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DEPARTMENT STORE SALES IN JUNE 1936
Preliminary report
Department store sales were maintained in June at the relatively high level reached in May. The Board's seasonally adjusted index advanced from 88 percent of the 1923-1925 average in May to 89 percent in June.

Total sales in June were 15 percent larger and in the first half of the year 10 percent larger than in the corresponding periods of 1935. All Federal Reserve districts showed increases in comparison with last year.
