SUMMARY OF BUSINESS TRENDS


Increased production in industries associated with the national defense effort was chiefly responsible for a further rise in aggregate output during February. Preliminary data indicate that the Federal Reserve Board's adjusted index of industrial production rose one to two points above the record 139 established in January. Only small changes from February levels have since taken place in most industries for which weekly data are available. Automobile assemblies, however, numbered 131,400 units for the week ending March 15—the largest weekly total since early in May 1937. Steel output also advanced at this time to 98.8 percent of capacity, the largest weekly tonnage in the history of the industry. For the current week it is scheduled at 99.4 percent of capacity.

Construction contract awards covered by the F. W. Dodge Corporation totaled \$270 million in February, compared with \$305 million in the previous month. The shorter month was mainly responsible for the smaller total, and awards on a daily average basis advanced by only slightly less than the usual seasonal amount. Residential awards, similarly computed, increased by more than three times the usual seasonal. The Dodge Corporation reported defense contracts of \$15 million

and \$30 million, respectively, in January and February. But because of difficulties in classification, some of the actual contracts let for defense purposes were not included in this tabulation. The Defense Commission announced that contracts totaling \$358 million were awarded for construction of defense plant and equipment in January, as compared with a total of \$700 million in the previous 7 months. These contracts, in addition to other large backlogs, are helping to push current construction activity forward.

The upward movement of sensitive commodity prices was accelerated during the second week of this month, the Bureau of Labor Statistics' 28 commodity index (August 1939=100) rising to 129.1 on March 14 from 125.6 a week earlier. Domestic and import commodities shared about equally in the increase, their indexes rising from 120.5 to 123.9 and from 134.0 to 137.7, respectively. The broad nature of the advance is shown by the fact that prices for 19 of the 28 commodities rose during the week, while prices for 8 remained unchanged. The index has now passed for the first time the high mark reached during the speculative upsurge following the outbreak of the war in the early autumn of 1939.
