Appointment of Dr. Luther H. Evans, of Bastrop, Texas, for the past pears assistant professor of politics at Princeton University, as National rvisor of the Historical Records Survey now being conducted by the WPA ral Writers! Project, was announced today by Assistant WPA Administrator by Baker.

The Historical Records Survey has been organized to carry out the of a recent WPA allotment of \$1,195,800 for making a nationwide inventory merican historical materials. The principal work will consist in the listing public records of state, county and municipal records for use by scholars, ernmental officials, business men and others. It will include the preparation peneral descriptions of the historical papers in the possession of libraries, orical societies, and similar groups.

The project, on which Dr. Evans has been working for several months, been prepared with the close cooperation and advice of representatives of a er of learned organizations, including the American Historical Association.

Before teaching at Princeton, Dr. Evans taught for two years at thought College, one year at New York University, and three years at Leland aford University. He received his Ph. He is the author of numerous articles on a subjects as constitutional and international law, the League of Nations, and Virgin Islands.
