SUMMARY OF BUSINESS TRENDS

BUSINESS activity generally continues to move ahead. So far in November production in the major industries is holding steady or advancing against the usual seasonal decline. Daily automobile assemblies are being maintained at above 24,000 units and steel-ingot production remains above 96½ percent of capacity. Electric power output and bituminous and anthracite coal production are rising. In retail trade, department store sales are showing new strength as consumer purchasing power expands. Factory pay roll data covering October disclosed that wage disbursements were at the highest level in the decade, while factory employment increased contraseasonally. The seasonally adjusted index of factory employment advanced from 105.2 in September to 107.5 in October, compared with 101.2 in the corresponding period a year ago.


An increase of \$48 million in exports of United States merchandise during October indicates that there has been no decline in foreign demand, despite the fall in shipments a month earlier. Exports advanced to \$336 million in October from \$288 million in September, virtually offsetting the drop of \$54 million in that month. Two-thirds of the advance was made by increases in aircraft, automotive products, nonferrous metals, petroleum

products, and metal-working machinery. Total iron and steel mill exports, however, declined 5 percent as increases in finished steel products were offset by reduced shipments of semimanufactured steel. Shipments of agricultural commodities increased seasonally in the month but remained at relatively low levels.

While data as to country destination of exports are as yet unavailable, the character of the commodity increases indicates larger takings by the United Kingdom. October shipments of aircraft, totaling over \$31 million, were 37 percent above the preceding month for the second largest volume to date. Exports of metal-working machinery moved into new high ground as shipments exceeded \$27 million, an increase of 19 percent over September. Brass and bronze tonnage again rose and, as large copper deliveries were resumed, the total nonferrous metals exported increased from \$13.6 million to \$19.9 million. In automotive products the month's showing was the best since March

motive products the month's showing was the best since March. General imports rose from \$195 million to \$207 million in the month. The increases occurred in a broad list of textiles and foodstuffs (except cane sugar). In the strategic and critical materials, silk imports increased more than 50 percent, while tin and crude rubber imports declined from record September volumes.
