserves; for miscellaneous expenses incident to the administration of the Organized Reserves, including the maintenance and operation of motor-propelled passenger-carrying vehicles; for the actual and necessary expenses, or per diem in lieu thereof, at rates authorized by law, incurred by officers and enlisted men of the Regular Army and Reserve officers and Reserve warrant officers ordered to active duty for periods in excess of fifteen days traveling on duty in connection with the Organized Reserves, and for travel of dependents, and packing and transportation of baggage of such personnel; [\$100] for expenses incident to the use, including upkeep and depreciation costs, of supplies, equipment, and materiel furnished from stocks under the control of the War Department; for transportation of baggage, including packing and craiing, of Reserve officers and Reserve warrant officers ordered to active duty for not less than six months; for the medical and hospital treatment of members of the Officers' Reserve Corps and of the Enlisted Reserve Corps, who suffer injury or contract disease in line of duty, as provided by the Act of June 15, 1936 (10 U.S.C.455), and for such other purposes in connection therewith as are authorized by the said Act, including pay and allowances, subsistence, transportation and burial expenses; in all $\$ 56,000,000$. (10 U.S. C. $97,961 b, 366-369 a$, 427, 455a-456; 97 U.S. C. 103; Act of July 3, 1945, Public Law 126.)

None of the funds appropriated elsewhere in this Act, except for printing and binding, field exercises, and for pay and allowances of officers and enlisted men of the Regular Army, and for mileage, reimbursement of actual traveling expenses, or per diem allowances in lieu thereof, as authorized by law, to Air Corps Reserve officers on extended active duty, shall be used for expenses in connection with the Organized Reserves, but available supplies and existing facilities at military posts shall be utilized to the fullest extent practicable.

No appropriation made in this Act shall be available for pay, allowances, or traveling or other expenses of any officer of the Organized Reserves who may be drawing a pension, disability allowance, disability compensation, or retired pay from the Government of the United States.

The pay and allowances of such additional officers and nurses of the Medical Reserve Corps as are required to supplement the like officers and nurses of the Regular Army in the care of beneficiaries of the United States Veterans' Administration treated in Army hospitals may be paid from the funds allotted to the War Department by that Administration under existing law. (Act of July 3, 1945, Public Law 126.)

## RESERVE OFFICERS' TRAINING CORPS

## Reserve Officers' Training Corps-

For the procurement, maintenance, and issue, under such regulations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of War, to institutions at which one or more units of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps are maintained, of such public animals, means of transportation, supplies, tentage, equipment, and uniforms as he may deem necessary, including cloaning and laundering of uniforms and clothing at camps; and to forage, at the expense of the United States, public animals so issued, and to pay commutation in lieu of uniforms at a rate to be fixed annually by the Secretary of War; for transporting said animals and other authorized supplies and equipment from place of issue to the several institutions and training camps and return of same to place of issue when necessary; for purchase of training manuals, including Government publications and blank forms; for the establishment and maintenance of camps for the further practical instruction of the members of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps, and for transporting members of such corps to and from such camps or other places designated by the Secretary of War, and to subsist them while traveling to and from such camps and while remaining therein so far as appropriations will permit, or, in lieu of transporting them to and from such camps and subsisting them while en route, to pay them travel allowance at the rate of 5 cents per mile for the distance by the shortest usually traveled route from the places from which they are authorized to proceed to the camp and for the return travel thereto, and to pay the return travel pay in advance of the actual performance of the travel, or to pay commutation in lieu of subsistence at camps at rates fixed by the Secretary of War; for expenses incident to the use, including upkeep and depreciation costs, of supplies, equipment, and matériel furnished in accordance with law from stocks under the control of the War Department; for pay for students attending advanced

camps at the rate prescribed for soldiers of the seventh grade of the Regular Army; for the payment of commutation of subsistence to members of the senior division of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps, at a rate not exceeding the cost of the garrison ration prescribed for the Army, as authorized in the Act approved June 3 1916, as amended by the Act approved June 4, 1920 ( 10 U. S. C. 387); for the medical and hospital treatment of members of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps, who suffer personal injury or contract disease in line of duty, and for other expenses in connection therewith, including pay and allowances, subsistence, transportation, and burial expenses, as authorized by the Act of June 15, 1936 (49 Stat. 1507); for mileage, traveling expenses, or transportation, for transportation of dependents (including dependents of retired officers, warrant officers, and enlisted men of the first three grades, and enlisted men of the first three grades of the Regular Army Reserve, ordered to active duty and upon relief therefrom), and for packing, crating, and unpacking, and transportation of baggage (including baggage of retired officers, warrant officers, and enlisted men of the first three grades, and enlisted men of the first three grades of the Regular Army Reserve ordered to active duty and upon relief therefrom) for officers, warrant officers, and enlisted men traveling on duty pertaining to or on detail to or relief from duty with the Reserve Officers' Training Corps; for the purchase, maintenance, repair, and operation of motor vehicles, including station wagons; for the procurement and issue as provided in section 55 c of the Act approved June 4, 1920 (10 U. S. C. 1180), and in section 1225, Revised Statutes, as amended, under such regulations as may be prescribed by the Secretary of War, to schools and colleges, other than those provided for in section 40 of the Act above referred to, of such arms, tentage, and equipment, and of ammunition, targets, and target materials, including the transporting of the same, and the overhauling and repair of articles issued as the Secretary of War shall deem necessary for proper military training in said schools and colleges; [\$100] \$16,782,000: Provided, That uniforms and other equipment or material issued to the Reserve Officers' Training Corps in accordance with law shall be furnished from surplus stocks of the War Department without payment from this appropriation, except for actual expense incurred in the manufacture or issue: Provided further, That in no case shall the amount paid from this appropriation for uniforms, equipment, or material furnished to the Reserve Officers' Training Corps from stocks under the control of the War Department be in excess of the price current at the time the issue is made: Provided further, That none of the funds appropriated in this Act shall be used for the organization or maintenance of a greater number of mounted units in the Reserve Officers' Training Corps than were in existence on January 1, 1928[, or for additional motor transport or tank units unless in replacement of existing cavalry units1: Provided further, That none of the funds appropriated in this Act shall be available for any
expense on account of any student in [Air Corps,] Dental Corps, or Veterinary units not a member of such units on May 5, 1932 but such stoppage of further enrollments shall not interfere with the maintenance of existing units: Provided further, That none of the funds appropriated elsewhere in this Act, except for printing and binding and pay and allowances of officers and enlisted men, shall be used for expenses in connection with the Reserve Officers' Training Corps. ## NATIONAL BOARD FOR PROMOTION OF RIFLE PRACTICE, ARMY

## Promotion of Rifle Practice-

Promotion of rifle practice: For construction, equipment, and maintenance of rifle ranges, the instruction of citizens in marksmanship, and promotion of practice in the use of rifled arms, for arms, ammunition, targets, and other accessories for target practice, for issue and sale in accordance with rules and regulations prescribed by the National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice and approved by the Secretary of War; for clerical services, including not exceeding $[\$ 30,000] \$ 45,000$ in the District of Columbia; for procurement of materials, supplies, trophies, prizes, badges, services,
and such other items as are authorized in section 113, Act of June 3, 1916, and under this head in War Department Appropriation Act of June 7, 1924; for the conduct of the national matches, including incidental travel of rifle teams and of individuals and of Marine Corps and other detachments required in the operation of the matches and including incidental travel of rifle teams and individuals attending regional, national, and international competitions, and for the purchase of medals and badges for use in National Rifle Association competitions, including those fired as a part of the national matches; for mileage at 8 cents per mile for members of the National Board for the Promotion of Rifte Practice when authorized by the Secretary of War, any provision of law to the contrary notwithstanding; and for maintenance of the National Board for the Pro-
motion of Rifle Practice, including not to exceed $\mathbf{[ \$ 4 , 5 0 0 ]} \$ 10,500$ for incidental expenses in addition to the amount authorized by Act of May 28, 1928; to be expended under the direction of the Secretary of War; [ $\$ 67,000 \mathbf{1} \$ 167,000$ : Provided, That officers, warrant officers, and enlisted men of the National Guard and Organized Reserves, who, under regulations prescribed by the Secretary of War, volunteer to participate without pay as competitors or range officers in the national matches to be held during the fiscal year 1947, may attend such matches without pay, notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, but shall be entitled to travel and subsistence allowances at the same rates as are provided for civilians who attend and participate in said matches, but this proviso shall not operate to prohibit the pay of such competitors or range officers, provided funds for such payment are available from the appropriation "Promotion of rifle practice, 1947 ", nor shall any provision in this Act operate to deprive a Reserve officer ordered to active duty incident to the national matches of pay for the full period of such active duty, provided funds for such payment are available from the appropriation "Promotion of rifle practice, 1947": Provided further, That officers, warrant officers, and enlisted men of the National Guard and Organized Reserves may be ordered to duty, with their consent, for the care, maintenance, and operation of the ranges used in the conduct of the national matches, and such officers, warrant officers, and enlisted men while so engaged shall be entitled to the same pay, subsistence, and transportation as officers, warrant officers, and enlisted men of corresponding grades of the Regular Army are entitled by law, which expense shall be provided by the appropriation "Promotion of rifle practice"; and after being duly mustered may be paid for the period from the date of leaving home rendezvous to date of return thereto as determined in advance, both dates inclusive. (Act of July 3, 1945, Public Law 126.)

## Expenses, Army of the Philippines-

[For all expenses necessary for the mobilization, operation, and maintenance of the Army of the Philippines, including expenses connected with calling into the service of the armed forces of the United States the organized military forces of the Government of the Commonwealth of the Philippines, and expenditures incident to pay, allowances, operation, maintenance, and other activities of units and personnel of said organized military forces, and for the emergent mobilization and training of such forces, may be made without regard to the provisions of law regulating the expenditure of or accounting for funds of the United States but shall be expended and accounted for in a manner prescribed by the President of the United States, $\$ 100$, which shall be available for payment to the Government of the Commonwealth of the Philippines upon its written request, either in advance of or in reimbursement for all or any part of the estimated or actual cost, as authorized by the Commanding General, United States Army Forces in the Far East, of necessary expenses for the purposes aforesaid: Provided, That any appropriation for the Military Establishment may be applied to the purposes aforesaid and may be reimbursed by transfer from this appropriation of the value of such property or service as may have been or may be applied to such purposes and any amount so transferred shall be available for expenditure for the purposes of the appropriation so reimbursed during the fiscal year in which such amount was received and the ensuing fiscal year.] (Act of July 3, 1945, Public Law 126.)

Sec. 2. No part of the appropriations made in this Act shall be available for the salary or pay of any officer, manager, superintendent, foreman, or other person having charge of the work of any employee of the United States Government while making or causing to be made with a stop watch, or other time-measuring device, a time study of any job of any such employee between the starting and completion thereof, or of the movements of any such employee while engaged upon such work; nor shall any part of the appropriations made in this Act be available to pay any premiums or bonus or cash reward to any employee in addition to his regular wages, except as may be otherwise authorized in this Act.

Sec. 3. [The appropriation "Finance Service, Army" may be increased by transfer of not to exceed $\$ 6,813,185,000$ of unobligated balances available on or after June 30, 1945, under the appropriations now entitled "Expediting production of equipment and supplies for national defense"; "Contingencies of the Army", "Air Corps, Army"; "Special field exercises, Army"; and "Supplies and transportation, Army" (subhead-"Army transportation"), and, in addition, not] Not to exceed 10 per centum of any of the appropriations for the Military Establishment for the fiscal year [1946 (except the appropriations "National Guard", "Organized Reserves", and "Reserve Officers' Training Corps"), 11947 may be transferred with the approval of the Bureau of the Budget to any other of such appropriations, but no appropriation [or subappro-
priation, except the subappropriations "Claims for damage to or loss or destruction of property, or personal injury, or death" and "Claims of military and civilian personnel of the War Department for destruction of private property" I shall be increased more than 10 per centum thereby.

Sec. 4. The foregoing appropriations for "Quartermaster Service, Army", "Signal Service of the Army", "Air Corps, Army", "Medical and Hospital Department", "Engineer Service, Army", "Ordnance Service and Supplies", "Chemical Warfare Service", and "Seacoast Defenses" shall each be available for the pay and allowances, including travel allowances, of such Reserve officers as the President may, with their consent, order to active duty for such periods, not in excess of two years, as their service may be required in the procurement or production of equipment therein appropriated for, or on duty pertaining to aviation.

Sec. 5. Appropriations for the Military Establishment for the fiscal year [1946] 1947 shall be available for carrying out the purposes of Executive Order 9112 of March 26, 1942; for expenses in connection with the administration by the Army of occupied areas; [for food, clothing, medicine and other items to meet urgent civilian needs in occupied and such other areas as may be determined by the Secretary of War to be important to military operations of the United States; 1 for expenses of conducting investigations in foreign countries incident to matters relating strictly to the Military Establishment, without regard to section 3648, Revised Statutes, including such compensation, expenses, and allowances of witnesses, cost of procuring and transcribing evidence, documents and testimony and other miscellaneous and incidental expenses as may ibe determined by the investigating officer to be necessary and in accord with local custom; for living quarters allowances in accordance with the Act of June 26, 1930 (5 U. S. C. 118a), and regulations prescribed thereunder, and cost of living allowances in accordance with the Act of February 23, 1931, as amended (22 U. S. C. 12), and regulations prescribed thereunder, for all civilian officers and employees of the War Department who are citizens of the United States permanently stationed in foreign countries; and for employees' special wearing apparel and equipment necessary to carry out the purposes of this Act.

Sec. 6. No part of any appropriation made by this Act shall be used in any way to pay any expense in connection with the conduct, operation, or management of any post exchange, branch exchange, or subexchange within any State, Territory, or the District of Columbia, save and except for real assistance and convenience under such regulations as the Secretary of War may prescribe, to such personnel as are now or may be hereafter authorized by law and regulation to purchase subsistence stores or other Quartermaster supplies and to civilians employed or serving at military posts in supplying them with articles of small personal needs, not similar to those furnished by the Government: Provided, That the commanding officer of the post at which any such exchange is situated shal certify on the monthly report of the post exchange council that such exchange was, during the period covered by such report, operated in compliance with this section: Provided further, That at posts isolated from a convenient market the Secretary of War may broaden the nature of the articles to be sold.
[Sec. 7. No part of any appropriation contained in this Act shall be used directly or indirectly, except for temporary employment in case of emergency, for the payment of any civilian for services rendered by him on the Canal Zone while occupying a skilled, technical, clerical, administrative, executive, or supervisory position unless such person is a citizen of the United States of America or of the Republic of Panama: Provided, however, (1) That, notwithstanding the provision in the Act approved August 11, 1939 (53 Stat. 1409), limiting employment in the above-mentioned positions to citizens of the United States from and after the date of the approval of said Act, citizens of Panama may be employed in such positions; (2) that at no time shall the number of Panamanian citizens employed in the above-mentioned positions exceed the number of citizens of the United States so employed, if United States citizens are available in continental United States or on the Canal Zone; (3) that nothing in this Act shall prohibit the continued employment of any person who shall have rendered fifteen or more years of faithful and honorable service on the Canal Zone; (4) that in the selection of personnel for skilled, technical, administrative, clerical, supervisory, or executive positions, the controlling factors in filling these positions shall be efficiency, experience, training, and education; (5) that all citizens of Panama and the United States rendering skilled, technical, clerical, administrative, executive, or supervisory service on the Canal Zone under the terms of this Act (a) shall normally be employed not more than forty hours per week; (b) may receive as compensation equal rates of pay based upon rates paid for similar employment in continental United States plus 25 per centum; (6) this entire section shall apply only to persons employed in skilled, technical, clerical, administrative, ex-
ecutive, or supervisory positions on the Canal Zone directly or indirectly by any branch of the United States Government or by any corporation or company whose stock is owned wholly or in part by the United States Government: Provided further, That the President may suspend from time to time in whole or in part compliance with this section in time of war or national emergency if he should deem such course to be in the public interest. I

Sec. [8] 7. Appropriations for the Military Establishment for the fiscal year [1946] 1947 shall be available for all necessary expenses in connection with the instruction and training, including tuition, not otherwise provided for, of civilian employees in and under the War Department and the Military Establishment.

SEc. [9] 8. Whenever, 'during the fiscal year ending June 30, [1946] 1947, the Secretary of War should deem it to be advantageous to the national defense, and if in his opinion the existing facilities of the War Department are inadequate, he is hereby authorized to employ, by contract or otherwise, without reference to section 3709, Revised Statutes, civil service or classification laws, or section 5 of the Act of April 6, 1914 (38 Stat. 335), and at such rates of compensation (not to exceed [\$25] $\$ 40$ per day and travel expenses, including actual transportation and per diem in lieu of subsistence while traveling from their homes or places of business to official duty station and return as may be authorized in travel orders or letters of appointment for individuals) as he may determine, the services of architects, engineers, or firms or corporations thereof, and other lechnical and professional personnel as may be necessary.

Sec. [10] 9. Section 3648, Revised Statutes (31 U. S. C. 529), shall not apply to pay ments made from appropriations contained in this Act in compliance with the laws of foreign countries or their ministerial regulations [under which military attachés are required to operate $]$ or to payments made for tuition.

Sec. [11] 10. No part of any appropriation contained in this Act shall be used to pay the salary or wages of any person who advocates, or who is a member of an organization that advocates, the overthrow of the Government of the United States by force or violence: Provided, That for the purposes hereof an affidavit shall be considered prima facie evidence that the person making the affidavit does not advocate, and is not a member of an organization that advocates, the overthrow of the Government of the United States by force or violence: Provided further, That any person who advocates, or who is a member of an organization that advocates, the overthrow of the Government of the United States by force or violence and accepts employment the salary or wages for which are paid from any appropriation in this Act shall be guilty of a felony and, upon conviction, shall be fined not more than $\$ 1,000$ or imprisoned for not more than one year, or both: Provided further, That the above penalty clause shall be in addition to, and not in substitution for, any other provisions of existing law.

Sec. [12] 11. No part of any money appropriated herein or included under any contract authority herein granted shall be expended for the payment of any commission on any land purchase contract in excess of 2 per centum of the purchase price.

SEC. [13] 12. No part of any appropriation contained in this Act may be obligated for the construction of quarters, including heating and plumbing apparatus, wiring and fixtures, in continental United States, except in Alaska, for greater amounts per unit than follow:

Permanent construction:
For commissioned officer, $\$ 10,000$.
For commissioned warrant or warrant officer, $\$ 7,500$.
For enlisted man, $\$ 6,000$.
Temporary construction:
For commissioned officer, $\$ 7,500$.
For commissioned warrant or warrant officer, $\$ 5,000$. For enlisted man, $\$ 3,500$.
[Sec. 14. Whenever the President deems it to be in the interest of national defense, he may authorize the Secretary of War to sell, transfer title to, exchange, lease, lend, or otherwise dispose of, to the government of any country whose defense the President deems vital to the defense of the United States, defense articles procured from funds appropriated in this or prior Acts, in accordance with the provisions of the Act of March 11, 1941, as amended (22 U. S. C. 411-419) to the extent that transfers have been authorized in prior Acts: Provided, That the term "defense article" as used herein shall be deemed to include defense information and services (including furnishing of quarters, subsistence, transportation, and hospitalization of personnel, and care of the dead), whether or not such information or service is necessary to or connected with the procurement or disposition of any defense article.]

SEc. [15] 19. The Secretary of War is authorized to utilize any appropriation available for the Military Establishment, under such regulations as he may prescribe, for all expenses incident
to the maintenance, pay, and allowances of prisoners of war, other persons in Army custody whose status is determined by the Secretary of War to be similar to prisoners of war, and persons detained in Army custody pursuant to Presidential proclamation.

Sec. [16] 14. The appropriations contained in this Act which are available for the procurement or manufacture of munitions of war of special or technical design may be used for the development and procurement of gages, dies, jigs, and other special aids and appliances, production studies, factory plans, and other production data, including specifications and detailed drawings, in accordance with the provisions of sections 120 and 123 of the National Defense Act, as amended. Such appropriations may also be used for the purchase of letters patent, applications for letters patent, and licenses under letters patent and applications for letters patent that pertain to such equipment or material for which the appropriations are made.

SEC. [17] 15. None of the moneys appropriated by this or any other Act shall be available to the War Department or the Military Establishment for audit work for the purpose of reconciling family allowance pay-roll deductions made by disbursing officers in the field with family allowance payments to dependents of military personnel under the provisions of the Servicemen's Dependents Allowance Act of 1942.
[Sec. 18. Appropriations available to the Military Establishment for the fiscal year 1945 shall remain available until June 30, 1946, and appropriations made by this Act or otherwise available to the Military Establishment shall be merged with (except as otherwise provided in this Act) and become parts of appropriations under the respective heads in the Military Appropriation Act, 1945, as amended, or otherwise available, and shall include the objects and be subject to the limitations and conditions under said heads respectively in those Acts except as otherwise provided herein: Provided, That repayments affecting merged appropriations shall be credited to the applicable current appropriations. $]$

Sec. [10] 16. The appropriations for the Military Establishment and for civil functions administered by the War Department for the fiscal year [1946] 1947 shall be available for the payment of rewards, subject to such regulations as the Secretary of War shall prescribe, to civilian officers and employees in addition to their usual compensation and to persons in civil life for suggestions resulting in improvement or economy in manufacturing process or plant or military material, and for suggestions resulting in efficiency or economy in the operation or administration of the War Department and the Military Establishment, and for expenses of such nonmonetary awards, including citations, insignia, emblems, medals, and devices, as may be granted in recognition of faithful and meritorious service.

Sec. [20] 17. During the fiscal year [1946] 1947 occupancy of Government facilities under the jurisdiction of the Military Establishment on a rental basis by personnel of the services mentioned in the title of the Pay Readjustment Act of 1942 or by their dependents shall not deprive such personnel of money allowances for rental of quarters.

Sec. [21] 18. The [application to the requirements of the War Department by the reappropriation] rescissions of the unexpended balances of War Department appropriations of prior years shall be deemed to be a compliance with so much of paragraph (2) of subsection (c) of section 403, as amended, of the Sixth Supplemental National Defense Appropriation Act, 1942, as reads: "Upon the withholding of any amount of excessive profits or the crediting of any amount of excessive profits against amounts otherwise due a contractor, the Secretary shall certify the amount thereof to the Treasury and the appropriations of his Department shall be reduced by an amount equal to the amount so withheld or credited. The amount of such reductions shall be transferred to the surplus fund of the Treasury".
[SEc. 22. As to appropriations and contract authorizations granted for the Military Establishment contained in this Act, in addition to compliance with the provisions of section 303 of the Second Deficiency Appropriation Act, 1944, there shall be submitted to the Appropriation Committees of the Congress on January 3, 1946, a list showing the condition of the balances of each of such appropriations and contract authorizations together with recommendations for the repeal of such of those funds or portions thereof as are deemed no longer required for the purposes for which they were granted. $]$

SEc. 19. The Secretary of War is authorized to delegate to subordinate officials the power to employ persons in the departmental service of the War Department wherever located and to delegate to such officials as he shall designate the function of authorizing payment of the cost of transportation of employees' immediate families on change from one official duty station to another for permanent duty.
